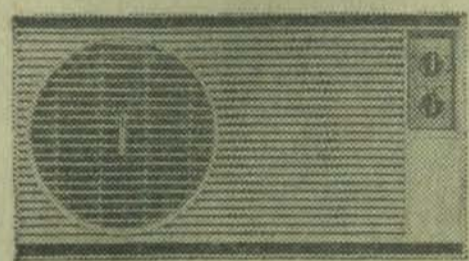

Frankfort, Ky. — The Highway Department has awarded a \$1,146,724 contract for construction of a bridge and approaches over Russell Fork and the railroad at Elkhorn City.

The project is located on the Elkhorn City-Virginia State Line Road and will extend for almost half a mile. It is being financed by the Appalachian Regional Development Program.

Saltzman Construction, Inc., Bardstow, submitted the low bid. The award is subject to concurrence by the federal Bureau of Public Roads.

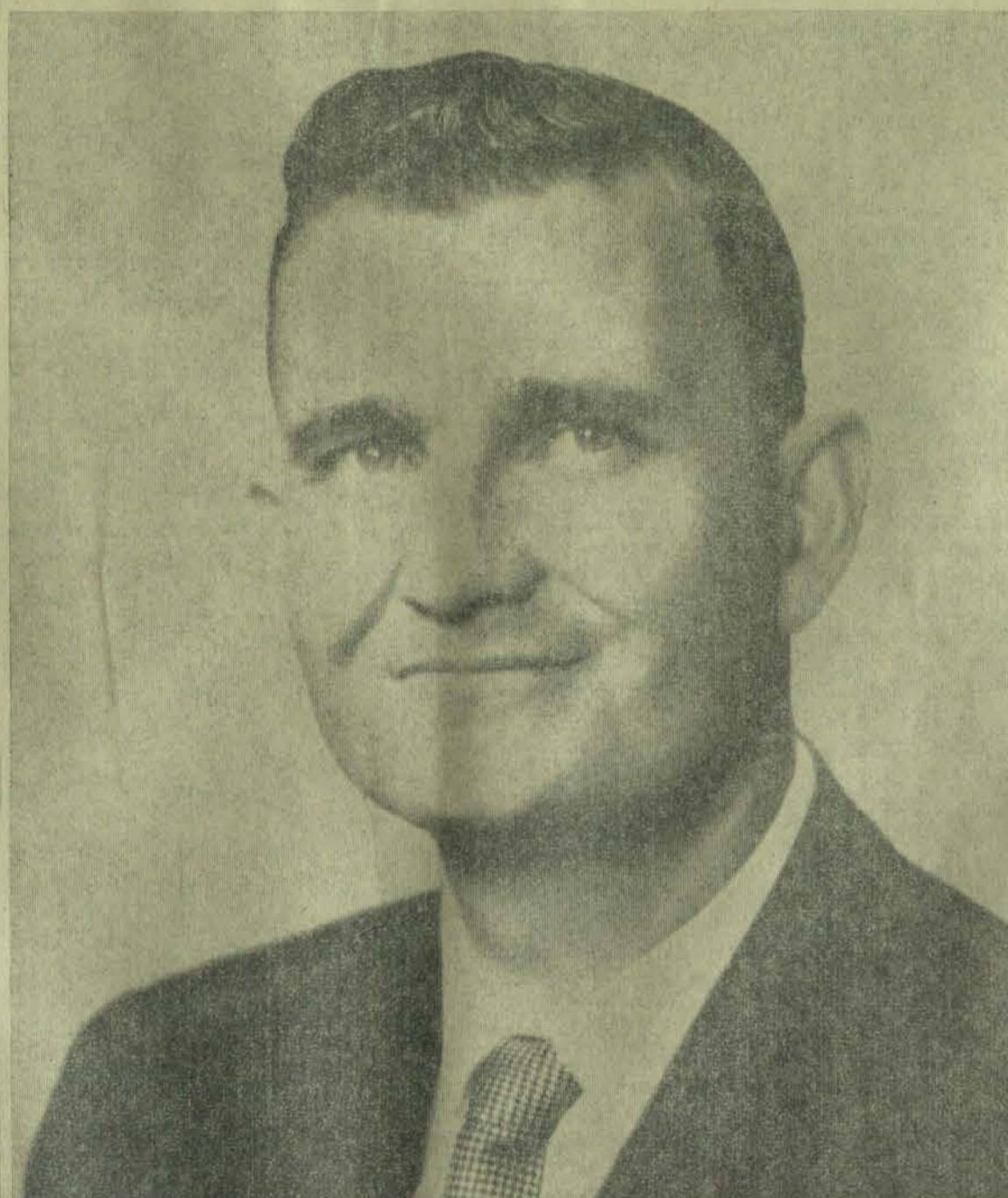

to Eastern Kentucky, to add to the future economy of the region.

For this year's loans applications from students will be accepted until August 1. Decisions on all loans are expected to be made by August 15, in advance of the date for the registration of students. Consideration will, first of all, be given to seniors, then juniors and on back to those entering college for the first time.

High school and college transcripts will be required of those making application, since the ability of the student to do college work as well as his or her need is important.

Undergraduates may borrow up to \$1,000 a year; graduate students, up to \$1,500. The student's note bears 6% simple interest. Repayments on the loan will begin on the first day of the tenth month after the student leaves school, and until that time the federal government will in most cases pay all the interest. And, after repayment starts, the student will be required to pay only 3% of the interest. The federal government will pay the other 3%. A fee of one-half of 1% a year of the amount of the loan, for the term of the loan, is to be paid in advance.

No collateral is required. The endorsement of United Student Aid Funds is all that the bank requires. The \$50,000 which The Bank Josephine will loan this year under the USA Funds program will benefit 50 or more students, it is predicted. The bank began its participation in the program last October.

To justify the federal investment, it was pointed out that the improvement will mean an additional 1,200 jobs in the area to be served. Communities to be tied into the water system are Maytown, Eastern, Bosco, Lackey, Estill and Wayland, on Right Beaver Creek; and, on Left Beaver, Hite, Hunter, Printer, Drift and McDowell. Schools with about 2,000 pupils will be served.

County Judge Henry Stumbo and Supt. of Schools Charles F. Clark hailed the undertaking as one of real importance. "This is a major development," Clark said.

