Use of seat belts can reduce the severity of injuries sustained by hundreds of thousands of persons and can prevent more than 5,500 traffic deaths every year, according to the U.S. Public Health Service.

Because accidents rank fourth as a cause of death in the United States, and because traffic accidents cause about onehalf of these accidental deaths, the U. S. Public Health Service, American Medical Association and many other public health agencies are emphasizing the importance of seat belts.

On the state level, the Kentucky Medical Association recently established an award to be presented to any organization in Kentucky that achieves 100 percent seat belt installation in all passenger vehicles operated by members or employ-
