Alice Lloyd College Shares in U.S. Grants

New federal grants and loans totaling more than \$2.7 million have been made to six Kentucky colleges and universities to help build or remodel classrooms, laboratories and libraries, the U. S. Office of Education announced.
Nationwide, the grants and loans total more than \$81 million. They will support construction projects costing about \$369 million.

Grants went to the following Kentucky institutions in the amounts and for the purposes indicated:

Alice Lloyd College, Pippa Passes, \$116,166, science; Catherine Spalding College, Louisville, \$42,563, library; Transylvania College, Lexington, \$450,673, science; University of Kentucky, Lexington, \$165,063, instructional and faculty office; and Villa Madonna College, Covington, \$419,053, library and instructional.

A loan of \$1,125,000 went to Georgetown College, Georgetown, for science facilities.

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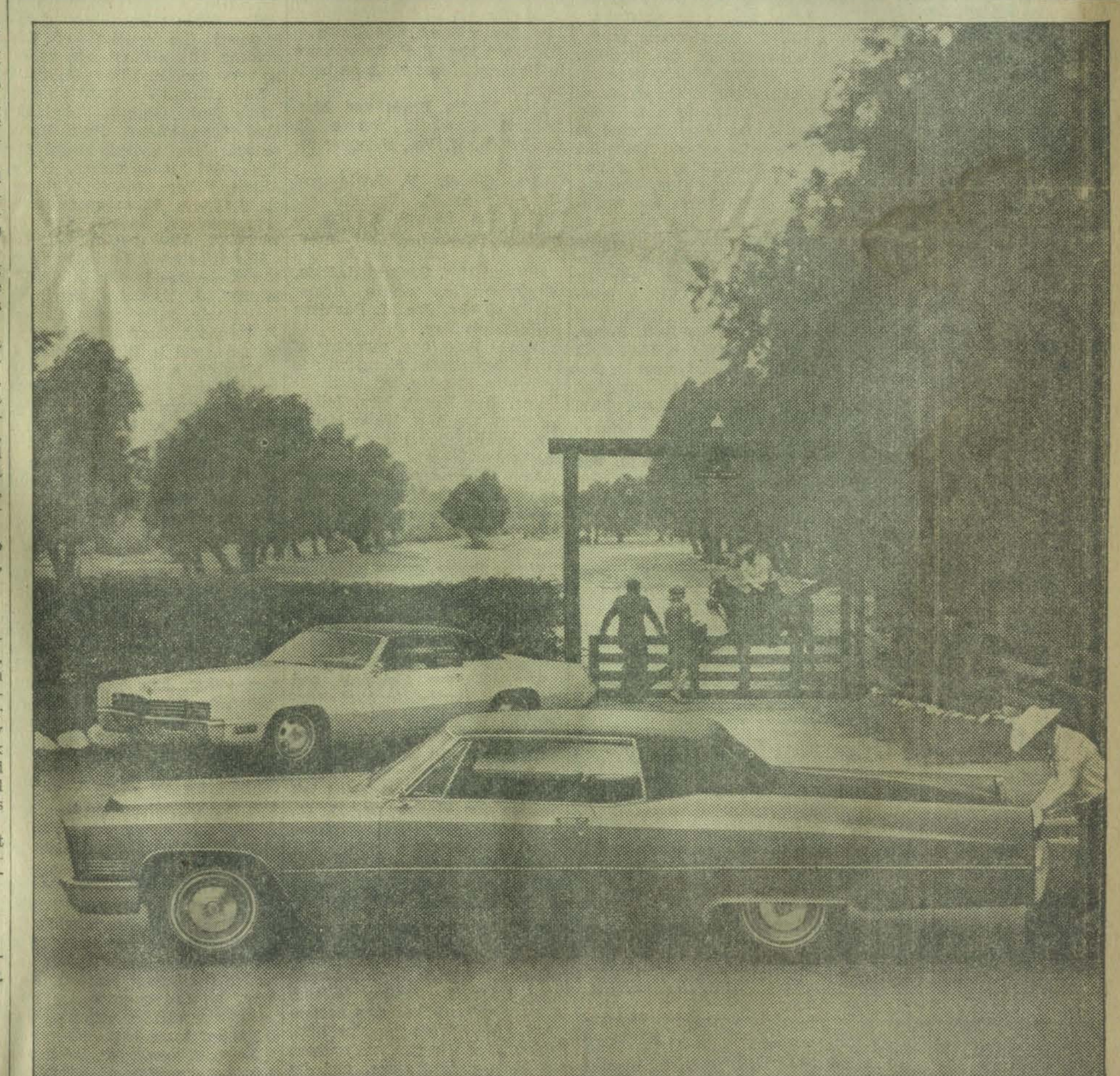

