> Careful observation is necessary for a few weeks after recovery from a strep infection, because there is a "silent" phase in the development of rheumatic fever, and one or more of the danger signals may reappear to warn of trouble.

> The child who develops rheumatic fever does not necessarily suffer heart damage. Once recovered without heart damage, he will be placed on long-term medication that protects against repeated attacks, but he is not ill and should be permitted to take part in the normal school program, unless a physician orders a limit on activities.
