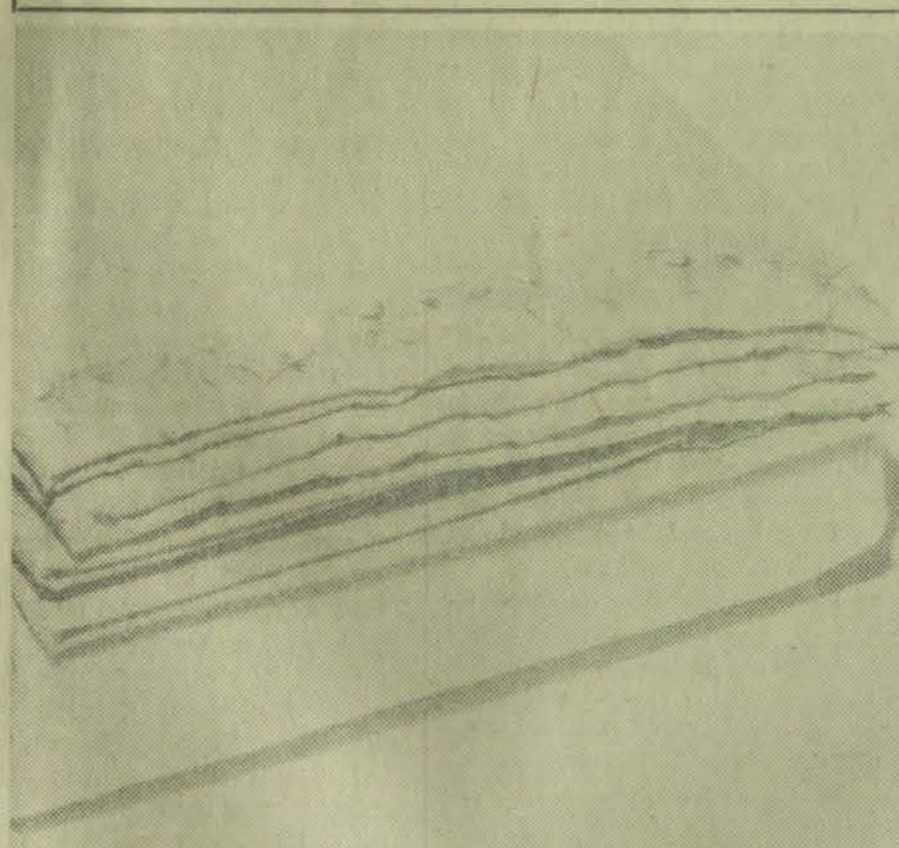

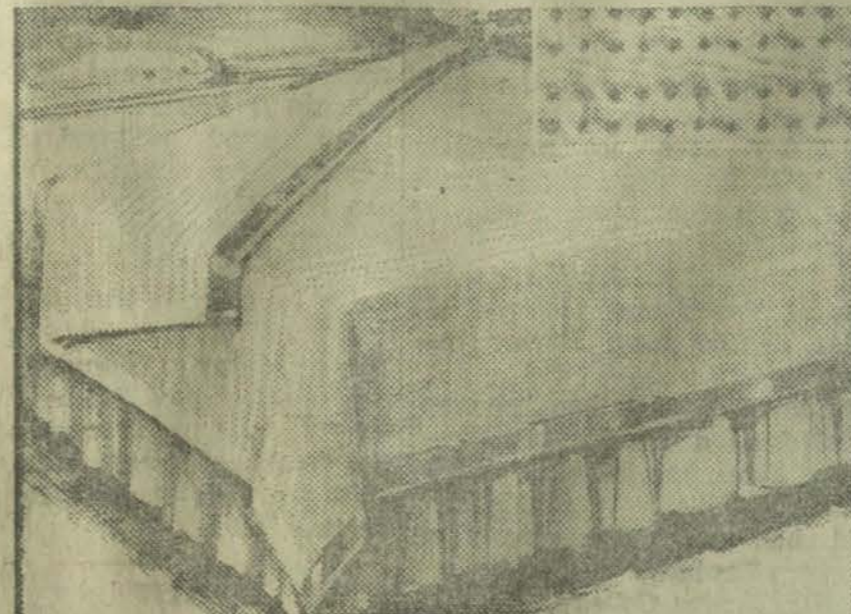

APPALACHIAN GOVERNORS, LEGISLATORS ARE ACCUSED

Nashville, Tenn.—Author Harry M. Caudill says governors and state legislators in the Appalachian Region have crippled people of the area by "serving the large coal interests."

