### 5,819 **GIVEN** STAMPS AID

In County As State Total for January Is Above 500,000

Free food stamp coupons issued to low income families in 44 Kentucky counties amounted to over \$500,000 during January, according to State Economic Security Commissioner C. Leslie

In Floyd county 1,107 families Lancer, membership chairman, representing 5,879 persons received \$87,958 worth of food stamps. Of this total, the recipients paid \$54,024 in each.

Coupons are made available by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in place of surplus commodity foods.

Low income families pay varyng amounts of cash based on the size of their household and income and receive bonus coupons on the basis of need. In the counties now participating in the program, recipients paid \$805,-323 to receive the \$1.36 million, Dawson' said.

The coupons are used as cash 4.64 in participating businesses and are exchanged for most all foods. Excluded are imported foods, alcoholic beverages, tobacco, and household supplies, such as soap, mops, brooms and toilet articles.

Food stamps are administered in Kentucky by the State Department of Economic Security through the public assistance

#### THE POOR SHOULD LOOK BEFORE TAKING THIS LEAP

Reports persist to the effect that an effort is being made in Eastern Kentucky to organize the socalled unemployed fathers and others into a union which could make its influence felt in Frankfort, Washington and wherever weight needs to be thrown around on behalf of the poverty-stricken.

The Times has no objection to organization of unions, as such, but it wonders about the motivation behind this reported move.

Back in the 1930's, when the poverty burden was eased for many thousands in this part of the country through WPA, meetings were held, rabble-rousing speeches made, memberships solicited and a union actually organized.

It was not until months later that many good, loyal mountain men learned that they had membership in a Communistic organization. That information was gained when the National Miners Union, one of which was formed in this section at the time, openly admitted that the organization was Communist-inspired and when New York Communists boasted that they had a membership of at least 5,000 in Eastern Kentucky.

This is not to say that the move to organize the poor in Eastern Kentucky now is Communistic. We do not know, and we are not among those who see a Red behind every fence-row. But the experience of the 1930's should cause our people to look around and behind whatever organization comes seeking their membership.

One wonders, too, why no effort was made by these people to organize the poor during those years when they were deep in poverty and receiving little or no help. Could it be that they were not solicited, back then, because they were so poor they had no money to contribute to the "cause"?

Why do they wait until now to argue, "Your government doesn't care," at a time when government is reaching deeper into the public treasury to meet the needs of the poor than at any time

These and other questions should be asked, and honest answers should be required and received, before Eastern Kentuckians commit themselves to rebels who may indeed have no bonafide cause.

Early in March, they begin the first leg of their long migration to the U.S. and Canada. Thy stop off in the southern states or Central America, or some of the tropical islands, and there they wait for the report of the scouts they send north. While the multiplied thousands of them are waiting, the scouts fly north to spy out the land, to see how weather conditions are, and how many boxes are available and to fly. The scouts then go back and report to the waiting flocks. If the reports are favorable, they begin the second leg of their ada to rear families.

Begin to listen for the scouts out as if to greet you. They sometimes fly down to inspect the boxes waiting for them.

Let's have good boxes ready for the purple martins. They are terials. among our best feathered friends. Each martin devours on the average 2,000 mosquitos each day. beetles that produce the obnoxious boll weevils and cloverleaf weevils. Each martin is worth its weight in gold as an insect

Sometimes the weather upsets the time table of the martins, as it did in the spring of 1966. Sometimes the report of the scouts do not pan out right and the martins are assailed by a spell of unseasonably cold weather. Last spring many of them froze or starved to death. A martin has to have flying insects to eat.



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

Dear Friend and Neighbor:

Kentucky Appalachian Industries, Inc. (better known as K.A.I. throughout this region) has just completed its first full year of operation. As this has been a Community project from the beginning, it is my pleasure to report to you the results of the past year's operations.

During the first year of operation K.A.I.

- Paid approximately \$300,000 in salaries and wages to persons in this area.
- Trained 180 people—who were paid an additional \$40,000 in wages by the Government during this period. An additional 126 persons received less extensive training enabling them to qualify for jobs with other companies in the area.
- \$19,000 was spent for materials, tools and equipment, much of it bought in this area.
- Invested \$67,000 in production machinery and equipment plus an additional \$190,000 for production material and supplies, all of which are now located in Prestonsburg.
- Paid nearly \$20,000 in Federal, State and Local taxes, or enough money to pay for the education of 67 Floyd county children for one entire year.
- Made possible the erection of a 20,000 square foot manufacturing plant in the area with an estimated value of \$200,000.
- Manufactured and delivered 174,777 articles of military equipment, nearly all of which went directly to the American soldiers in Vietnam.

K.A.I. has just accepted a contract for approximately \$1,500,000 to manufacture tents for the United States Army and it is anticipated that another addition will soon be added on to the present facility, the second one in a year, and new personnel will have to be trained to meet the growing demands.

We look forward to even greater growth and greater employment in 1967. We expect K.A.I. to be an increasing factor in promoting the prosperity and well being of your Community.


