Twenty-seven projects in the area were planned last year. The number has dropped to eight this year. These 35 farmers have signed contracts and the money has been obligated. One discouraging factor was the cut-back in funds directed by President Johnson. Another — which has at least been partially corrected — was the original ruling that no landowner having an income of more than \$3,000 a year is eligible to participate in the program. Now, however, that has been changed to a \$5,000-a-year income, and some cases of farmers with an even greater income will be submitted to the state Soil Conservation office for consideration.

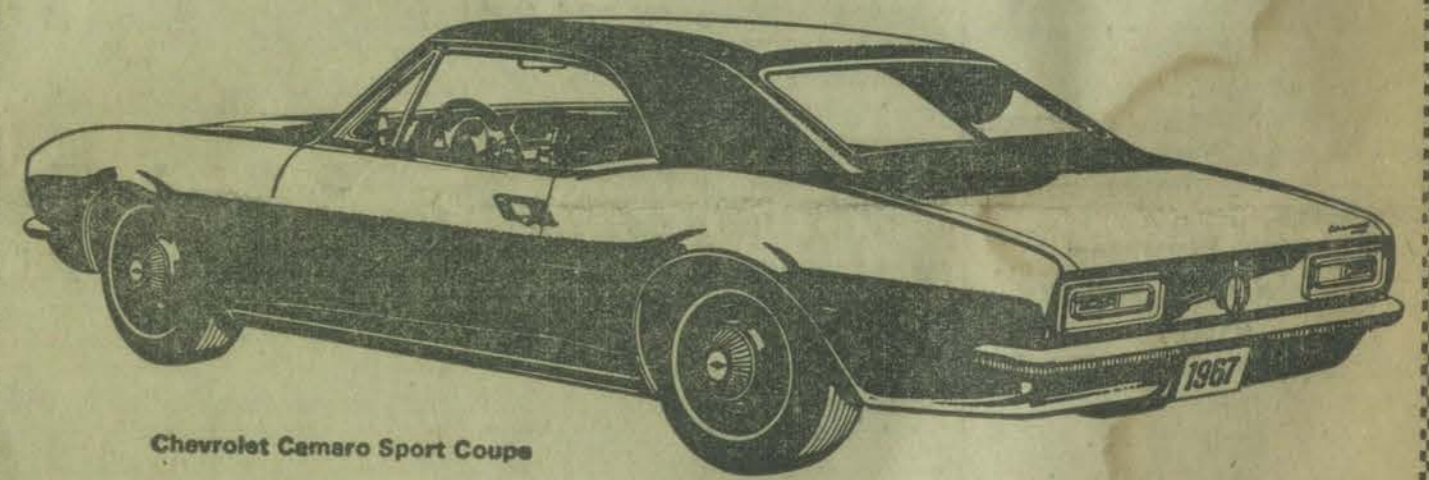

W. E. Elliott, board chairman of the hospital, said the hospital expects to have at least one full-time psychiatrist added to its staff. Elliott said the beds will serve patients from Floyd, Martin, Pike and Letcher counties.

Four to six beds for the mentally ill will be added under the grant at Prestonsburg General hospital, Paintsville hospital and the Appalachian Regional hospital at Williamson, W. Va.

The three Kentucky hospitals will also add emergency services and out-patient services for psychiatric patients.

The federal agency said that mobile teams, including non-professional local people, will provide out-patient service to the surrounding mountain area. The central coordinating office for the mobile teams will be in Prestonsburg, where a center will offer information, screening and referral services.

The grant will also provide educational programs on mental health to local schools and to area residents, as well as personal consultations on child training, marital relationships and other areas which affect mental health.

EDA Funds To Help Resort Development At Buckhorn

Approval of a \$774,400 grant to help complete a vacation resort complex at Lake Buckhorn State Park in Perry county was announced last week by the Economic Development Administration, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The Kentucky Department of Parks, applicant for the EDA assistance, will invest \$193,600 to meet the \$968,000 total cost of the project.

The Department of Parks said that in addition to creating jobs at the park, the project will increase tourist spending in the Eastern Kentucky area and thereby spur economic development.

The project includes construction of a service building, a swimming pool, an incinerator, employee housing, boat dock slips, vacation cottages, a par-three golf course, a chair lift, lodge additions, stables and bride trails and a fishing pier. In addition, the funds will provide for landscaping and foot trails.

The park is being developed on

Buckhorn Reservoir, a Corps of Engineers impoundment.

Approval of a \$530,400 grant to help expand the recreational facilities at Pine Mountain State Park in Bell county also was announced.

