

PERKINS SAYS HE WANTED STAFF 'WE COULD TRUST'

"I wanted a staff we could trust—that is something we lacked in the past." So said Congressman Carl D. Perkins Monday in answer to attacks from civil rights leaders after he had fired some staff employees of the House Education and Labor Committee of which the Knott countian is chairman.

Perkins was named to succeed Harlem's Rep. Adam Clayton Powell when Congress organized last month. Since then, Perkins has been revamping and slimming down the committee staff.

His changes include the appointment of two Kentuckians to top staff posts and the dismissal of a dozen fulltime Powell appointees. In addition, several dozen other Powell employees are out of temporary jobs because Powell's five ad hoc subcommittees have also been abolished.

Perkins was accused by Washington civil rights leader Clarence Mitchell of discriminating against Negroes in firing many of the appointees of his Negro predecessor.

Perkins replied: "My purpose was to build a professional staff to serve the committee and Congress as well as the people. I wanted a staff we could trust—that is something we lacked in the past."

The new appointees include: Hartwell D. (Jack) Reed, Jr., of Frankfort, moved up to the position of general counsel for the full committee. For the past six years, he has served Perkins as counsel to subcommittee on general education and labor legislation.

Benjamin F. Reeves, former Washington correspondent and managing editor of The Courier-Journal, will be editor of committee publications and general troubleshooter for Perkins.

Two other former subcommittee specialists, William Gaul in education, and Robert McCord in labor, will move up to the full committee staff.

The Powell staff was directed largely by C. Sumner Stone, a \$25,890 special assistant and one of those who was fired, but Perkins said he intends to run the staff himself.

"I never expect to have on my staff any individual whom the committee members do not have implicit faith in," Perkins said. All of his new appointments, the chairman said, were endorsed by the other Democratic committee members, who frequently complained in the past about Powell's hiring-and-firing practices.

Among other changes, the committee will have no ad hoc subcommittees, temporary investigating committees which Powell used. One Perkins aide estimated that 40 or 50 Powell people were "coming and going" as staff employees on ad hoc committees.

WHEREAS, the City of Prestonsburg has heretofore enacted ordinances providing for the regulation and licensing of motor vehicles operated on its streets, and has made provision for the issuance of duplicate license stickers in cases of the sale or transfer of licensed vehicles, and

WHEREAS, the city desires to amend said ordinance, and specifically Section 2 thereof,

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG AS FOLLOWS:

1. Section 2 of Ordinance No. 3-64 is hereby deleted.

2. In lieu thereof, Section 2 of said ordinance shall henceforth read as follows:

"Whenever a person or license holder under this ordinance presents satisfactory proof of the transfer of title of a motor vehicle to a purchaser outside of the corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg, which said purchaser does not, in the normal course of business operate said motor vehicle upon the streets of the City of Prestonsburg, such person or license holder shall be entitled to a duplicate license sticker upon the payment of a \$1.00 fee. The clerk shall note the number of the duplicate sticker, and the person to whom it is issued, upon the books kept for that purpose. Each person who makes application for a duplicate sticker shall be required to furnish satisfactory evidence of the name of the transferee or purchaser of said motor vehicle before such duplicate license is issued. In the event that the transferee or purchaser is a resident of the City of Prestonsburg, other than automobile dealers, or in the normal course of business operates said motor vehicle upon the highways of the City of Prestonsburg, within the definition of prior ordinances referred to herein, then the Chief of Police is authorized and directed to remove such sticker, if any, from the transferred motor vehicle, and forthwith require the transferee or purchaser to comply with all ordinances of the City of Prestonsburg with respect to licensing a motor vehicle. Such action shall not be required in the event the applicant for a duplicate license furnishes to the clerk the old license, or evidence of its destruction.

3. All other ordinances, and each provision thereof, with respect to licensing of motor vehicles by the City of Prestonsburg, not expressly repealed or amended herein, are hereby reaffirmed and shall remain in full force and effect.

BOB TALLENT OFF U. OF K. NET SQUAD

Jones Tallent, father of Bob Tallent, the Floyd countian who was dropped Tuesday from the University of Kentucky basketball team by Coach Adolph Rupp for "disciplinary" reasons, told The Times, late Wednesday afternoon, that he was unable to shed new light on the situation at Lexington, although he had talked with his son via telephone during the day.

"Bob expects to talk with Rupp tonight or tomorrow morning; maybe we'll know more about it then," the Maytown man said.

The elder Tallent said he had personally been dissatisfied with the treatment given his son for some time. But he indicated that his son — "not the cry-baby type" — was reticent about it all and wanted only to play basketball.

