### AN IMPORTANT INDUSTRY AND AN IMPORTANT ISSUE

Writing in KENTUCKY BUSINESS, Fred B. Bullard, president of the Kentucky Coal Association, not only gives a comprehensive report on the booming present and bright future of the coal industry but also forthrightly faces up to some of the problems which concern coal.

He writes, for instance:

"The matters of air and water pollution are of serious concern to the coal industry. They present problems which must be faced frankly and attacked aggressively with all the methods and tools of modern technology. This is being done and there are indications that the results will bring satisfactory answers to the public demands for clear air and clean streams. It is axiomatic that if the coal industry does not economically solve its air and water pollution problems, there will be a decline rather than an increase in the future utilization of coal . . ."

This is the sort of attitude that will win friends for one of the nation's most important industries. An honest admission of facts, a frank appraisal of the problem or problems and an honest and continuing effort to solve these problems will create for the industry a new image in the public mind.

Surely nobody is so ignorant or so biased as to dispute the very real need for coal production. Aside from the economic benefits accruing from the employment of skilled workers at high rates of pay, coal has heavily contributed to, and continues to be a vital influence in, the development of this country, first among the nations of the world. Such an industry should hold the regard not only of those who directly benefit from it but also of the country as a whole.

On the other hand, the public has pretty well reached the conclusion that no industry, however important it is, is justifiable if its operation is to

the public hurt.

The Kentucky coal industry does well to refrain from fighting all attempts to eradicate air and stream pollution. It will benefit if it drops, as Mr. Bullard's article indicates it will, those arguments crying out that the cost of protective measures against pollution will destroy the industry.

For such measures will save the coal industry and at the same time go far toward being a saving force working in behalf of millions of Ameri-





He will be entitled, however, to vote in the November election and in the 1968 primary.

If he does plan to change his affiliation and waits until after the primary to do so, he cannot only vote in his present party's primary, but also in the general election and in the 1968 primary of the party to which he switches.

Kentucky elects a governor and eight other statewide officials every four years. None of them may succeed himself in the office to which he was

The other statewide offices are those of lieutenant governor, secretary of state, attorney general, auditor of public accounts, state treasurer, superintendent of public instruction, commissioner of agriculture, and clerk of the court of appeals.

Also up for nomination May 23 are candidates for 100 seats in the House of Representatives and 19 of the 38 seats in the State

The senate seats to be filled this year are from odd-numbered districts. Statewide officials and state senators are elected for four-year terms. State representatives serve two-year terms.

An undetermined number of candidates also will be elected to municipal boards this November. A number of vacancies in various offices throughout the state will be filled at the same

Registration books will be reopened five days after the primary for registration to vote in the November election.
