Pike Driver Sought After Flagman Beaten On New Road Project

State Police Wednesday were seeking the identity of the driver of a Pike county car who, early that morning, assaulted a flagman on the Prestonsburg arm of the Mountain Parkway.

Driver of the car, according to the flagman, left the auto and beat him with his fists, then drove away. The worker, a son of Monroe Adams, described the auto as a white Plymouth and gave Sheriff Henry C. Hale its license number. Sheriff Hale, however, learned later that the license number supplied him belongs to a 1958 Ford.

Sheriff Hale said flagmen on the route, which has been surfaced to Ivyton but on which work is still being done, have been subjected to considerable verbal abuse recently from motorists who insisted on driving over it.

The motorist who attacked Adams was driving in the direction of Salyersville, and officers there were alerted.

Goal of 100,000 Hours Worked Without Injury Is Reached by Gas Co.

The Prestonsburg district of the Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company reached a goal of 100,000 man-hours worked without a lost-time injury on August 9, 1965. This goal was achieved through the cooperative efforts of 64 employees who work in Johnson, Floyd, Martin, Lawrence and Magoffin counties.

May Joins 'U.S.-2's' Serving In Methodist Mission Work

Martin Douglas May, 217 St. Margaret Drive, Lexington, Kentucky, is one of 27 young men and women who are giving two years of their lives to the home missionary service of the Methodist Church, starting this fall.

Mr. May will do educational work at Holding Institute, a Methodist mission school for Spanish-speaking pupils at Laredo, Texas.

The 22 women and five men are called "U.S.-2's," because of their two years of professional home mission service in rural areas, mission schools and hospitals, community centers, inner city churches, children's homes and other mission projects. They are a kind of Methodist "domestic Peace Corps," filling such church-related humanitarian vocations as teaching, nursing, social work, rural church-and-community service, inner city church work and social service with children.

All projects are under the National Division of the Methodist Board of Missions. In preparation for their missionary service, the young people spent six weeks in training last summer at Scarritt College, Nashville, Tennessee.

Born in Prestonsburg, Mr. May attended the University of Kentucky at Lexington and graduated in 1964 with a bachelor of arts degree in political science. During the last two years he has been on the staff of the circulation department of the University of Kentucky Library. He is a member of the Aldersgate Methodist Church in Lexington, and of its Methodist Men's Club.

PHONE FIRM GETS FUNDS

\$340,000 Loan Made For Harold Company To Improve System

Congressman Carl D. Perkins announced in Washington Tuesday that the Department of Agriculture had authorized a loan of \$340,000 to the Harold Telephone Co., Inc., for the financing of a wide improvement program.

The loan will finance these improvements:

1. Upgrading of party-line service throughout the system, no line to have more than four subscribers (at present, some lines have eight).
2. Facilities to serve 157 new subscribers.
3. Construction of a dial office in the new exchange at Grethel, on Mud Creek.
4. Construction of 12 miles of new line.

Paul R. Gearheart, president of the company, said negotiations are now under way with the Southern Bell Telephone & Telegraph Company, seeking toll-free service from the Melvin area to McDowell.

The Harold Telephone Company was formed in 1953 with the purchase of the Olga Roberts Telephone Company which at the time had 71 subscribers. The system now has 1550 homes and businesses on its lines which extend along the river in the upper section of the county, through the Mud Creek area and into the head of Left Beaver Creek. In 1959 the company acquired the Valley Telephone Company with 525 subscribers in Melvin, Weeksburg and other communities on Left Beaver Creek.

HALL VICTIM OF WOUNDS

Knife Slashes Fatal To Banner Resident, Vets Hospital Patient

Glendon K. Hall, 34, of Banner, died in Lexington Tuesday night of what were described as self-inflicted knife wounds.

The report received here from Lexington said that Hall was a patient at Veterans hospital there and that he and another patient overpowered a guard and escaped the hospital grounds. He was said to have stabbed himself later with a screwdriver, then to have entered an apartment building where he procured a knife. A stab wound in the region of the heart caused death.

