COURT ASKS CREEK WORK

Project Would Extend Right Beaver Clearing; Bridge Repair Sought

A recent Floyd fiscal court resolution calls on the U. S. Corps of Engineers to initiate another snagging and clearing project on Right Beaver Creek which would be an extension of an earlier work completed on the stream.

The project would begin 550 feet downstream from the KY 80 bridge at Midas and extend upstream a distance of 11,600 feet to the old KY 7 bridge at Bosco. The first snagging and clearing job done in the county with federal funds began at Wayland and extended downstream to Bosco.

The court agreed to procure easements and rights of entry for the work and to keep safe the U. S. government against any damages which might result.

The court at its meeting last week requested the Kentucky Department of Highways to enter into a supplemental agreement with the county to floor and repair the bridge across the Big Sandy at Knottley Hollow. The span is heavily used. (See Story No. 7, Page 4)

Charlie Bradshaw, head football coach at the University of Kentucky, was added this week to the list of top UK leaders who will meet at the Prestonsburg Community College next Thursday evening with university alumni and friends from an eight-county area of Eastern Kentucky.

The Thursday meeting will coincide with the annual summer workshop of the Alumni Association's board of directors which will bring together 40 or more alumni leaders from various parts of Kentucky and the nation at Jenny Wiley State Park for their annual planning sessions. The group will remain at the park for Friday and Saturday sessions.

Paul C. Combs, chairman of the meeting scheduled at the

college, listed among those who will attend these UK administrators: Dr. Glenwood Creech, vice-president for University Relations; Dr. Alvin Morris, assistant vice-president for the UK Medical Center; Dr. Paul Nagel, dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, and Dr. Stanley Wall, associate dean of the Community College system. Adolph Rupp, UK's famed basketball coach, may also attend.

The meeting will center on these themes: "Your Questions About UK." Parents of students who will be applying for admission to the University next fall will find the meeting helpful, Mr. Combs said, urging not only alumni but all who are interested in the university and its community colleges to attend.

FERTILIZING IS RESUMED

At Lake for 2nd Year As Eight Tons Added; Weather Cuts Visits

Dewey Lake got its second annual fertilizing Tuesday when personnel of the Department of Fish & Wildlife Resources, assisted by U. S. Corps of Engineers employees, added 16,700 pounds of fertilizer to the impoundment.

First addition of fertilizer at the lake was made last year, and fishermen claimed a marked improvement in fishing during the fall months. This year's distribution of fertilizer, made from a point near Terry's boat dock to Copperas Creek in the upper section of the impoundment, was made as a continuation of the experiment.

Dewey is the first major Kentucky impoundment to undergo a widespread fertilization program.

The lake has returned to its normal stage after a three-foot rise resulting when the gates of the dam were closed May 28 to cut down the flow of water into the flood-threatened Ohio River valley. (See Story No. 6, Page 4)

JOHNSON BID LOW ON JOB

Garrett Firm Gets Contract To Build Sector in Lawrence

The Johnson Construction Co., of Garrett, has been awarded the contract for construction of 4.26 miles of US 23 in Lawrence county.

The bid of the Floyd firm was \$998,000, lowest among nine bids submitted on the US 23 sector which is a part of the Appalachian Program planned for Eastern Kentucky.

Bituminous surfacing of 2.3 miles of the Branham's Creek road in Knott county will be done by the Adams Construction Co., Pikeville, which submitted the low bid of \$25,940.

No Floyd county road work was included in this letting. Work will be done on the US 23 lettings when 9.5 miles of Appalachian highway (US 23) in Johnson county and 4.8 miles in Lawrence are scheduled to be let to contract.

Senator Kennedy Dies Of Assassin's Bullet

Senator Robert F. Kennedy this morning (Thursday) became the second member of his tragedy-ridden family to die of an assassin's bullet.

The Senator was shot at the Ambassador hotel in Los Angeles, early Wednesday, a few minutes after speaking at a celebration of his victory in the

California Presidential preference primary. An Arab refugee from Jordan was arrested as the gunman.

President Johnson has declared Sunday a day of national mourning.