Mr. Wells was high in his praise of Congressman Perkins, who handled negotiations for federal aid in Washington. "Carl has done a wonderful job, staying with us," he said.

Commenting on the plan to extend the system on Left Beaver Creek to Weeksbury, Wells pointed out that negotiations are now under way, and that the prospects are bright, for a sportswear manufacturing firm to locate at or near Wheelwright. The plant, he said, would employ 200 persons.

## ATTORNEY GENERAL TELLS TEACHER GROUP POWERS

Frankfort, Ky. — The Kentucky teaching profession's Professional Practices Commission (PPC) has authority to take jurisdiction over complaints filed with it against local boards of education and individual members thereof, the Attorney-General's office has ruled.

In such cases the PPC also has authority to subpoena local school board members to testify under oath, the ruling stated.

PPC secretary Verne P. Horne requested the opinion in a letter to Attorney-General Robert Matthews. The opinion was written by Assistant Attorney-General Lloyd R. Cress.

Horne said recent requests for PPC investigations of board-of-education action in three counties prompted his inquiry about the commission's authority. The requests came from local education associations in Barren, McCracken and Pike counties.

The PPC, established by the Kentucky General Assembly in 1962 through the efforts of KEA, was the first professional practices commission in the nation. It is the education profession's self-policing and self-disciplining group. The KEA membership finances its operation.

The Attorney-General's opinion cited statutes directing the PPC to develop criteria of professional practices and prescribing the action the PPC can take in administering its criteria.

Quoted in the opinion was this portion of KRS (statute) 156.540: " . . . Further, the commission shall have authority to make recommendations to the State Board of Education in cases involving suspension or revocation of certificates and to make any other recommendations to the State Board and to local boards of education which would promote improvement of the teaching profession. . . "

The ruling emphasized that in hearing complaints falling within the purview of KRS 156.530 and 156.540 against local boards of education or individual board members the PPC is limited to those forms of remedial action

spelled out in the section quoted above.

