Supreme or appellate courts of five other states have held that the so-called "broadform" mineral deeds which, more than half a century ago, transferred landowners' mineral rights, including other rights, do not go "hell deep," as one Knott countain stated it.

These courts ruled—and their opinions have not been overriden—that the "broadform" deeds either do not allow strip-mining or, else, the owners of the surface land must be reimbursed for any damage done to their property by such mining.

The Kentucky Court of Appeals, in sharp contradistinction, however, held in 1956 that strip miners were liable for damages to the surface only if the destruction was "arbitrary, wanton or malicious."

Governor Breathitt has been criticised roundly in some quarters for his action. We commend him. He recognizes the importance of the coal industry to Kentucky, but he also recognizes the importance of human rights.

The Prestonsburg Municipal (Archer) Park, already the most developed city park in East Kentucky, has greatly benefitted from the work of unemployed fathers under the direction of City Manager Curtis Clark. Federal law prohibits work on private property, however, and a project of reforestation, which is urgently needed, cannot benefit from WE&T labor. I believe adjustments should be made whereby WE&T personnel could engage in an intensive reforestation program under the direction of the Department of Forestry. This would be infinitely more valuable over a long period than the present weed-cutting on county roads (even though) this needs to be done). This is not to suggest that there are not administrative problems involved in this and similar programs. But Unemployed Fathers Program, the Neighborhood Youth Corps, and the College work-study Program are all valuable contributions owed-through the Federal government-to an area which has surrendered many natural resources with little proportionate gain for itself and provided much labor to the industrialized areas to the north.

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




