"Dewey Lake has top priority, and in all probability will get these fish this year. If not, it will get an abundance next year," Clark told The Times.

The main uncertainty lies in the hybridization of the fish under hatchery conditions. Hybrids have been caught where crossbreeding has occurred under natural conditions.

Besides supplying a game fish of unusual size and fighting qualities, the stocking of the hybrid species would add what is expected to be an important cure to the control of the shad and rough fish population of the lake.
