ORDINANCE

An Ordinance Amending Ordinance No. 3-64, 5-62 and 7-62 Providing for A License Tax Upon Motor Vehicle Owned Or Operated By Persons, Firms, and Corporations Within the Corporate Limits of the City of Prestonsburg; And Specifically, Amending Section 2 of Ordinance 3-64 With Reference To The Issuance of Duplicate Stickers.

WHEREAS, the City of Prestonsburg has heretofore enacted ordinances providing for the regulation and licensing of motor vehicles operated on its streets, and has made provision for the issuance of duplicate license stickers in cases of the sale or transfer of licensed vehicles, and

WHEREAS, the city desires to amend said ordinance, and specifically Section 2 thereof.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG AS FOLLOWS:

1. Section 2 of Ordinance No. 3-64 is hereby deleted. 2. In lieu thereof, Section 2 of said ordinance shall henceforth read as follows: "Whenever a person or license holder under this ordinance presents satisfactory proof of the transfer of title of a motor vehicle to a purchaser outside of the corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg, which said purchaser does not, in the normal course of business operate said motor vehicle upon the streets of the City of Prestonsburg, such person or license holder shall be entitled to a duplicate license sticker upon the payment of a \$1.00 fee. The clerk shall note the number of the duplicate sticker, and the person to whom it is issued, upon the books kept for that purpose. Each person who makes application for a duplicate sticker shall be required to furnish satisfactory evidence of the name of the transferee or purchaser of said motor vehicle before such duplicate license is issued. In the event that the transferee or purchaser is a resident of the City of Prestonsburg, other than automobile dealers, or in the normal course of business operates said motor vehicle upon the highways of the City of Prestonsburg, within the definition of prior ordinances referred to herein, then the Chief of Police is authorized and directed to remove such sticker, if any, from the transferred motor vehicle, and forthwith require the transferee or purchaser to comply with all ordinances of the City of Prestonsburg with respect to licensing a motor vehicle. Such action shall not be required in the event the applicant for a duplicate license furnishes to the clerk the old license, or evidence of its destruction.

3. All other ordinances, and each provision thereof, with respect to licensing of motor vehicles by the City of Prestonsburg, not expressly repealed or amended herein, are hereby reaffirmed and shall remain in full force and effect.

WALNUT TREES CAN BRING HUGE PROFITS IN 40 YEARS

The Kentucky Farm Bureau and the state forestry division are making a special effort to get farmers and lot owners to plant walnut tree seedlings this spring.

In a program announced last week, county farm bureaus will take orders for seedlings, combine them into one order to the state's free nursery and apportion them when the seedlings are delivered. They are asking civic groups, youth organizations and homemaker clubs to promote the idea.

John W. Koon, executive secretary of the farm bureau, said he thinks many landowners are missing a good bet if they don't put some of their idle land and land along fence-rows and creeks to producing walnut trees.

Clarence L. Miller, marketing consultant for the organization, said the seedlings will be packaged in bundles of about 250 each and sent to county farm bureau headquarters in March. The county farm bureaus will break the bundles down into smaller lots, according to the sizes of orders they have. He said the state sells the trees for \$8 for 1,000. It will have more than a million walnut seedlings available this spring, he said.

Farmers and landowners also can order other seedlings from the state tree nurseries at the same price, including, black locust, tulip poplar, and loblolly, shortleaf and white pines.

