## Order Bans Action By Martin Officials

A temporary injunction ordered Wednesday morning by Circuit Judge Hollie Conley forbids further official action by either Martin Police Judge D. M. Hutchinson or Chief of Police A. J. Reed in the case of Clyde Hogged, who is accused of shooting at without wounding Reed last Friday night. The restraining order is to remain effective until a hearing is held May 31. Judge Hutchinson is restrained from taking any jurisdiction in the case against Hogged, and Reed is forbidden to arrest Hogged or interfere with any of his movements or freedom. Last Friday night's trouble between Hogged, a Martin storeowner, and the chief of police is the second reported, the first dating back to last December. It was said Reed was fired on by Hogged Friday night after he had received a telephone call, presumably from Hogged, saying he was drunk and inviting

the officer to arrest him. Reed said that when he stopped his car near Hogged's home several shots were fired, one bullet striking the rear of his police cruiser. Hogged's complaint, filed in requesting the restraining order, claimed that: 1. Upon hearing that Reed was looking for him, after the alleged Friday night incident, he feared for his life and came to the county jail here at 3 a.m. Saturday and had himself held there for his own safety and to submit to the authority of the Floyd county court, contending this was the only court with authority to try the offense with which he is charged. 2. At 9 o'clock Saturday morning he caused a warrant to be issued from the county judge's office "for the purpose of placing himself within the jurisdiction of the court." He executed bond for his appearance for examining trial next Monday. 3. Defendants, upon being advised of this action by Hogged, let it be known that Reed intended personally to arrest Hogged on sight. 4. Hogged's attorney, Burnis Martin, of Prestonsburg, refuses to go into the Martin police court. A transcript of the hearing held last Dec. 30 in another case involving Hogged and Reed was filed, and Hogged's complaint claimed this transcript showed Reed "virtually took over the court" and abused the attorney for Hogged and the court reporter. ## SHOCK FATAL TO STUDENT

### Son of Phone Company's President Electrocuted At Work Near Teaberry

Stephen Eugene Gearheart, 17-year-old Betsy Layne high school senior, died last Friday at Methodist hospital, Pikeville, 12 hours after he had been electrocuted while working on a telephone line near Teaberry. Young Gearheart, a son of Paul R. Gearheart, of Harold, president of the Harold Telephone Company, was working with another youth when the tragedy occurred. The other had climbed a telephone pole and young Gearheart, on the ground, was pulling the line tight when the line came in contact with a power line carrying 7,200 volts of electricity. The youth was burned from his waist down. He is survived by his parents, Paul R. and Elaine Ward Gearheart, one brother, Paul Douglas, and one sister, Susan, all of Harold. Funeral rites were conducted at 1 p.m. Monday from the Boldman Free Will Baptist Church, and burial was made in the Gearheart family cemetery at Harold under direction of the Hall Brothers Funeral Home.

## DEWEY LAKE GETS MUSKIE

### Predatory Fish Added As Shad Control Hope; More Fertilizing Near

A new attempt to control the shad population of Dewey Lake through introduction of a predatory species to the impoundment was made last Friday when 25,000 muskellunge fry were released there by Bernard Carter, director of the division of fish, State Department of Fish & Wildlife Resources. The 10-day-old muskies will now account for a minnow a day. If they grow, their inroads into shad will take a toll of millions of shad a year, Carter said. Within four years the muskie may normally be expected to attain the 30-inch "keeper" size effective in Kentucky. (In Sunday's edition of The Courier-Journal appeared the last article written by the late Burt Munro, who was famous in Kentucky as a conservationist. Munro pointed out that running streams rather than lakes are conducive to muskie growth and that acid waters are the special bane of the species.) The Department of Fish & Wildlife Resources will renew its fertilization program of the lake, starting early next month, and population studies will be made in selected areas of the lake. The Floyd County Fish & Game Club recently approved continuance of the seining of rough fish in the lake by commercial fishermen under contract with the state. The Dewey Lake Fish & Game Club is slated to make its stand on the issue known within the next few days.

John J. Johnson, 84-year-old retired farmer and barber, of Mud Creek, died last Wednesday at a Huntington, W. Va. hospital after a long illness. ## Cable Held In Tackett Death Case

Brother of Victim Admits Hiding Gun, Says Threats Made When the body of 29-year-old Howard Tackett, of Toler Creek, was taken Monday morning to a Martin funeral home he was reported as having shot himself, but within two hours the death had developed into a murder case and a resident of that community was in jail here, charged with murder. Booked on the murder charge was Ballard Cable, 57. His examining trial has been set for Friday. Cable, his brother and William Tackett, a brother of the dead man, took the body to the Hall Brothers Funeral Home when it was found that the wounded man was dead on arrival at Our Lady of the Way hospital at Martin. All three, Commonwealth's Attorney Harold J. Stumbo and Sheriff Joe W. Lewis said, at first claimed the shot was self-inflicted. William Tackett, they said, was questioned about whereabouts of the .22-calibre pistol with which the man had been shot, and he told officials he had hidden the weapon behind a house. Asked why he did so, he said Cable told him to hide the gun. Next morning, however, Tackett signed a statement to the effect that he saw Cable shoot his brother. ## HILL WORKS WITH GROUPS

Planning Airfield, Site for Industry In Breathitt Co. John T. Hill, Prestonsburg engineer, has signed a contract to work with two Breathitt county groups in presenting to the Economic Development Administration improvement programs which, if approved, will involve the expenditure of an estimated \$1,500,000. One of the proposed projects is the development by the Breathitt County Industrial Development Foundation of a 36-acre industrial site similar to the Kenwood site in Johnson county. The other, to be undertaken by the Jackson-Breathitt County Airport Board, is construction of an airfield on the low ridge opposite the state highway garage, near Jackson. Phil Smith, Jackson banker, is chairman of both groups. The industrial site, which will cost an estimated \$742,000, will be located at Wolverine, about two miles downriver from Jackson. 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## Perkins Bill Seeks WPA-Type Plan

Washington, D. C.—Representative Carl D. Perkins has called upon Congress to pass a public works employment act to provide jobs for those who cannot find them through normal economic channels.