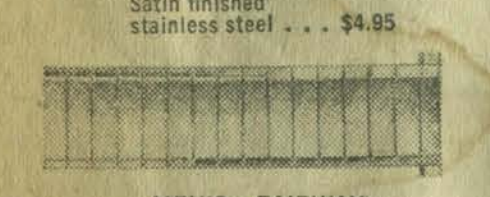

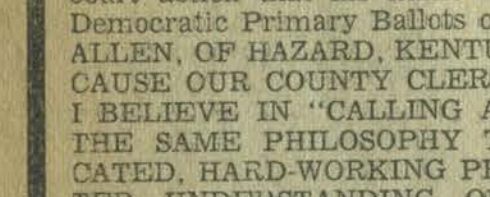

P'burg Native Becomes Assistant to Bullard, Effective on May 1



Quentin D. Allen, native of Prestonsburg, has been named assistant to the president of the Kentucky Coal Association, a Lexington-based organization. He began his new duties on May 1.

In announcing the appointment, KCA president Fred B. Bullard noted that Allen "comes to the association with a background of twelve years in newspapers, magazines and public relations work." Initially, Allen's principal responsibilities will involve planning and implementing an expanded public relations program for the Kentucky coal industry, Bullard said.

Following graduation from the University of Kentucky in 1955, Allen worked for several newspapers, including The Floyd County Times, the Lexington Leader and the Sarasota Herald-Tribune (Florida), and did public relations work with the Travel Division of the Department of Public Information, Frankfurt.

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Appalachia's Future Bright, Hayes Predicts At Pippa Passes Meet

Pippa Passes, Ky. — Approximately 125 members of the Council of the Southern Mountains heard Alice Lloyd College President William S. Hayes predict a bright future for Appalachia.

Hayes said that in 20 years many of the problems of the area will have been overcome. "But does Appalachia really want to catch up with the progress of urban America?" he asked. "Perhaps the congestions of the city is not the ideal to which we should strive. Perhaps the development of attractive, small towns, reminiscent of America a few years ago, should be our goal. In such an environment there is a lack of tension, a quiet taste, a friendliness that may attract people and businesses tired of urban congestion."