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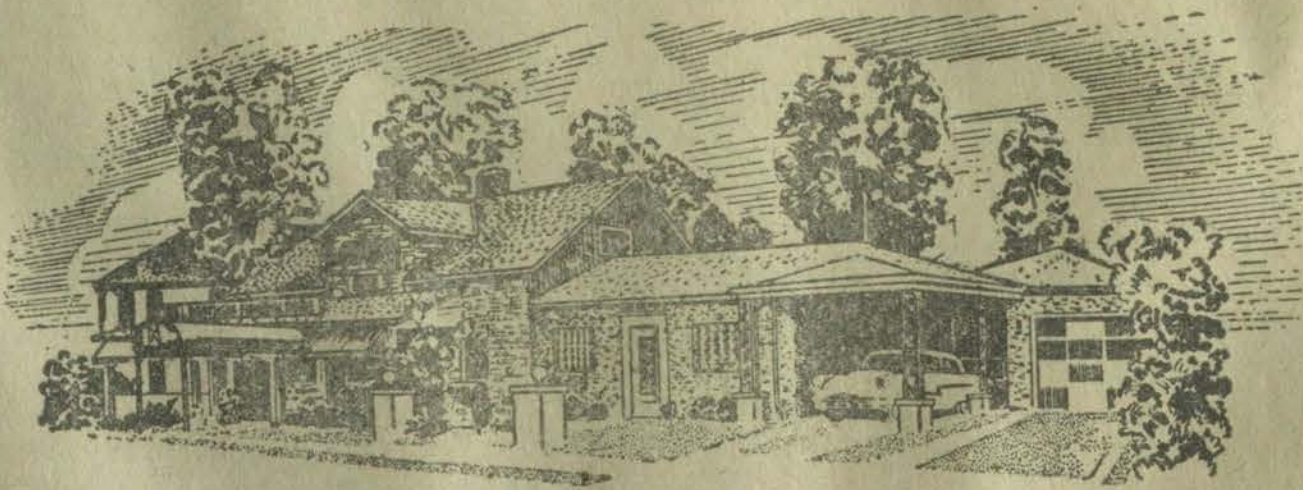