As to subpoena power, the Attorney-General's office noted that the statutes do not limit the individuals who are subject to subpoena by the PPC. Therefore, members of local boards of education may be subpoenaed to testify before the commission.

Horne said the PPC has not used its subpoena power in the past.

Oak Wilt Survey To Start July 10th In East Ky. Counties

Frankfort, Ky. — Ground and aerial surveys will be conducted by the state this summer in the second year of a program to determine if oak wilt is spreading in Kentucky.

Commissioner J. O. Matlock said the surveys will be conducted by the Department of Natural Resources' forestry division and the U. S. Forest Service on permanent sample plots established at random in 15 counties over the state when the program began last summer.

The aerial survey will be conducted during July 10-14. Wilting trees, which are easily detected from the air since they often resemble trees struck by lightning, will be plotted on minute topographic maps.

In the ground survey, which will follow immediately, samples will be taken from the suspect trees and sent to a pathology laboratory for confirmation of the presence of the disease.

Oak wilt attacks and kills all types of oak trees, Kentucky's largest-volume commercial timber. It is prevalent in a 20-state area in the eastern and central United States.

Past control efforts in Kentucky, Tennessee and North Carolina produced no appreciable difference in the spread of the disease and were discontinued on advice of the Forest Service.

The survey program is designed to gain more knowledge about the disease.

The survey counties in Eastern Kentucky are Fleming, Morgan, Breathitt, Clay and Pike, where a high incidence of oak wilt was discovered last year.

**ORDINANCE NO. 129**

**NATURE TRAILS**  
By Rufus M. Reed

**MR. HOPTOAD, FRIEND OF THE GARDNER**

The toad is a tailless, toothless amphibian, and each is regarded as worth about \$25 a year to the gardener. They devour almost all kinds of insect pests, and a single toad can eat as many as 50 insects in one day. He captures the pests with his sticky tongue, which is fastened at the front of the mouth and lashes out like a whip to snare the unwary insect. This animal won't eat a dead or wounded insect; it has to be alive and moving. But let it move just enough to catch the toad's sharp eye and, presto! his tongue gives a lightning thrust and down the insect goes. The strong juices in the stomach soon dissolve the soft tissues of the insect and it is quickly digested.

Ever watch a toad swallow a bug? He shuts his eyes when swallowing, as if in much enjoyment of the tasty morsel. But some say the shutting of the eyes is an aid to swallowing. A toad is not choicy as to what he captures to eat, just so it is alive and moving. He eats stink bugs, squash bugs, bean beetles, moths, caterpillars and larvae of all kinds.

The toad is a cold-blooded animal and cannot endure extremes of temperature. That's why he keeps hidden in some cool spot on hot summer days and comes out late in the evening to look for his supper. If there is a bright outside light, the toad will visit it to feast on the insects attracted by the light. A man who once had an outside light in the backyard kept dozens of toads fat every summer; these visited the light each night and grew fat on the bounteous crop of insects diving into the burning gas jet. Moths, beetles, many kinds of bugs and others got their wings singed and fluttered to the ground, to be gobbled up quickly by the toads.

Some gardeners build around their crops small stone houses in which the toads stay to escape the hot sun; then at dusk, they hop out to help the gardener in his fight against the pests.

Toads are not the dumb animals they may appear to be. They can be tamed and make fine pets. They learn to come at the call of their name—it seems many pet toads are named, "Her-man." They can tell the difference between their owner and a stranger, and will not come at a strange call. They seldom forget a kindness and will return to the same place, year after year. A toad has been known to live up to 30 years.

We have two leading species in our region: The American toad and the Fowler's, which is slightly the smaller and darker of the two species. The Fowler's toad has a white line down the middle of the back and this is bordered by irregular rows of black spots. Toads hibernate during winter, often digging down two or three feet to escape the winter's freeze. In winter they breathe the oxygen they need through pores in the skin.

