KENTUCKY'S 3 GREAT SONS AND THEIR CIVIL WAR ROLES

This historical feature, written in three parts, is dedicated to Kentucky's 175th anniversary, and its purpose is to bring out some of the little-known details and influences of destiny that linked the lives of three of our state's greatest native sons; Abraham Lincoln, Jefferson Davis and Albert Sydney Johnston.

Johnston, who was already a brigadier-general when the Civil War broke out, was born at Washington, Mason county, Ky., in 1803, eight years before Abraham Lincoln was born on the waters of the Nolin River, near Hodgenville, Larue county, on the Sinking Spring Farm, Feb. 12, 1809. The Civil War brought a tragic end to the lives of both Lincoln and Johnston. Lincoln was shot by a half-demented actor at Ford's Theater, in Washington, April 14, 1865, and died the next morning. Albert Sydney Johnston, who was one of the most brilliant strategists of the Southern army, was leading a gallant charge against Gen. Grant's men at Shiloh when he was killed in 1862, at the age of 59.

On June 3, 1808, eight months before Lincoln was born, another baby had been born at Fairview, Christian county, who was destined to play a role in the Civil War opposite Lincoln.

as the President of the Southern Confederacy. In the very early years of the lives of these two men we can see a significant trend that seemed to foreshadow the opposing roles of both. When Jefferson Davis was about one year old, his parents took him and went south, where they settled in Wilkinson county, Miss. Lincoln's parents took their

eight-year-old son, Abe, and went north, where they settled in a crude frontier cabin in Indiana. Here we begin to see the trends of history that culminated in these two great men being on opposite sides in the Civil War. Davis was taken south and cast his lot with the cause of the Southern Confederacy; Lincoln was taken north and destiny shaped his life so that he became the preserver of the Union and with supreme courage he weathered the great storm of rebellion and brought the Ship of State safely through the storm.

Although Jefferson Davis was taken from his native state of Kentucky when he was a baby, he returned to the state to continue his education. He attended Transylvania College, Lexington, but was soon appointed to the U. S. Military Academy, West Point, at 16, and graduated there at 20. Johnston was also a graduate of West Point when 23 years of age. He got his first experience as a fighter in the Black Hawk Indian War and later helped Texas win her independence and served as Secretary of War of the new republic of Texas. At the outbreak of the Civil War, Johnston was made military commander of the Kentucky and Tennessee Department of the southern army and was fighting to defend this region against Grant's invasion when he was killed at Shiloh.

TROUT FISHING IN EAST KY. SET TO START THIS MONTH AS STREAMS BEING STOCKED

Trout fishing in Eastern Kentucky is assured this month.

An opportunity to fill the creel with rainbow trout begins with the week of March 13 when 10 streams in the Daniel Boone National Forest will be stocked. The stocking, to take place at regular intervals throughout the spring and summer, is a cooperative project of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the U. S. Forest Service. More than 33,000 trout, provided from federal hatcheries by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, will be released in the national forest streams.

According to Robert F. Collins, Winchester, Daniel Boone National Forest supervisor, the 1967 trout stocking program will be much larger than in previous years. Stocking will be carried out at scheduled intervals to insure good fishing for all who want to try national forest streams located in six Eastern Kentucky counties. "A firm stocking schedule has been set up," said Collins, "to allow fishermen, in and out of state, to plan their trips with greater assurance of finding well-stocked streams and good fishing."

Stocking schedule is as follows:

Rowan county — Craney Creek, monthly, March through May, first stocking the week of March 20; Wolfe county — Middle Fork of Red River, monthly, March through May, first stocking the week of March 20, and Swift Camp Creek, April through July, first stocking to be announced by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources; Jackson county — War Fork of Station Camp and Indian Creek, monthly, March through June, first stocking the week of March 20; McCreary county — Rock Creek and Beaver Creek, twice monthly, March through May, Rock Creek, monthly, June, July and September, first stocking the week of March 13.