Five other persons were wounded by shots fired from the Jordanian's .22-calibre pistol. (See Story No. 3, Page 4)

'Old' Eastern Kentucky To Live Again at Fest

The Eastern Kentucky of generations ago — how its people dressed and found expression and entertainment in dance and music — will be portrayed as the heritage of the region at the Kentucky Highlands Folk Festival which will be held at the amphitheatre in Jenny Wiley State Park, June 21-23.

The festival, which was organized four years ago and is being sponsored by the Jenny Wiley Drama Association, "is fast growing and attaining the potential to build a storehouse of our rich heritage of folk music and dances," said Mrs. Edith F. James, festival director, here this week.

Schools have for some weeks been rehearsing pupils in American dances, and choruses have been formed to present folk music of European background.

A special feature of the festival will be the appearance of the Hindman Settlement Dancers, directed by Raymond McLain. They will be assisted by the DeCoy Community Dancers led by Lionel Duff.

The Saturday evening (June 22) program will consist of the music and dances indigenous to Appalachia. Music handed down from generation to generation will be rendered by singers, banjo-pickers, fiddlers and others.

The Sunday afternoon program, which will be free, will be devoted to religious music. A rhythmic choir, one of two to be found in all Kentucky, will dramatize the earliest form of worship.

This will be followed by a boys choir from the Prestonsburg elementary school, demonstrating early chants arranged by Pope Gregory. A church group singing chants as still heard in the hills will follow, and the program will close with the singing of modern hymns by participants and audiences.

ARREST BAN IS DISSOLVED

But Judge Directs Martin Defendant's Arrest by Trooper

The temporary injunction which he granted May 22 forbidding Martin Policeman A. J. Reed to arrest Clyde Hogsted on a shooting without wounding charge or Police Judge D. M. Hutchinson, of Martin, to have jurisdiction in the case was dismissed Monday by Circuit Judge Hollie Conley.

But the order dismissing the injunction also directed that Hogsted's arrest be made by State Trooper Michael Angell, in open court at the Monday session set for a hearing of the motion to dissolve the injunction. This Angell did.

No testimony was heard prior to Judge Conley's order.

The temporary injunction was granted on Hogsted's petition, claiming Hogsted feared for his safety and had already placed himself in the jurisdiction of the Floyd quarterly court by causing a warrant to be issued for himself and executing bond.

Hogsted, a merchant at Martin, was accused of firing several shots at Reed on the night of May 17.

KEA Says Floyd Teachers Paid Above State Level

Teachers in the Floyd county school system received during the school year now ending the highest salaries paid by any county in Eastern Kentucky, except Boyd, and drew above the state average, according to figures released by the Education News Service of the Kentucky Education Association.

Salaries listed by counties pertained, mainly, to teachers in the upper three ranks—Rank I (those with a master's degree, plus 30 hours' graduate work); Rank II (teachers with a master's) and Rank III (those with a four-year college degree or its equivalent).

Most counties, including Floyd also had teachers in ranks IV (non-degree, with 96 to 128 hours' college work), V (non-degree, with 64-95 semester hours), VI and VII. No state money was received for pay of teachers below Rank V.

Even heart-of-the-Bluegrass Bourbon county was lower on its minimum salaries to the top three ranks than was Floyd. Madison, home of Eastern Kentucky State University, was lower in its salary schedule. Rowan, home of Morehead State University, had no teachers in Rank I and its salary schedule for the other two top ranks was lower than this county's.

The salary ranges for the year in the top three ranks follow by counties of the area:

FLOYD: Rank I—\$5,455 minimum, \$6,460 maximum; Rank II—\$5,155 and \$5,160; Rank III—\$4,855 and \$5,860.

PIKE: Rank I—\$5,350 and \$6,350; Rank II—\$5,100 and \$6,100; Rank III—\$4,810 and \$5,860.

JOHNSON: Rank I—\$5,700 and \$6,200; Rank II—\$5,250 and \$5,900; Rank III—\$4,950 and \$5,600.

KNOTT: Rank I—\$5,450 and \$6,200; Rank II—\$5,150 and \$6,000; Rank III—\$4,850 and \$5,700.

Sutherland is now engaged in reopening the Sycamore mining operation, near Williamson.

could expect to earn in a local school system during the 1967-'68 school year ranged from \$6,200 to \$9,592.

