## HOUSING SITE IS SELECTED

### Martin Plans Complex Of 30 Units for Aged; Playground Is Planned

An area at the rear of the new postoffice building was selected last week by a representative of the Public Housing Administration as the site of the second complex of low-rent public housing units planned at Martin. The new units, which will number approximately 30, will be specially designed for the elderly, it was said. The building will be of motel type and of a design which will add to the attractiveness of the town.

The first low-rent public housing project of 40 units, which was completed a few months ago, has been acclaimed by PHA representatives as one of the most beautiful developments of its type to be completed.

Martin Mayor John Roberts said this week he has contacted federal authorities in Atlanta relative to a municipal playground for the community. The federal Open Space Program will provide, he said, 50% of the cost of the land, its improvement and the equipping of a playground. He added that the Martin Kiwanis Club has expressed an interest in helping raise funds to finance the city's part of the undertaking.

Roberts also said that the Martin sewer system is 95% complete and that he has met with some encouragement in his attempt to get a small factory located there.

## MAY WINS ON MOVE FOR NEW JURY LIST

### TAKES STEP AS 2nd TRIAL SET NOV. 29

### Martin Draws Term Of 120 Days, \$200 Fine At Liquor Sale Trial

Motion of Headmon May challenging the present jury drum, as a preliminary to his Nov. 29 trial for the slaying of A. B. Hopson at Harold, was sustained last Thursday by Circuit Judge Hollie Conley.

The motion filed by May's attorneys asked that the court remove all names of jurors from the present jury drum and have it refilled by the jury commissioners on or before the November 29 trial date. It was pointed out that May was given trial, earlier this year, on one of two murder charges and that at that trial the Commonwealth sought the death penalty. The motion also contended that several hundred jurors disqualified in the earlier case because of conscientious scruples against inflicting the death penalty, that their names were then returned to the jury drum and are, consequently, illegally in the drum.

May was given a life term for the slaying of his mother-in-law, Mrs. A. B. Hopson. Last week, he was convicted of shooting and wounding his wife, Mrs. Ruth May, and was given a 21-year pen term.

## TWO NABBED BY RAIDERS

### Martin, Hunt Booked As Liquor Is Seized; Other Arrests Made

State officers struck almost simultaneously at widely separated points of the Beaver Creeks Saturday, confiscating a sizeable haul of intoxicants and arresting two men.

ABC Agent Claude A. Flanery and State Trooper D. H. Goble arrested Lark Hunt at Hunter and charged him with possession of alcoholic beverages in local option territory after they had confiscated 355 cans of beer and nine half-pints of gin.

Junior "Red" Martin was charged with both possession and selling by ABC Agent Randolph Stamper and State Trooper Richard Ray after they had found 48 pints of wine and 274 cans of beer on his premises at Estill.

Trials of both men were set in quarterly court here, November 13. They were released under bond.

## HALE WOULD RETAIN POST

### Police Judge Here Says He Will Be Candidate For Re-Appointment

Although withholding comment on the claim of Scott Collins, Prestonsburg attorney, to the office of police judge here because of write-in votes cast for Collins at the recent election, Police Judge Watt Hale did say this week that he will seek reappointment is on the city saturday books. Appointment has been made for a number of years by the Governor on recommendation by the City Council.

"All I can say at this time," said Judge Hale, "is that my application for reappointment will be submitted to the Mayor and members of the Council for their approval or disapproval. I naturally hope, that it will be approved."

Remarking that the four-year term now ending has not been as easy as anticipated, Hale said he felt he had earned the \$125-a-month salary paid him. He said members of the Bar Association have been very helpful to him on matters requiring legal advice and that the police force has done an excellent job, with crimes of violence reduced to the very minimum.

## TROUBLE SEEN AHEAD ON HOME SANITATION

Floyd county homeowners may find themselves in trouble with both state and federal authorities because of inadequate sewage disposal systems which serve their homes, Dr. Russell L. Hall, Floyd county health doctor, warned this week.

Dr. Hall's statement followed a report made by sanitarians of the Floyd County Health Department who have found many new and costly residences being constructed, some by individual owners, others by contractors, without meeting satisfactorily the sewage disposal problem.

"It's a pity," he commented, "that some homes costing perhaps \$30,000 have a sewage disposal field leading to a nearby creek, thereby creating a serious nuisance and health problem, not only for the homeowner and his family but for their neighbors."

He referred to the contamination of streams and water supplies and the danger of epidemics. The penalty that may await such homeowners, Dr. Hall said, may result from the machinery set in motion when President Johnson signed the Water Pollution Bill and by the enactment of anti-pollution laws in Kentucky.

He also pointed out that the septic tank is no cure-all for the home sanitation problem and the prevention of stream pollution. "The outflow from the septic tank must be kept underground," the health officer said. "Many people are not in position to know about all needed facts, and they should consult the health department for plans and specifications which are free. Should a contractor build your home, inform him that he must construct the sewage disposal system in accordance with plans and specifications of the Floyd County Health Department."

Dr. Hall urged that the health department sanitarians be consulted by homeowners needing to know what must be done to provide a satisfactory sewage disposal system, whether by septic tank or by sanitary privy, and to call at the health department for plans and specifications which will be supplied without charge.

"In no case should the sewage disposal field lead to a creek or river," he emphasized.

## CAR CLAIMS GIRL VICTIM

### Miss Robinson Killed When Struck by Auto Driven by Emma Man

Miss Barbara Robinson, 18, of Cow Creek, was instantly killed at 7:15 a.m. Monday when struck by an automobile on U.S. 23 at the old Winchester mining camp, seven miles south of here.

Richard Lewis, of the Emma vicinity, driver of the death car, was not held. It was said that Miss Robinson walked into the lane of traffic followed by Lewis' car.

The victim, who resided with an aunt, Mrs. Griffith, on Cow Creek, left the auto of Mrs. Harry Gordon Allen at the roadside, opposite the Allen home where she worked as a baby-sitter. She was struck as she crossed the highway. Some witnesses said she appeared to be about midway Lewis' lane of traffic when hit.

