

CRAPPIES-You'll get some of worse. You may catch spotted these, but you'd catch still more weakfish in strictly fresh water, with even smaller poppers, and while casting for other species, usually most with underwater fly- but this occurs very rarely. rod lures - wretched things to you can do much better on crappies with an open spinning reel and small sinking lures than with any fly-rod stuff.

BLUEGILLS-You'll get an occasional one of these on the size poppers you use for bass. By changing to a tiny bluegill popper, you can often get oodles of them but it's too small to do well with those other species.

SNOOK-In some parts of Florida, these fish easily replace bass as top favorites with advanced fly-rod anglers. Although they are generally regarded as sea fish, recent research seems to show that many snook spend practical-

TIP FOR SAFER WINTER DRIVING





Six years ago this month, The Floyd County Times gave its full editorial support to the road bond issue then so enthusiastically sought by Governor Chandler and his lieutenant-governor, Harry Lee Waterfield.

The Times thought that bond issue was needed and that it would serve a good purpose, and time vindicated our judgment.

The Times now supports the State Bond Issue proposed by Governor Breathitt's administration, and the reason is the same as in 1958.

In this newspaper's edition of October 11, 1958,

"What is good for Kentucky?

"That is the only question the voter should consider . . .

"Old grudges, unsettled scores, have nothing to do with the right or wrong of this bond issue.'

We stand on that statement. The settling of "back accounts" with political foes has no place in our thinking, if Kentucky is to be a progressive state rather than a political "dark and bloody

This 1965 bond issue is needed in order to get the benefit of \$9 of federal money for \$1 of ours, or, in some cases, \$7 for \$3, for the construction of those highways which are needed to attract new industry, get more young people to high school and college, save more lives from the narrow, twisting trails that now exist in too many places in this

and other counties. Lieutenant Governor Waterfield opposes the Bond Issue, and that is his privilege. But he does not say what Kentucky should do if it rejects it. Does he suggest that Kentucky forget roads, colleges, health, parks and all the other items in the program? Or would he suggest that Kentucky impose new taxes or increase old taxes in order to raise the state's share of the \$860,000,000 that is proposed for Kentucky progress?

Please, let us not settle any old scores at the public expense. Let us try, honestly, sincerely, to vote and work for a better, greater Floyd county and state of Kentucky.

These maps are the base for any landowners to start developing a complete conservation plan on their farm or track of land.

of MEAD RELATIONS) says they are Samuel Mead and Kate Goodbeard. I would like to clarify this. Priscilla died around 1840 and James Elijah (Ely) Sturgill married Delinda Clark, May 28, 1845."

MEAD RELATIONS, by A. M. Prichard, 1933, has much information on the Mead(e), and other Eastern Kentucky counties. He says that Priscilla Mead was a daughter of Samuel Mead and Katy Goodbeard Mead. Samuel was married ca 1789 in Bedford county, Virginia, where the Meades lived prior to migrating to Floyd county in 1801. Priscilla's brothers and sisters were Samuel, Robert, Thomas, Rhodes, Elizabeth, Kisiah, Isabell and

Grandparents of Priscilla Mead(e) and parents of Samuel Mead were Robert Mead and Hannah Rhodes Mead, Bedford county, Virginia. They left Bedford county for the Mud Creek section of Floyd county in 1801. He was a prominent man in Bedford county and dealt considerably in real estate. He resided on Goose Creek in that county on a tract of 850 acres. He owned one tract of 1,600 acres that he acquired from his brother, William Head for 16,000 pounds of tobacco. Another Goose Creek farm of 636 acres he sold to his brother-in-law, Joseph Rhodes,

Robert Mead built his home near the mouth of Little Mud Creek in 1801. He brought slaves from Virginia to build the necessary plantation buildings before bringing his family to the new land. He died in 1825.

Another inquiry on the Mead family is from Mrs. George Rydings, 4220 Wiedenmann Place, Kansas City, Mo.

She writes: "Hannah Mead, born August 10, 1770, died August 30, 1850, married December 24, 1793, to Isaac St. John, Jr., born December 1, 1764, died December 24, 1834. His father was Isaac St. John, Sr., of Norwalk, Connecti-

"A daughter of the above mentioned couple, Julia Ann St. John, born March 4, 1807, died July 30, 1855, married May 3, 1834, to John Dunham, Jr., born 1799, died July 26, 1855. Hannah Mead was reputed to be from Virginia." Mrs. Doughton and Mrs. Rydings invite correspondence.

RUTH ANN SPEARS Mrs. Mary Ruth Cooper, 419 Blondell Ave., Appalachia, Virginia, inquires for information on Ruth Ann Spears, daughter of Joshua Spears and Mecca Graham Spears, of Scott county, Virginia. He was from North Carolina and was authorized to operate a ferry in Scott county in 1833. Many members of the Spears family migrated to the

Big Sandy valley. Mrs. Cooper notes that her father was Isaac Patton Thomas; his parents were William Gregory Thomas and Ruth Ann Spears. Brothers of Joshua Spears were Robert, Asberry

and Andrew. The name, Ruth Ann, was a favorite of the old Spears residents of this region. One Ruthie Ann Spears, daughter of Spencer Spears and Rosa Wells Spears, married first to John P. Mc-Guire, of the Johns Creek section of Floyd county, who was killed in the Civil War at McCombs, Kentucky. His widow remarried to John W. Fraley and resided in Johnson county on the Big Sandy River opposite the mouth of Bobb's Branch. John W. Fraley, born 1807 in Russell county, Virginia, migrated to the Big Sandy valley when a young man. He had previously been married

to Lucy Lauhorn.

Medicare Kits Mailed To All 65 or Older Deadline Set March 31

Social Security headquarters in Baltimore has completed the mailing of Medicare information kits to all of the 151/2 million persons 65 and over on the Social Security and railroad retirement

By now, all elderly social security or railroad retirement beneficiaries in Floyd county should have received their kits and the enclosed application for the supplementary medical insurance part of "Medicare," Thomas L. Read, Social Secur-

ity district manager, said. Many other older personsthose not on the social security or railroad retirement benefit rolls-have already been in touch with the Social Security District Office in Pikeville, he reported. But many others still need to take action to protect their Medicare rights.

Eight out of 10 aged persons will be reached through the mass mailing, he noted. About onethird of those who will not be reached this way are receiving old-age assistance payments and will hear directly from their local welfare agencies.

Another third are still working, fulltime, and will need to file Social Security applications. About one million will also have to get in touch with their local Social Security district offices.

The enrollment period for those who will be 65 or over before the end of the year closes March 31. 1966, Read pointed out.