Mr. Hall had been in ill health for some time. He was a son of Edgar H. and Ida M. Hall, well-known Banner residents. Surviving, besides his parents, are his widow, Mrs. Jean Holbrook Hall, and one brother, Robert, of Banner.

Funeral rites will be conducted at 1 p.m. Friday from the Allen Baptist Church, the Revs. Fred McGinness and William H. Amburgey officiating. Burial will be made in Davidson Memorial Gardens under direction of the Hall Brothers Funeral Home.

James Clark Succumbs Monday; Was a Former Floyd County Official

James Clark, 92, former Floyd county magistrate, died Monday night at the Prestonsburg General hospital after an illness of several days.

A son of Alexander Lackey Clark and Elizabeth Peery Clark, he was a native of the Johns Creek section of the county. He was elected to two terms as magistrate, also served as county treasurer and for years owned and operated the Clark hotel here. During his latter years he had resided with his nephew, Montaine Clark, on the Auxier road, near here. He was a member of the Horn Chapel Methodist Church.

Mr. Clark was first married to Lou Ratliff, and after her death in 1905 to Jeannette Spears, who died in 1947. His only immediate survivor is a brother, Alex Clark, of Lancer.

Funeral rites were conducted this morning (Thursday) at 10 from the Free Will Baptist Church here, the Rev. Henry Crider officiating. Burial was made in the Dick Clark cemetery, near here, under direction of the Carter & Callihan Funeral Home.

NABBED PANTRY-RAIDER, PRISON CAMP ESCAPEE

An intruder found raiding the pantry at the home of Julian Scalp, near Mare Creek, last Sunday, turned out to be more than just another hungry man—he was a fugitive from a Virginia prison camp.

The fugitive fled through a kitchen window at Scalp's approach but was pursued and overpowered after a struggle, then brought to jail here. He was listed here as Paul Meadows, age about 35.

PUPIL DROP IS RECORDED

Enrollment Total As of Last Week 326 Below 1964

Floyd county's school enrollment as of August 24 showed a drop of 326 from the same date a year ago, according to figures compiled this week by Herbert Prater, county attendance officer.

The enrollment last year was 11,621. This year, it was 11,295.

And this year's enrollment is only 841 short of the total school census, which has been dropping regularly in recent years. As of July 1, 1964, the census total was 12,800—664 more than were listed in the census as of July 1, this year.

Added to the basic July 1, 1964 census were 907 children who became six years old by July 1 this year, 293 who transferred to this county from other Kentucky counties and 357 who transferred to the county from other states—all this raising the total to 14,357. But there were deductions to be made—1235 who became 18 by July 1, 200 who moved to other Kentucky counties, 768 who moved out of the state, 13 deaths and five duplications, leaving the net census figure for 1965 at 12,136.

Court Order Closes Alleged Trouble Spot On Sturgill's Motion

The place operated by Grover Handshoe on the divide between Raccoon Fork of Salt Lick in this county and the head of Licking River in Magoffin was closed by county court order Tuesday upon petition of County Attorney Barkley J. Sturgill.

Handshoe's place of business, which is located within a few yards of the Floyd-Magoffin line, has been the scene of drinking, with disorderly and boisterous persons frequenting it, and has been marked by cutting affrays. Sturgill said in his complaint. The county attorney described the place as a "constant aggravation" to officers.

Held in violation of KRS 231.110, the place was ordered temporarily closed. A hearing for its permanent closing has been slated for September 13.

Surviving, besides her husband, are seven step-children, George D. and Mack Lewis, Jr., both of Mackinaw, Illinois; Joe W. Lewis, Cleveland, Ohio; Mrs. Mollie Parrott and Mrs. Joretta Graybeal, Goodfield, Illinois; Mrs. Ellen Taylor, Cleveland, Ohio, and Miss Correne Lewis, Plymouth, Ohio. She also leaves two half-brothers and a sister.