BIG CITY MAGIC

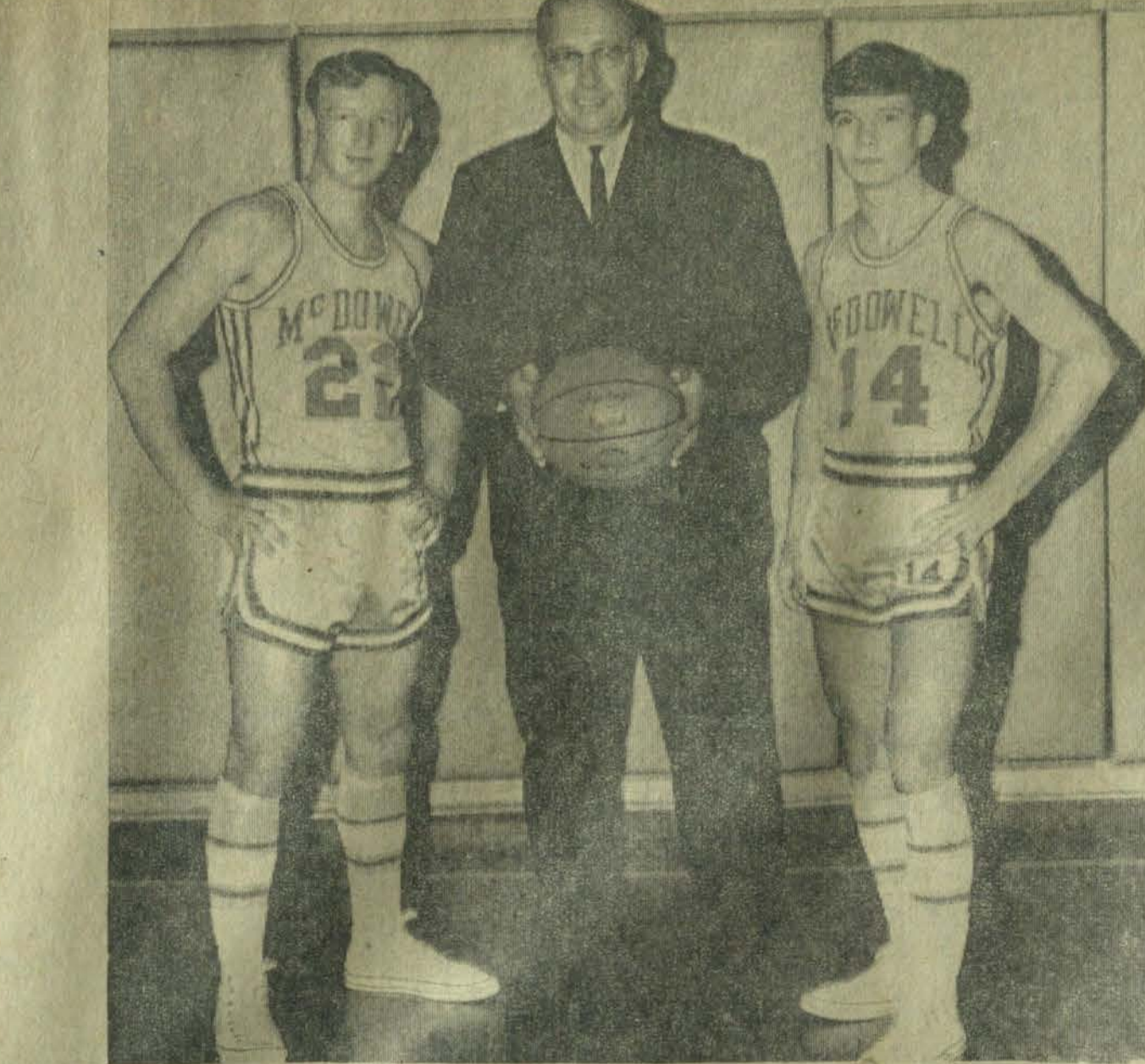

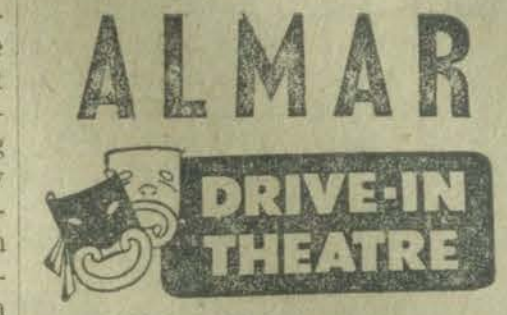

ID Numbers Absence Slows Claims Payment, Insurance Firm Says

Reports from Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, Lexington, the carrier which handles medicare doctor bills claims for the Floyd county area, indicate that payment of some claims is being slowed up because medicare identification numbers are not shown on the request of payment form.

Daryl E. Ratliff, social security district manager at Pikeville, said the problem of missing medicare numbers has been most frequent on claims submitted by beneficiaries.

"Even though the number may seem like a very simple item, it is very important to the medicare carrier," he said. "Without the medicare identification number, it is very difficult for the carrier to find out if you are actually signed up for doctor bill insurance or if you have met your \$50 deductible for the year."