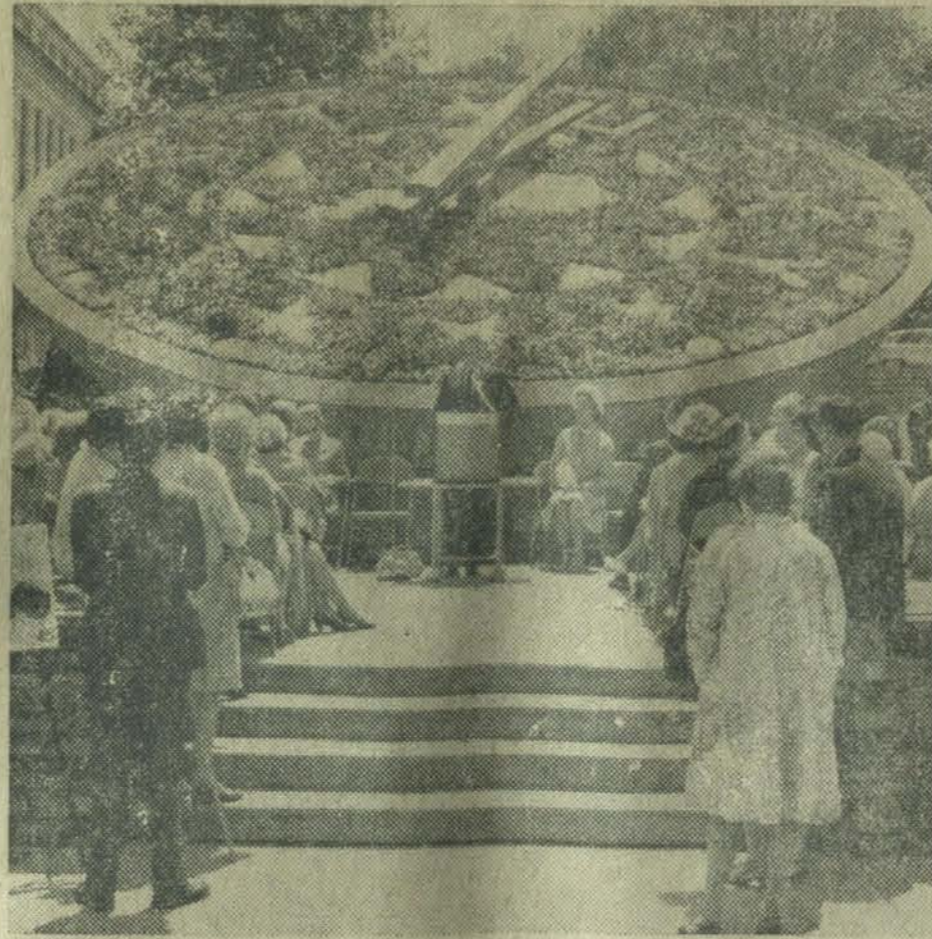

Mrs. J. Vimont Layson, president of the Garden Club of Ken-

tucky, Inc., presided at the ceremony sponsored by the club. The club also sponsors the upkeep of the clock and distributes the funds taken from the pool.

Former Gov. Bert T. Combs, during whose administration the clock was built, spoke of his appreciation to the garden club for its efforts in sponsoring the clock and to the many visitors for having turned the pool into a profit for Kentucky's children.

The clock, built in 1961, is one of Kentucky's major tourist attractions. Attesting to this is the fact that most any hour of the day or night visitors may be seen walking around the clock.

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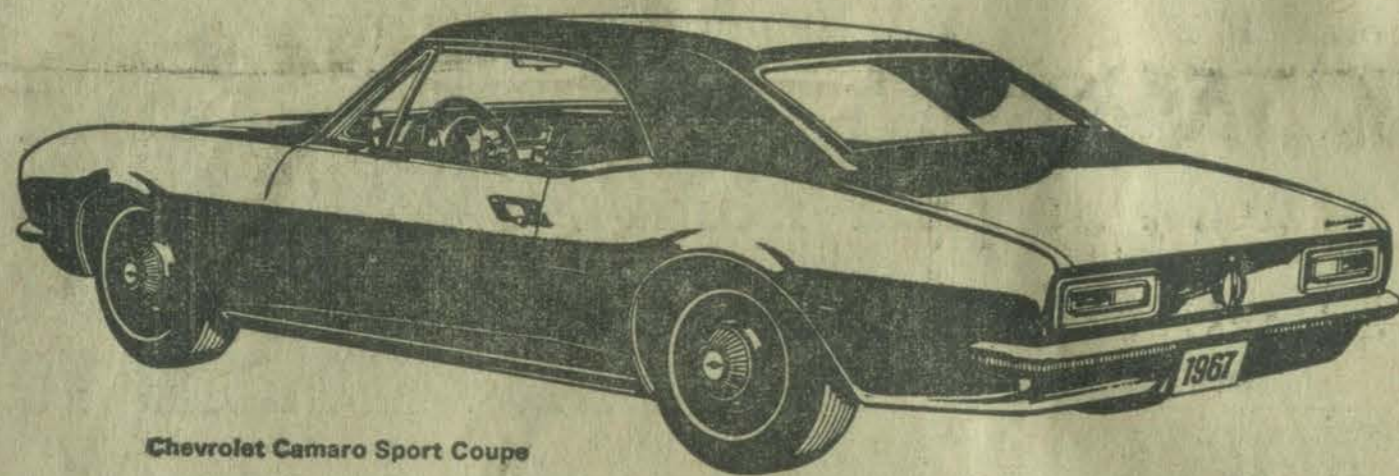

WAR is DECLARED

The taxpayers of Floyd county and the State of Kentucky have declared political war upon the Breathitt administration and the 100, 200, 300, and 400 percenters and upon those politicians supporting the candidacy of Henry Ward, the administration candidate. Percentage-wise, many of the tax bills exceed 400 percent over the last few years.

