STATE VOC ED STUDENTS MAY SEEK LOANS, MAY 1

Frankfort, Ky.—Kentucky students in vocational education will be able to apply for loans under the state's guaranteed student loan program about May 1.

Billy F. Hunt, secretary of the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority, suggests that students reach agreements with their local banks for loans now to save time when the program goes into effect.

He said vocational education students should have fewer difficulties obtaining a loan than college students have had because the loans generally will be smaller and for shorter periods. The process will be the same as for college students, Hunt said. The student first applies at his school for certification and then negotiates a loan directly with a local bank. Repayment of the loan is guaranteed by the student fund.

The Sandy Valley Water District, comprising the communities of Harold, Betsy Layne, Stanville, and vicinity, in Floyd county, Ky., having filed its supplemental petition in the Pike County Court requesting the court to enter its order to confirm, ratify and adopt all prior proceedings with respect to the annexation, extension and inclusion of the communities of Boldman, Green Meadows, Broad Bottom, Blair Town, Mossy Bottom, Coal Run, and vicinity, heretofore annexed by the orders of this court on September 9, 1963; and further, requesting the court to enter its order to correct any discrepancy with respect to the sufficiency of the proceedings heretofore taken, the notice of publication of said proceedings and the inclusion of Coal Run Village, a municipal corporation of the sixth class; and that said supplemental petition has asked the Pike County Court to confirm, ratify and adopt all of said proceedings, heretofore undertaken, and to approve the actions proposed to be taken by the Sandy Valley Water District. 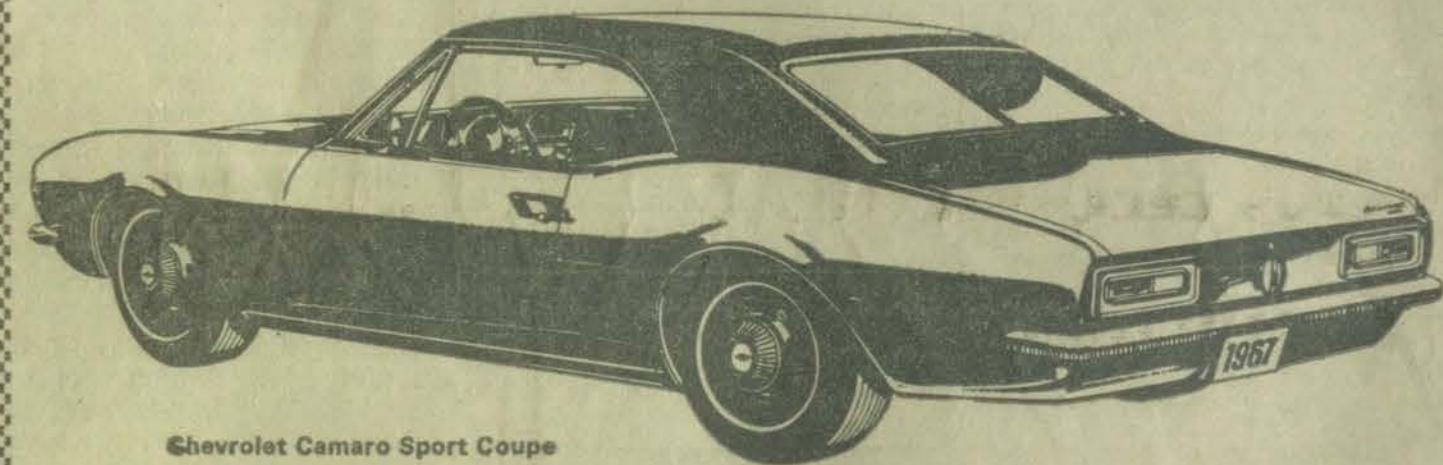

Prestonsburg Native Dies in Washington

William Herbert Flanery, 74, son of the late J. M. and Belle Langley Flanery, died Feb. 24 at a hospital in Washington, D. C., after a long illness of cancer.

He was born in Prestonsburg and resided here until he went to Washington where he was employed under an appointment from his uncle, John W. Langley, who was Congressman from this district at the time. He served in the U. S. armed forces in World War I and was a practicing attorney at the time of his death. He was a musician of rare ability.

