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ISLAND CREEK SEES BIG OUTPUT GROWTH

Island Creek Coal Company will attain a 50 percent growth in production over the next five years, James L. Hamilton, chairman, predicted last week.

He told the New York Society of Security Analysts the coal industry generally has bright prospects, especially in the electric utility, metallurgical and export markets. Mr. Hamilton said his company's production has increased more than 100 percent in the past five years, principally through acquisitions. Growth in the next five years, however, is predicated mainly on the open-

ing of new, large-scale mines in the company's coal reserves, now totaling more than three billion tons owned, leased, under option or controlled, he said. Five such mines are already under construction, he said.

Hamilton estimated increases in national coal consumption would approximate 100 million tons every five years for the next 15 years, for an annual total of some 800 million tons by 1980. The principal reasons for the consumption increase are the "remarkable job" of the coal industry and its allies in transportation in holding down and even reducing delivered coal costs, and the tremendous growth in demand for electric energy. Coal production for the utility market will expand substantially despite the inroads of nuclear power generation, which will make most of its gains at the expense of gas, oil and hydro, Mr. Hamilton said.

Island Creek now has under contract or committed, for periods up to 25 years, nearly 200 million tons of coal — close to eight years' production at current levels—having a value of nearly \$900 million, he said.

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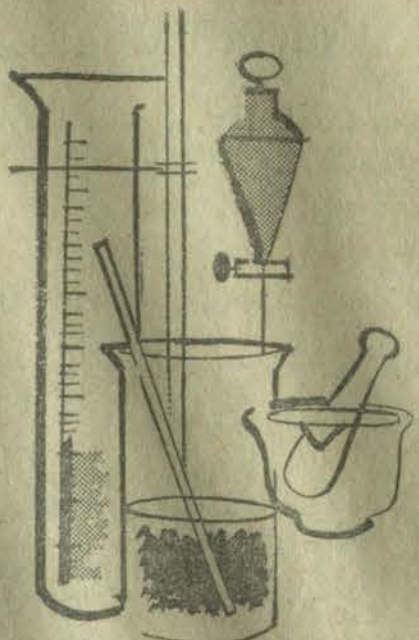

Alice Lloyd Prexy Visits West Coast

Pippa Passes, Ky.—For Alice Lloyd College President William S. Hayes, currently visiting the West Coast, California, Washington and Oregon represent the last stage of a journey that has taken him across the continent in less than a month.

Beginning early in February, President Hayes visited Washington, D. C. with Dean Ellis Hartford, of the University of Kentucky, and Dr. Henry Campbell, of Prestonsburg Community College. Meeting with Edward Glazer, executive director of the American Association of Junior Colleges, and U. S. Rep. Carl D. Perkins, they discussed educational problems of Eastern Kentucky.

Next stop on Hayes' journey was Columbus, Ohio, where he was featured speaker at the state convention of the Ohio chapters of the Society of Colonial Dames of the 17th Century. Alice Lloyd College is a recipient of financial support from the Society's Scholarship Fund.

After a brief stop in Dayton, Ohio, where he spent two days working with Alice Lloyd College staff and friends, he flew to California to begin a month-long session of work on the West Coast.

During his stay in California, Washington and Oregon, he will appear before television and club audiences, speak on radio, be interviewed by newspapers and visit several foundations and corporations, acquainting more and more people with the story of Alice Lloyd College and the educational problems of the Appalachians.

14 KY. SCHOOL SYSTEMS IN TEACHER PAY STUDY

Salary schedules of 14 Kentucky school systems are among 1,101 throughout the nation for which the National Education Association (NEA) research division this year has reported valuation scores based on an objective series of tests.

The individual scores are reported for the first time in a new NEA research report entitled "Evaluation of Salary Schedules for Classroom Teachers, 1966-'67." The 1,101 systems all have enrollments of 6,000 or more.

Eleven tests made up the evaluation instrument and a maximum score of 100 was possible, though no system in the nation scored higher than 79.5. The median score was 37.5 (half the group scored more than this and half scored less) and the mean or average score was 37.7.

Two Kentucky school systems—Louisville and Jefferson county—came close to the median with identical scores of 36.5. They are in the 50,000-99,999 enrollment stratum.

In the 12,000-24,000 enrollment stratum Fayette county scored 23.5 and Pike county scored 18.5.

These were scores of 10 other Kentucky school systems, all in the 6,000-11,999 enrollment stratum:

Ashland, 25.5; Covington, 29.5; Hardin county, 26.5; Harlan county, 23.5; Hopkins county, 23.5; Kenton county, 28.0; Letcher county, 23.5; Lexington, 30.5; Owensboro, 23.5; and Paducah, 23.5.

