Another restriction has been removed that may affect those between the ages of 62 and 65. Prior to the 1965 amendments if you had chosen to receive reduced benefits by taking early retirement-say at age 62-even though you became disabled later you could not file for disability. Now if you become disabled before age 65 you may now qualify for disability benefits which are not reduced except for the months that you received benefits before your disability

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




