There were two questions to be answered: Had the dog exhibited the signs and symptoms of rabies and should they wait before starting the rabies treatment? In the doctor's mind was the vision of the untold suffering the child; the sensitivity to light and air, the constant restlessness, the ever-present drooling from the mouth, the convulsions and spasms and finally the inevitable death. On the other hand, the treatment was extremely painful, and it took so long to complete. Then there were the two families to think of; the Joneses, who may lose their child, and the Smith family; feeling of responsibility for the possible death of the child.

What if this happened to your child or pet? Would you have mother, or the family in this story? This dog had shown the symptoms of Hydrophobia, but the doctor was unaware of all the circumstances; he was not aware of the sullenness of the dog, the refusal of food and the sudden reversal of the dog's attitude and temperment. He had administered the necessary first aid and given the required tetanus booster. If the exact time of the death of the dog could have been established, the head could have been cut off, packed in ice and sent to the State Health Department laboratory for tests to determine if rabies were present. However, if 24 hours has gone by after death the tests are very difficult to run, and then are not very re-