"This bill is aimed at the hard-core unemployed, those who through no fault of their own, cannot participate in the economic prosperity now being enjoyed by most of the nation," Perkins said.

"It is designed to meet the needs of those pockets of unemployment which unfortunately dot the American landscape—both in the rural areas and in the cities."

The Kentucky Congressman, chairman of the important House Committee on Education and Labor, said the bill embodies the best features of the old Works Progress Administration Act. He has long advocated a W.P.A.-type approach to attack hard-core unemployment.

The Perkins bill would provide for federal grants to states and local public bodies to construct a wide variety of "public works."

Except for professional supervisory and technical personnel, the people employed on these projects would have to be residents of the area unable to find other jobs.

The "public works" term was broadly defined to in-

clude construction, repair, remodeling or improvement of streets, roads, bridges, parks, hospitals, physical education facilities, recreation facilities, libraries, police and fire protection facilities, and other public installations and facilities.

The "public works" undertaken under the Perkins act would be limited to those that would not be started in the community without Federal assistance.

The Congressman pointed out that in his own area of Eastern Kentucky, millions of dollars worth of public facilities remain unbuilt, unmaintained and unrepaired simply because the local communities do not have the money to undertake them.

The facilities are needed not only for the convenience of the people, but to encourage industrial development and achieve normal economic growth of the communities, Perkins said.

At the same time, thousands of people in these communities are unemployed because they do not have the training or the skills demanded by the private sector of the economy.

A combination of the need for public facilities and the availability of manpower would solve many of the nation's unemployment problems, Perkins said.

Dr. Stepp is now teaching at Georgetown College, and next year will be a member of the faculty of the University of Houston, Houston, Texas. He is a graduate of Prestonsburg high school.

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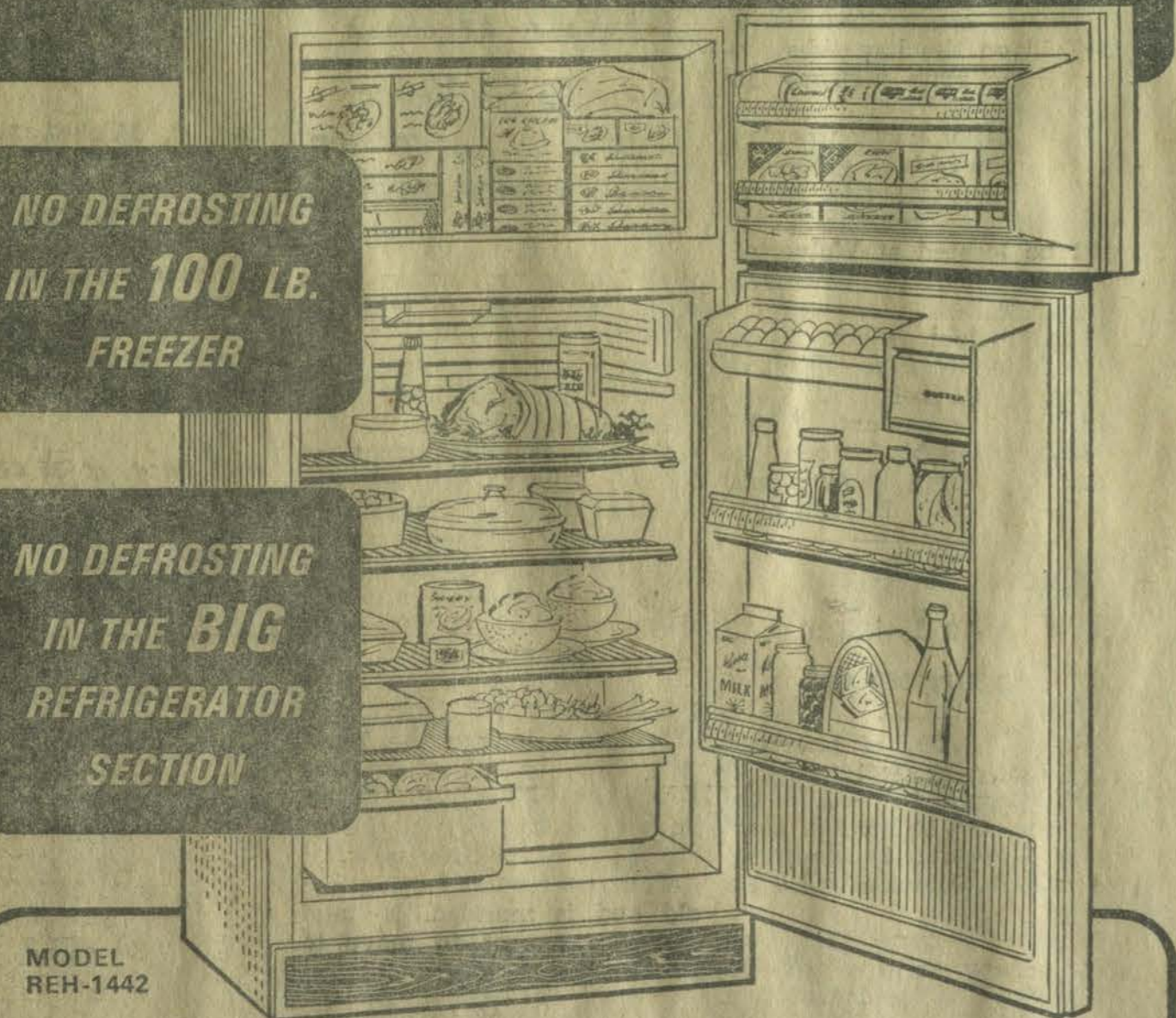