State Troopers Richard Ray and Don H. Goble investigated the tragedy.

A native of Martin county, Miss Robinson was a daughter of Ira and Luchie Robinson, of Pilgrim, Kentucky. She was graduated last year from Inez high school. Surviving, besides her parents, are four brothers and two sisters, Gary, Larry, Lonnie, Billy Joe, Florence and Brenda, all of Pilgrim.

Her funeral was conducted Wednesday from the Leeanna Regular Baptist Church, and burial was made in the family cemetery.

## MARINE VET FIRED SHOTS, BELIEF HELD

### Triple Slaying Follows Retirement of Martin, Former Marine Captain

Earl Dinsmore Martin, 48, Floyd native, shot and killed his German-born wife, Mari- anne, 46, and his 12-year-old son, Earl Dinsmore, Jr., then ended his own life early Wednesday morning, last week at the Martin home at Beaver Creek Township near Xenia, Ohio.

So ruled authorities after an investigation of the domestic tragedy.

The shooting followed by a few days Mr. Martin's retirement as electronics engineer at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, O., and a few hours before sheriff's deputies were scheduled to take him to Dayton State hospital for psychiatric examination. He had received treatment at a mental institution, about three years ago.

There was no eyewitness to the shooting. The Martin's 10-year-old daughter, Christine, had been sent by her mother to a neighbor's home with a note requesting that officers be called, and this circumstance, authorities surmised, may have saved the girl's life.

Virgil Bradshaw, sheriff's office dispatcher, said he was talking with Mrs. Martin by telephone when she was shot. The phone was found beneath her body. When officers arrived at the scene, they feared resistance, but a cautious search of the home resulted in the discovery of the bodies of Martin and his son on beds in an attic room. Each of the three victims had been shot twice with a .357 magnum revolver.

A note written on a sheet in a legal pad read, "I die, that the honor of all veterans will be preserved." It concluded with the dates: "Nov. 10, 1875 . . . Nov. 10, 1965."

Nov. 10, 1875 marked the founding of the U.S. Marine Corps; Nov. 10, 1965 was the date of the triple-slaying.

Martin served in the Marine Corps from 1937 to 1946, taking part in both World War II and the Korean Conflict, and (See Story No. 3, Page 8)

## HEALTH DEPT. GETS GRANT OF \$20,000 TO HANDLE FLOYD BIRTH CONTROL PROGRAM

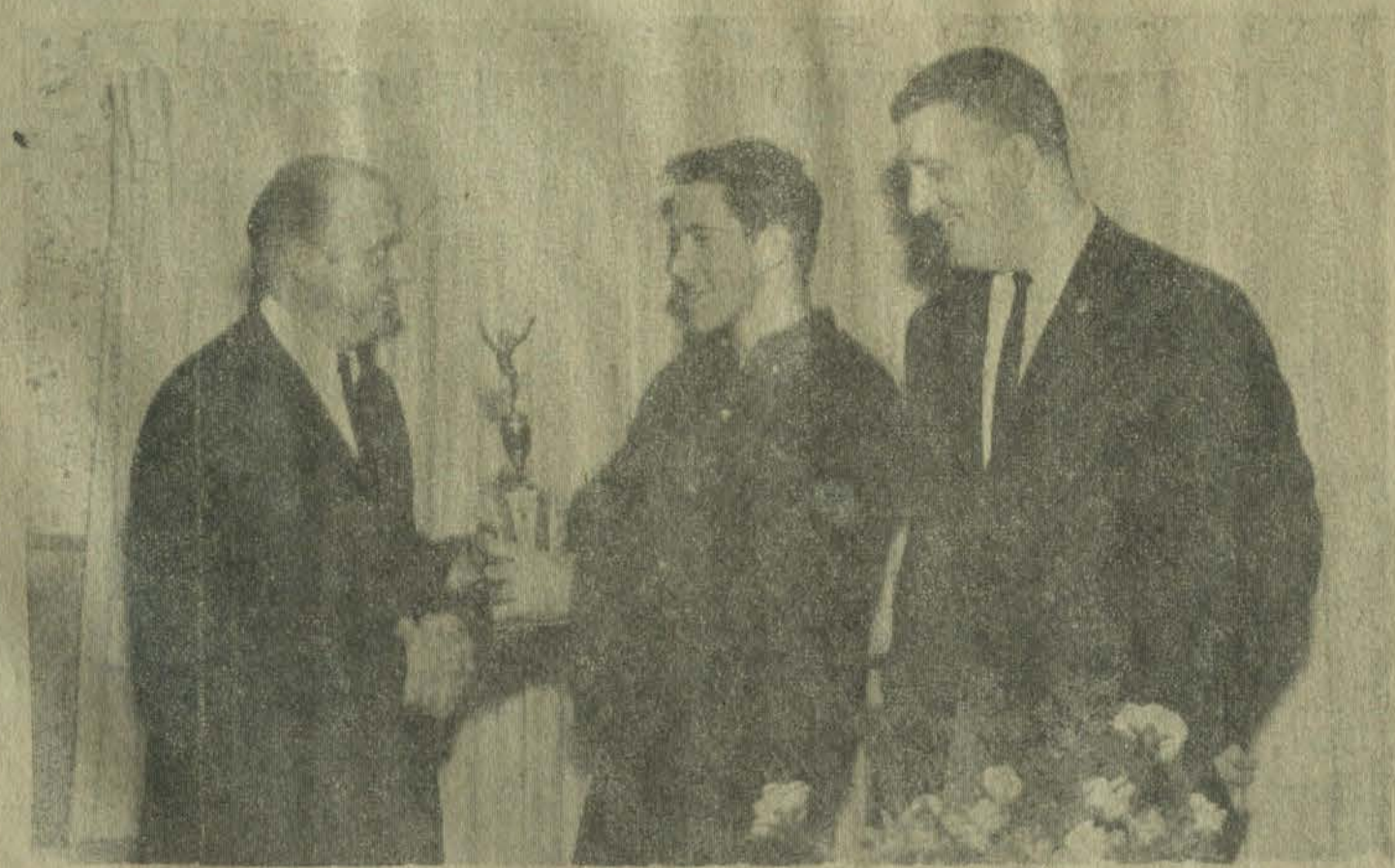
Mrs. Helen B. Wells, Floyd county CAP director, said Monday that Congressman Carl Perkins notified her, late last week, that Floyd county has been approved for a \$20,000 federal grant from the office of Economic Opportunity.