The officiating minister was the Rev. James Harmon. Burial in Davidson Memorial Gardens was directed by the Baker Funeral Home.

Identity of Looters Of College Sought

City, county and state officers joined this morning (Thursday) in the investigation of the break made into the Prestonsburg Community College during the preceding night which resulted in heavy destruction of property.

Doors, locks, a safe, filing cabinets, desks, vending machines, a pay telephone—all items which might have contained money—were damaged or ruined as the thieves attacked with a crowbar.

Fingerprints were being sought by State Police but it was not known if they were successful.

The looting was discovered shortly after 7 a.m. today. Entry was effected after 9 p.m. Wednesday when the caretaker at the college left the grounds.

The college does not have a nightwatchman. "We didn't think one was needed," it was explained.

The break obviously was made in search of money, little of which was found. Dr. Henry A. Campbell, Jr., college director, said funds are not left in the building overnight, except for small amounts in vending machines.

All four outside doors of the building are so badly damaged that their replacement is necessary. Nine other doors, including some to cabinets, are ruined. About 20 door locks and numerous door frames were damaged, and the office safe was completely ruined.

The pay telephone at the southern entrance to the building was yanked from the wall and taken inside where it was torn apart.

The break apparently was made by persons who knew the interior layout of the building and spots where money was kept. There was no extensive vandalism for its own sake.

MARTIN GAS RATES ARGUED BEFORE PSC

The proposed gas rate for the town of Martin came before the Public Service Commission for the second time Monday, and a decision was postponed for 30 days.

The Public Service Commission analysis showed that the increase sought would mean a raise in the average gas bills at Martin of 30%.

The Martin Gas Company is asking for rates which would produce an estimated \$49,420 in annual gross revenues, according to the commission's analysis. IPSC estimates the present rates are yielding a gross of \$38,000 a year.

But Ray R. Allen, secretary-treasurer of the gas company and owner of 50 percent of its stock, testified that the increase sought would average only 16%. He said again that the company last year showed a profit of only \$171 and that the increase sought in rates is to permit the firm to realize 6% on its investment.

The \$171 profit figure was arrived at without including payment for some 9,628,000 cubic feet of gas which the gas company apparently received "free" from its suppliers in 1964.

Al Humphries, PSC principal engineer, said a staff study

showed that the company billed its customers for 59,968,000 cubic feet during 1964, but was billed by its two suppliers for only 50,340,000 cubic feet.

A check of customer meters showed some minor discrepancies, but nothing to explain the 9,628,000 difference, Humphries said. The gas apparently reached Martin Gas Co. without being registered on the suppliers' meters, Humphries said.

The suppliers are United Fuel Gas Co. and Southeastern Gas Co.

Martin Gas Co. got a 16 percent rate increase August 1, 1964. On January 1, 1965, it got an added 12 percent hike, based on higher rates granted provisionally to United Fuel. However, a final ruling out of part of the increase and Allen said yesterday that Martin customers have received refunds of 3.8 cents per 1,000 cubic feet for usage between January 1 and July 31.

The new rates would produce the biggest percentage increase, 49 percent, for users of 2,000 cubic feet per month. Last year an average of 34 out of the system's 364 customers were billed in this category.

At Monday's hearing, Prestonsburg attorney Joe Hobson presented a 220-name petition opposing the new rates. However, Allen said that several of the signers were not company customers. City Councilman Steve Stout, a railroad yardmaster, said the council had passed a resolution opposing the increase.

In a letter to PSC Chairman J. David Francis, Martin Mayor John H. Roberts charged that Stout's statements to a July 21 hearing were "for the express purpose of causing embarrassment to Mr. (Woodrow) Burchett (a PSC member)."

BILL FIXES TIME LIMIT

For 10% Tax Boost; Rep. Reynolds Views No Occupational Tax

Although a move apparently stemming from Kentucky educators is afoot to attempt to persuade a Governor Breathitt to broaden his special legislative session call to include an occupational tax of one-half of one percent, it appeared this week that the attempt will fail.

