

Page, Jr., a Chattanooga, Tenn., forester and entomologist called by the strip mine operators to testify, said his studies in Western Kentucky showed that strip mine pits produce fewer mosquito larvae than either nearby farms ponds or marshes. Strip mine pits have steep sides that inhibit growth of vegetation in the water, he explained.

However, Smither said the salt-marsh mosquito seems to prefer acid water created by strip mining. He claimed the mosquitoes, native to the Gulf Coast, were "not in abundance" in Kentucky before the spread of strip mining. Vigorous objection was also

exposed for stripping. Five Eastern Kentucky witnesses backed a 175-foot maximum bench width on a slope higher than the State-

They said the State's narrow bench widths would not allow operators to expose enough coal to be profitable, and would not allow room for piling spoilbanks and moving equipment.

However, only 22 out of 112 Eastern Kentucky strip mine operators surveyed last month failed to meet the stiffer conditions of the proposed regulations, Roy Mullins, area supervisor in Eastern Kentucky for the State division of Strip Mining and Reclamation, said.

State Natural Resources Commissioner J. O. Matlick said the Strip Mine and Reclamation commission is likely to make some changes in its proposed regulations. He said it would be three weeks before the transcript of the hearing would be available for study. Other members of the commission are Mines and Minerals Commissioner Ambrose Mandt and Strip Mining and Reclamation Director Elmore Grim.