Speaking to the Race Relations Institute at Fisk University Thursday, Caudill said state gov-

ernment in Appalachia has "de-

vised a tax system which taxes a coal miner for lifting a loaf of bread from a grocery shelf, but allows the world's largest steel company to carry away millions of tons of coal untaxed."

Caudill is author of "Night Comes to the Cumberlands," a book on the war on poverty in Appalachia.

He called Appalachia's poor "simply a reflection of the ignorance, timidity and greed of Appalachia's leadership," and labeled Appalachia "a colonial stronghold of the American money centers and industrial centers."

Caudill said the poor must be helped by governors, bankers and educators if the war on poverty is a success.

"An area the size of Connecticut has been destroyed by strip mining," he added.

Tennessee's legislature moved this year to curtail strip mining by requiring that pits be revegetated and reclaimed. Kentucky has a similar law.

Long Binh, Vietnam—John A. Turner, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Turner, David, Ky., was promoted to Army private first class April 9 upon arrival in Vietnam, where he is serving with the 46th Engineer Battalion.

Pvt. Turner, a heavy equipment operator in the battalion's Company B near Long Binh, entered the Army in November, 1966, and was last stationed at Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo.

He is a 1964 graduate of Maytown high school.

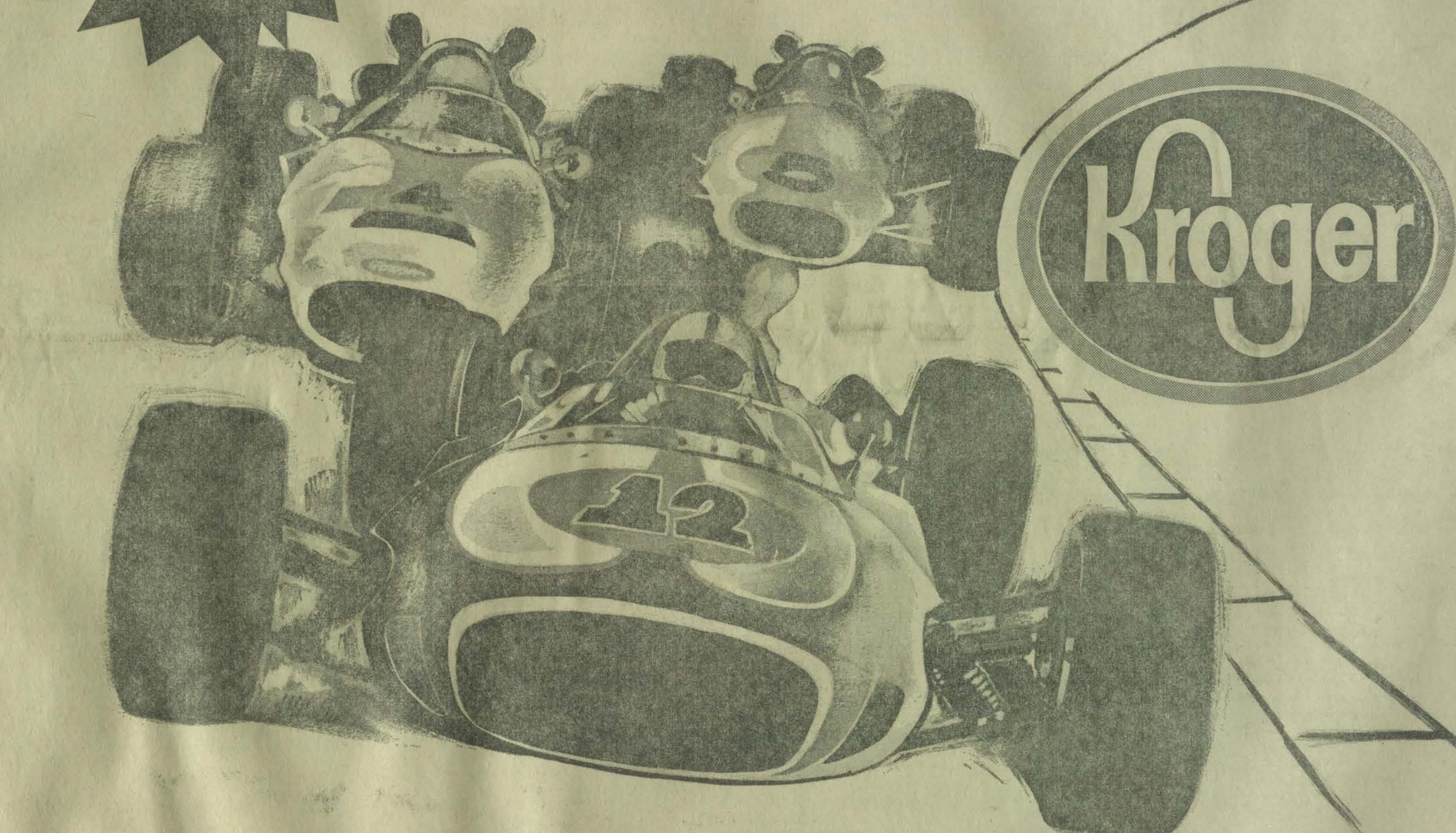

veloping educational program, the college has retained the campus-regional planning firm of Johnson, Johnson & Roy, Ann Arbor, Mich. Financed through a \$16,000 grant from the Grover Hermann Foundation of Chicago, the campus study will determine the most effective use of the college's approximately 15 usable acres along the bottom and lower slopes of deep, narrow Caney Creek valley. Eventually, the college hopes the study to expand into a full examination of its future relationship with and effect on neighboring communities.

For the present, it must concentrate on its immediate program and its more local community. Recent grants totaling \$400,000 for a water and sewage project will help overcome one of the major roadblocks to expansion. Obtained with the help of community leaders, the Caney Creek Water District not only will assure vital construction grants and loans, but will make possible low rent housing and shopping developments in the rural valley.