A new Kentucky Education Association (KEA) research division bulletin entitled "Salary Schedules of Kentucky Public-School Districts, 1967-'68" shows the \$6,200 top maximum was scheduled for Rank I teachers in 42 of the state's 199 school districts while the \$9,592 top maximum was scheduled in only two districts — Louisville and Jefferson county.

Rank I teachers are those with a master's degree plus 30 approved college-credit hours beyond the master's. The \$6,200 top maximum could be reached in all but one of the systems — Kenton county, where it took 12 years. In both Louisville and Jefferson county it took 15 years of experience to reach the Rank I top maximum.

In addition to Knott county the systems paying the \$6,200 top maximum were the county systems of Adair, Bracken, Breathitt, Calloway, Carlisle, Casey, Cumberland, Fulton, Graves, Grayson, Green, Hancock, Hart, Jackson, Johnson, Knox, Laurel, Leslie, Magoffin, Marshall, Mercer, Morgan, Owsley, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Russell, Todd, Trigg, Webster, Whitley and Wolfe and the independent systems of Augusta, Benton, Berea, Dawson Springs, Fulton, Irvine, Jackson, Pineville, Richmond and Science Hill. Some systems listed no Rank I salary schedules if they had no Rank I teachers.

The majority of Kentucky's public-school classroom teachers are in Rank III, which means they have a bachelor's degree.

For Rank III teachers at the maximum level of experience, the KEA research bulletin pointed out, the highest salary scheduled ranged from \$5,600 in 40 school systems to \$8,938 in two school systems—Louisville and Jefferson county. In the latter two systems it took 15 years of experience to reach the Rank III maximum, compared with 10 years in the systems paying the \$5,600 top maximum.

The 40 systems paying the \$5,600 top maximum for Rank III teachers were the county systems of Adair, Breathitt, Calloway, Carlisle, Casey, Cumberland, Elliott, Fulton, Graves, Grayson, Green, Hancock, Hart, Jackson, Johnson, Knox, Laurel, Leslie, Magoffin, Marshall, Menifee, Mercer, Morgan, Owsley, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Russell, Todd, Trigg, Whitley and Wolfe and the independent systems of Augusta, Benton, Dawson Springs, East Bernstadt, Ferguson, Fulton, Jackson, Pineville, Richmond and Science Hill.

Top maximum salaries scheduled for Rank II teachers (those with a master's degree) ranged from \$5,900 in 41 school systems, where the maximum could be reached in 10 years, to \$9,374 in two school systems—Louisville and Jefferson county, where it took 15 years to reach the maximum.

The 41 systems paying the \$5,900 top maximum for Rank II teachers were the county systems of Adair, Breathitt, Calloway, Carlisle, Casey, Cumberland, Elliott, Fulton, Graves, Grayson, Green, Hancock, Hart, Jackson, Johnson, Knox, Laurel, Leslie, Magoffin, Marshall, Menifee, Mercer, Owsley, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Russell, Todd, Trigg, Whitley and Wolfe and the independent systems of Augusta, Benton, Berea, Dawson Springs, East Bernstadt, Ferguson, Fulton, Jackson, Pineville, Richmond and Science Hill.

Minimum Rank I salaries scheduled—for teachers with little or no experience—ranged from \$5,150 in Jackson county to \$6,322 in Louisville and Jefferson county. The independent system with the lowest Rank I minimum was Harrodsburg, with \$5,396.

Minimum salaries scheduled for Rank III ranged from Webster county's \$4,725 to Beechwood's \$6,400. Murray and Van Lear had the lowest Rank III minimum—\$4,800—for independent systems. Highest Rank III minimum for county systems was Jefferson county's, \$5,450.

Minimum Rank II salaries ranged from \$5,000 in Mercer county to \$6,511 in Beechwood, Falmouth and Van Lear had the lowest Rank II minimum—\$5,100—for independent systems. Highest Rank II minimum for county systems was Jefferson county's \$5,886.

Dean Murray, dam manager, Corps of Engineers, said bad weather last month cut into the number of visitors at the lake. The total was 145,000, as compared with 149,110 for May, 1967.