Instead, Breathitt's bill to roll back rates to hold taxes at their present level even under 100% assessment, with increases of 10% per year allowed after hearings are held by school boards, fiscal courts and other taxing bodies, is gaining ground and may be reported out of committee. This improved situation has developed from the addition of an amendment to the Breathitt bill, specifying that the increases may not be made for more than two years.

State Representative W. J. Reynolds, Jr., of Allen, said here last week that he was one of those openly opposed to permitting the 10% increase a year unless there was a definite limit on the number of years—one, preferably, and not more than two—for the raise to be made.

School officials have agreed to this limitation. Reynolds also predicted that any attempt made to induce the Legislature to vote an occupational tax would be unsuccessful.

LACKEY MAN IS WOUNDED

Officials Quiz Jones After Estill Shooting; Say No Charge Made

Officials here said Wednesday that no warrant has been issued and no arrest made in the shooting, late last Saturday afternoon at Estill, of Agnel Jones, of Lackey.

County Attorney Barkley J. Sturgill said he and Commonwealth's Attorney Harold J. Stumbo questioned Jones about the shooting but found him unwilling to divulge information.

Jones, who was at first believed to have been seriously wounded by a revolver bullet which passed through his body, left the emergency room of the McDowell Appalachian Regional hospital, Saturday night, walked to his car and drove home, authorities said they were told.

Sheriff Henry C. Hale said Cluett Messer, owner of the Estill building outside which Jones was shot, admitted to him that he returned Jones' fire. The sheriff said Messer told him Jones was told to leave the premises and that he suddenly began firing back into the building.

The shooting is expected to be investigated by the grand jury, which will convene Tuesday.

COMMUNITY COLLEGE ENROLLMENT AT 650

The Prestonsburg Community College began its second year of work Wednesday morning, and the enrollment on opening of the term stood at approximately 650.

The number of fulltime day students was placed Tuesday afternoon by Dr. Henry A. Campbell, Jr., director of the college, at 560. The expected total of 650 includes night students.

The upsurge in enrollment resulted from a "population explosion" in the freshman class. Three hundred twenty-five freshmen had been expected; the total is nearer 400.

In the freshman class will be 55 Morgan county students for whom roundtrip daily bus transportation from West Liberty to Prestonsburg is sought through

assistance of the Office of Economic Opportunity.

The program, as proposed, has been approved by the University of Kentucky and the Morgan County Board of Education, but a new proposal was required by OEO, and this was completed and on its way to Washington, Tuesday.

Pending final approval of the program, the Morgan school board has tentatively agreed to supply transportation for the students. The transportation program will, when finally approved, be under the auspices of the Northeastern Kentucky Development Association.

The enrollment peak last year, the first for the college, was 325 in the first semester.

BIG CROWD VIEWS FIRST HORSE SHOW

A crowd which filled the football stadium here Saturday night braved cold weather to witness the first horse show to be staged by the Prestonsburg Junior Woman's Club.

Success of the venture, which was planned originally to help the club finance its pledge to the new city park, was such that the clubwomen plan the horse show as an annual event.

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THE TAX ISSUE DOES NOT CONCERN THE BOND ISSUE

The current tax scare, which has forced Governor Breathitt to call an unnecessary session of the General Assembly, has nothing whatsoever to do with the \$176,000,000 road bond issue.

The Court of Appeals handed down the decision that property in Kentucky must be assessed at 100% of its fair cash value. And the truth is, that decision was made by those who long ago provided in the Kentucky Constitution for such assessment.

Now, whatever is done about the tax situation, or if nothing is done, the road bond issue is not affected. If the tax income stands at its present level, the bonds will be paid; if taxes are increased, the bonds will be paid — this bond issue is in no way involved with this disconcerting tax question.