Soil Stewardship Week began last Sunday and will end next. I am not over-fond of "weeks," as such, but this matter of conservation and stewardship of resources is so important that I gladly observe this week after my peculiar fashion.

the shooting, and admitted he was afraid of Cable. He was quoted as adding that Cable's brother was present, also, and that there wasn't anything he could do about it.

(A resident of the community, whom officials declined to identify, was quoted as saying the witness saw Cable fire and saw Tackett pitch forward outside the car parked at the scene, a short distance up Toler Creek.

The accused man, officers said, claimed all he knew of the matter was that William Tackett called for him and that he went from his home with his brother to the scene to give help.

The Cables also were quoted as saying they did not know Tackett was shot until they arrived at the funeral home. Tackett was shot in the chest, the bullet ranging down and lodging low in his back.

Sheriff Lewis said the two men had had trouble earlier, that Tackett had procured a warrant for Cable's arrest last fall and that the two later had had a fight.

Others involved in the investigation of the shooting were Coroner James J. Carter, County Judge Henry Stumbo, State Trooper Elmo Allen, Claude A. Flanery and Deputy Sheriff John Reed.

The victim was a son of Callie Robinson Tackett, of Harold, and the late Sallie Tackett. 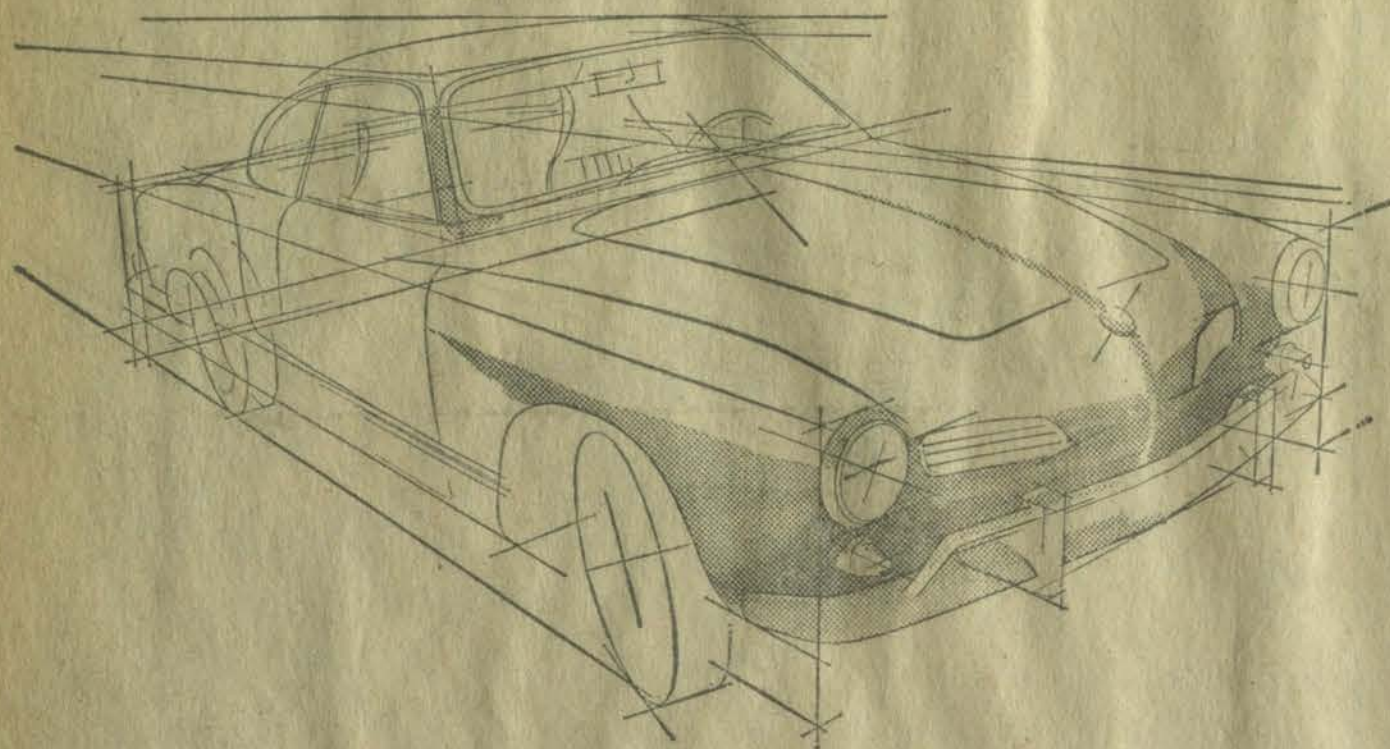

### There's The Indian—Remember Him?

Employment figures, released a few days ago, showed that the percentage of Americans, white and black, who are at work is higher than ever before.