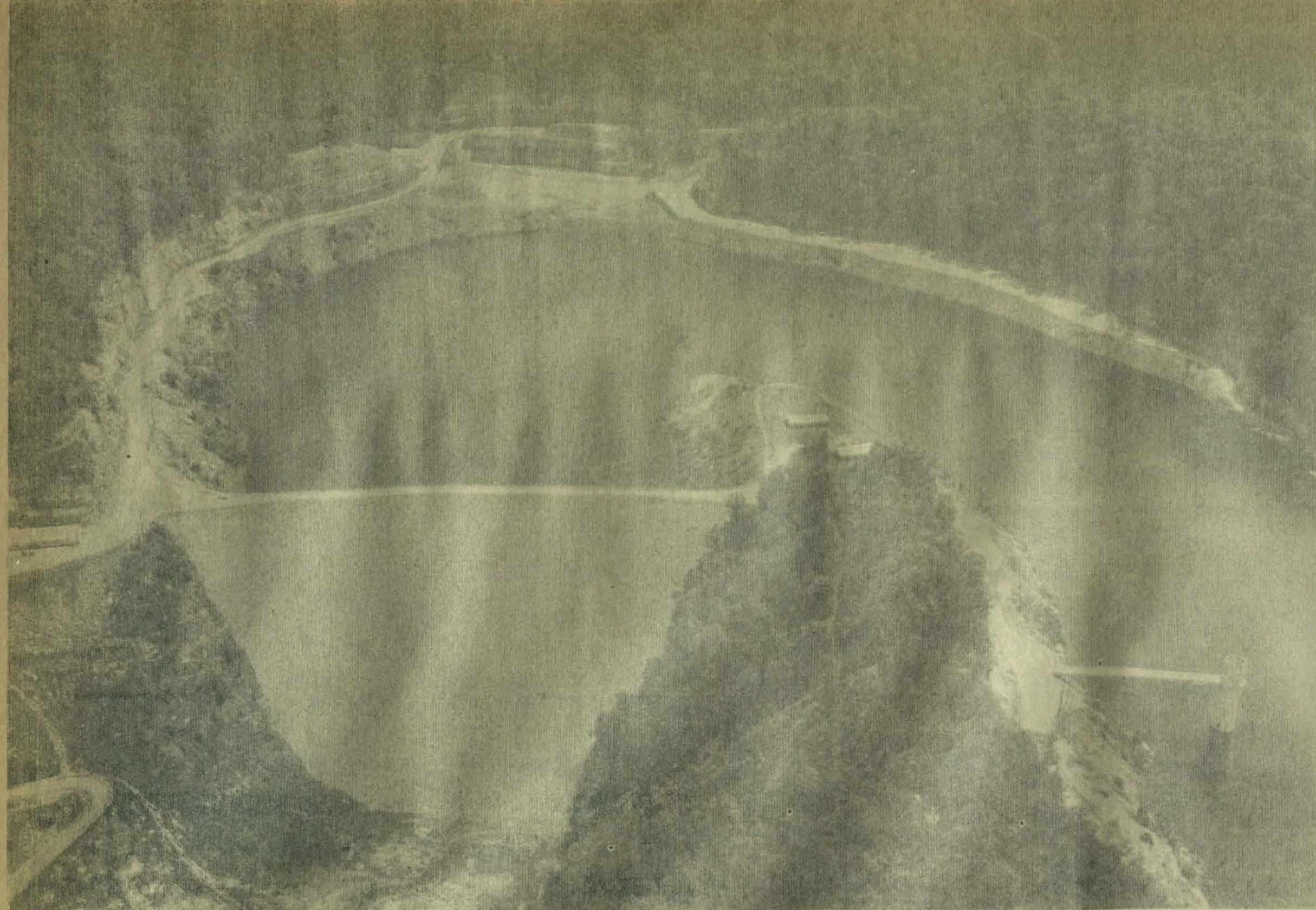

LIBRARIES TO SUPPLY BOOKS TO STATE HOSPITAL PATIENTS

Frankfort, Ky. — Books and other library materials and services may be made available next fiscal year to patients and residents of state institutions, according to Miss Margaret Willis, state librarian.

She said Kentucky has received \$7,075 under the Federal Library Services and Construction Act to develop a plan of library services for residents of the institutions.

The federal act defines such state institutional library services as "the providing of books and other library materials, and of library services to inmates, patients, or residents of penal institutions, reformatories, residential training schools, orphanages, or general or special insti-

tutions operated or substantially supported by the state . . ."

"Our first step," Miss Willis said, "will be the determination of priorities for participation in the program." A survey of existing facilities will be carried out by the Department of Libraries in cooperation with other state agencies dealing with institutional services, she said.

Representatives of state agencies who attended a recent meeting to discuss the plan included Don McClure, Child Welfare Department; Billy Howard, Corrections Department; Sara Sice, Health Department; Dr. Edgar Moles, Mental Health Department; Mrs. Betty Bailey, T. B. Commission, and Miss Willis.

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LINCOLN HERITAGE TRAIL STARTS AT SPRINGFIELD

"All that I am, or hope to be, I owe to my angel mother."

So spoke Abraham Lincoln of Nancy Hanks, the flaxen-haired frontier girl who married a carpenter, Thomas Lincoln, and bore a child who became the 16th and perhaps the greatest President of the United States. Everyone, thanks to the son himself, knows of Lincoln's debt to his mother. But Kentucky, the Lincoln's native state, has done something about it.

The Commonwealth established, in 1952, Lincoln Homestead State Shrine on Ky. 523, near Springfield—in the neighborhood where Nancy Hanks and Thomas Lincoln lived, courted, and finally married. It is a natural starting place for tourists who follow the Lincoln Heritage Trail, a three-state network of highways that traces the progress of the Great Emancipator's life.

Visitors to Lincoln Homestead State Shrine will see the log house in which Nancy Hanks lived with the Francis Berry family, from the age of 10 until her marriage in 1806. Removed from its original site in nearby Beechland, the cabin has been reconstructed according to its original form.

This is the very building where Thomas proposed to Nancy. Two stories high, it is furnished with objects which make it a compact museum of Kentucky frontier life. Outstanding pieces include a squat wooden stool known to have been used by Nancy Hanks herself, and the pulpit of Jesse Head, eccentric

Methodist preacher who married the two.

Just a few hundred yards away is a replica of the cabin where the widow Bathsheba Lincoln raised her five children, including Thomas. Thomas' father had been killed by an Indian's bullet when Thomas was six years old.

The house, constructed of logs from a neighborhood barn some 200 years old, has a loft like the one Thomas slept in, a fireplace, a massive stone chimney, and furniture made by Thomas Lincoln himself. Approximations of Bathsheba's household articles surround the stone hearth, and there are also crudely built puncheon benches and tables.

Near this cabin, close by a pleasant stream, is a reproduction of a pioneer blacksmith and carpenter's shop. It is a replica of the one in which Thomas learned his trade from Richard and Francis Berry.

The President's mother is especially remembered by a field-stone enclosure in one corner of the Berry Yard. Somewhat similar in appearance to a stone foundation, it was placed here by the federal government in remembrance of the woman who, by Lincoln's own testimony, laid the foundation for his success.

Va., and Mrs. Tina Allen, of Martin, Raymond and Billy Conner, of Milton, W. Va., and Charles Conner, of Miami, Fla.; nine grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. She was a resident for several years of Northern, this county.