The first major structure to take its place in the new campus plan will be a \$300,000 science building, already two-thirds financed by a federal grant and loan. The college also is drawing blueprints for fine arts and administration buildings.

Not waiting on completion of its "Co-operating Institutions" program to take some significant steps of progress, Alice Lloyd is strengthening its student exchange program, which has in the past three years involved Renyon College, Cornell University, Garland Junior College and Wittenberg College. The exchange program offers its students an unusual opportunity to broaden their cultural and social experiences and helps promote a better understanding of Appalachia among youth of other regions.

Through National Teaching Fellowships, the college faculty has been increased and faculty members have been given the opportunity for advanced graduate study. Fourteen currently are enrolled in summer schools.

Alice Lloyd residence halls, which utilize students in the capacity of house parents, are being organized into self-governing bodies designed to give occupants early experience in the leadership and service to which they are committed.

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The inadmissible evidence may have been a factor in leading the jury to recommend the death penalty, the majority opinion said.

Judge Morris Montgomery, dissenting, expressed alarm "at the growing tendency of courts to reverse convictions such as this when the identity of the accused and his guilt have been established beyond all question."

This tendency, said Montgomery, bears directly upon the increasing disregard for law and order and upon the increasing crime rate.

At Salisbury's trial here, County Judge Henry Stumbo testified to a conversation he had with Salisbury's sister, Darlene Martin, while county officials were investigating the crime.

Over objections of Salisbury's lawyer, Judge Stumbo was permitted to say that when he questioned the woman, she told him her brother had admitted the slaying to her and had showed her where he put the shotgun.