Unemployment among whites had fallen to 3 percent; among Negroes, to 6 percent.

Negro leaders immediately protested that they were being discriminated against because their low unemployment rate was twice that of the whites. Which possibly is understandable, if you take time to reflect that there are a greater number of Negroes who for lack of education or training are unfitted for modern-day employment. You can go on back of that and protest that if these Negroes had had equal opportunity they would be ready for employment, but that belabors an issue with which the national government is at last grappling in earnest.

If the reader will return to the first paragraph of this editorial, he or she will note that only two colors of skin were mentioned. Those high employment figures do not apply to the American Indian.

And, if you want to think about justice and human problems, really, you'll wonder why the Indian isn't marching, demanding, looting and going through all the protest violence that is a part of the national scene, these days. You may also wonder why Civil Rights leaders and those whose hearts bleed for the oppressed are so silent about the plight of the redman.

This is not to minimize the injustices suffered by the Negro race. They are a mark against Christian America that is midnight black. But why this lack of concern for the only native Americans in the whole lot of us?

The Indian protested mightily when his land was taken from him, and we called it war, responding to his action with all the instruments of war we had. The Indian lost, and he has been losing ever since.

His unemployment rate is not to be compared with that of the white race—it's twice that of the Negro. Open housing for the Indian?—many of his people are restricted to reservations in the bleakest sort of natural settings. Education?—for many the Indian child there is no public school, only private schools at which he must reside if he is to get an education, there to remain nine months a year without seeing his parents.

The American Indian is called lazy, ambitionless. These people are parasite-ridden, robbed of vitality by malnutrition, a dying race because its weakened people are ravaged by tuberculosis, diabetes and other diseases.

It might interest big-hearted America to know that the suicide rate among these native Americans is six times that of the white race. Despair is taking a ghastly toll.

Equal rights for all Americans—we subscribe to that doctrine, and we have the conviction that the peaceful, the meek, those who suffer in silence, should inherit as well as the politically powerful and highly vocal whites and blacks that belabor America.

## PRISONER REHABILITATION PROMISING, SAYS HOWARD

Frankfort — A comprehensive rehabilitation program for the convicted criminal, initiated by the Kentucky Department of Corrections a year ago, is now beginning to show "some positive" results, according to former Floyd countian, Bill Howard.

Correction officials say it is too early to assess the impact of the program on the 300 law violators involved in it, but cite "exceptional" examples they believe show "something of the program's potential."

One example is a parolee of the Kentucky State Reformatory at LaGrange, who this month will complete his first year in college, studying to be a math major and a school teacher.

"He gained our confidence through several phases of our program at the Reformatory and showed he was an exceptional prisoner, with a lot of motivation," said Mr. Howard, educational officer of the Corrections Department and coordinator of the rehabilitation program. "We enrolled him in college, paying his tuition and board and purchased his books. He has proved to be a good student," he added.

Another example of how well a good rehabilitation program is expected to work is shown by a parolee at an "honor" (forestry) camp in Bell county, Howard said. He has developed an avid interest in nature, particularly snakes which he has furnished to some professors for study at the University of Kentucky and Eastern Kentucky University.

Howard said the parolee, vouched for his professor friends, has enrolled at the University of Kentucky through the rehabilitation program.

The rehabilitation program, called "Restore," will not produce many examples such as shown, Howard said, since it will deal with a large number of mentally retarded, other mental deficiencies and mental deviations, but they can be trained and returned to society as productive, useful citizens.

"In fact, vocational training is the core of our training program," Howard said. "It is about the only training most inmates in the program can be expected to accomplish."

Vocational training is so important to the program, Howard noted, two of the four supporting agencies in Restore are State Department of Education's Bureau of Vocational Rehabilitation and its Bureau of Vocational Educational.

Other supporting agencies are Job Placement Services of the Department of Economic

Security and the Division of Probation and Parole of the Department of Corrections.

The program, aimed mostly toward the youthful offender, is in its first phase at the Reformatory, but is to be extended to the Kentucky Penitentiary at Eddyville and the Correctional Institute for Women at Pewee Valley.

Essentially, it consists of three steps: (1) Restore and improve the inmate mentally and physically; (2) train him, and (3) find him a job and help him to become adjusted to society.

The first step will be accomplished, Howard said, through use of general medicine, special and diagnostic service, and special counseling by psychologists and social workers.

Howard said the program furnishes any appliance, such as artificial arms and limbs, dentures and arch supports which may be required by the handicapped.

The inmate, if selected for training, will be tested and guided in one of a half dozen or so study areas available at the institution. This includes the Reformatory's vocational school, which is under the Jeffersonstown Area Vocational School. It soon is to be expanded into additional quarters, offering new training programs in drafting, business and office machine repair, and radio and T. V. repair.

Training now is offered in welding, auto mechanics, auto body repair, carpentry, printing electricity.

Other training facilities include the prison industries, where the inmate may learn to operate a machine press, and on the prison farm, where several study areas such as horticulture, meat cutting, greenhouse management and ornamental landscaping are also supervised by the area vocational school.

Job Placement and the Division of Probation and Parole take over when the inmate

finishes training and is released from prison. Job Placement places him in a job and, if necessary, finds him a place to live and obtain what tools may be required on his job. A parole officer provides supervision.