The funds will be turned over to the Floyd County Health Department to conduct a Planned Parenthood Program. Dr. Russell Hall will be able to serve 400 indigent women through the program, which will run for a year.

Women from families of less than \$3,000 income with several children are eligible to apply for the program; also, girls who are "child brides" (ages 14-19) are eligible if they want to continue their schooling.

In addition to the family planning services and medications, patients will receive medical examinations, including the cancer tests. All services will be free for the patient.

The Planned Parenthood clinic will be set up in the basement of the Health Department. Clinic dates will be announced later.

Chairmen for this Jaycee event were Ted Hicks and Ed Kern, Jr.



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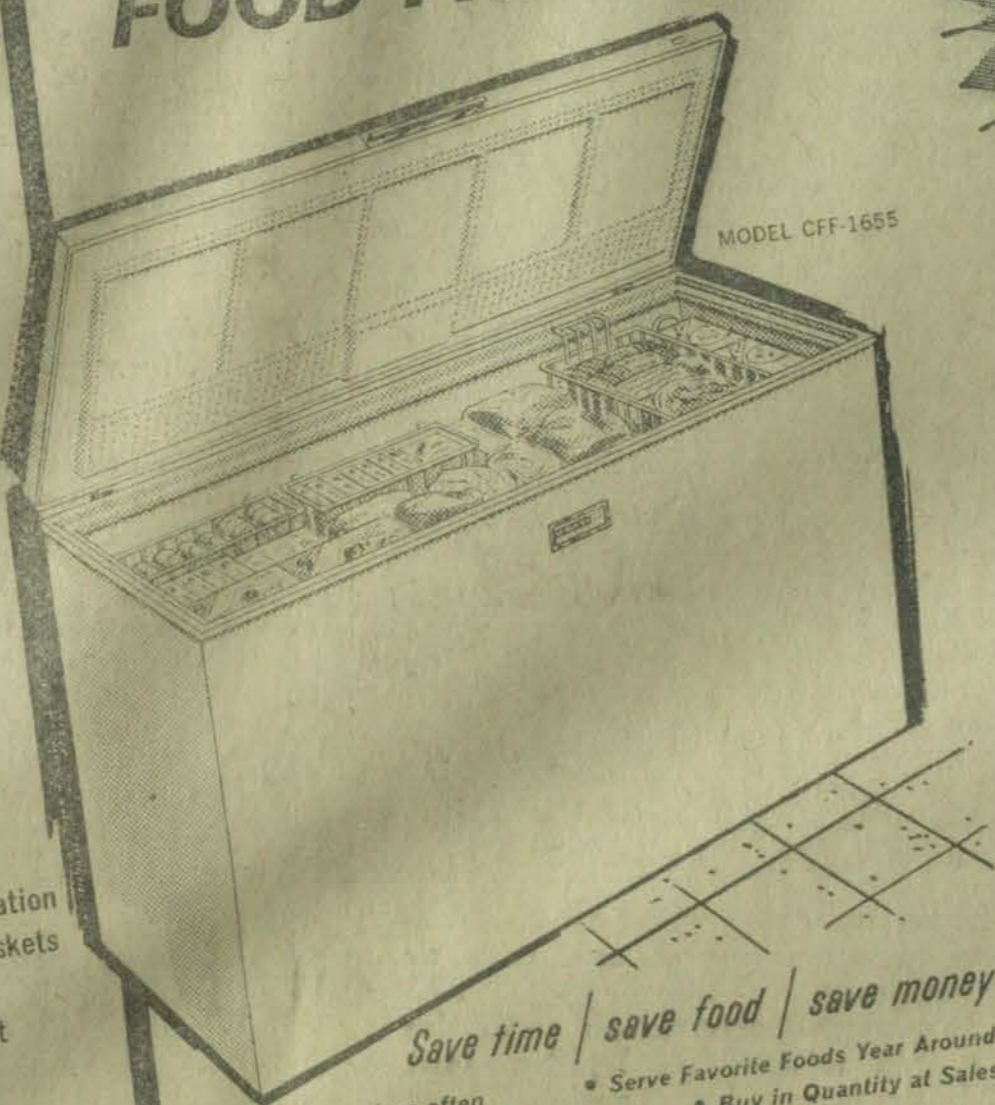
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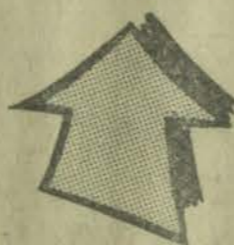
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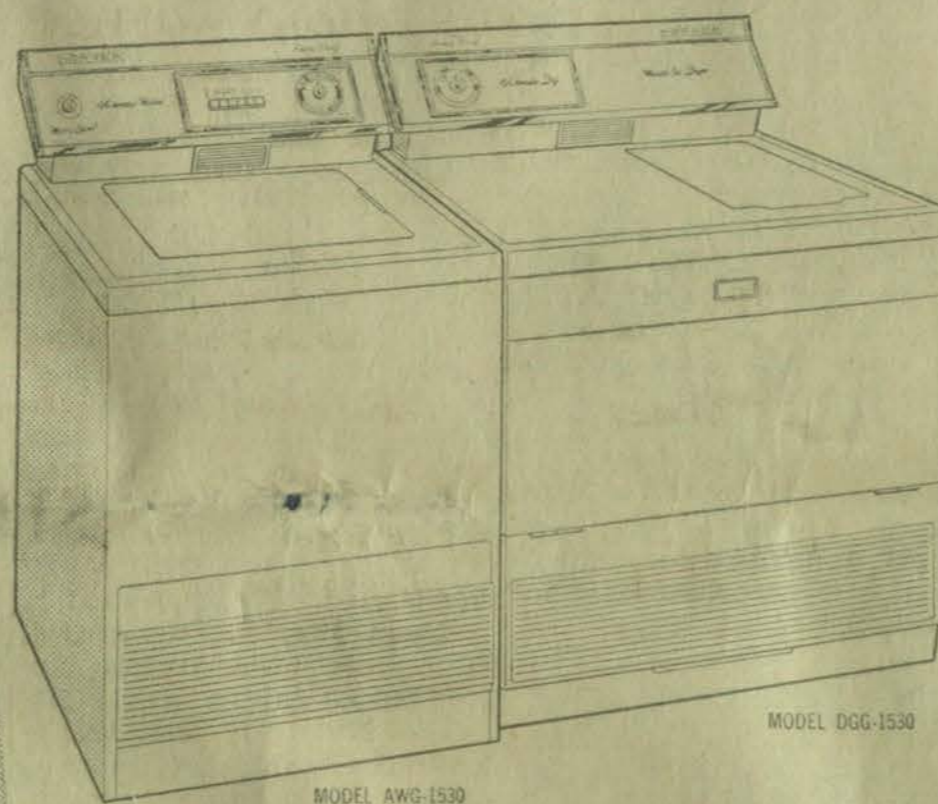
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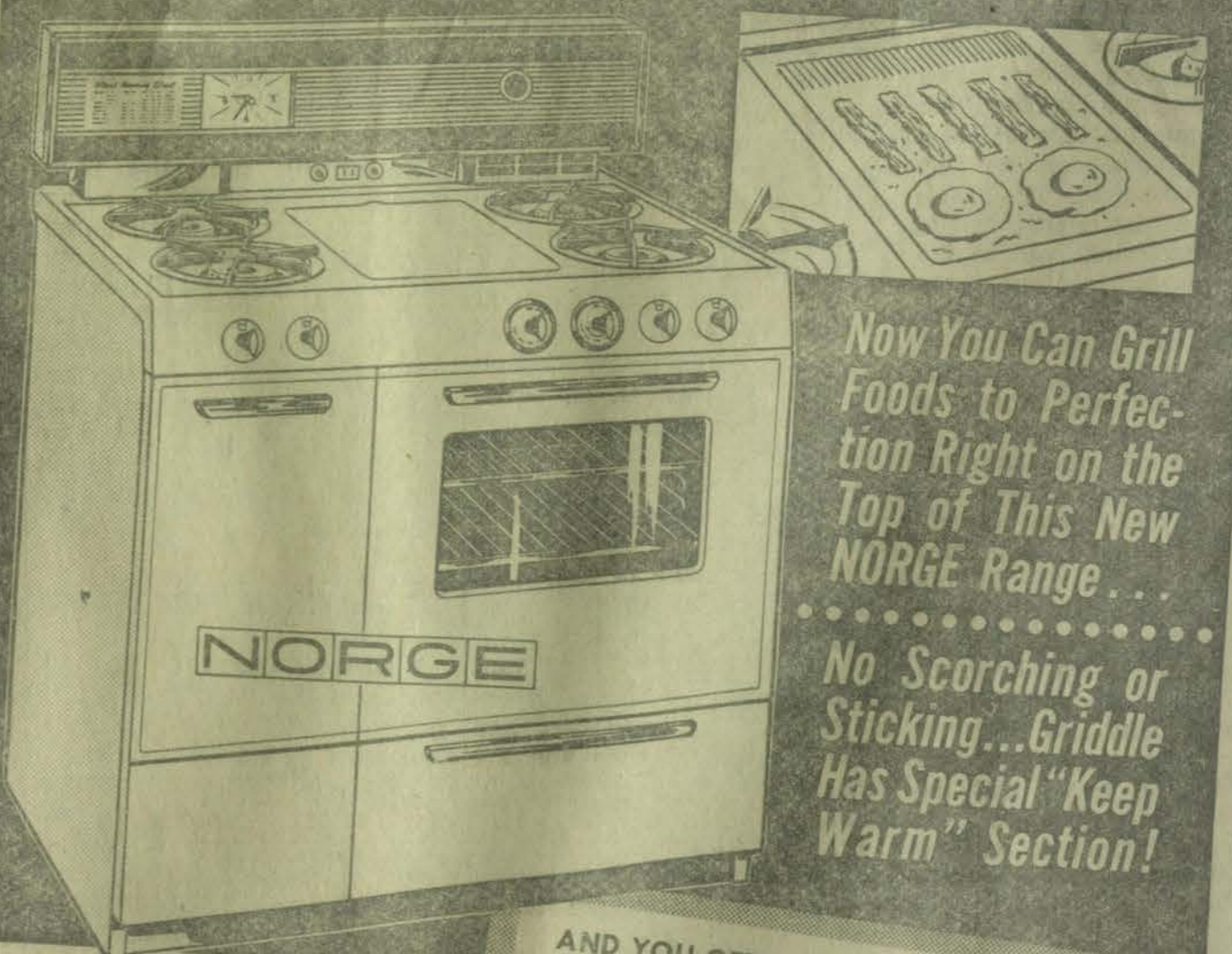

# ASCS AREA LEADERS MEET AT JENNY WILEY PARK

The 1966 Agricultural Conservation Program was the theme of an area meeting held October 28 at Jenny Wiley State Park by the Agricultural Conservation and Stabilization Service. Attendance at the meeting included ASCS representatives from 23 Eastern Kentucky counties. Approximately 200 county ASCS representatives attended the meeting, in addition to state and national representatives, including Congressman Carl D. Perkins.

