





Developing potential skills that could produce future job opportunities for women was another area emphasized often in the allday conference. This need in the Big Sandy area was pointed out by statistics showing that only 8% of the homemakers in this area are employed, while the figure in Kentucky is 25% and







U-KATS (University of Kentucky Athletic Team Supporters) a nonprofit corporation founded for the purpose of boosting the Unigrams and the improvement of athletics at the primary and secondary school levels in the state. is promised strong support from the Prestonsburg Athletic Asso-

The membership of U-KATS is composed of persons over 21 years of age who have sincere interest in the purposes of the group. A member need not be a

University of Kentucky alumnus. In seeking members for U-KATS, the primary purpose is simply to gather as many people who will support the UK program as much as possible. Main work of the organization will be done through the enthusiasm and influence of these people.

A secondary program involves membership dues for the group at \$10 a year, and U-KATS expect to accomplish much through the combined strength of the membership dues.

The monies will be placed in a central fund, from which they will be used solely to pay for the administrative costs of U-KATS and to be invested in Kentucky primary and secondary school programs. A man from Prestonsburg, for instance, designates Prestonsburg high school as the school he wishes to support his membership dues will be held in escrow for Prestonsburg high school alone. If 1,000 members join who support Prestonsburg high school, then U-KATS will donate \$5,000 to the Prestonsburg program as a need arises.

However, the club is not limited in its aid to the \$5 alone. Many members join without designating any particular high school. Their money, and any money that is not needed for the administrative costs of U-KATS, may be invested in any way the board of directors sees fit. So it may be possible for U-KATS to invest funds to begin a football program at a school that now loes not have one.

Next meeting of the Prestonsburg Athletic Association will be held at 7:30 p.m., June 14 at the Floyd County Emergency & Rescue Squad building. All interested persons are invited.

## Frost-Bitten Corn May

Don't disk up your corn neid because above-ground portions of new plants show frost damage, says S. H. Phillips, UK Cooperative Extension Service grains

"The important parts of the corn plant are under the surface of the ground at this time of year," he says, "and these probably were not injured by the re-I will install, without charge, cent unexpected freeze. However, a lot of farmers are disking up their corn and replanting. This is probably not necessary.

Phillips said many corn plants showed blackened parts and leaves from the cold, but said this probably will not be a problem. "We think such frost-damaged corn will recover event-

He said it is better to let the existing plants recover than to replant. "Replanting costs the farmer money. Also, later plantings have reduced yields. Disking and replanting probably will cost the farmer more than letting frost-damaged corn re-

There was frost damage throughout the state but last week's extremely low temperatures—a record low for May in many areas-apparently hit hardest in Eastern Kentucky. Much corn was already growing well when the freeze hit.

The Governor's Commission on Agriculture has informational brochures for farmers on the operation of vacation farms and hunting preserves. They may be obtained on request.

The cost of the hearings could be tremendous, he said, especially if each river is artifically divided into certain zones containing numerous cities and towns. Pickard lists what he calls some of the discrepancies.

"In some cases," he said, "the most appropriate use might to be to transport wastes from an industry, so there is somewhat of a conflict.'





Most coal-burning plants now catch and harmlessly dispose of the sooty "fly ash" that used to contaminate the air, but many still pollute the atmosphere with large amounts of sulphur dioxide

This irritant gas can be trapped as it is burned and converted into sulphur, a basic chemical, but the high cost of the process under presently developed methods has prevented its being used on a large scale. Research is continuing to find an economical

Now, however, improved laboratory-tested techniques have convinced some experts in the coal and petroleum industries and in the government's research arm that coal-based gasoline can be made at a price that's right.

Apparently with this in mind. a number of big oil companies have hedged their bets by getting into the coal business. For example, Continental Oil Co., eighth largest in the country, is in the process of taking over Consolidation Coal Co., one of the two largest in coal and a leader in coal-to-gasoline research.

Consolidation Coal is now building, under a federal research contract, a \$10-million pilot plant at Cresap, West Virginia, to tap coal for high grade gasoline through a relatively new extraction process.

The plant is due to start operations late this year. If advance calculations are correct. it will turn out good gasoline for about 11 cents a gallon wholesale, which is actually a cent or so below the wholesale price now in some regions.