When the number is not shown on the request for payment form, Ratliff said, Metropolitan Life Insurance Company must write to the social security district office of the beneficiary to get it. Naturally, time is lost and the payment is not made as quickly as it could be.

He advised beneficiaries to be sure that they copy the number from their red, white, and blue medicare card in the blank at the upper right-hand corner of the request for payment form before sending it to Metropolitan.

"There are a couple of important things for beneficiaries who pay their doctor bills and send in their own request for payment forms to remember," Mr. Ratliff said. "Be careful to fill in all blanks on the top half of the form and be sure either to have your doctor complete the bottom part of the form or enclose his itemized receipted bill."

Ratliff reminded beneficiaries that he was talking only about doctor bill claims where the "payment to the patient" method was used. Under the "assignment" or "payment" to the doctor method, the doctor sends the bill to the medicare carrier and bills the patient only for the part not covered by medicare.

"We are inviting Floyd county area beneficiaries who are making a doctor bill claim for the first time, to bring their request for payment forms into our office and let us check them," he said.

Beneficiaries who are unable to come to the office may send their forms with their telephone number to the social security office at Pikeville and they will be contacted if there are any problems.

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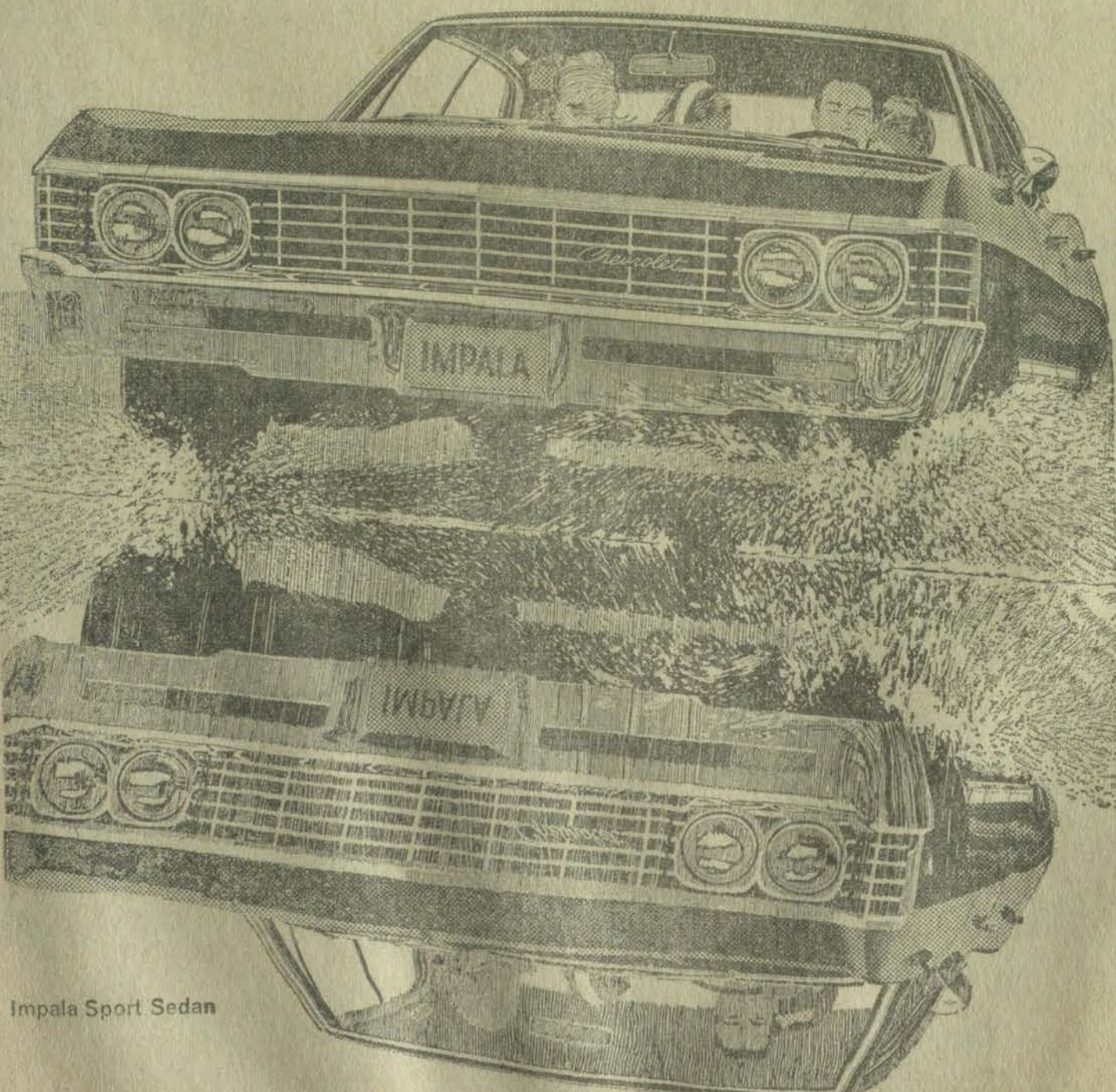
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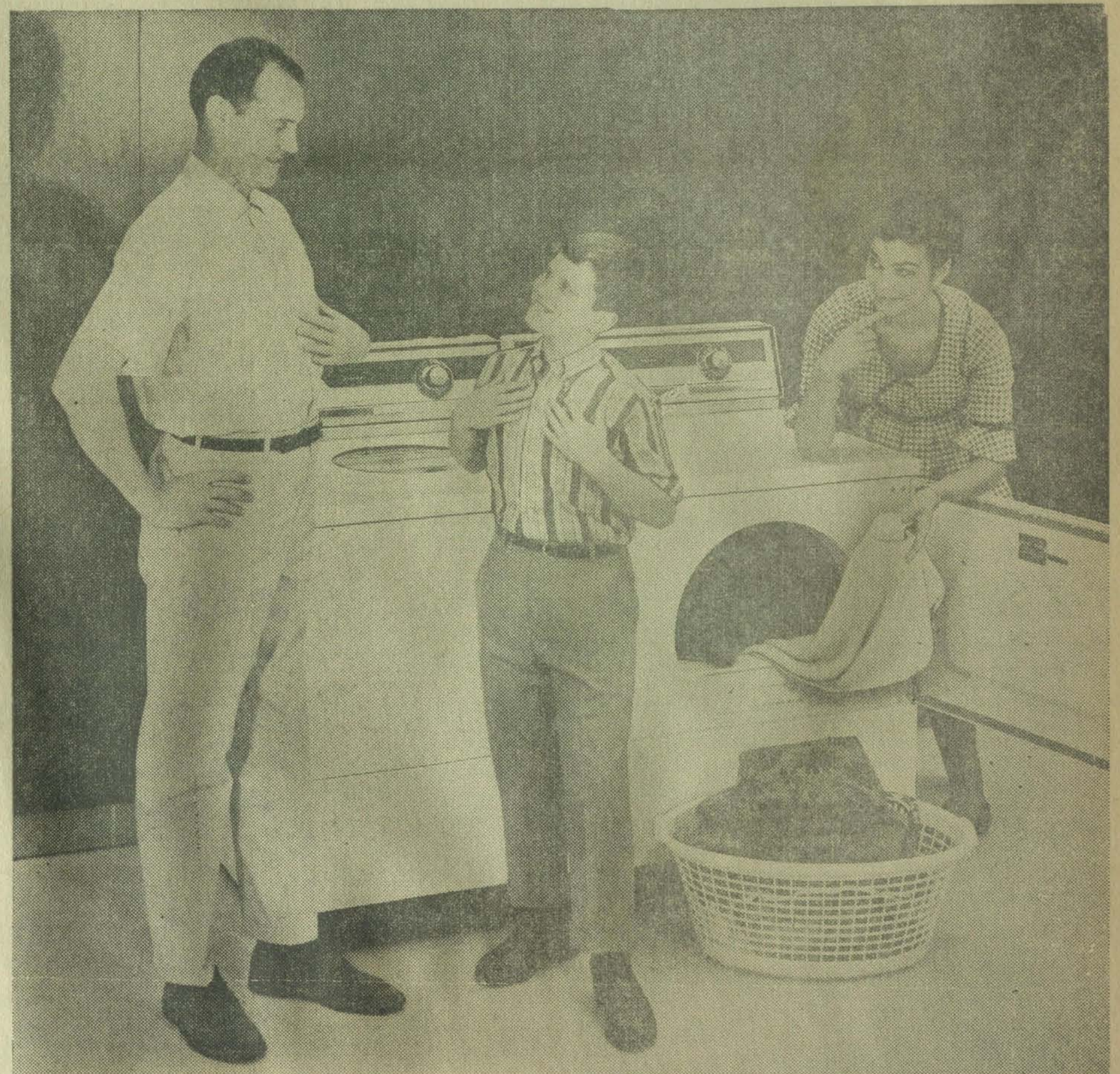