The day of the Kingmakers has gone and passed forever. About 2,000 years ago Christ was betrayed and crucified, nailed to a cross with a crown of thorns upon his head, and left there to linger, suffer and die for the sins of the world but He has arisen, and He is now among us watching over us each day. In a sense, the taxpayers have been crucified by higher and higher taxes, and if we don't wake up, the next effort will be to nail the taxpayers to a cross with a crown of thorns upon their heads and left there to do the best they can.

The taxpaying public is now aroused as never before, and on May 23, 1967, they will be able to go forth in great numbers and do something about these deplorable conditions now existing. The people only have an opportunity every four years to rid themselves of some of the sins that have been heaped upon them. You will soon have an opportunity, if you desire to right some of the wrongs to which you have been subjected, and if you are not willing to do so, keep on voting as you have in the past, and when the time comes around to pay your taxes do not complain, just grin and bear it, you had it coming to you.

If the politicians and job holders, including state employees, had your welfare at heart as much after the election as they do before, it would be a great day, but the chances are you will not see them until the next four years, at which time they will reappear, seeking your help in the next campaign in order that they may retain their positions or jobs, but you who do the helping get nothing in return.

The public in general should support the candidacy of Thelma Stovall for State Treasurer, since she is the only state official, who at her own expense, toured the state fighting and making speeches against the proposed constitution amendment which would have brought havoc upon the general public; however, the amendment was defeated by approximately 400,000.

Within the last few years, salaries of state officials have been increased from \$5,000.00 to \$20,000.00 or more, and your county officials from \$5,000.00 to \$14,900.00. A few from Floyd county within the last few years have received from the state treasury around \$100,000.00 each.

You can readily see from the above figures there is little or no hope of reduction of your taxes unless you take matters into your own hands and go to the polls and vote to eliminate as many of these evils as possible, which have already existed far too long. It is high time that the taxpayers take matters into their own hands in an effort to eliminate all the useless jobs and expenses in order to bring about at least some relief. The taxpayer has been gouged and bored to such an extent, he hardly knows which way to turn for relief. He can't even get a good night's sleep, not knowing what will take place next.

Many of the taxpayers are coal miners who go under the hills, slave and labor and eke out an honest living, not knowing whether they can support their families and pay their taxes. Other people in other occupations work diligently at their jobs in order to meet their bills and pay their taxes, but the worst matter of all is to have their tax money gobbled up and paid out to useless employees who do little or nothing. As the days go by, more state employees are being added to the state payroll, which, of course, is being done for the purpose to influence a few more votes for the candidacy of Henry Ward.

It is a well known fact that most state employees, if not all of them, are directly or indirectly called upon to make liberal donations to such campaigns as is now being conducted in the State of Kentucky.

Just recently a count was made of the number of tax bills and the number of people upon whose property had been levied and advertised for sale in The Floyd County Times, the number being more than 2,000, and the total amount sought to be collected was \$60,256.73, to which, when redeemed, is added 6% penalty, costs of advertising and 12% interest per annum until date of payment. After the sale of the properties for delinquent taxpayers, a lien is created upon whatever property is sold and is made a record of in the office of the County Clerk, and as the various properties are redeemed and paid to the County Clerk, the clerk issues a check of 20% of same in payment to the County Attorney as a commission.

Now, for instance, consider that you take the state as a whole, based upon Floyd county, you would have more than 240,000 people and around \$8,000,000 in past due taxes. This number of taxpayers levied upon is sufficient to defeat any candidate. As a result of these sales, many people will lose their homes or whatever property is sold. After a certain period of time the county attorneys of the various counties may institute a suit in Circuit Court against these delinquent taxpayers and take title thereto to the county and state and move the owner out.

If and when the taxpayers ever assert their rights, then and only then, they will be recognized and our public officials will heed the warning of the ballot, and something will be done about it and relief will be forthcoming.

People have already heard that many people are being called over the phone and otherwise and advised just how they got their job, and to get on the ball for Ward. That means if you don't, you will be discharged. More coercion is brought upon you. It seems this country is not free to act anymore, except by only a few politicians.

