The gym tax rate for the City of Prestonsburg was set at 7.1c. Last year, the rate was 5.8c. The gym rate for franchise companies was set at 12.8c, up from 5.8c last year.

Real estate, 46.8c (40.5c); franchise companies 59.9c (61c): bank shares, 38c.

The rate was based on properties assessed at \$83,505,489. The total assessment for the county was centified at \$95,643,674, but manufacturing machinery, stocks and bonds, annuities and one or more other classes of property are not subject to local taxa-

The rates, as established by the court, are calculated to bring the total tax bill for the county to \$217,414 and for the ject to discounts, exemptions and tees to fill the vacancy.

"To our knowledge the Appalachian Volunteers have worked in only six of the state's 27 multi-county Community Action agency areas. All of these quite naturally are in the Eastern or Appalachia area of our state There have been numerous and repeated complaints from all of them during the past two years over the lack of cooperation and in many cases open rebellion of the Appalachian Volunteers against the O.E.O.-Community Action Agencies. Many complaints have been made by individuals and other citizen

"These complaints became too voluminous to ignore in the summer of 1966, and the first hearing because of them was held in an all-day meeting at Jenny Wiley State Park; called by the Regional O.E.O. in November of 1966 and was attended by all the leading officers of the Appalachian Volunteers and the CAP Directors of five or six Community Action Agency areas.

"At this hearing, I stated very emphatically that the Appalachian Volunteers and the CAP would have to get together and cooperate fully if we were ever to make any headway in winning the War on Poverty,

Further, I listed three specific complaints which had been made and which I considered very serious against the Appalachian Volunteers and stated that any and all groups funded by O.E.O. to work in Community Action areas obviously must work together or else would not work at all. Our chief aim or job is to unite the entire community-the rich, the just well-to-do and the poor - to work together against poverty; and if we who were funded by O.E.O. couldn't get together, how in the world could we expect to unite entire com-