"These statements by the judge were patently hearsay and as such inadmissible, especially the statement that appellant had told his sister that he shot them," said the majority opinion written by Judge Earl T. Osborne.

"We are unable to say what weight the jury gave Judge Stumbo's testimony and what effect it might have had in their decision to impose the death penalty."

"Being unable to say this hearsay evidence did not affect the sentence imposed by the jury, we must necessarily conclude it was prejudicial."

The two attorneys figuring in the first trial of the case made informal comment on the decision. Commonwealth's Attorney Stumbo said, "Judge Montgomery's dissenting opinion expresses my views. I agree with it." Burnis Martin, defense counsel, commented, "The question at issue was, Shall a man be given trial according to law? It's a principle that applies not only to this case but to future trials."

EDA Loan To Help In Creating Jobs At Elkhorn City

Approval of a \$1,137,500 loan to help construct a plant expected to employ 178 workers at Elkhorn City was announced last week by the Economic Development Administration, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The applicant is the Elkhorn Stone Company, Inc., a New Market, Tenn. corporation formed in October of last year to mine, produce and process aggregate limestone, rock, cement and asphalt in Pike county, where the project will be located.

The funds will help the firm construct and equip the plant which will create 58 jobs for workers in the limestone quarry and 120 jobs for truckers and maintenance workers.

The application for EDA assistance stated that the project will enhance the Pike county economy by stimulating the building trades and helping the coal mining and glass industries of the area.

Total cost of the project will be \$1,750,000. In addition to the EDA loan, which will mature in 10 years, the Hamilton National Bank is making a \$350,000 loan and the Pike County Development Association is providing \$87,500. The applicant will furnish \$175,000 in equity capital.

EDA also will guarantee 90 percent of the unpaid balance of a \$250,000 working capital loan to be made by the First National Bank of Pikeville.

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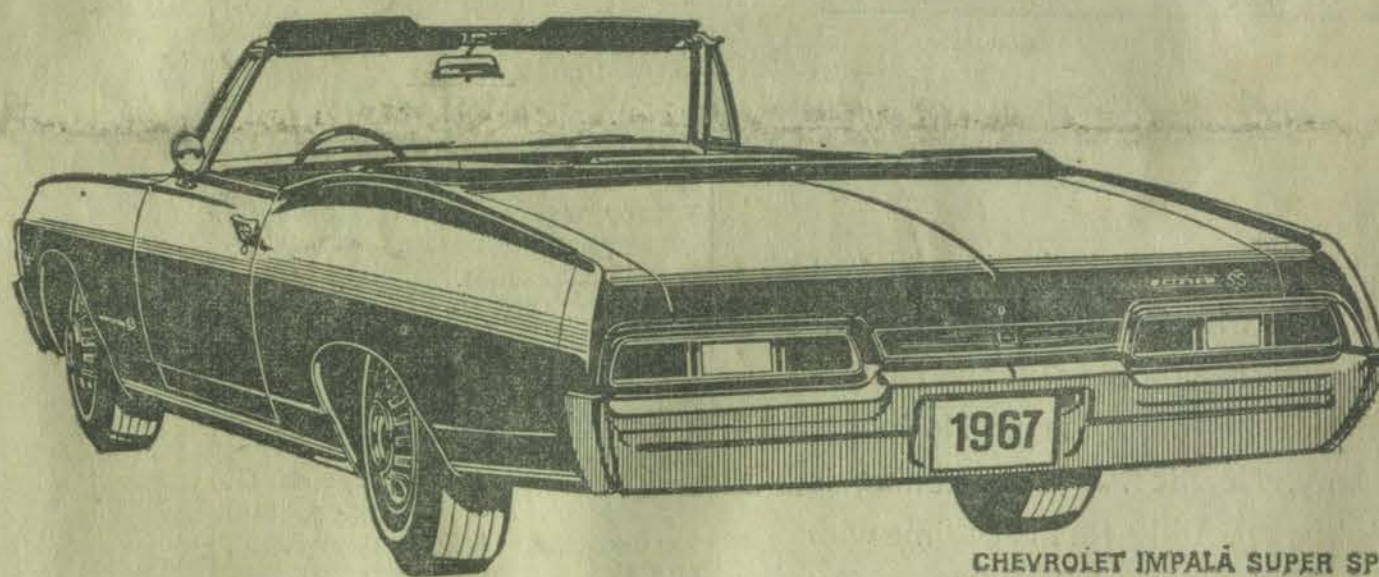