Surviving are his wife, Agnes, a son, William E. Flanery, three grandsons and three granddaughters.

what the prudish old lady called Speckled Richard. This is right potent too.

OFFICE RULES

How are your working conditions? The following rules are said to have been posted in the place of business of one Zachary U. Geiger, "sole proprietor of the Mt. Cory Carriage & Wagon Works," and were dated April 5, 1872:

1. Office employee will daily sweep the floors, dust the furniture, shelves and show-cases.
2. Each day fill lamps, clean chimneys and trim wicks. Wash the windows once a week.
3. Each clerk will bring a bucket of water and a scuttle of coal for the day's business.
4. Make your pens carefully. You may whittle the nibs to your individual taste.
5. This office will open at 7 a.m. and close at 8 p.m. daily, except the Sabbath, on which it will remain closed. Each employee is expected to spend the Sabbath by attending Church and contributing liberally to the cause of the Lord.
6. Men employees will be given an evening off each week for courting purposes, or two evenings a week if they go regularly to Church.
7. After an employee has spent 13 hours of labor in the office, he should spend the time reading the Bible and other good books while contemplating the glories and building of the Kingdom.
8. Every employee should lay aside from each pay a goodly sum of his earnings for his benefit during his declining years, so that he will not become a burden upon the charity of his betters.
9. Any employee who smokes Spanish cigars, uses liquor in any form, gets shaved at a barber shop or frequents pool and public halls, will give me good reason to suspect his worth, intentions, integrity and honesty.
10. The employee who has performed his labors faithfully and without fault for a period of five years in my service, and who has been thrifty and attentive to his religious duties, and is looked upon by his fellowmen as a substantial and law abiding citizen, will be given an increase of five cents per day in pay, providing a just return in profits from the business permits it.

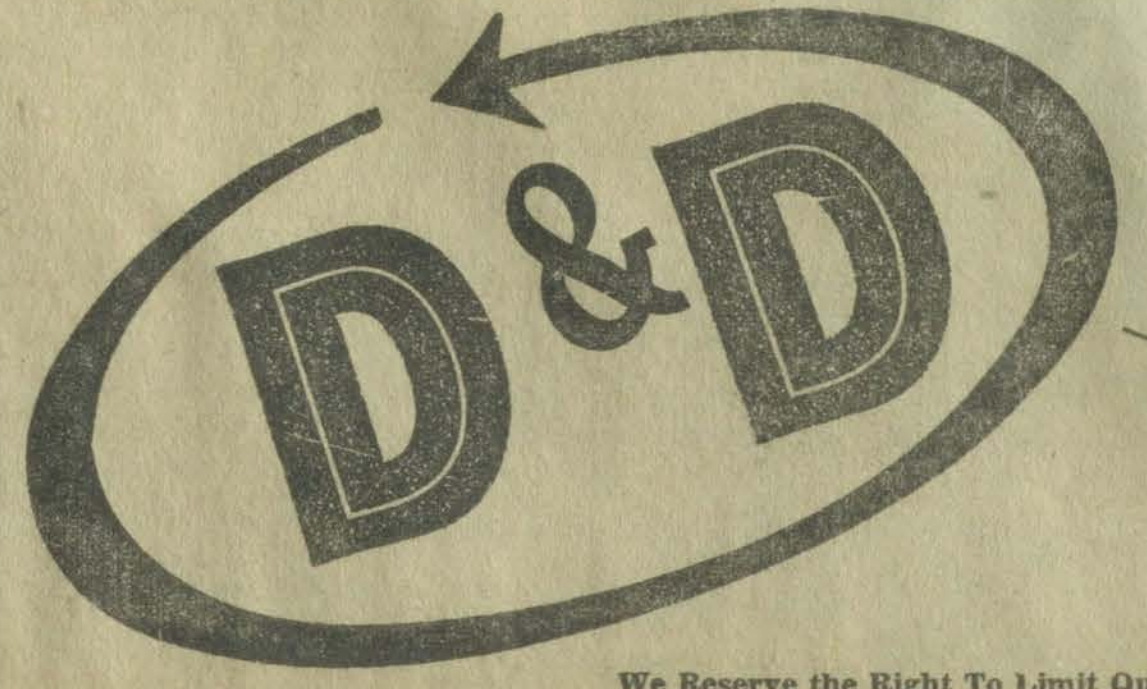

MISSIONARY COUPLE LEAVES TO RETURN TO AMAZON POST; HOPE TO REMAIN TEN YEARS



Irish-born Bill Barkley and his wife, the former Mary McGinnis, of this county, concluded a month's stay at home, Tuesday—and they hope to be gone 10 years before they're back again.

