## Tried by 800 UK Women

Marriage and children and colen students at the University of

Many mature women students at UK are not waiting until their children are grown to pursue educational goals, a recent study by Mrs. Celia K. Zyzniewski, assistant to the dean of women for continuing education of women, dis-

In a report to Robert L. Johnson. UK vice-president for student affairs, Mrs. Zyzniewski stated that questionnaires were sent to 822 women students 25 years of age and older who were enrolled at UK during the fall semester.

A total of 557 of the women students represent 25 percent of the enrollment of the UK Graduate School, while 265 are undergraduates. Enrollment of mature women at UK is 40 percent more

Thirty percent, or 244, responded to the questionnaires. Mothers reported having 134 children in elementaray school, plus 62 pre-school age children.

Decisions to continue their education were made by 212 of the women themselves—or 86 percent -while 127 added that their husbands had also encouraged them. and 41 reported encouragement from their children.

A total of 98 women reported study problems: 93 stated they are having problems with friends, and 70 have encountered finan-

While enrollment in the field of education showed the highest interest-27 percent-scientific and liberal arts studies also had a large following, especially at the graduate level, Mrs. Zyzniewski points out.

These and other problems involved in the continuing education of mature women will be explored during a series of programs on February 2, 9, 16 and

Each program features a UK faculty member offering various approaches to these questions, and discussions will be held with women visitors who are successful in their respective professional fields.





#### Counties Near Floyd Face Caterpillar Blight

Landowners in three small sections of the state, including all or parts of 11 Eastern Kentucky counties, may face increased defoliation of their fruit trees this summer, a survey indicates.

The areas are Taylor county and parts of the surrounding counties of Casey, Marion, Green and Adair; Menifee, Morgan, Montgomery and parts of Powell, Wolfe, Magoffin, Ellioft, Rowan and Clark, and Letcher county and parts of Knott, Perry and Harlan.

The survey was conducted by the Kentucky Department of Natural Resources' division of forestry and the U.S. Forest Service, to determine the potential for defoliation in the state this year due to the Eastern tent cat-

Wild cherry trees in 30 counties across the state were surveyed to determine the presence of caterpillar egg masses.

Trees with a great deal more new egg masses than old ones can expect more defoliation this year than last year.

Assistant forestry director Harry Nadler said landowners in the three areas where increased defoliation is expected will be informed of the situation so they may undertake control

A follow-up survey will be conducted in May, Nadler said. Noting that the recent survey is the first ever attempted anywhere, he said one purpose of the May survey will be to test the accuracy of the system used in the

#### Breathitt Asks U.S. To Lift Freeze On Highway Funds

Frankfort, Ky. - Gov. Edward T. Breathitt has asked U.S. Secretary of Transportation Alan S. Boyd to lift the freeze on \$30 million in federal highway construction funds for Kentuky.

Kentucky was notified Nov. 23 through the Bureau of Public Roads that the funds for this fiscal year would be reduced some 17 percent. The order also froze all federal highway funds carried over from previous years. In Kentucky's case, the cutback for the current fiscal year amounted to about \$14 million.

Carryover funds frozen totaled about \$30 million. This, in effect, reduced Kentucky's federal aid construction funds by about \$44 million for the next six months. It is the freeze of carryover funds that Breathitt wants rescinded.

The carryover funds, according to Breathitt's letter to Boyd, were due to the Highway Department's method of programming projects so as to construct them on a seasonal or calendar basis rather than a fiscal year

"It is illogical to me for the federal government to penalize Kentucky for having its road building program on a sound businesslike basis so as to give its taxpayers the most for their dollars," Breathitt said.