The Parks Department will invest \$132,600 to meet the total cost of \$663,000 for the project. The expansion will include a golf pro shop, new camping area, an incinerator, employee and vacation housing, a storage building, modernization of the food facility and additions to the lodge.

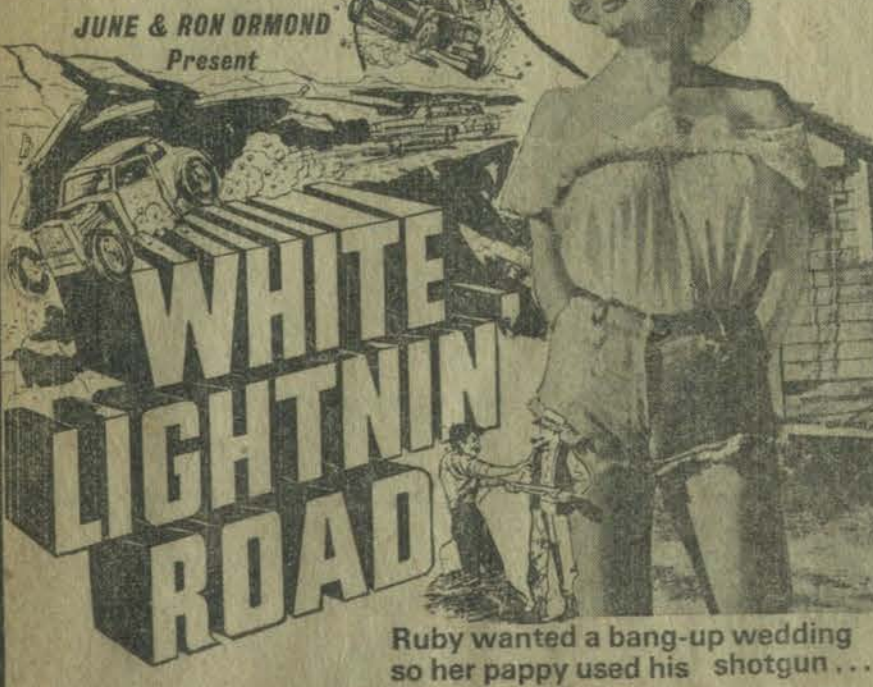

RIVER TRAGEDY CLAIMS DR. MURRAY, 5 OTHERS

Two West Liberty men and four other members of their party lost their lives in a Kentucky River disaster Sunday, May 21.

The bodies of Dr. Hershell Bayless Murray, owner of the West Liberty hospital, and Walter Barker, West Liberty grocer, were recovered soon after the 32-foot cruiser in which they and other executive members of the Mountain Rural Telephone Corporation plunged over a 14-foot dam at Valley View, near Nicholasville, and broke up in the turbulent waters below.

Recovered later: W. H. Adams, Pomroyton; Carl Murphy, of Ezel; Emerson Hill, West Liberty, and Ray Oliver, Campton automobile dealer.

The Floyd County Emergency & Rescue Squad took part in the search operation.

Those who escaped death were hospitalized. They included J. Blaine Nickell, West Liberty attorney; William Miller, West Liberty, manager of the telephone cooperative; T. D. Gilliam, West Liberty farmer, and Charles Schultz, manager and trainer at the Murray Heights Farm owned by Dr. Murray on the Winchester road.

All of the men held executive posts with the cooperative. They were guests of Dr. Murray for the river outing which began, shortly before noon at Clay's Ferry.

They cruised downstream near Lock 9, towing a 16-foot runabout behind them. Anchoring about 300 feet above the dam, Dr. Murray, Charles Schultz and William Miller boarded the runabout leaving the seven other passengers aboard the cruiser.

Twenty minutes later, while the runabout was circling the area, the cruiser slipped anchor and was carried toward the dam by the swift current of the swollen river.

Not realizing the cruiser was in trouble, those in the outboard circled her several times. It was only as the cruiser neared the dam that the outboard came to assist the stricken vessel. Dr. Murray went to the cruiser and tried to start the engines, but there was not time.

Ray Oliver jumped from the cruiser to the runabout and tried to pull clear, but the cruiser's anchor line fouled the outboard's propeller.

The cruiser, drifting sideways down river, turned her stern toward the dam and plunged over stern first.

The three men in the smaller boat, Oliver, Miller and Schultz, jumped out and tried to swim ashore.

Bill Miller related later, "I looked down and saw that big cruiser down there being crushed. I landed on top of it."