The discussion at the meeting dealt with administration of the 1966 Agricultural Conservation Program through ASCS which provided financial assistance to farmers in sharing the cost of carrying out needed practices for the conservation of land and water resources. Through this program federal funds are provided by Congress as an investment in the conservation effort to encourage and enable farm-

ers to carry out conservation measures in the best interest of the agricultural future and public welfare.

Mrs. Treva Howell, vice-chairman of the State ASCS Committee, presided at the meeting and commented that the committee is justly proud of the "good job the county committees and office personnel are doing in administering the ASCS programs in Eastern Kentucky." The group was reminded that there has been a need for additional programs that would enable the area to deal more effectively with conservation problems in the mountain counties. Mrs. Howell declared that "your Congress has responded by passing the Appalachian Program, a program that is specifically designed to meet the many needs of Appalachia," indicating that now for the first time the necessary tools and funds to do the job are available, but that success or failure of these programs is entirely up to the local people. Pointing out that the programs have been made possible "through the efforts of an understanding President and a sympathetic Congress," she challenged local residents to get on with the job and make the most of the opportunities that have been presented.

John Whisman, administrator, Area Program Office, Frankfort, spoke to the group on the Appalachian Program. He briefly outlined the background and passage of the program and reviewed the many advantages and opportunities afforded to the area. Mr. Whisman stressed the need for local interest and initiative in order that the program can accomplish its maximum results.

John Vance, deputy administrator of the ASCS, from the Washington office, briefly outlined the objectives of the 1966 Agricultural Conservation Program, pointing out that in 1966 county ASCS committees will be given greater authority and responsibility in making determinations relative to a better program for their respective area. In order to reach many new participants it will be possible for them to extend federal cost-sharing at a higher level to small farmers who have low incomes and where the conservation need is the greatest. Under the 1966 program every farmer can effectively deal with the conservation problems on his land. The 1966 program will discourage certain practices which could possibly bring about increased production of commodities which are now deemed to be in surplus. Special consideration should and will be given to those practices which not only meet the conservation needs, but will also contribute to beautification of the country-side, he said.

Congressman Carl D. Perkins was introduced by Freeman Hockensmith, chairman of the State Committee, who described Congressman Perkins as one of the best friends of agriculture in Washington. Congressman Perkins related that he was entirely familiar with the problems of farmers in Eastern Kentucky, since he owns a farm and was raised in the hill country of that area. He praised the ASCS personnel of the 23 counties "for the good job you are doing in administering the related farm programs." Perkins added that only seven percent of the total population now live and earn their living on farms, and as a result it is becoming increasingly difficult to get farm legislation enacted. Congressman Perkins praised the leadership and understanding of President Johnson in making these new programs available, as well as the hard work and capable assistance provided by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman.

Congressman Perkins told the group that the land-use phase of the Appalachian Program will be put into operation early next spring. Under this program some \$740,000 has been allocated

## RATE BOOST OF \$7 SEEN

### On Liability Insurance To Floyd-Co. Motorists If Proposal Is Granted

Liability insurance costs for motorists in Floyd county would be increased \$7 annually if a proposal to revise auto insurance rates is granted.

A public hearing on adjustments and new rate schedules began this week before Kentucky Insurance Commissioner William E. Bivin.

Requested by two national rating organizations, the National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters (NBCU) and the National Automobile Underwriters Association (NAUA), the changes include increases in most counties for collision insurance and increases in some counties but reduction in others for comprehensive insurance, in addition to the liability changes.

For Floyd county, comprehensive protection would decrease by \$3. The yearly cost for \$100 deductible insurance protection would be increased \$6.

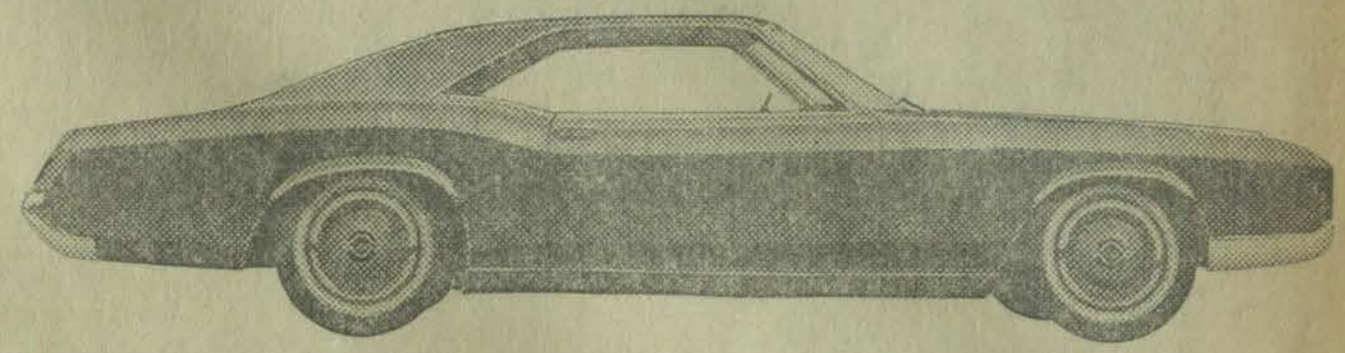
Revisions vary for different areas of the state which is divided into a dozen rating territories according to population and traffic volume. The NBCU and NAUA are presenting accident data experience from these rating areas in an attempt to show justification for the insurance revisions.

Commissioner Bivin, prior to the hearing, announced that he has sent three special deputies to the NBCU office in New York to verify the accuracy of the data compilations made by the agency.

Protesting the rate changes are the Louisville Automobile Club, the Kentucky Association of Trial Lawyers and the Kentucky Automobile Dealers Association.



Draft-card burners and "retreat to peace" demonstrators demanding withdrawal of United States Forces in Viet-Nam are accused of breaking faith with the nearly 1,000,000 Americans who have died in the service of their country.