He said that measurable rainfall was recorded at the dam on 18 of the 31 days in May, with a total accumulation of 4.88 inches, but that the total for May of the preceding year was 6.52 inches. Rain fell last year with less regularity and the weather generally was better.

Two areas for camping and picnicking have been prepared by the Corps of Engineers along the lake—one, opposite Terry's boat dock, the other between Arrowhead Point and Stratton Branch. The areas are mowed twice weekly and refuse is moved, one day a week. Mr. Murray said development of other similar areas may be made later. He said cooperation of campers and picnickers is needed and especially asked that tables provided these two areas not be taken elsewhere along the lake.

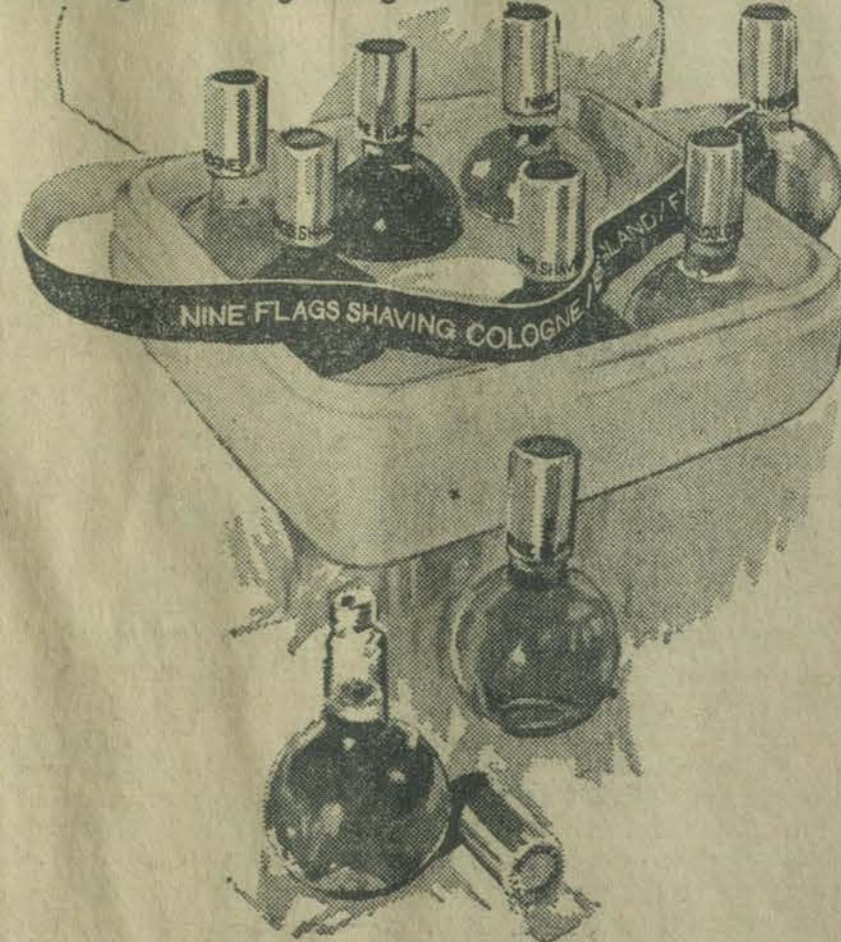

**Roberts Nearer 'Home'
In New Teaching Post**

Dr. Thomas H. Johns, president of Pikeville College, has announced the appointment of Dr. Leonard Roberts, Mrs. Barbara McGinty, and John Kaman to the University of Kentucky for the 1968-69 academic year.

Dr. Roberts was selected as professor of English and acting chairman of the Division of Humanities at the college.

He is a native of Toler Creek. His first six school years were spent in a one-room school. He then spent two years at Pikeville city schools. He started high school at Betsy Layne but stopped to go into military service. Upon his return to civilian life he entered Pikeville high and finished in two years and a summer. He then entered Berea College and was awarded his A.B. degree there.

Dr. Roberts was then hired by Jackson city schools to organize a band and teach English. After a year there he then went to Brevard Junior College. After two years he resigned and continued his education at the State University of Iowa, earning his master's degree in English. In the midst of World War II he left Iowa to teach in the Navy V-12 program at the University of North Carolina. His studies continued there until he took a fulltime job with an Army pro-

gram in the State College at Raleigh. After teaching five more years and collecting folklore during this time, he enrolled at the University of Kentucky for his Ph.D. degree in English and folklore.