Though a prisoner may officially be released from the program, "he may return to our services, with medical services included, if he needs us," Howard said.

Such a multi-phase program, Howard said, can only be accomplished through inter-agency cooperation. It is a popular concept of penal reform but Kentucky is one of a few states which are utilizing this approach so extensively, he said.

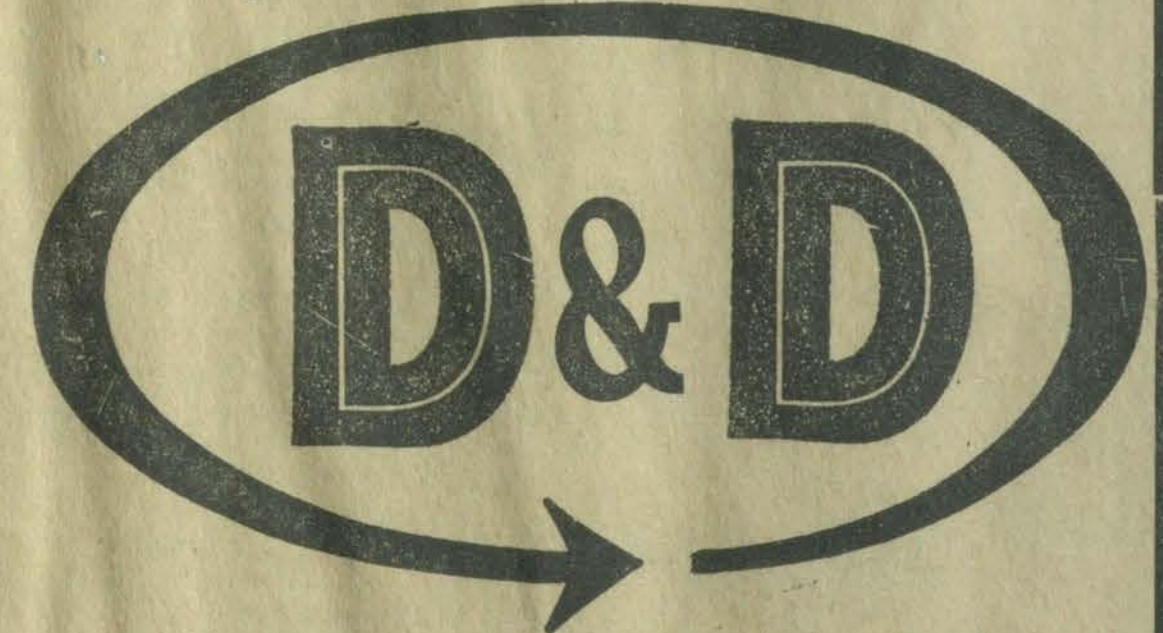

## Pike and Martin Wells Planned by United Fuel

Searching for natural gas, which was started by the company when it was organized in 1903, is being continued this year by United Fuel Gas Company in West Virginia and in Pike and Martin counties, Kentucky.

Jams S. Phillips, president, said United Fuel will spend \$2,749,200 to develop gas reserves in the two states. West Virginia's share of the program will be \$2,344,100 and Kentucky's \$405,100. In all, the company will complete 45 wells.

All of the wells will be drilled in areas of known gas production.

The West Virginia counties in which the drilling program will be conducted are Kanawha, Lincoln, Mingo, Wayne, Logan, Putnam, Clay and Preston.

A few of the wells have already been completed. In addition to its drilling program, United Fuel will lay approximately 50 miles of field lines to gather the gas produced by the wells. Most of the lines will be four, six, eight or 10 inches in diameter. They will cost approximately \$1,749,000.

Mr. Phillips said that until 1944 United Fuel obtained all of its natural gas from the Appalachian area. Since then, the volume of local production has been maintained at a relatively even level. Increased demand for gas has caused this production to represent a continually declining percentage of the total volume needed by the company.

United Fuel has 3,939 producing gas wells. "These wells and the gas purchased from local producers' wells," Phillips said, "provide United Fuel and its affiliates with about 14 percent of the gas they need."

"The other 86 percent is purchased by United Fuel from Southwest suppliers."

Thanks to two new production fields near United Fuel's headquarters in Charleston, W. Va., United Fuel sold more locally produced gas last year than it has in any year since 1944. The total locally produced and purchased gas for 1967 was 98 billion cubic feet.

One of the fields, Kanawha Forest, came into importance in 1964 when drillers found large volumes of gas in the Newburg formation. United Fuel has five

wells in the forest and it also purchases gas from other producers. A second line is being constructed to take additional gas from the forest.

The second field and the one generating the most excitement in West Virginia today, is Rocky Fork in Kanawha and Putnam counties. The field is approximately six miles northwest of Charleston. At the beginning of March this field was supplying the company with 166 million cubic feet a day. Discovered in 1966, Rocky Fork is a highly competitive field. More than 60 wells have already been drilled and new ones are being completed at a rate of about two a week.

More than 15 billion cubic feet of gas has been produced in Rocky Fork since it was discovered.

Lee Howell, 85, of Harold, died on May 8th at the Methodist hospital, Pikeville, after a long illness.

He was born May 1, 1883 in Floyd county, a son of Jeff and Valerie Clark Howell, and was twice married—first to Mary Ann Justice, and following her death, to Mousie Dye, who survives.