The charge was leveled by William J. Driver, administrator of Veterans Affairs, and chairman of the President's Veterans Day National Committee, as the nation prepared to observe Veterans Day last Thursday.

Driver pointed out that more than 30 million Americans have donned uniforms to insure the survival of freedom and liberty in the course of nine wars during the nation's history, and that approximately 1,000,000 of these patriots met death in service. "If those who now refuse to serve, and those who preach peace at any price were to prevail," he declared, "it would make a shameful mockery of the sacrifices and deeds of valor contributed by all our veterans, living and dead."

The VA Chief, a veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict, said he supported fully the right of so-called peace demonstrators to assemble and protest, for "such a right is a vital part of the heritage for which our veterans fought and died. But those who would evade service, and yield Asia to the Communists should pause to consider how long such freedom to criticize would be tolerated in Peking or Hanoi, or any other Communist controlled country.

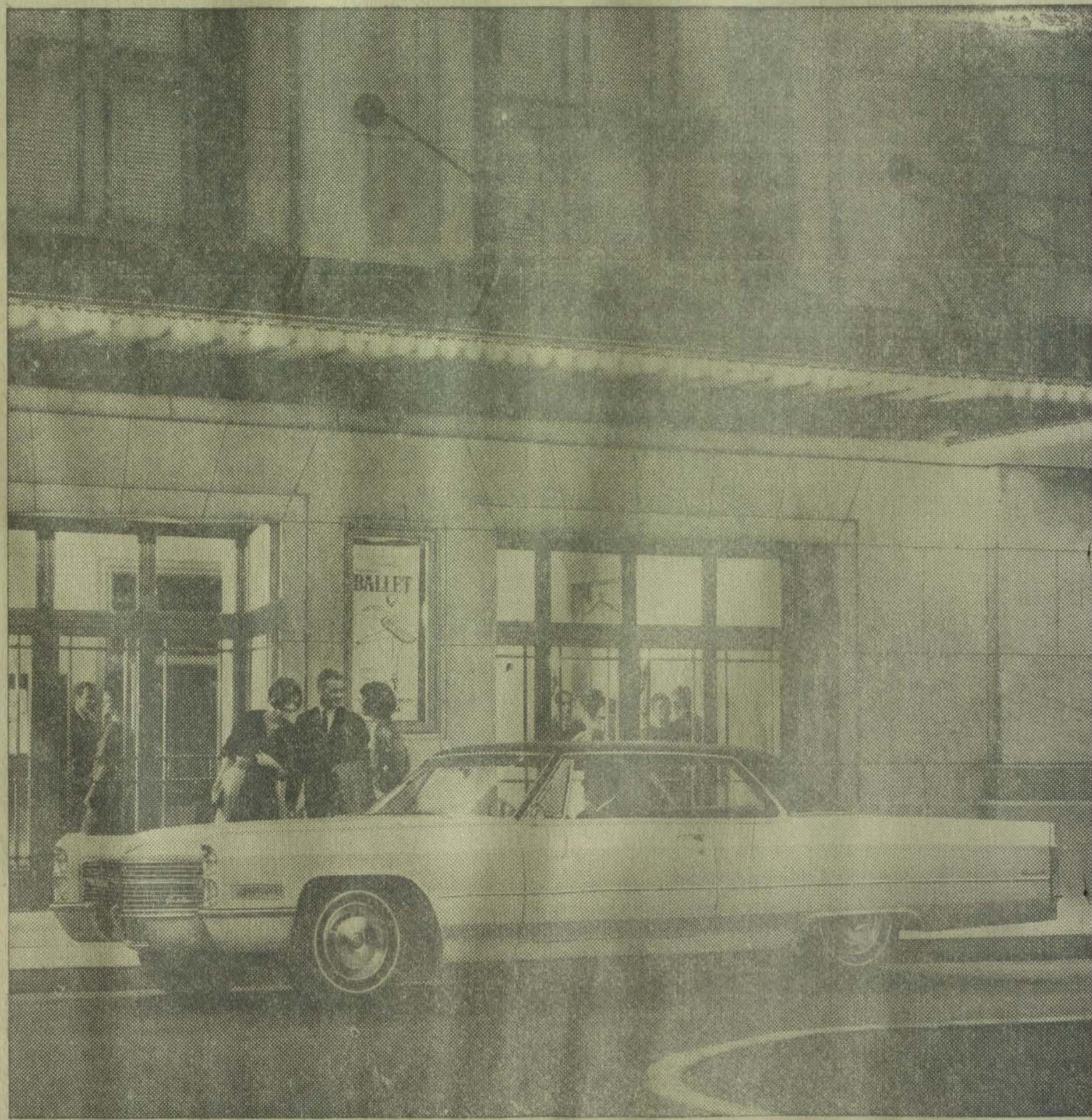

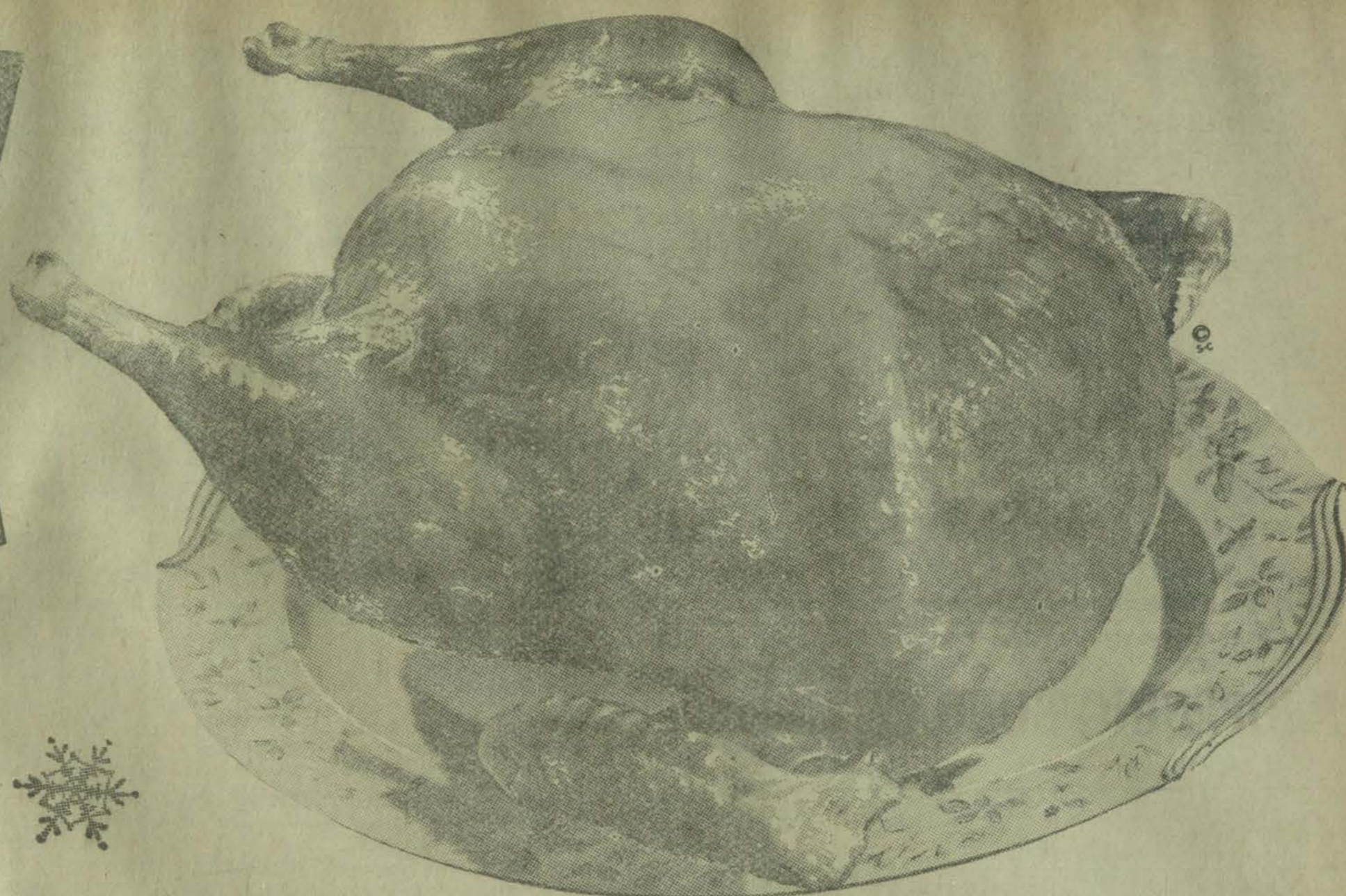

which he received the death penalty was denied last Thursday by Judge Conley. He was convicted in the slaying of Mrs. Mallie T. Denney at Drift.

Junior "Red" Martin, of Estill, was fined \$200 and sentenced to jail for 120 days Tuesday upon his conviction of a second-offense liquor-selling charge.

The penalty was one of the stiffest to be imposed here in a whiskey case. Martin is expected to appeal.