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KENTUCKY TO ASK 100% WELFARE PAY

The Kentucky Department of Economic Security will ask the 1968 legislature to increase welfare grants to 100 percent of what the state calculates a recipient needs to live on, Economic Security Commissioner C. Leslie Dawson last week told a delegation of about 50 welfare recipients.

The department now figures welfare payments at about 87 percent of their actual needs for shelter, food, clothing, medicine and the like.

A request for welfare grants at 100 percent of need headed a long list of complaints about the system by the Louisville welfare rights organization.

Other changes sought by the group would:

1. Permit welfare recipients of aid for dependent children grants to earn the difference between the amounts they need and the grant, without reducing the grant.
 2. Provide retroactive benefits from the time of an underpayment, in case of error.
 3. Notify recipients of changes in regulations affecting their eligibility.
 4. Permit recipients to draw full benefits without deducting any support payments that are made by husbands under orders of juvenile courts.
 5. Hire recipients to do some paper work, thereby releasing social workers to do social work.
 6. Permit recipients to earn up to the national poverty level — \$3,200 for a family of four and \$900 for each additional dependent—before the welfare grant is cut.
 7. Open public-assistance records to recipients, or any person authorized in writing by the recipient to see his records.

STATE FALLOUT SHELTERS FOR 2 MILLION CLAIMED

Frankfort, Ky.—In the event of a military disaster, Kentucky's Civil Defense program can provide fallout shelter for more than two-thirds of the state's three million people.

Addressing the 1967 annual spring conference of the National Association of State Civil Defense Directors at Lexington, Gov. Edward T. Breathitt said the state community shelter program includes 1,697 shelters with space for 2,144,000 persons.

Reporting to delegates from every state in the nation and its five territories, Breathitt said the state has 54 local emergency operating centers. Their work is to help cope with emergencies created by natural disasters, storms, floods and the like. Of the E.O.C. stations, 33 came into existence during the past two years, he said, and are coordinated by a center in Frankfort to which all departments and agencies of state government have been assigned specific responsibilities. The E.O.C. program complements the work of Civil Defense, according to Breathitt.

In a report on Kentucky's Civil Defense preparedness, Major General A. Y. Lloyd, State Adjutant-General, cited these statistics for this fiscal year:

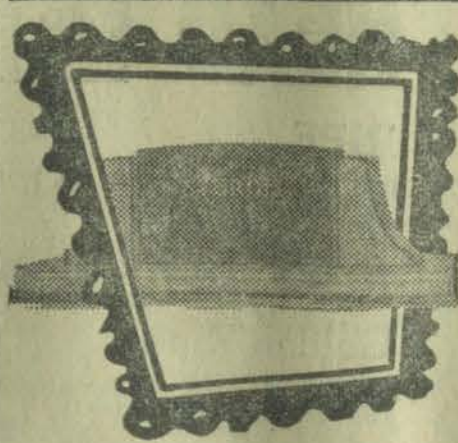
1. There are 92 active fallout shelter programs covering most of 98 counties. He predicted that programs will be started in the state's 22 other counties (mainly in Appalachia) during fiscal 1968.

2. More than 40,000 persons have been given medical self-help training; 12,500 others received additional instruction in survival.

3. A new Radiological Defense Calibration and Maintenance Laboratory has repaired, serviced or calibrated more than 14,000 instruments. They are used for detecting and measuring radiation.

4. The performance of highly trained and locally-operated C-D rescue teams remains excellent.

Breathitt called Civil Defense "a day-to-day business — one of the most vital day-to-day businesses anywhere — on the state level."