Additional survivors are four sons, Clifton and Robert Howell, both of Harold, Lowell Howell, of Hammond, Ind., and Doug Howell, of Gary, Ind.; two daughters, Miss Jewell Howell, of Harold, and Mrs. Anna May Mesker, of Scottsville, Ky.; a brother, Charles Howell, of Pikeville; 16 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.

Funeral rites were held May 11th at 11:00 a.m., at the Rock school house on Toler Creek, with Bill Ford and R. B. Clark officiating. Burial was made in the Howell and Roberts cemetery on Toler Creek under direction of the Baker Funeral Home.

**Community Colleges  
Get Increase in Funds**

The University of Kentucky Community College System will receive the largest percentage increase in funds of any UK agency, a look at the budget approved at the May meeting of the UK Board of Trustees discloses.

The addition of Paducah, Hazard and Maysville to the community college family made necessary the jump from \$3.4 million during the current fiscal year to \$5.1 million for the year beginning July 1.

The total University budget for the coming year will be \$83.7 million, of which approximately 44 percent will come from sources other than taxes. The remaining 56 percent was appropriated by the 1968 General Assembly.

The new figure is approximately \$10 million more than was allocated for the current fiscal year.

The additional expenditures approved by the UK board will enable the University to expand its faculty by 100 on the Lexington campus and by 131 teachers in the Community College System.

Additionally, the University will establish several new programs, including the School of Natural Resources, a Department of Planning in the School of Architecture, a new Department of Higher and Adult Edu-

cation in the College of Education, and several graduate division programs.

Funded in the budget but not yet established is a School of Social Welfare.

The budget also provides for 488 more fulltime students on the Lexington campus. An increase of 2,404 students is expected in the community colleges for a total there of 6,783. The additional students at Lexington will bring the enrollment on that campus to more than 15,000.

A breakdown of appropriations for the community colleges, including Jefferson Community College, which is beginning its first full year of operations, notes the following figures.

Prestonsburg, \$374,951; Ashland, \$463,882; Elizabethtown, \$418,935; Ft. Knox, \$60,564; Hazard, \$184,250; Henderson, \$348,168; Hopkinsville, \$274,489; Jefferson, \$803,233; Lexington Technical Institute, \$131,536; Maysville, \$229,600; Northern at Covington, \$550,508; Paducah, \$611,525; Somerset, \$322,674; Southeast at Cumberland, \$270,143.

The remainder, \$315,899, is appropriated for administration and student health programs.

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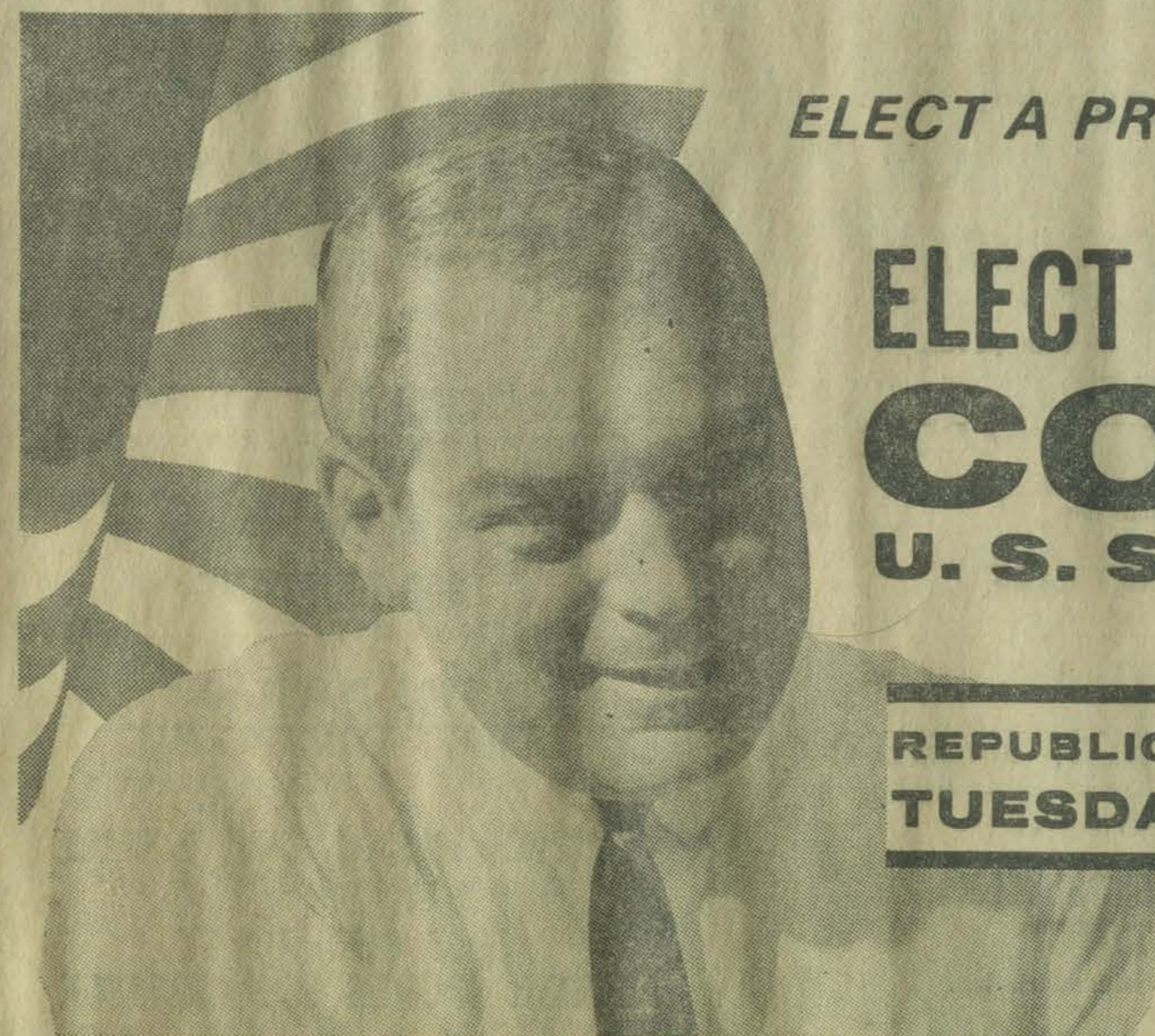