Not that Mr. and Mrs. Barkley aren't fond of home and Floyd county. But they are missionaries, and there is a claim upon them that is stronger than home and family ties.

They will leave the United States, May 1, to return to Amazonia, Brazil, a thousand miles up the Amazon River, where Mrs. Barkley has been for six years and where her husband has served since 1958. They were married there in March, 1964, and the visit here which ended this week was her first since she went to Brazil. They are returning to Amazonia to assume management of the Christian Home Bookstore at Manaus, the capital, a city of 200,000 population. It is the only such source of religious literature for Protestants in a radius of a thousand miles.

These two hope to be gone 10 years, because the need is so great where they go. Asked what constrained them to leave home and loved ones for a strange land and strange people, Mr. Barkley said, "We go because He has sent us. We go, first of all, because He is real in our experience."

While operating the bookstore the couple will continue their work as missionaries among the people of Amazonia.

Problems and discomforts aplenty are there, they admit. To begin with, there was the language—mainly Portuguese—which they learned, not in school but while at work on the mission field. There is the lack of roads—"the roads all run;" there is opposition, open on occasion, more often overt; insects; lack of sanitation, looking on penury and squalor and great physical and spiritual need; in one thousand-mile-long river valley there

is not a school or a doctor; all such fail to satisfy.

But their greatest disappointment? "It is seeing a person who, you thought, had had a real conversion experience revert to his old way of life."

Mr. and Mrs. Barkley do not report literally hundreds making decisions. The road is rough; gains are made slowly. But they insist they do not prize sensational gains too highly. "We want to see lives changed, and that is not represented by figures," they say. "Besides, when religion becomes popular, there's something wrong," Mr. Barkley adds.

The Roman Catholic religion is predominant in Amazonia, the Barkleys said. Among many natives, spiritism has a powerful hold.

When they first went to the Amazon country the two were under auspices of a religious organization. When they return they will serve as independents. "In that way we hope to serve all groups better through the bookstore," they explained.

Speaking of the lack of roads and primitive conditions in much of Amazonia, Barkley said most transportation is by air and water. "Even some of the people from the interior," he said, "have been in the air more than the people of Prestonsburg."

The Barkleys speak with deep affection of the people with whom they have lived and worked. They discourage any feeling that they are facing hardship.

"Some people," Mr. Barkley said, "speak of our service as sacrifice. I almost resent that word, 'sacrifice.' It's our privilege."

Mrs. Barkley's sister, Miss Sharon McGinnis, has been a missionary to the Indians of the Northwest Territory since December, 1960.

The missionary sisters are daughters of the Rev. and Mrs. Fred McGinnis, of Banner. Mr. Barkley's home address is 5141 Corner, Ballymena, North Ireland, c/o J. Barkley. Their field address is Caixa Postal 253, Manaus, Auazenas, Barzil, South America.

TIDBITS of KENTUCKY FOLKLORE

The Joneses, Mrs. Grundy, and the Rest

At the conclusion of the preceding article I suggested what the good provider was expected to do, to keep his own and his family's standing in an old-fashioned community. I am sure, if any young people read the article, they must have thought that I was talking only about some long-ago time when values were rather comic as viewed by modern people. I am not so sure that these youngsters would say this, however, for they must have looked around themselves and seen how hard it is to keep up with the procession. No age has a monopoly on gadgets and odd-dads and customs that place us in our strata, whether these strata are what we desire or not.

Wasn't it funny that a rubber-tired buggy brought so much social advancement? And isn't a buggy of any type somewhat funny? Well, maybe. What type of car do you drive, and do you ever apologize for it and yourself? And is your house equipped with only the latest gadgets that can be bought and installed? Did you ever hear of an icebox? Why, that was really something to brag about. And did you ever ride in a surrey? No car of any kind can ever, in this day, bring so much solid satisfaction as did a surrey. It lifted you miles above the fellow who rode in a wagon and a good many yards above the fellow in a mere buggy, unless the driver were a young chap and his companion the best-looking girl of the neighborhood. But the old family buggy looked shabby beside the surrey, and the riders in the surrey knew it, even if they were on their way to church, where the sermon might have for a text something about coveting anything that is thy neighbor's.