It is also rumored throughout the county if the Wet and Dry issue is decided in favor of the Wets, certain people may get a license to sell liquor or beer or both, provided their actions prove satisfactory in the coming Primary. But everybody knows there is a limit to the number of retailers in a county, and no doubt more promises have been made than will be allowed. Some are going to be misled and fooled since all the promises cannot and will not be filled.

The people get an opportunity every four years for a change in the administration for Governor, and on May 23rd that day will arrive. Then it will be your opportunity to act and vote in your own defense, and for your own preservation. The voters have it in their power to shake and jar the State Capitol at Frankfort, until they will think MT. VESUVIUS has erupted thereunder. These 100 percenters and more will awaken to their greatest calamity in their political history. Talk about action, you will get it then.

Some people say a change will not be any better, but the question is—Could it be any worse? It is very doubtful beyond any question that it could be any worse, or more deceitful. Take a look around and you will find scads of employees receiving salaries out of all reason, and more are now being added each day, just before the Primary as usual. The Kentucky Department of Health estimates that 140,000 children in the state have not been immunized against measles.

Dr. Russell E. Teague, state health commissioner, warned that child-aid projects such as Head Start could be delayed by an outbreak of the disease. Teague estimated that about 100,000 Kentucky youngsters are now immune.

"About 40,000 inoculations were given last year and a similar number this year," he said.

Teague pointed out that if two-thirds of Kentucky's children could get the shots, the combination of artificial immunity with the natural immunity of many children could achieve success in wiping out measles.

MISS GIFFORD APPRAISES WORLD LEADERS, ADMITS ONLY DeGAULLE DISLIKED

Miss Chloe Gifford, one of America's most famous clubwomen is a lady who likes people but she frankly admits that there is one world leader she can very well do without.

Guess who?—De Gaulle. Speaking at May Lodge, Jenny Wiley State Park, at a meeting of the Prestonsburg Woman's Club last Thursday evening, Miss Gifford candidly discussed national and international personalities whom she has met as head of the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

Of all the world leaders she has met, she frankly admitted, De Gaulle was the only one she didn't like. "Most conceited ass I've ever met in my life," she stated. "De Gaulle talked constantly about DeGaulle."

Miss Gifford feels that a part of his Anglo-American animosity arises from the time when Winston Churchill and President Roosevelt virtually ignored him.

Madame Chiang, she told the clubwomen, "is the only woman I've ever known who can hold men in the palm of her hand." Recalling a conversation with the late Eleanor Roosevelt, who she termed "a complete realist," Miss Gifford said she asked Mrs. Roosevelt how Mme. Chiang contrived to convince hard-headed business and government leaders of the imminent revolution on the Chinese mainland. Mrs. Roosevelt's reply: "Why, don't you remember what she did to FDR?"

Miss Gifford's frank appraisal of personalities continued: Adenauer: He reiterated his wish that Berlin be reunited "but not at the expense of relations with the United States."

Willy Brandt: "Reunite Berlin, and to hell with the U. S."

Khrushchev: "With all his crudeness, he had more sense than to start World War III."

Castro: "Completely unfitted to head a government. The Bay of Pigs saved him. He was on his way out till then."

Vietnam, she said, began with the Eisenhower administration. "Kennedy inherited the situation... now, Johnson has it."

On Presidential hopefuls (she explained the Democratic nominee already is decided and so did not comment on him).

Romney: "Is he running too soon? He is a fine man, intelligent, kind. Stand on international affairs not well-defined."

Rockefeller: "I like him very much, but too many women would never vote for him because of 'Happy'."

Reagan: "I think that would be a disaster."

Nixon: "A has-been, a dark

horse. An opportunist but has more real knowledge of world affairs than any of the others. A worker, and he's eager."

Miss Gifford described the Queen of England as lovely, gracious, but added that Phillip is the main show there. "Britain," she said, "held the fort for us; now, we must stay close and help them."

Miss Gifford, now director of special services at the University of Kentucky, came here to install officers of the Prestonsburg Woman's Club. She headed the World Conference of Women's Clubs in Manila, in 1960, and is a national director of the Heart Association.