The story, then, rests on the report given by Billy Reed in the Wednesday morning edition of The Courier-Journal. Excerpts from that story follow:

"It was a disciplinary problem that had to be taken care of and I took care of it," Rupp said yesterday by phone from Lexington. "That's all there is to it."

Rupp's action stemmed from an incident late in the second half of UK's 76-57 loss to Tennessee Monday night at Knoxville, Tennessee.

After a Tallent pass to Louie Dampier went out of bounds, Rupp jerked Tallent from the game and swapped heated words with him on the UK bench.

Neither would relate exactly what was said.

"It was all I could take," Tallent said yesterday, also by phone from Lexington. "I really didn't lose my head. . . . I just got fed up."

Tallent said he "kinda figured he (Rupp) would do something." He found out what it was when he reported for practice yesterday. UK equipment manager George Hukle told Tallent that Rupp had issued orders not to give him any practice equipment.

"That's how I found out," Tallent said.

A strong "B" student in engineering, Tallent was UK's No. 3 scorer with 240 points in 19 games for a 12.6 average. He was the team's best marksman, hitting 52.7 percent from the field.

Nevertheless, Rupp blamed Tallent publicly for contributing heavily to UK's disappointing record this season. And, after Steve Clevenger turned in a series of sparkling relief performances at guard, UK fans booed Tallent in last Saturday's 77-72 overtime loss to Mississippi State at Lexington.

"When the fans start getting on you, it's time for something to happen," Tallent said. "I don't know what I did to deserve it. I guess they had to have a scapegoat and I was it."

"It made me feel pretty bad. All you can do is try your best. They acted like I had never scored a point, or anything, and I felt I played some pretty good games this year."

Before the opening game, Rupp named Tallent to fill a starting guard position vacated by the graduation of Tommy Kron from last season's national collegiate runner-up team.

Then, early in the season, Rupp publicly criticized Tallent for poor defense and too many floor errors.

"He's shaken us up," Rupp said. "Tallent doesn't seem to like that pressure."

Comments like that did shake up Tallent.

"He called me his 'error boy,'" Tallent said. "But as long as I got to play, I didn't care what they said."

Taking their cue from Rupp, UK fans became unhappy with Tallent, even though he scored 20 points against Northwestern, 25 against Kansas State, 28 against Notre Dame and 26 in the second game with Florida.

His best game was UK's 96-85 win over Notre Dame on New Year's Eve in Louisville's Freedom Hall. Tallent hit 13 of his 19 shots from the field that night.

He started every game until spraining his left ankle Sunday, Jan. 22, the day before UK played Tennessee in Lexington.

Clevenger started and Tallent sat out that game (UK lost 52-56 in two overtimes), but Tallent was back in the lineup when UK played Louisiana State in Lexington the next Saturday.

"When I got my ankle hurt, that's what caused it all," Tallent said. "If you're injured, you know somebody's going to take your place, so I started back before I was ready."

"But I couldn't play as well as I was capable, so they (the coaches) got down on me. They started taking me out every time I made a mistake and I lost my confidence."

"I can't play like that, but I decided to finish the season."

"I've never had anything against coach Rupp at all," Tallent said. "He treats everybody the same. I don't really know what I'm going to do now. I hope to stay in school and finish this semester."

"Then I don't know what I'll do."

Persons already registered to vote do not have to re-register unless they have changed their name by marriage, or have moved since they last voted from one precinct to another, or from one county to another.

Those eligible to register and vote in the primary must be 18 years old by the time of the Nov. 7 general election, and must have lived in the state one year, the county six months, and the precinct 60 days.

If a registered voter is going to be away from his county on primary day, he may vote by absentee ballot. To get this absentee ballot, he must make notarized application to his county clerk not later than May 4.

The voter's ballot, also notarized, must be returned to the same county clerk so that he will receive it before the polls close at 6 p.m. on primary day.

A person now registered as a Democrat or Republican may change his party affiliation before the books close March 25, but if he does, he will disqualify himself from voting in this year's primary.

He will be entitled, however, to vote in the November election and in the 1968 primary.

If he does plan to change his affiliation and waits until after the primary to do so, he cannot only vote in his present party's primary, but also in the general election and in the 1968 primary of the party to which he switches.

Kentucky elects a governor and eight other statewide officials every four years. None of them may succeed himself in the office to which he was elected.

The other statewide offices are those of lieutenant governor, secretary of state, attorney general, auditor of public accounts, state treasurer, superintendent of public instruction, commissioner of agriculture, and clerk of the court of appeals.

Also up for nomination May 23 are candidates for 100 seats in the House of Representatives and 19 of the 38 seats in the State Senate.

The senate seats to be filled this year are from odd-numbered districts. Statewide officials and state senators are elected for four-year terms. State representatives serve two-year terms.