## I Say What I Think

Frankfort, Ky. — The natives are restless in the hierarchy of the Democratic Party in Kentucky. But this isn't the first time the leaders have spat at one another during a primary.

Foster Ockerman, one of his party's top contenders for nomination to the U. S. Senate, has called upon his old friend Gov. Edward T. Breathitt to resign his party leadership post because Breathitt is supporting Katherine Peden during the primary.

Ockerman also has accused Breathitt and Peden jointly with defeating Henry Ward for the governorship in the last general election because Miss Peden had all but formally announced that she would oppose Frank Albert Stubblefield for Congress in the First District.

Repeated efforts were made during the fall campaign to get Miss Peden to make a formal statement that she would not oppose Stubblefield, but no such statement ever came. This is why Ockerman is saying that she and Breathitt helped to defeat Ward.

Strange as it may seem, Ockerman and Breathitt have been close political allies ever since they served in the House together when A. B. Chandler was governor last. They were among the rebel leaders to oppose Chandler in most of his legislative program in the 1956 session and Ockerman carried through in the 1958 session.

They worked together in support of Gov. Bert T. Combs, and then Ockerman followed as primary campaign manager for Breathitt in his primary in 1963 and again in the 1963 general election.

For this service, Ockerman was rewarded by being chief legislative assistant to Breathitt, when Breathitt was governor. Ockerman also was named chairman of the Democratic State Central Executive Committee as a reward for his efforts.

When Breathitt gave the nod to Highway Commissioner Henry Ward that administration support would be behind him for the Democratic nomination for governor in 1967, Ockerman fol-

## HICKS NEARS COMPLETION OF PLAN FOR HIS FARM IN MIDDLE CR. PROJECT

Donald Hicks, of West Prestonsburg, has completed installing 800 feet of 5-inch tile drainage on his Middle creek farm. This is another practice applied on the Hicks' farm under the Middle Creek project of the Appalachian Land Stabilization Conservation Program. The tile system was laid by hand and provides adequate drainage to three acres of pasture.

Last summer, Hicks cleared 36 acres of land, seeded 50 acres of pasture, constructed a farm pond and installed a tank for livestock water. His plan calls for about 720 rods of fence to be constructed and when this practice is done the conservation and development plan for this farm will be completed.

The farm pond was built for livestock watering purposes, but it has also been stocked with fish by the Kentucky

Department of Fish and Wildlife. Assistance with the Conservation and Development plan was provided by the USDA-Soil Conservation Service. Cost-sharing assistance was provided by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The Middle Creek project was approved in 1966 and approximately \$93,000 has been allocated for this 12,000 acre project area to date.

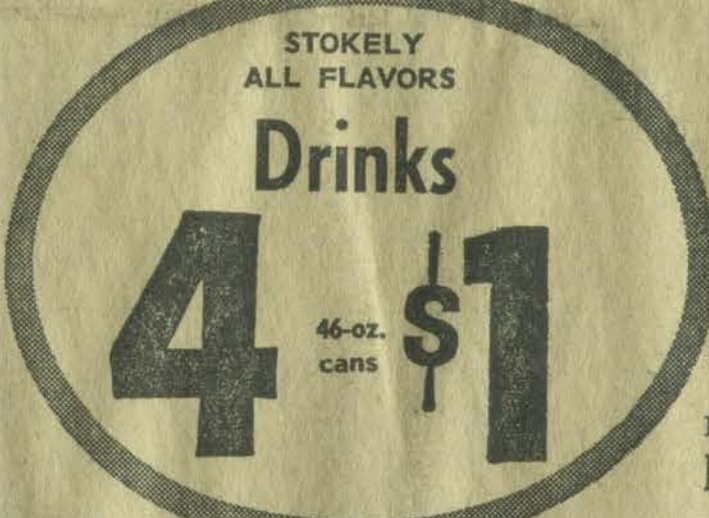

Frankfort, Ky. — Interest and life is being breathed into the U. S. Senate campaign in the state by candidates in both parties, and particularly from the Democratic side.

**ORDINANCE**  
No. 5-68

An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, Closing Fifth Street in the Dingus and Layne Addition to Lancer, Kentucky, and Authorizing the Institution of the Necessary Legal Proceedings To Effect This Purpose.