Then it would be most arrant folly for any taxpayer to oppose, out of sheer resentment of a Constitutional provision and a court decision, a bond issue upon which depend highway construction and Kentucky progress.

To seek to "get even" by venting childish and unreasoning resentment would be more than "cutting off the nose to spite the face" — it would be cutting ourselves off without a cent at a time when one cent will get you nine from the federal government for the building of roads to serve Kentucky and Kentuckians and all who do business with them over the years to come.

The Floyd County Times supported the bond issue which was voted during the administration of Governor Chandler. It now supports the bond issue proposed by Governor Breathitt for the same reasons — namely, it believes in progress; it knows progress cannot be made, standing still; it knows that good roads are basic to progress; and it knows, too, that opportunity such as is offered in federal sharing of road construction costs at ratios varying from \$7 to \$3 on to \$9 to \$1 must be seized upon now or be lost.

ROAD, COLLEGE CONSTRUCTION WORK TOLD BRC MEET BY OHIO GOVERNOR

Lexington, Ky. — Kentuckians were challenged by Ohio's Governor, James Rhodes, when a delegation from the Kentucky Better Roads Council and the Maysville-Mason County Chamber of Commerce visited the Buckeye capital, Columbus, for the eighth regional meeting of the Council.

Governor Rhodes, attending the meeting, told the Kentucky group that his state had approved a total of \$1.4 billion (correct) in just 17 months time.

The money, he said, went to complete Ohio's system of highways and to expand its college

and university building program. In addition, he told the group that Ohio was out to get its share of the tourist dollar.

"We're going to sell those bonds and pay them off with cheaper dollars," Governor Rhodes said, taking note of the inflationary trend.

He also said that the Ohio bond issues, like the Kentucky issue, is to be retired without additional taxes.

Kentucky has had two bond issues since 1956, totaling \$190 million. The issue to be on the November ballot is for \$176 million.

5,000 INDEPENDENT MINES IN NATIONAL ORGANIZATION

The nation's 5,000 independent small coal mines have given sweeping new power and responsibility to their national organization, the National Independent Coal Operators Association (NICOA), it was announced last week by Robert Holcomb, Pikeville, NICOA president.

Among the provisions of the reorganization program voted by the small mines are:

1. Centralization of financial, administrative and other key functions in the national organization.
2. Establishing of a new headquarters in Washington, D. C.
3. Appointment of an officer-director of NICOA to take on the additional duties of executive secretary, the top salaried job in the organization.

Holcomb said that in the past the national organization undertook actions and programs when recommended by a consensus of the state organizations. Under the new plan, the national organization will have sole responsibility for initiating and carrying out broad programs in the interest of the members.

He said, "The change is in line with the growing responsibilities and strength of NICOA. The new centralization of authority will enable the national organization to speak for all 5,000 member companies with a strong voice as well as permit NICOA to apply its full muscle to the vital issues facing it."

Louis Hunter, of Richlands, Virginia, has been elected national executive secretary of NICOA. Mr. Hunter, who also carries the title of vice-president and director of NICOA, has been in the coal business since 1949 and has been a mine superintendent for Paragon Jewel Company of Bluefield, West Virginia. He was a director of NICOA since its inception.

NICOA was born as a result of the automation of the major coal companies in the early 1950's which displaced some 350,000 of the industry's 450,000 underground miners. Many of these men, unable to find other employment, turned to small truck-mine operation. At present, 70,000 miners employed by members of NICOA produce about 30 percent of the nation's bituminous coal.

