Soil Conservationist A soil survey report for 14 East Kentucky counties is now available, according to an announcement made this week by H. A. Taff, state conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service. The report covers 3,627,000 acres. The report gives a detailed de-

the location of the major soil The report provides valuable information for people working in area-wide development, Taff said, as well as specific information

of individual soils Taff pointed out that the suitability is given for each soil for the production of wood crops, agronomic crops and wildlife. The engineering properties of the soils

are also classified. For a given soil the woodland section recommends the tree pecies to plant in an existing woodland and species to be plant ed in open fields. For each woodland soil the reports tells which trees will best produce and thus should be favored in manage-

In the horticultural section it is shown that Allegheny soils are suited for the production of apples, peaches, grapes, certain small fruits, vegetables and nut trees. Tyler silt loam is not recommended for any of these crops. Huntington silt loam is not suited for apples, peaches and grapes but is well suited for vegetables and nut trees.

The agronomic section places each soil in its capability class and limitations are identified. Soils suitable for use in row crops, pasture and hay, and their required treatment and management are described.



The State Highway Department lost three of four land condemnation cases last week in the

On February 25, 1958 a truck owned by Ralph Boots Ratliff struck a bridge in Pike county. Five years and one day later the state filed suit to recover the cost of repairs. Pike circuit court threw it out on grounds there is a five-year statute of limitations on such matters.

The Highway Department contended the limitation for negligent damage to real estate actually is 10 years.

Beetle Plague Killing Region's Tulip Poplars, Nature Writer Reports

BY RUFUS M. REED

For the first time known, swarms of the tiny, black snout beetles are attacking the tulip poplars throughout this region and doing heavy damage. Some of the large tulip poplars now show more than half their leaves

The snout beetles are about one-fourth inch long, but four or five of them can soon eat enough of the leaf to kill it. They feed on the underside of the leaf, much in the manner of the Mexican bean beetle, and when about half of the leaf is eaten, it turns brown and dies as if it had been scalded by fire.

The beetles show the same habits as the Mexican bean beetle. When a leaf is touched on which they are eating, they let loose and drop, in this way escaping birds and other enemies.

The wholesale destruction of the leaves of the fine tulip popof the destruction of the chestnut trees several years ago by a parasitic fungus that killed them all. The small snout beetles have a corrugated, glossy wing cover and are voracious feeders. 



Of these 58, 11 have been dismissed because of compliance either before or after being indicted. Of the remaining 47, 27 have been indicted and 20 are awaiting action of the grand jury. The screening law enacted by the 1962 Kentucky General Assembly requires junkyard dealers to build suitable screens around their yards if they are within 2,000 feet of the highway centerline. Dealers have the option of moving their business if they do not wish to build screens.







### Points to Law Setting Fees for Constables

I had a number of friends who ran in the May primary for Constable, none of whom were nominated. This is the first time I have in all my 70-odd years had anything published in a newspaper, and I do this now to cite the fees allowed by law to Constables and to show those who lost the election that they did not lose as much as they may have thought.

WILLIE JOHNSON

Constables may collect, for the following services the following fees (See KRS 64.190);

Making arrests for violations involving a motor vehicle on the public highways, 50c; serving a summons in any civil case, on each defendant, before a justice of the peace, 50c; serving a peace or search warrant, for each defendant, \$1; levying an attachment, 50c; removing and taking care of any attached goods, livestock or other property taken under the attachment, a reasonable fee, to be allowed by court; summoning a garnishee, 50c; taking up a vagrant, 50c; summoning a witness, 20c; collecting money under execution or other legal process, taking a replevin or forthcoming bond, or for a stay of execution, the same commission that may be allowed a sheriff, and one percent more; collecting fee-bills, ten percent, to be deducted from the fee-bill; summoning and attending a jury. \$1; serving a notice on each person, 25c; killing a mad dog, \$1; and burying a distempered horse, ass or mule, \$3; killing and burying any other cattle, per head, \$2; altering a stud, jackass or bull, \$1. Any other services, the same fees allowed sheriffs for similar services.