COMMISSION MEMBER OPPOSES ANOTHER AGENCY

Frankfort, Ky.—J. David Francis, Bowling Green, member of the Kentucky Public Service Commission, will testify before the U. S. Senate Committee on Commerce in Washington May 25 against a senate bill which would authorize the U. S. Department of Transportation to prescribe safety regulations for pipeline transportation of natural gas. Francis says 44 states have adopted pipeline safety codes and he believes creation of another federal agency to handle the matter is unnecessary.

THE TRAGIC END OF MOBY JOE

Moby Joe died the other day. She was cruelly slain by a pack of men with high-powered Winchester who swooped down on her in boats and pumped her huge body full of lead.

Who was Moby Joe? She was a gigantic, fin-back whale weighing eighty tons. She got stuck in a pool and couldn't get out to swim back to her home in the sea. She had been misnamed; she should have been called, Moby Josephine. She was a female, and she was pregnant. If she had not been shot full of lead, she might have got back home in the sea, and this season she would have given birth to a baby whale twenty-five feet long and weighing about seven or eight tons. The men who used her for a rifle target perhaps didn't know she was due to become a mother soon. Maybe they wouldn't have cared, anyway.

The big whale had followed high tide too far inland and before she could turn back to the sea, the tide went down and she was stranded. A few kindly men got interested in her dire predicament and began to try to save her life. She had great value commercially and her worth on the market after processing into many kinds of products was about \$30,000.

One man, a Mr. Mowat, a friend of wild life and a noted naturalist, took steps to try to save the whale. But he acted too slowly. Before he could cut through the government red tape and get the \$1,000 they appropriated to help succor the whale, several boatloads of men moved down on her with their rifles and began to shoot her for sport. The whale couldn't escape their fusillade of bullets; she couldn't cry out for mercy, and her killers showed no mercy. Although the suffering whale couldn't protest to her killers, she did a silent message by radar to her mate, whom we'll call Moby Jack. Moby Jack got her message and knew she was in bad trouble. He swam as near as he could to where she lay writhing in agony. But he couldn't reach her; he swam back and forth in the ocean, near the pool where she was a prisoner. He couldn't go to her over the dry land, so he just swam back and forth, back and forth, and if a whale can pray, I'm sure Moby Jack must have prayed for his mate.

But the men with the guns had shot her full of lead — enough lead to make a statue if it were all melted and put together.

At length Mr. Mowat got his money and also orders from the government to stand guard over the whale and try to save her. He also got a lot of money through the mails, sent to him by persons who had a feeling of pity for the trapped whale. But it was too late now. The men who had gotten their brutal sport out of shooting a defenseless creature, got in their boats and rowed away. Mr. Mowat was much too late. The whale's unborn baby was dead from the bullets, and the mother was slowly dying. Mr. Mowat saw the many bullet holes in her sides, — there were over 800 — and he saw (See Story No. 1, Page 5)

Moby Joe was a species of fin-back whale belonging to the family called, Rorquals. Her color was slate-gray above and white below. She was 80 feet long and had 100 pleats on her throat. She was a rapid swimmer when in the sea and her food consisted of krill, small shrimp, tiny fishes, protozoa and plankton. Instead of teeth, her mouth had a large sieve or strainer, made of whalebone with fringes; she gulped in tons of sea water and strained out her food. Her big tongue weighed as much as an average-size elephant! She could stay under water for nearly an hour as she hunted for food, and when she had to come up at last for air, she spouted out a great hissing geyser through her nostrils, which shot twenty feet into the air. It was like an old-time engine blowing off steam, and old sailors seeing a sight like that shouted excitedly: "Thar she blows!"

About 15,000 of these big fin-back whales are killed each year to satisfy industry's demands for their products, such as perfumes made from the ambergris in their intestines and various types of oils from the blubber. These big Rorquals mostly stay in cold waters of the ocean as they have a large layer of blubber all around their bodies to act as insulation against cold sea water. Their bodies are hairless, streamlined and smooth and their tails have flukes and are flattened sidewise, instead of vertically.

Each whale mother brings a single young and suckles it for six months. The giant Rorquals include the great blue whales, the largest mammals ever known in this or any other age of the earth.