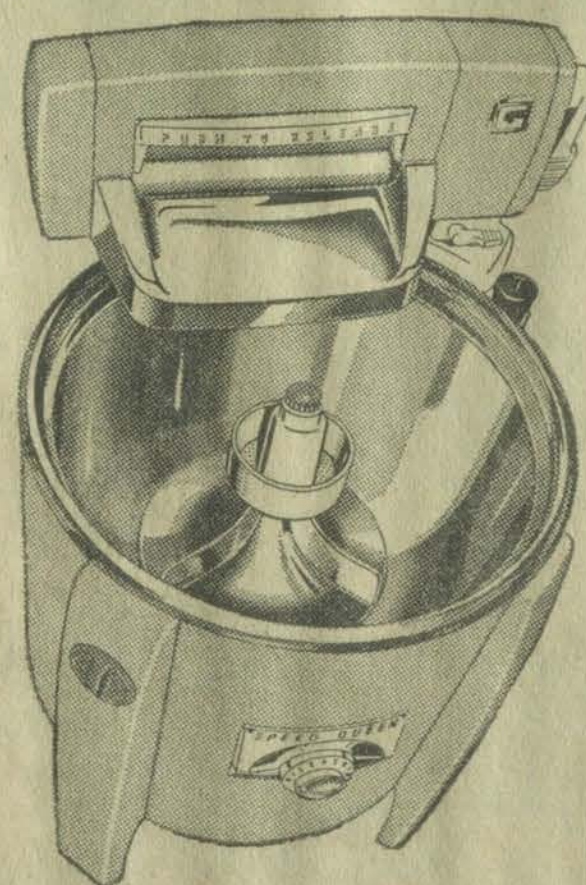

Both teams registered victories in their opening games last week. Morgan County drubbed Pikeville 26-7, while the locals bounced Wheelwright, 13-0.

The invaders have a strong fullback in senior J. C. Brown, a 205-pound veteran and two good ends in Mike Price and Gary Holbrook, who has been a forward on the Blue Devil's basketball team for the past two seasons.

Russell Rice of the Lexington

Leader related Sunday that a petition for the "Preservation of Game Fishing in Lake Cumberland" is being circulated throughout Russell county and other areas in the vicinity. This petition will be presented to the U. S. Corps of Engineers to curtail speedboaters. This is what is needed at nearby Dewey Lake as well, and should be started by all interested persons.

The group of Russell county fishermen who drew the petition claim speedboats transmit waves which harm fish, churn toxic exhaust gasses and oil into the water, produce heavy waves and sidewashes which rapidly erode deep furrows into soft clay or shell banks and destroy spawning beds of many game fish.

"It has been repeatedly noted that some speedboaters fail to extend the common courtesy of reducing speed when passing close to small fishing boats and even seem to delight in watching their victims struggle to keep from capsizing," the petition states.

"Fishermen are aware of the pleasure most speedboaters derive from the legitimate pursuit of their sport, and it is not the purpose of the petitioners to deprive them of the legitimate rights and pleasures, but only to restrain them from depriving fishermen of an equal right and pleasure, by a just and reasonable regulation of speedboat activities.

The petition proposes setting a speed limit of four miles an hour in all creeks and coves of Cumberland, suggests that fishing areas be set aside and marked with buoys and signs which are of the same form and color scheme, and that the Corps, in cooperation with the state, initiate a two-year program of artificial stocking in the reserve areas to establish a favorable game fish balance.

The Wheelwright Trojans, now one and one in the early season, meet Lily high in the Laurel county community at 1 p.m. Friday. Morehead State College's Eagles will play their first two games in Huntington and Ashland. On September 18 at 3 p.m. Morehead tangles with Marshall University and on the next Saturday night moves into Ashland for the Shrine Bowl game against Youngstown University.

In other area games, Prestonsburg maintained its record of never having lost a game to Wheelwright by nipping the Trojans, 13-0; Jenkins nipped Elkhorn City, 7-0; Leslie County tripped M. C. Napier, 6-0; Louisa surprised Fleming-Neon, 24-0, and Hazard lost its first opener in several seasons in bowling to Hopkinsville 28-7 in Mt. Sterling's second-billing Recreational Bowl game.

Bert Dixon's Prestonsburg Black Cats annexed the Floyd county grid championship in its verdict over Wheelwright, although the two teams meet in a return game in Prestonsburg on October 1.