The conviction came three days after Martin had been arrested by raiders and booked on a new offense. Commonwealth's Attorney Harold J. Stumbo said the January grand jury will be asked to indict Martin for third-offense selling, which is punishable by pen term.

Edd Owens was convicted last week on a charge of assault and battery and was fined \$50. Rafe Lafferty and Janet Adkins won an acquittal from the jury hearing their trial on a charge of wilfully damaging public property. Curtis Bartley was convicted of shooting at without wounding and was fined \$250 and given a 12-month jail term. He later filed motion for probation. the approach to a \$1 billion farm income. Breathitt is chairman of the Commission.

In the study, emphasis was placed on good land use, efficient farm organization, good management practices and use of approved production practices by commercial farmers, those with a gross annual income of \$2,500 or more in farm sales, according to Breathitt. 1963 was used as a base year.

The reports are now being screened by county-level committees, which will make individual recommendations to the commission, the Governor said. He emphasized that the potentials are only possible production levels; that they are not forecasts, projections or goals.

The study was made to help lay groundwork for a practical expansion of the state's agricultural income, Breathitt said.

According to the report, the 1963 estimated gross income from crop production in Floyd county was \$219,100. Net livestock production added \$78,200 for a total of \$297,300.

The study revealed that the county's annual farm income could be increased to \$502,200 by 1970—\$269,500 from crops and \$232,700 from livestock.

The long-range potential estimated that livestock and crop receipts could climb to \$652,200.