J. Blaine Nickell was on the stern of the cabin cruiser with Dr. Murray. He said he was determined to get out of the water if he could.

He "came up in the rough water and started moving around trying to swim and I felt something under the water." It was Dr. Murray wearing a life jacket.

Transylvania College at Lexington, the oldest seat of higher learning west of the Allegheny Mountains, started out in a log cabin at Danville in 1783, three years after the Virginia legislature awarded a charter for a seminary in the "distant province of Kentucke."

Dr. Murray's Death Seventh at U. of K.

The death of Dr. Hershell B. Murray, of West Liberty, and member of the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees, in a Kentucky River tragedy, May 21, brings to seven the number of deaths to strike the UK academic community since the first of the year.

Dr. Murray, secretary of the board, fell to his death when a cabin cruiser went over a dam on the river near Valley View. Earlier this year, another long-time member of the UK board, William F. Foster, of Mayfield, died in a Baltimore hospital.

An air crash at Blue Grass Field near Lexington took the lives of four high-ranking University professors. A fifth died a few days later of a heart attack.

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HAZARD-LONDON HIGHWAY FUNDING IS AUTHORIZED

Frankfort, Ky.—The Kentucky Turnpike Authority late Friday authorized sale of \$104 million in revenue bonds to finance 23 miles of toll road between Owensboro and Henderson and 62 miles between London and Hazard by way of Manchester and Hyden.

The route will be called the Daniel Boone Parkway. Gov. Edward T. Breathitt announced the venture at his office, then turned to members of the turnpike authority for official ratification. The vote was 5 to 0.

Both projects had been recommended Wednesday by Henry Ward, former commissioner of highways, who was nominated for governor in the Democratic primary last Tuesday.

Gov. Breathitt said the bonds will be offered for sale before early fall, with next spring as the target date for construction. "But I am hopeful," he added, "that construction will begin sooner."

The Owensboro-Henderson facility is estimated to cost \$24.8 million. It will be designed to meet standards of the other state-owned toll roads.

The London-Hazard facility is estimated to cost \$79.1 million. It will be designed to standards of the two-lane extension of the Mountain Parkway east of Camp-ton, with truck-climbing third lanes where necessary.

This facility also includes upgrading all roads connecting it with London, Manchester and Hyden. Traveling distance from

GROUP HEARS LIGON STORY

Stumbo Reviews Work Completed Recently At Cost of \$59,000

The Floyd County Community Action Committee at its May meeting heard a detailed report on one of the outstanding projects undertaken in the county since the "War on Poverty" began.

John M. Stumbo, director of the Ligon Project, which was completed May 5 at a cost of \$59,000, told the story. Briefly, it runs:

Ninety-five sanitary-type toilets constructed, only one of the old type remaining; three bridges constructed; 105 water samples taken, with 93 showing contamination; 93 wells chlorinated; 14 garbage barrels placed in the community; four picnic tables built; Clear Creek snagged and dragged; 129 private premises cleaned; a sanitary landfill constructed; 27 old car bodies hauled away; 300 trees white-washed; ditches cleaned out; 50 loads of "red dog" hauled for roadway; nine health films shown; 3,210 home visits made; 439 immunizations given; 329 stool specimens collected; 13 types of parasites discovered and 183 persons treated; \$12,000 worth of medicine used.

Mr. Stumbo introduced his Ligon aides, Brenda Collier, Alfreeda Henson and May Lucas, and gave much credit for success of the project to the Unemployed Fathers.

The countywide Clean-Up Month was changed from May to June, and Douglas Morrison, director of the Floyd CAP, was placed in charge of the effort.

Polk K. Hill, Neighborhood Youth Corps supervisor, reported that 76 persons had been placed for work as of May 5. Workers at a hospital are receiving two hours' classroom work daily, also free lunches, uniforms and medical care. Five have been employed at scale wages.

EDA Grants To Help Systems In Knott-Co.

Approval of two grants totaling \$252,680 to help install water and sewer systems at Pippa Passes, was announced last week by the Economic Development Administration, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The Caney Creek Water District, applicant for the EDA assistance, said the project will provide for an expansion of Alice Lloyd College and serve low-income families in the area.

Total cost of the project, which is expected to be completed in about a year, will be \$399,300.

EDA is making a \$174,800 grant to help install a water-treatment plant and distribution system and sewer lines. Total cost of this part of the work is \$30,000. The water district will complete the financing with a \$55,200 loan from the Farmers Home Administration.

