Bids on the project were opened at the Municipal Building last Thursday, and the low bid of \$478,639.66, submitted by Akers & Akers, Dana contractors, was accepted. Three other bids were of-

fered. Construction work at the 14-acre site acquired by the housing commission almost two years ago at the mouth of May's Branch here, is scheduled to begin in the early spring. Completion of the project will bring to 82 the total of public housing units available here. The first constructed, Green Acres, has 40 units. The new construction job

### A VALUABLE INDUSTRY AS **OPPOSED TO OTHER VALUES**

Strip-mining in Kentucky meant this to the state and nation in 1966:

More than 30 million tons of coal produced and sold for upwards of \$135 million; steam electric generating plants supplied the necessary fuel to light, heat and cool thousands of homes and industries: a necessary fuel supplied to a wide assortment of domestic markets.

This is an impressive record, and since 1966 the volume of production and its dollar value have increased. It is a record which makes all the more trying the task of dealing effectively in the public interest with the strip-mining industry.

But, while all this production was going on, something else was happening. According to the U. S. Department of Interior, the "overburden" created by the peeling away of the soil to get at the coal with augers and other machinery spoiled 119,600 acres of land and polluted 395 miles of Kentucky streams. This, if the U.S. Department of Interior knows what it is talking about, is a price Kentucky and its people paid not only for one year for that coal but one which they will pay for God knows how long, every year.

Kentucky has the toughest strip-mining law in the nation, we are told. But how much has it meant? Governor Breathitt in the closing days of his administration issued a tougher executive order, forbidding the mining of slopes steeper than 28 degrees. What will that ultimately mean? This could be the year of decision.

Nobody in his right mind wants to destroy the coal industry. Its importance to the country is too great. Its economic impact on the state of Kentucky, especially its coal-producing sections, is such that here coal, indeed, is king.
