





For almost forty years now we have watched Floyd county struggle and grow. During this time. too, we have had a part in recording the story of Floyd county crime.

We remember "Rat Row" in Prestonsburg and all the "joints" scattered over the county in the days when whiskey sales were legalized. We recall the murder rate in those days-a time when one official described Floyd county as "the bloodiest soil in the Western Hemisphere." And when there was none to challenge his statement.

Since 1946 Floyd county has been legally dry. Everything has not been perfect since then — not by a long shot. There has been bootlegging; there still is. The law, generally, has not been adequate. But the sale of whiskey, the transporting of whiskey, its consumption in public—all are illegal. And, imperfect as the administration and enforcement of the law is, yet it has served to drive the business underground, to keep the drunks off the streets and to maintain order to the extent that Floyd county today has one of the lowest murder rates

We are trying to be unemotional about this matter. We are seeking only to show those who prize human life and the peace of their communities that a liquor store and beer joints in every village of the county is not the way toward better morals, obedience to the law and a decent, orderly society.

Floyd county may have a long way to go yet, but it has come a long way. It cannot afford now to turn and slip the long way back by legalizing a traffic which attracts to it so often those who care nothing about legality.



Some game biologists, when they stock fresh water streams with fish, usually employ men to hunt out and destroy the water snakes. I think perhaps these snakes eat only the small fish such as chokes, chubs, hogsuckers, silversides and johnny-darters, all of which are worthless from the standpoint of the fisherman. They also devour many young bullfrogs, which must be chalked up

against them, of course. For my part, I would say the water snakes should be controlled and kept to a minimum where there are fish in the streams. But the water snakes are getting scarce in almost all the streams of Eastern Kentucky because the fish have nearly all been killed out by polluted mine waters. Where there are no fish or frogs, there will be no water snakes. For my choice, I will say the water snakes add color