Since then, he has had published five books, 43 folktales and many articles on Kentucky folklore.

After finishing his Ph.D. he went to Georgia to head the English department at Piedmont College. From 1954-1958 he was chairman of the Division of Languages and head of the English department, Union College, Barbourville, Ky. He held the same title at Morehead State College from 1958 to 1960. He has been at West Virginia Wesleyan until the present, serving as division chairman and department chairman, has served as president of the West Virginia Folklore Society, West Virginia Association of College English Teachers, and as vice-president of the National Folk Festival Association, Washington, D. C.

Dr. Roberts is married to the former Edith Reynolds who was graduated from Pikeville College in 1937.

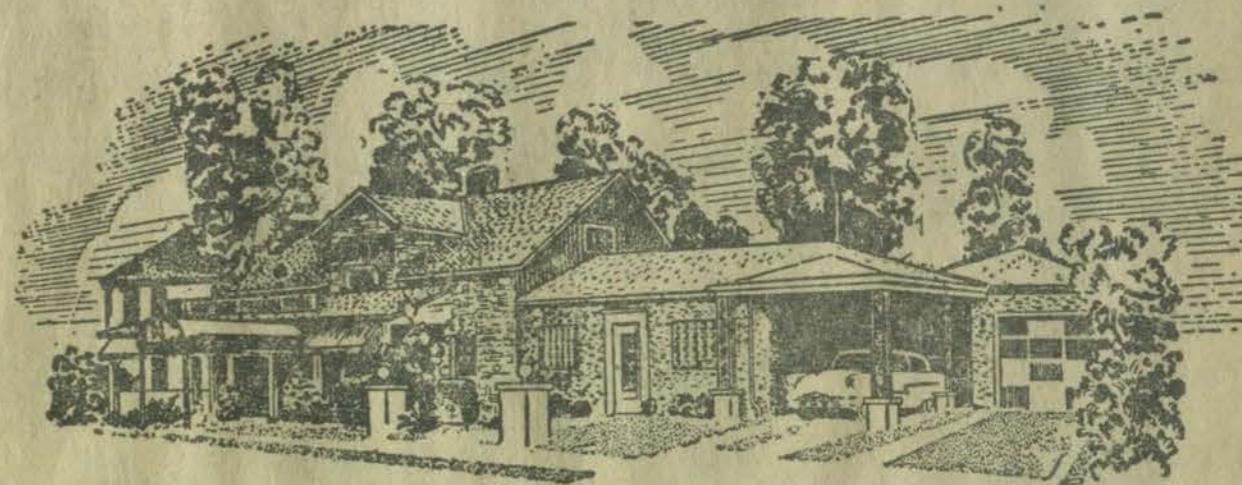

Passed and approved at a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Martin, Kentucky, on March 2, 1968.



Wins NSF Appointment



Woodrow Allen, principal of Prestonsburg high school, has been notified that a student at the school, John David Preston, has been selected to participate in the National Science Foundation's Summer Linguistics Institute to be held at Northern Arizona University, Flagstaff, Arizona, from June 10 through August 2.

This is the first known program of its kind in the United States. Competition for participation was particularly keen, with only 30 being selected out of over 500 requests for participation.

The program is designed to introduce talented high school students to linguistic science, and to stimulate in them a desire to pursue further scientific study. The student is a son of Mr. and Mrs. John F. Preston, of Allen.

Check Evergreens now, Advises County Agent

Those spindle-shaped bags hanging from evergreens or deciduous trees and shrubs in your lawn mean the bagworm is causing trouble.

These bags contain small caterpillars with big appetites. The bagworm can do serious damage to the plants on which they feed; evergreens, in particular, may be killed by bagworm infestation.

Bagworms pass the winter in the egg stage inside the bag that contained the females last year. In late May or early June, the eggs hatch, and the naked larvae crawl from the bag in search of food. By using silk and bits of leaves, bark, or twigs, the caterpillar soon starts building its bag. It carries the bag around, sticking its head out to feed and enlarging the bag as it grows.