Lowest score in the nation was 5.5.

Of the possible maximum score of 100 points, 40 could be achieved on the basis of dollar amounts scheduled and 60 for good schedule structure.

For three years the NEA research division has worked jointly with the NEA salary consultant service to develop such an objective instrument for evaluating and comparing salary schedules pertaining to classroom teachers.

Such an evaluation device has been needed to indicate how well salary schedules are measuring up to the best accepted practices of scheduling, not only in respect to the dollar amounts of salaries but also in respect to structural procedures involving the number and relative size of increments, adequate recognition of advanced preparation, and other important aspects of scheduling.

The 11 tests in the evaluation instrument cover these aspects of salary scheduling and are assigned these maximum scores within the total possible score of 100:

1. Minimum salary for bachelor's (B.A.) degree, 20 points.
2. Ratio of master's (M.A.) degree minimum to B.A. minimum, 5 points.
3. Ratio of M.A. maximum to B.A. minimum, 10 points.
4. Ratio of 6-year maximum to B.A. minimum, 10 points.

FUND TO AID 30 STUDENTS

Grants Are Offered To Medical Students For Rural Practice

The Rural Kentucky Medical Scholarship Fund will have at least 30 scholarships available this year to Kentucky medical students, Dr. C. C. Howard, chairman of the funds board of trustees, has announced.

The Rural Scholarship Program provides for a revolving fund designed to assist medical students who are willing to practice in rural areas in Kentucky who need financial help. It was established as a means of providing better distribution of physicians in rural Kentucky and now has recipients practicing in 30 of the 120 counties in the state.

Applicants must be residents of Kentucky who have been admitted to an accredited medical school. The fund now has three plans available:

1. A student may borrow up to \$2,000 per year, provided he will agree to practice in one of 10 Kentucky counties most in need the recipient practices in one of these 10 "critical" counties, one \$2,000 loan will be canceled.
 2. A student may borrow \$1,300 per year with the provision that one-half of the loan will be forgiven for each year of practice in a "semi-critical" county area designated by the board. The "semi-critical" counties are selected on the basis of the ones next in greatest need.
 3. A student may borrow \$1,300 per year who will agree to practice in rural areas other than the "critical" or "semi-critical" counties.

FLOYD TOWN CITED BY STATE OEO HEAD

With a \$50,151 grant from the Office of Economic Opportunity, the Floyd county community of Ligon has built 75 outdoor toilets to stop contamination of ground and water supply and has initiated a health-education program.

Director Albert Whitehouse, of the Kentucky O.E.O., says the community of 350 persons at the head of Clear Creek "is a splendid example of how a group of

people can start with one goal and end by solving many common problems."

After the Floyd County Health Department found 68 percent of the residents infected with intestinal parasites, a clinic was established and health education begun in community meetings, homes and schools. (The health department loaned the project the services of one of its sanitarians, John Milton Stumbo, who has pushed the work and enlisted community cooperation.)

Thirty unemployed fathers of the Work-Experience program helped build the new toilets and a 4-H Club contracted to clean up the creek-road where the old privies had drained. Other clean-up and decorating projects were begun.

A final survey next month is expected to show the people are now free of parasites, Whitehouse says. The people are working for the long-range goals of a permanent pure water system and better housing.

Whitehouse's remarks were made to the Big Sandy Area Community Action board of directors recently at Paintsville.

Cumberland College Music Department Building Destroyed

On the morning of Feb. 23 a fire, believed to have originated in the furnace room, completely destroyed the Music building of Cumberland College in Williamsburg.

The building was renovated in 1960 and had housed the Music Department since that time. The structure was built in 1910 as a gymnasium. In 1928 it was converted to the college library, and, when the Norma Jeanne Perkins Hagan Library was built, the building was renovated and became the home of the Music Department. It housed 12 practice rooms, four studios, five offices, a band and choir room and two classrooms.

Destroyed in the blaze was equipment worth in excess of \$30,000. This included 17 pianos, an organ and band instruments for 45 people.

Temporary arrangements have been made to take care of the music classes.

President J. M. Boswell has estimated replacing the building will require in excess of \$300,000.