A \$77,880 EDA grant will help meet the \$169,300 total cost of a sewage-treatment plant and lift stations. The Federal Water Pollution Control Administration is making a \$50,790 grant and FHA, a \$40,630 loan to complete the financing.

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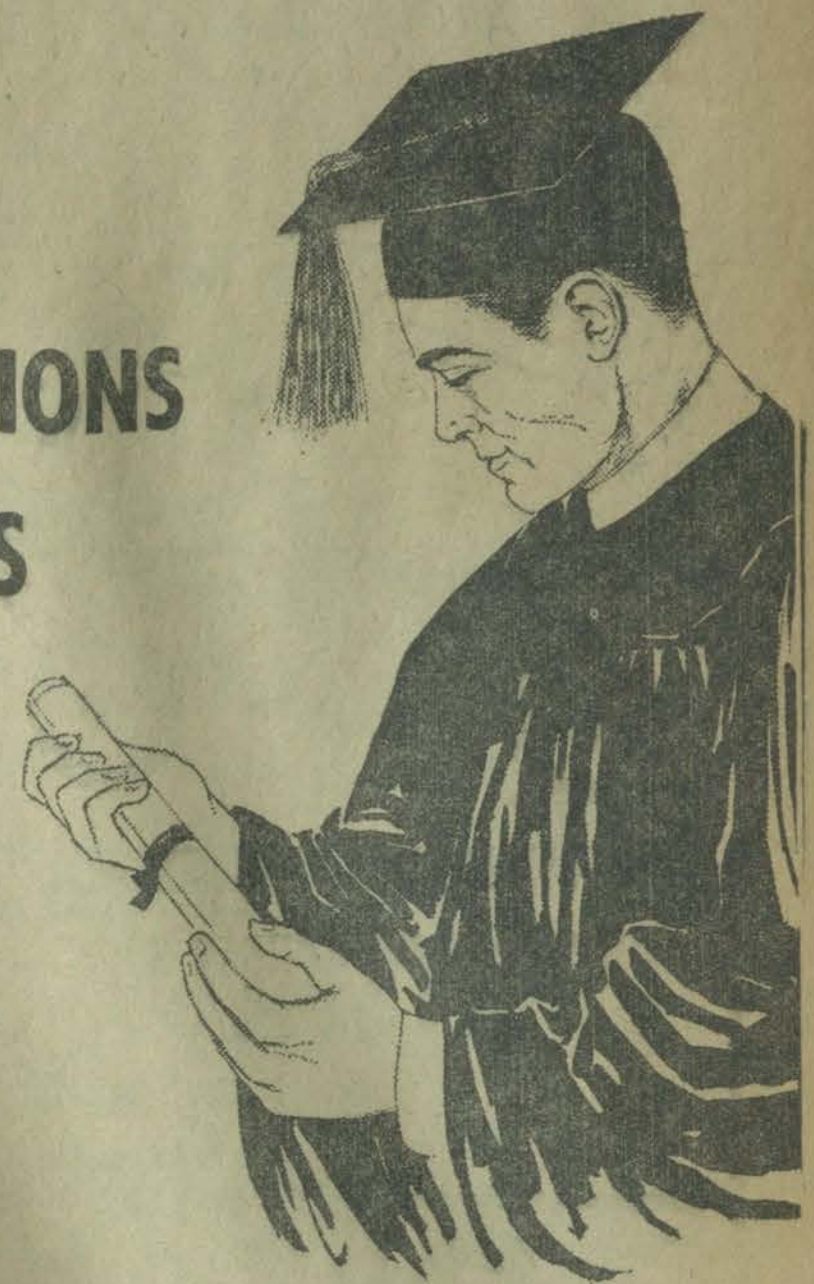
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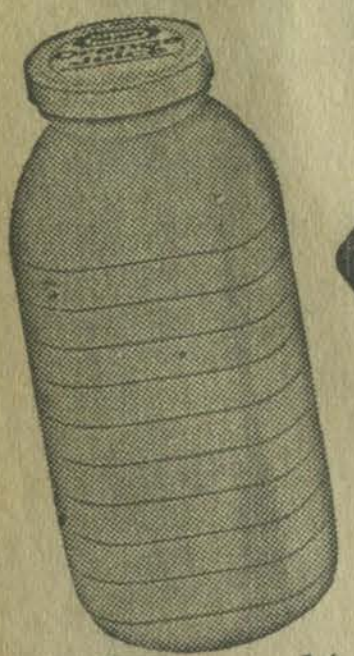
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
