#### Questions and Answers By and to Veterans

Q. In World War II, I was a Catholic chaplain attached to an Army unit in the South Pacific. I left the priesthood shortly after the war. Am I entitled to any veterans benefits?

A. You would be entitled to the same benefits as any honorably discharged World War II veteran. See or write your VA regional office for specific information on any benefit in which you are in-

Q. I am a disabled veteran and am receiving additional compensation for my 17-year-old son. He has enlisted in the U.S. Navy. Must I report this event to the VA, and will this action stop the additional compensation

A. The answer to both questions is "no," as the additional compensation will continue until your son reaches 18, regardless of his military service.

Q. How much longer do I have to apply for reinstatement of my GI insurance under the new program for disabled veterans.

A. You have until midnight May 2, 1966. However, you should keep an eye on your own next birthday. Since insurance premiums are based on the age nearest your birthdate, you may wait too long and find that for insurance purposes you are a year older than you really are and the premium will be higher.



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