Three from County Receive Certificates After 6-Week Course

A special awards program was held in the District Highway Office at Pikeville last Friday.

Twenty-three highway employees received certificates of achievement for having completed a six-week training program in highway construction inspection. This class and others are being conducted by the Department of Highways in order to train additional personnel which will be needed, beginning next year, to supervise and inspect the 200 miles of road to be constructed in District 12 under the Appalachian Program.

District Engineer Wendell Bayes pointed out to the group the need for constant training and advancement on the part of each employee in order that he be qualified for the responsibilities that lie ahead.

\$72.8 MILLION IS SOUGHT FOR WATERWAY PROJECTS

Kentucky members of Congress and supporters of waterway projects sought approval last week of appropriations totaling \$72.8 million.

The delegation appeared before a House appropriations subcommittee and backed President Johnson's budget request for \$67,476,000 for state projects for the year beginning July 1.

This includes \$627,000 for construction of recreation projects at Army Corps of Engineers' projects now in operation. The Kentuckians, headed by Rep. William H. Natcher, a Democrat and member of the Appropriations Committee, also asked more than \$5 million additional for other projects.

In a statement read by Col. James E. Thetford, water director for the state Natural Resources Department, Gov. Edward T. Breathitt asked for reinstatement of \$3 million for five projects cut from the President's proposed public works budget. A similar appeal will be made today to the Senate subcommittee.

Breathitt asked these things for fiscal 1968:

1. \$100,000 for advanced engineering and design of Taylorsville Reservoir on the Salt River in Central Kentucky.
2. \$490,000 to begin building the Booneville Reservoir Dam on the South Fork of the Kentucky River in Owsley county.
3. \$150,000 to resume advanced engineering and design for Falmouth Reservoir on the Licking River.
4. \$500,000 to begin construction of Eagle Creek Reservoir in Grant county.

\$100,000 to begin construction planning of the Southwest Jefferson county flood-control levee, which is designed to eliminate flooding in a 41-square-mile area southwest of Louisville.

He said the Kentucky Water project is No. 1 in priority.

Breathitt said the Falmouth Resources Authority has told the Army engineers it plans to buy the maximum available water in the Falmouth Reservoir for the future water supply of metropolitan Northern Kentucky.

Construction money was asked for these projects as budgeted:

- Newburgh Locks and Dam, \$12 million;
- Red River Reservoir, \$33,000;
- Cannelton Locks and Dam, \$10.6 million;
- Carr Fork Reservoir, \$5.8 million;
- Cave Run Reservoir, \$4.6 million;
- Fishtrap Reservoir, \$8.5 million;
- Frankfort Floodwall, \$920,000;
- Green River Reservoir, \$6.6 million;
- Laurel River Reservoir, \$1.3 million;
- Sturgis Floodwall, \$700,000;
- Uniontown Locks and Dam, \$12.5 million.

Approval also was asked for engineering and designing funds for these projects:

- Yatesville Reservoir, \$200,000;
- Keokee Reservoir, \$100,000;
- Martins Fork Reservoir, \$230,000;
- Paintsville Reservoir, \$200,000.

For general investigation, the delegation asked:

- Kentucky peninsula revetment, \$100,000;
- Pond River basin, \$15,000;
- Appalachian region water resource survey, \$2 million;
- Creek and tributaries, \$18,000;
- Clarks River, \$21,000;
- Highland and Martin, \$65,000.

Money requested for recreation facilities included:

- Markland Locks and Dam, \$80,000;
- McAlpine Locks and Dam, \$24,000;
- Buckhorn Reservoir, \$70,000;
- Wolf Creek Reservoir, \$30,000;
- Barren River Reservoir, \$183,000;
- Nolin River Reservoir, \$120,000;
- Rough River Reservoir, \$70,000.

Natcher said three projects are ready for construction. He said the delegation recommended appropriations of \$490,000 for Booneville Reservoir; \$1.3 million for Smithland Locks and Dam and \$2.3 million for Mound City Locks and Dam.

Natcher also asked \$100,000 for engineering and design work on the Taylorsville Reservoir on Salt River; \$440,000 for construction of the Panther Creek Flood Control project; and \$175,000 for engineering and design of the Falmouth Reservoir.