Quarterback Steve Clark whipped a 20-yard touchdown heave to end Claude McKenzie in the first stanza of the penalty-marred and fumble-plagued rivalry.

**Health Doctor Urges
Flu Immunizations
As Outbreaks Seen**

All persons over 45 years of age, the chronically ill and all pregnant women are especially urged to begin influenza immunizations this fall, Dr. R. L. Hall, Floyd county health officer, emphasized this week.

This recommendation is based upon data compiled by the U. S. Public Health Service Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices. The committee predicts an increase in widespread outbreaks of influenza, Type B (regular flu). Most of the influenza occurring in the United States last winter was Type A2 (or Asian flu), but there were Type B influenza epidemics throughout Europe during 1964-'65.

Immunizations should begin September 1 and be completed by mid-December, according to the committee. Protection is especially important for those persons in groups which experienced high mortality from influenza epidemics.

Persons of all ages are advised to consult their family physician about their need to take the vaccine this fall, Dr. Hall said. This also, includes individuals who have not received influenza vaccination since July, 1963, when the last major change was made in vaccine composition.

Since the vaccine is produced in eggs, vaccination is not advised for persons who are unable to eat eggs or chicken due to food allergy, or who have had a definite allergic reaction from previous inoculation of an egg vaccine, Dr. Hall warned.

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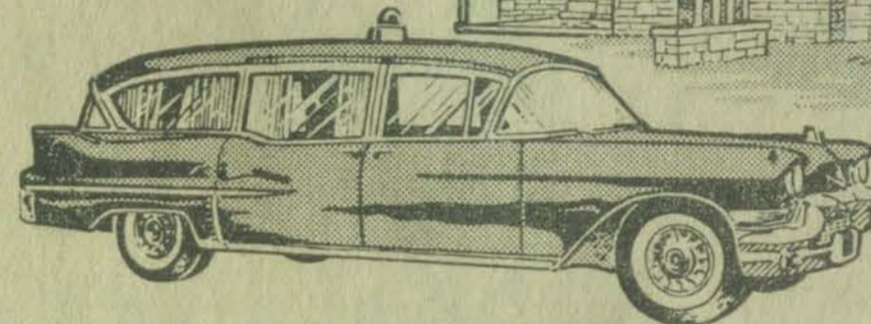
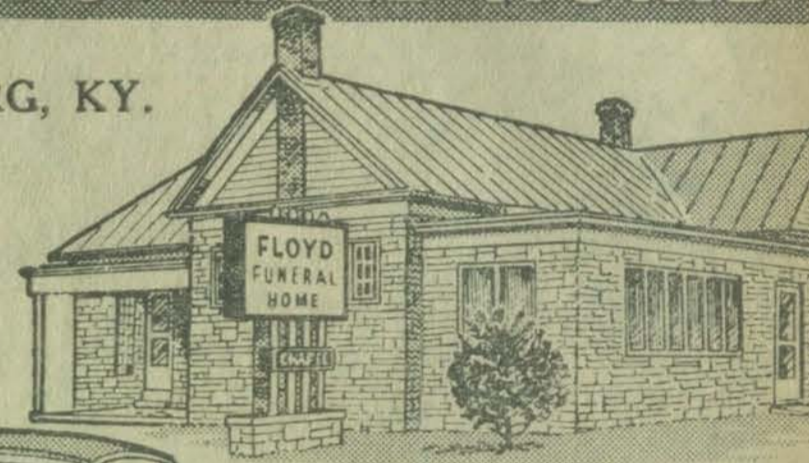

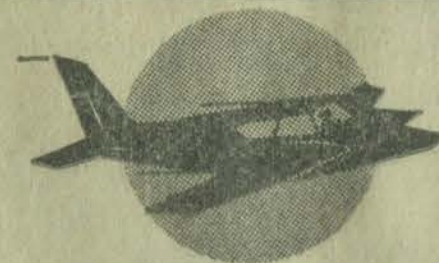