An undetermined number of candidates also will be elected to municipal boards this November. A number of vacancies in various offices throughout the state will be filled at the same time.

Registration books will be reopened five days after the primary for registration to vote in the November election.

KNOTT COUNTY'S FIRST PUBLIC LIBRARY OPENS

The first public library in the history of Knott county opened its doors, last Saturday to crowds of well-wishers, more than 400 strong.

Located on the Court House Square in Hindman, the library was scheduled to open in its official quarters this time last year. Fire, however, swept through the building before the first book could be borrowed, and the result was a make-shift arrangement until a new building could be constructed.

Housed now in its newly completed quarters, the library as it now stands is a demonstration of model library operation, designed to establish the best in library service for all of Knott county's 17,500 residents.

As the seventh demonstration of model library service in the state to date, the Knott county program is supported, almost completely, by funds from the Kentucky Department of Libraries in an all-out effort to upgrade library service throughout the Commonwealth. Support for the Knott county public library includes the providing of salaries for two staff members, the provision of the entire book collection, equipment, and other necessary library materials. At the end of the demonstration time, it is believed that the operation will be proved so vital to the entire county that local support for the program will be increased. Included in this library service is the Bookmobile, a \$7,100 mobile library, which was purchased by the Department of Libraries, and supplies

outlying areas of the county with the finest books available.

Now open more than 35 hours a week, the county library offers not only a large collection of thousands of new, well-selected books, but it also offers recordings, and art reproductions which may also be borrowed, free of charge, by all residents of the county. Newspapers and magazines are also available from the library.

Don Amburgey, regional librarian, and Mrs. Hazel Bowling, county librarian, Saturday expressed their sincere appreciation to all Knott countians and the people of surrounding counties who attended the opening day celebration. The fact that more than 300 books were checked out on the first day indicates that the Knott county library program is here to stay.