But what it would cost to have the same sort of social standing now that a frame house with a porch and everything painted white used to bring I would be afraid to guess. Accustomed to log houses or boxed houses, most of the Fidelity people had never attained to a frame house when I left home 60 years ago. Probably half of the people's houses in my father's practice area as a country doctor were of logs as recently as 1900, and I could have counted on my hands the frame houses that I knew. Many people lived in boxed houses that had been weatherboarded and framed, but the genuine frame house was pretty rare. Across our larger creek stood, and still stands, the first—and only—brick house in our part of the county. It must have looked like something out of ancient Greece or Rome to the people who helped build it, away back in the eighteen-hundreds. Even

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CLAY AND TAYLOR, GREAT ADOPTED SONS OF KENTUCKY

A History Series in Three Parts By RUFUS M. REED

Part 1

"Lives of great men all remind us We can make our lives sublime, And departing leave behind us Footprints on the sands of time." —Longfellow.

It is well for us in this the 175th year of our state's anniversary to pause and think of the great contribution to our state and the nation men like Henry Clay and Zachary Taylor made. In this brief series I shall depict these two men as real, living personalities instead of figures on the dry pages of history.

Although their personalities were quite different, Clay and Taylor had many things in common. Each was a genius in his line—Taylor was a brilliant military genius who gave 40 years of his country; Henry Clay was of his life to the armed services a legal genius and had greatness in so many other lines he might be correctly termed one of the greatest all-around geniuses of American history.

Both Taylor and Clay were born in Virginia and both came to Kentucky at an early age to make their homes. Clay was born in Hanover county, Virginia, in 1777, and was seven years older than Taylor, who was born in Orange county, Virginia, Nov. 24, 1784. When Taylor was a baby of less than one year old, his parents brought him to a settlement near the present city of Louisville, where he spent the early years of his life.

Neither of these men had any public schooling, as schools were few and far between in those days. Taylor was taught at home by a private tutor for a short time, and Clay studied law in his spare time, while working to help support his widowed mother. His father died when he was four years old, and when he was in his early teens he had to work in a retail store at Richmond, Va., to help support the family.

Taylor no doubt inherited some of his military genius from his father, Richard Taylor, who was an officer in the Revolutionary War. Clay, who was one of the greatest orators of American history, no doubt inherited some of his oratorical powers from his father, who was a Baptist preacher. Clay had the power to hold an audience spellbound; he had a most engaging personality and a pleasing, musical voice that captivated the hearts and ears of his listeners. He is ranked next to Daniel Webster as one of our nation's greatest orators.

Kentucky, the adopted state of both these men, was good to them. The remains of both of these great leaders rest today in the hallowed soil of the state they both loved. Clay's remains lie in a tomb at Lexington, his home town, and there is a beautiful monument at his tomb and a placard by it, which says: "I know no North, no South, no East, no West." Clay's great work as a statesman was like Lincoln's in later years: He sought at all times to try to preserve the Union from disruption.

The remains of General Taylor lie at rest in the Taylor Family cemetery at Louisville. He was honored in World War I by having one of the great military camps named after him—Camp Taylor at Louisville.

Clay and Taylor were both members of the National Republican Party, popularly known as "The Whigs." Henry Clay once rejected him as their candidate from Taylor, when the Whigs had to bite the dust of defeat and nominated Taylor in 1843. Taylor's great popularity as a general overshadowed Clay's great ability as a statesman.

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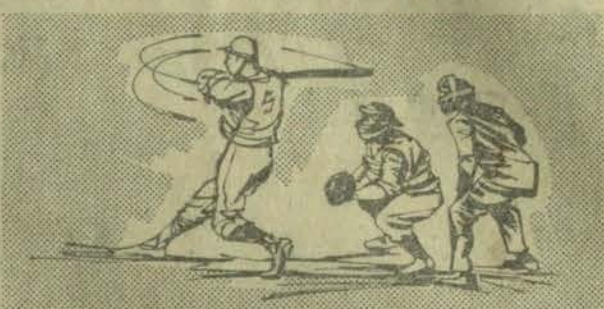