In early spring the female toad lays up to 15,000 eggs, placing them in long strings of gelatin. The eggs are always laid in stagnant pools along roads and streams and the eggs hatch out in about 12 days. The tadpoles are jet black and have long, slender tails for use in moving about in the water. They soon develop legs and lungs for living on land. The tiny tadpoles feed on algae, protozoa and the dead matter of the stagnant water. It takes about two years for toads to reach adult size.

Does it rain teenty-tiny toads? Many persons say so. After a brisk summer shower hundreds of the little fellows the size of one's fingernail on the little finger suddenly appear, as if rained out of the sky. Once I was parked in a certain town during a hard rain, and when it was over, there were many little toads hopping all about the street. Where had they come from? Some say the little tykes are hiding everywhere — under leaves, sticks, trash, small stones, and suddenly they hop out when it rains, as if to enjoy the downpour. Others say the winds blow the little toads skyward and they are rained back to earth. But this doesn't seem possible. Surely a fall from a cloud would kill a small toad stone dead.

## 'Switch-Blade' Blunderbuss, 'Latest Thing' In Weapons In 1790, In U. K. Exhibit

The term, "switch blade," applies to knives these days. There was a time when it usually applied to guns.

The sudden and awesome evidence is found in a brass-barreled blunderbuss—often called a thunder gun—now on exhibit at the University of Kentucky Life Museum (Waveland), Lexington.

In use extensively in the latter 1700's, the eye-catching, bell-muzzle gun with the spring bayonet attached to the side of the barrel, is now a valuable rarity.

With a flip of a latch, a foot-long bayonet clicks into place ready for action if the flint fails to spark or the trigger hangs.

Made by Boney of London in 1790, the gun has been loaned to the UK museum by Miss Henrietta Clay, Lexington, granddaughter of Henry Clay.

Dr. Hambleton Tapp, museum director, said the gun ignites the interest of visitors to the museum, despite the fact there are many other novel and antique firearms on exhibition.

"Visitors always seem interested when they see the blunderbuss," Dr. Tapp said. "They become excited when they hear the sound of the bayonet click into place or see the long rifle fly out beyond the muzzle."

Although the switch bayonet was novel in its day, equally as novel was the bell muzzle. The principle behind the invention of the bell muzzle was declared by the inventors to be manifold, but time proved the principle in error, and the bell muzzle was abandoned.

Contrary to original belief, the bell muzzle did not cause the two dozen or more shots to scatter. Only at 40 feet does the gun produce a scattering effect, but with a mean spread of only 20 to 36 inches.

The bell muzzle had its advantages. The idea became prevalent that the shots scattered over a wide area, giving rise to the notion it would kill many people at one time. The gun held before a crowd had a remarkable psychological effect.

The bell muzzle proved advantageous in another way. The flintlock could be loaded easily, especially by a guard riding atop a jolting stagecoach, or by a sailor on a rolling ship.

The new firearm addition at the museum has its colorful history, beginning with Dr. LeClere, a famous French physician.

Dr. LeClere bought the gun for his daughter and only child, Victorie Charlotte LeClere Mantelle, shortly before she and her husband fled from France early in 1793 to escape the vengeance of French revolutionaries.

He put the gun in expert hands. Although he had wanted a son, he was determined that his daughter should know all the things he would have taught a son.

She was meticulously trained in the use of firearms, fencing, and riding, along with the gentler arts of music, dancing, literature, English, and the graces of a lady who would have been at home in the elegant and effervescent court of Louis XVI.

A son of Isom Moore, of Minnie, and the late Ann Jones Moore, he was the husband of Mrs. Inzie Stumbo Moore, who also survives.

Surviving, besides his father and widow, are one son, James Edward Moore, of Fairborn, O.; a daughter, Miss Anna Jewel Moore, of St. Mary's; two brothers, Sherman and Harved, both of Ypsilanti, Mich., and one sister, Mrs. Audrey Smith, of Pike county.

He also leaves one grandchild. Funeral services will be held Saturday at 10 a.m. at the Old Beaver Church, the Revs. Charley Jones, Jerry Hall and Troy Nickles officiating. Burial will be in the Lucy Hall cemetery at McDowell under the direction of the Hall Brothers Funeral Home.