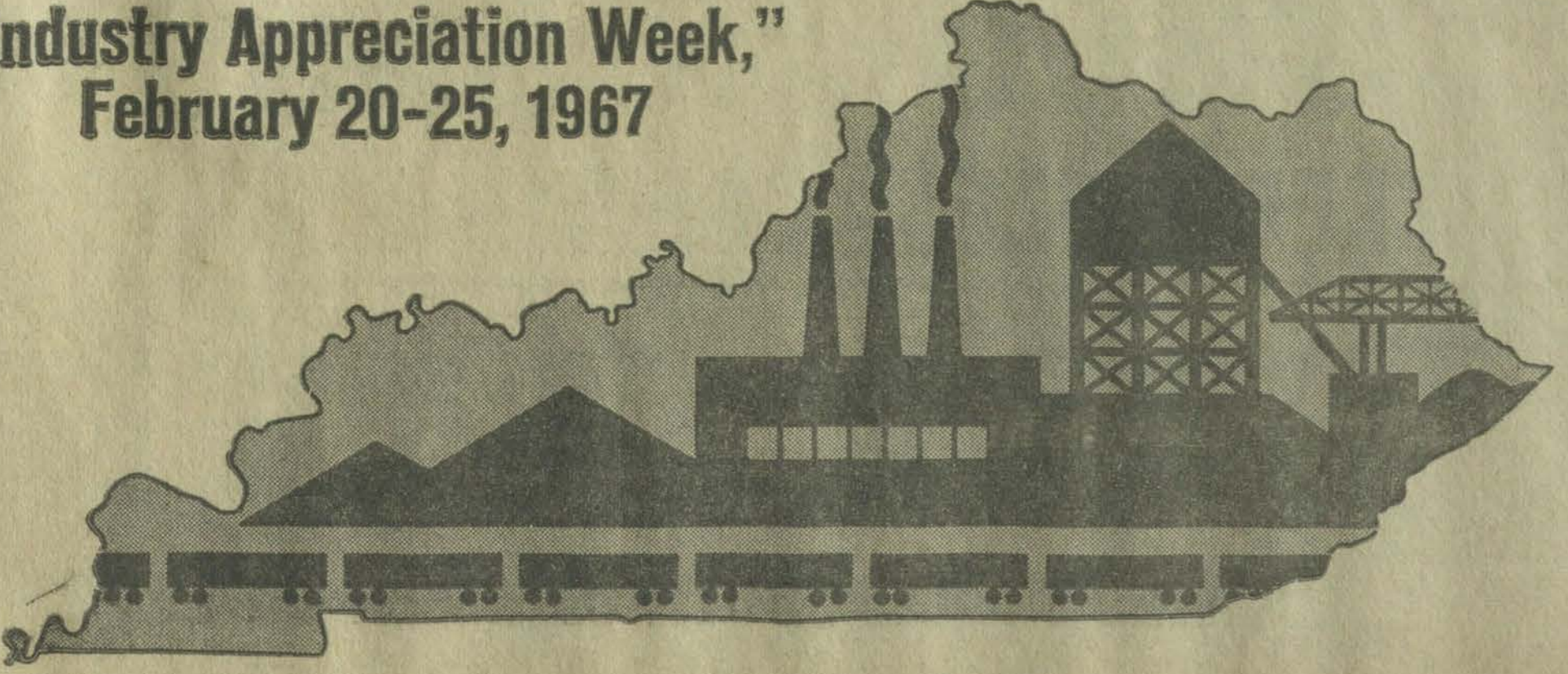

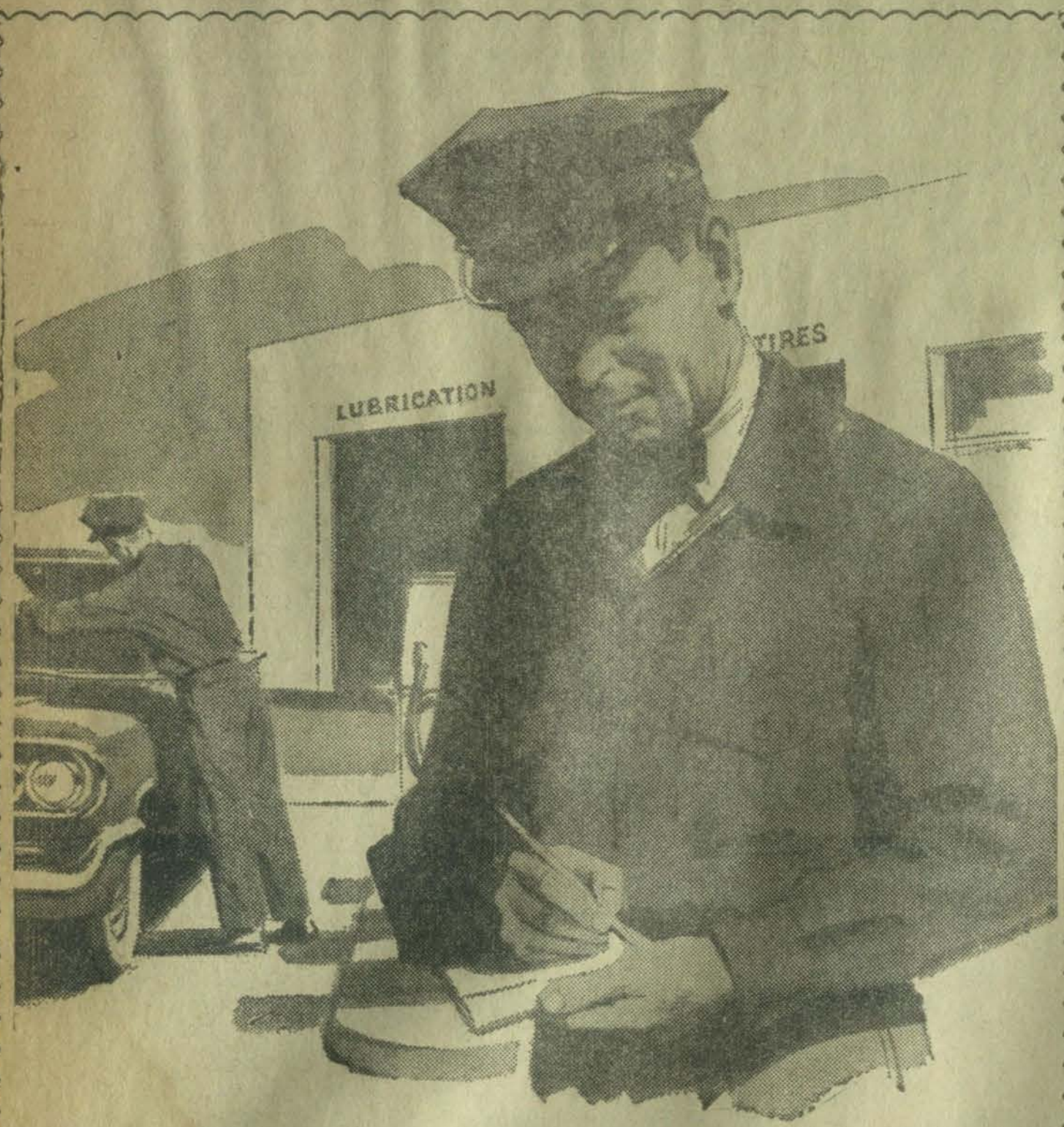