Two control methods are recommended. If only a few bagworms are present and within reach, the best and cheapest method of control is to hand pick the bags and destroy them. This can be done in the fall, winter, or whenever they are noticed.

The second method involves using a spray when the eggs hatch and caterpillars are seen. The best control results are obtained when they are small—in June or July. Sevin (50 percent wettable powder) and Chlordane (40 percent wettable powder) are two materials that can be used at the rate of two tablespoons per gallon of water. Malathion (liquid emulsion concentrate) is also suitable when used at the rate of one tablespoon per gallon of water and sprayed thoroughly on the plant.

Check your shrubs closely—if you have questions related to your shrubs or lawn care, you can receive answers and advice by phoning 886-2668—the Floyd County Extension Office.

Arnett, 7 Others Receive Scholarship Fund Loans For Study of Medicine

The board of trustees of the Rural Kentucky Medical Scholarship Fund approved loans for eight first-year medical students at the annual May meeting, according to Dr. C. C. Howard, Glasgow, board chairman. Five recipients plan to attend U. of L. and three will enter U. of K.

Four of the 1968-69 loan recipients have agreed to practice in counties listed as "critically in need of physicians." Under this plan, a student may borrow up to \$2,500 per year by contracting to practice in either a "critical" county or in the Kentucky Public Health Service in an approved area. One year's loan is waived for each year of such practice. The four students are Roger D. Akers, Lexington; Charles F. Arnett, Prestonsburg; Stanley G. Clemons, Lexington; and Herbert Cool, Jr., Sidney, Kentucky.

Recipients of regular first-year loans are Larry S. Atkinson, Falmouth; Ronald M. Johnson, Utica; Allen M. Jones, Louisville; and Marilyn Pack, River, Kentucky. Under this plan, they may practice in over 90 counties and borrow up to \$1,500 a year at the rate of two percent to maturity. If they later decide to practice in a "critical" county, one year's loan will be forgiven for each year of practice. One-half year's loan will be forgiven for each year of practice in a semi-critical area.

The 10 "critical" counties

selected for 1968-69 on the basis of information supplied by the Kentucky Medical Association and the State Board of Health are Jackson, Knott, Crittenden, Metcalfe, Powell, Meade, McCreary, Wolfe, Rockcastle and Magoffin.

Semi-critical areas selected are Carter-Lewis, Todd, Breathitt, Martin, Butler-Edmonson, Clinton-Cumberland, Estill, Clay, Owen-Gallatin, and Pendleton-Bracken-Robertson.

Twenty-two renewal applications of upper classmen were also approved at the board meeting. The total amount of all loans approved amounted to \$60,500.

As an incentive to physicians entering practice for the first time, the fund will lend them \$2,000, forgiving \$500 per year in a critical county and \$250 per year in a semi-critical area. Dr. Howard said that the board is particularly appreciative of the interest and support of Gov. Louie B. Nunn, Health Commissioner Russell E. Teague, and the Kentucky General Assembly.

Household Work Subject To Tax

Householders employing persons to work about their homes in such capacities as cooks, maids, baby sitters, gardeners, handymen, housekeepers, etc., are required to report earnings for these employees if the employer pays the worker as much as \$50 in cash during a calendar quarter, such as April through June, July through September, as well as to pay the social security tax.

The type of work is referred to as domestic service. The report of earnings and the tax are to be sent to the District Director of Internal Revenue. The present tax rate is 4.4 percent of the employee's earnings, plus the like amount paid by the employer.

For example, suppose that the householder employs a maid one day a week and pays the maid \$4.00 per day. In a 13-week quarter this could be more than the minimum of \$50 for the quarter. In this case the householder is required by law to report the earnings and pay the tax—4.4 percent of the employee's earnings, plus an additional 4.4 percent from the employer—a total of 8.8 percent.

The method of reporting is simple. The employer sends the employee's name and social security number with the proper amount of tax to the Director of Internal Revenue for the area in which the employers lives. The Internal Revenue Service furnishes an envelope for this purpose.

If the employer reports for other types of employees such as those that he may employ in his business, he may include domestic employees with this type of reporting and he should designate such employees with an "H" after their names.

Householders who report only domestic employees should request form OASI-21, "Social Security and Your Household Employee" from the nearest social security office.