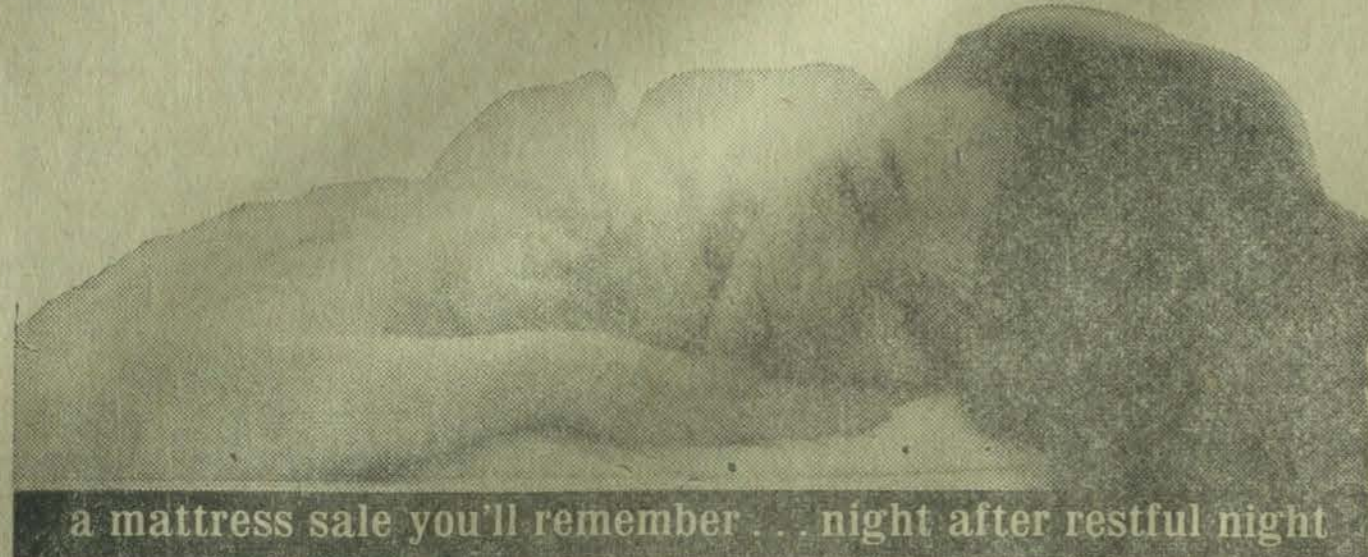

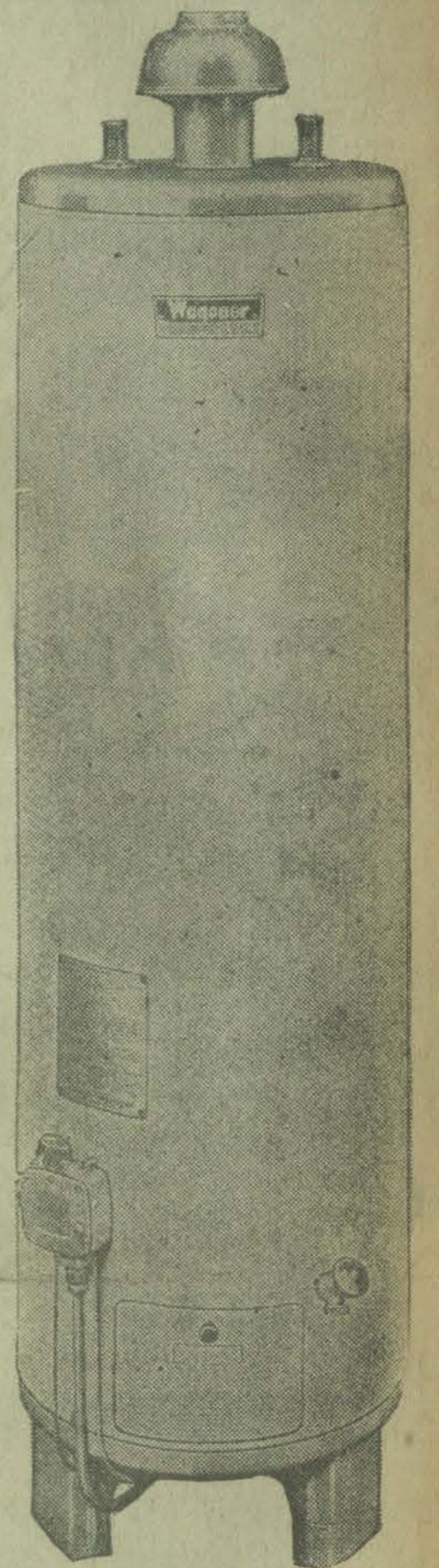

**ORDINANCE NO. 11-65**

An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, Regulating Weights of Trucks and Other Vehicles Using City Streets.

WHEREAS, the City of Prestonsburg has, pursuant to Ordinance No. 8-64, completed a street improvement project, and WHEREAS, the City of Prestonsburg has, pursuant to Resolution dated, March 23, 1964, completed construction of City Parking Lots, and

WHEREAS, same was accomplished by reason of a sale of bonds that must be redeemed or paid for by the City of Prestonsburg through annual payments by abutting land owners and persons so using the parking lots, over a period of twenty years, and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that every precaution be taken by the City to preserve and protect the said improved streets and parking lots, and that in order to do so, it is necessary that the City establish an ordinance regulating truck and other vehicle weight limits and prohibit the use of said streets by certain vehicles.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY, AS FOLLOWS:

All vehicles may be operated upon the streets and parking lots of the City of Prestonsburg, except the following:

1. No vehicle weighing in excess of 18,000 pounds shall be operated over any City street, except those streets maintained by the Department of Highways of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

2. No bulldozers, tandem trucks, caterpillars, tractors, trucks with three or more axles or other heavy construction equipment or machinery shall be operated upon the streets of the City of Prestonsburg.

In the event it becomes necessary to operate any of the above vehicles over the City streets, then and in that event the person so desiring to use the said vehicle shall apply to the Director of City Properties for permission, and upon the recommendation of the said Director, the Mayor of the City of Prestonsburg may grant written permission.

Any person or persons who operates a vehicle upon the streets of Prestonsburg in violation of the Ordinance herein shall be fined not less than \$50.00, nor more than \$500.00.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage. DATED: November 4, 1965.

### 83% of Ky. Junkyards Have Been Screened, Is Report by Ward

Highway Commissioner Henry Ward announced this week that 83 percent of Kentucky's junkyards are screened and 98 percent of the owners have taken steps toward compliance with the state screening law.

Ward said the Highway Department issued five permits during October, which increased to 516 the total number of permits issued since the Department began enforcing the screening law on July 1, 1964. Permits are issued only after suitable screens have been erected.

Out of a total of 739 junkyards in Kentucky at the end of October, 721 had submitted applications.

Ward said that all compliance officers in the state have been instructed to ask for indictments before the next grand jury for any junkyard operator who does not have a permit by the time the next grand jury meets, unless a good reason exists for not doing so.

Of the 123 junkyards without permits, 44 have been taken to the grand jury and eight others have had complaints filed against them in county court. This leaves 71 subject to possible grand jury action if they do not comply before the next grand jury convenes.