Regulation Protecting Life Insurance Buyers To Be Effective June 1
A new State Insurance Department regulation to protect purchasers of life insurance from misleading sales methods will become effective June 1.
Insurance Commissioner S. Roy Woodall, Jr., recently said the regulation will "assure fair and full disclosure of all relevant facts in the sale of life insurance."
Some examples of misleading sales methods discussed during a recent hearing on the regulation are:
Omission of facts which fairly describe the policy, undue emphasis upon facts not relevant to sale of life insurance, undue emphasis upon features of secondary importance to life insurance.
More than 300 life insurance companies and 8,000 agents in Kentucky will be affected by the regulation, Woodall says.
The regulation will prohibit any company or agent from:
Including annual coupons which might be construed as stock certificates as part of policies containing guaranteed annual endowments; issuing a policy containing guaranteed annual endowments unless the gross premium for this is shown prominently and separately in the policy; making statements which imply that the insured will be a stockholder; or using such words as "Investment or investment plan," which might mislead a purchaser into believing he is to receive something other than an insurance policy; referring to the payment of dividends so as to misrepresent their true nature—or suggesting that certain policyholders will receive preferential treatment.

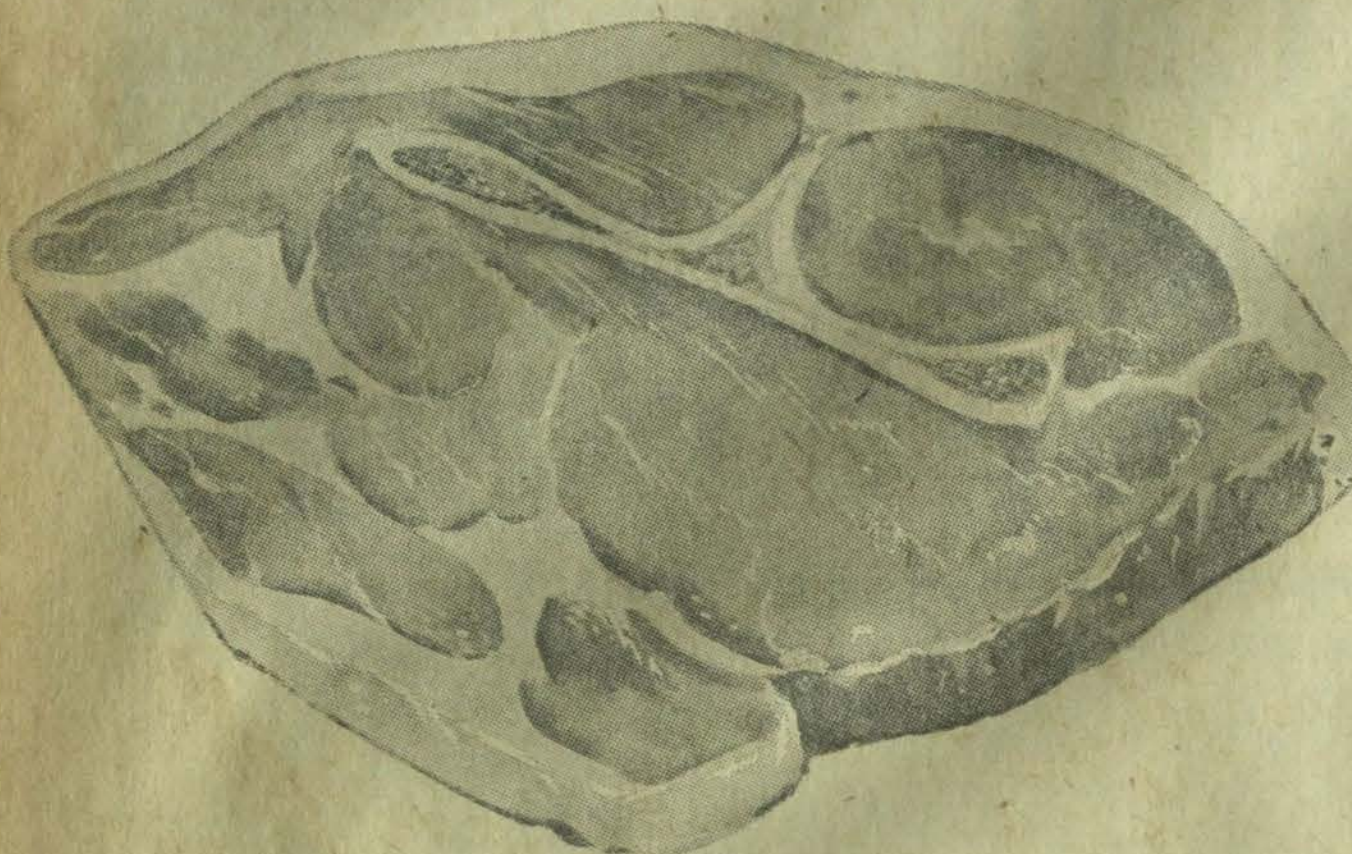