WHEREAS, there is existing in the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, in the Dingus and Layne Addition to Lancer, a street designated on the plat as Fifth Street, running between U. S. Highway 23 and the Big Sandy River a distance of 380 feet, more or less, and

WHEREAS, the above described street is not now in use and has not been used by the general public for many years and the closing thereof will not damage or interfere with the general public, or any of the adjoining or abutting property owners, and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the City Council to permanently close said street and surrender it to the use and occupancy of the adjoining property owners, their heirs, successors and assigns, subject only to the right of the City of Prestonsburg to ingress and egress on said street for the purpose of laying, removing, altering or maintaining city utilities.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, hereby enacts and ordains as follows:

SECTION 1. That the street designated as Fifth Street in the Dingus and Layne Addition to Lancer, Kentucky, as shown on the plat in the Floyd County Court Clerk's Office, designated Men No. 54, be and the same is hereby permanently closed and said property surrendered to the use and occupancy of the adjoining land owners, their heirs, successors and assigns, subject only to the right of the City of Prestonsburg to ingress and egress on said street for the purpose of laying, removing, altering or maintaining city utilities.

SECTION 2. That Clifford B. Latta is hereby designated Special Attorney for the City of Prestonsburg and is authorized and directed to take whatever legal action is necessary to carry out the purpose and intent of this ordinance, including the filing of a suit in the Floyd Circuit Court, the most of which, including attorney fees, is to be borne solely by the adjoining property owners affected hereby.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall become effective as of the date of its enactment, execution and publication as required by law.

The new note in the campaign this week is that John Young Brown, of Lexington, has opened state headquarters in Louisville and has said he is launching a vigorous campaign. He apparently has strong backing in many quarters, but most important is the fact that Brown and his son, John Young, Jr., have the money to finance it. There is no problem on this score for him.

The big problem for Brown and the other two major candidates in the Democratic primary is that they—Ted Osborne and Foster Ockerman—are all from Lexington and must face the hazard of splitting this strong Central Kentucky base.

One note indicates that Ockerman's campaign isn't limping along on discarded crutches. A \$25-a-plate dinner, billed as "Foster Ockerman for United States Senator Dinner," is scheduled at the Phoenix Hotel in Lexington. Any candidate who can come up with a dinner of this calibre and price certainly must be considered in the running.

Osborne also is touring the state and must be considered in the running.

The one advantage Brown would seem to have over his fellow Lexingtonians is that he has had the advantage of labor support in his past political campaigns and his name is a familiar one to Kentuckians.

Brown has said that he is going to stage a spirited campaign until the May 23 primary date, using all advertising media generously.

On the Republican side, where former Congressman Eugene Siler and Jefferson County Judge Marlow Cook are seeking their party's nomination, the contest seems to have narrowed down to which can come out of his own stronghold with the greatest number of votes.

Siler has the predominately Republican Fifth district as his base while Cook's home base is Jefferson county. In the November gubernatorial vote, the Fifth district polled 87,832 Republicans while Jefferson county chalked up only 54,299 for Nunn. Thus, indications are that Siler may have the edge.

Gov. Nunn has told newsmen that he "could see no circumstance" in which he would oppose Siler; however, he has given no indication openly that he is throwing his governorship strength into the primary campaign.

Have you heard the one about the good brother who told about the biggest funeral he ever attended? Went something like this:  
"Biggest fun'al ever was around heah," said Wash. "It was Mose Crindle's. All dem lodges and societies what Mose belong to was out in dey full regallium. Dey had four choruses to sing de hymns, and dey had three preachers to preach de summons. Den dey had a band and a long peerade all de way to de graveyahd, and more flowers dan you ever see, piled up

around de grave. Dey put dat coffin on dem sticks across de grave—and den dat Mose Crindle did de blamedest thing you eveh seen at a fun'al."  
"What did he do?" someone asked.  
"He des kicked de lid off dat coffin and set right up straight and locked at de crowd!"  
"My goodness, did they bury him?" they asked again.  
"De Lawd knows—I don't!"  
And then there is the one about the old Negro preacher who was standing by the grave of a departed brother who had gaily traveled forbidden paths. Sorrowfully gazing into the yawning abyss, he said—"Farewell, brudder, we hopes you've gone where we 'spects you ain't."

Nobody can do that but us. Every man preaches his own funeral as he lives, and, regardless of what the preacher says as we wait to be lowered, he cannot change anything about us.

We thought it rather strange that Rev. High should preach his funeral in the manner in which he did. We would have liked to heard what he had to say. But, regardless of what he did say, it was not his funeral sermon. He had already preached that as he lived.

Have you ever wondered about how your funeral will be? I have. Guess we all have thought about how many people will be there (they won't have room to seat them all at our funeral, will they?) Guess we have thought about how sad the people will be and we have probably thought about what the preacher will say, also. Doesn't really matter what he says because we have already said it much more eloquently than he can.

We have said it every day that we have lived.

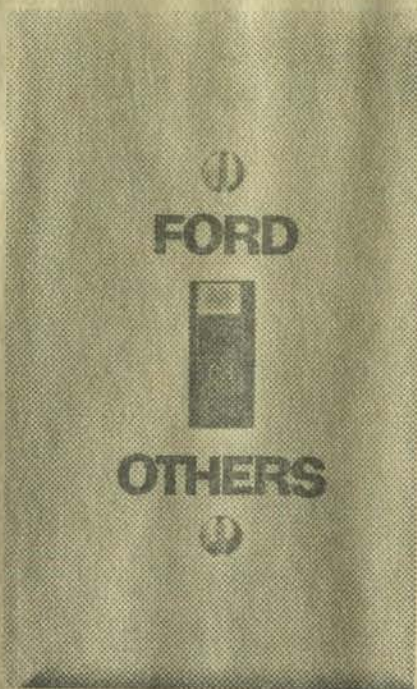
