## Spending Cut May Hit Floyd Schools

### WET Fades But No Job Loss Seen

### Eastburn Says Jobs To Open; Woodwork Shop Set for County

The economy drive in Washington is not expected to leave idle the men now employed by, or already phased out of, the WET (Happy Pappy) program in Floyd county, contrary to recent daily newspaper reports, Harry Eastburn, director of the Big Sandy Area Community Action Program, said this week.

At the same time, however, County Superintendent Charles Clark expects Poverty Program cuts to effect the county's Title I funds 10 to 15%, which would mean a loss of between \$150,000 and \$200,000.

## HOPKINS DIES DURING VISIT

### Florida Newspaperman, Native of Prestonsburg, Heart Victim Tuesday

John Calvin Hopkins, 50, native of Prestonsburg and veteran Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. newspaperman, was found dead Wednesday morning at the Mt. Sterling home of a relative, Mrs. James Nesbitt, where he and his family were visiting.

Mr. Hopkins went, only a day before his passing, to Mt. Sterling from Prestonsburg, where he and Mrs. Hopkins visited relatives. A heart attack was blamed for his death.

He was the only child of the late John C. Hopkins, well-known Prestonsburg attorney, and Valentine Pierat Hopkins. Educated at Kentucky Military Institute and Centre College, he had been associated with the Ft. Lauderdale Herald about 25 years and also did public relations work in the area of politics.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Polly Hopkins, and one daughter, Penny. The body will be taken today (Thursday) to Ft. Lauderdale for burial.

## Gable Says Lease May Cost EDA Aid

The lease of the boat dock at Jenny Wiley State Park to Jenny Wiley Boat Docks, Inc., headed by Paul Martin, of Prestonsburg, was attacked last week by Parks Commissioner Robert Gable on the grounds that the state may lose \$346,200 in federal funds unless it can be renegotiated.

He claimed that the lease, executed in closing days of the Breathitt administration, includes land previously earmarked by the state for \$25,000 in new recreational facilities under an EDA grant to the park.

Gable admitted, however, that he had not yet conferred with EDA about the situation.

The land in contention is the old road way extending from the dock to the lakeside where a bridge formerly spanned Johns Creek. Gable says it is needed for tennis courts, shuffleboard courts, horseshoe pitching and similar recreational activities.

## Board OK's Plans For New Hi School

The Floyd County Board of Education moved a step nearer construction of the Right Beaver Creek high school at East-ern last Saturday when it approved preliminary plans for the proposed school and gymnasium. Bids may be asked within the next few months.

The plan as it now stands was developed by George Lee Shannon, architect, following discussions he and Supt. Charles Clark had with teachers and administrators, seeking a building that, above all, will be functional.

The unusual design has the library at the center of a group of "clusters" housing classrooms, departments and other functions of the school. The 2,000-seat gymnasium is to front on KY 80, and it will be separated from the main structure. At the front of the main building, it is planned, will be the auditorium and music department, then the lobby and administrative offices, the cafe-

teria, kitchen and lockers, and back of these 12 regular classrooms, plus the language, art, home economics, chemistry and physics, biology and general science departments. These classrooms and departments almost encircle the library to which entrance is provided from every side. Every unit of the building will be hexagonal.

The board of education asked the Floyd fiscal court to approve its general fund budget and recommended that the tax rate be unchanged from that of the preceding year. It granted an easement over its old Dick-eytown school grounds to the Prestonsburg Municipal Water & Gas System which will extend water service into that area, and leased as a garbage dump for use by the school a tract of land from John Ousley, on Buck's Branch, near Martin, for \$65 a year. Workmen's compensation insurance was renewed with the Hall-Music Insurance Agency here.

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## FORD VOIDS RENTAL PACT

### Acts in Nunn Absence To Cancel Contract For Road Equipment

Acting Gov. Wendell H. Ford last week issued an executive order canceling highway equipment rental contracts totaling \$91,600 between the Highway Department and G. B. Hall, Frankfort, formerly of this county.

Hall's wife, Ann, is an aide in the office of Highway Commissioner William B. Hazelrigg.

Ford, who had been acting governor since June 29, when Gov. Louie B. Nunn left Kentucky to attend the Midwest Governors Conference in Milwaukee, acted just an hour before Nunn landed at Frankfort Airport.

## COMBS DIES OF INJURIES

### Youth Hurt Friday In Maytown Mishap Dies at Lexington

Barron Spencer Combs, 19-year-old Lexington youth, died at 4:30 a.m., Saturday, at the University of Kentucky Medical Center, Lexington, of injuries received last Thursday evening when the motorcycle on which he was a passenger was struck by a truck at Langley.

Driver and owner of the motorcycle, Alex Gary Bailey, 20, and Kenneth Blevins, driver of the truck, both of Langley, were uninjured.

According to State Police the tragedy occurred as the motorcycle and truck were travelling west on KY 80 and Bailey, with Combs riding behind him, began to make a left turn into a driveway at the time the truck was attempting to pass him. The motorcycle was struck in the right rear.

Combs, the son of Carl Lamar and Marie Combs, both of Lexington, had been at Langley visiting his grandmother, Mrs. Octavia Combs.

Surviving, besides his parents, are three sisters, Phyllis and Karla Combs, and Mrs. Pamela Broham, all of Lexington.

Funeral rites were held Monday at 3 p.m. at the Milward Funeral Home at Lexington. Burial was made in the Lexington cemetery.

## 4th of July Week-End Draws Record Crowds

A near-record low temperature for July 4 held the number of visitors at Jenny Wiley State Park for the day slightly below last year's figure, but the 87,000 persons reported by the Corps of Engineers, Thursday through Sunday last week, was an all-time four-day record for the Dewey Lake area.

State park figures released by Jenny Wiley Park Manager S. R. Hatcher showed a higher total of visitors, but this resulted from a variance in the method of arriving at estimates. The Corps of Engineers makes a car count and figures three persons per car, while the Department of Parks bases its figures on 3.6 persons per car. Parks estimated the total for four days at almost 100,000.

Added to the throngs at Jenny Wiley were an estimated 15,000 persons at Archer Park here during July 4, enjoying the park pool, tennis courts, ball fields and playgrounds, and the day-ending fireworks display and dance.

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## UNION SETS STRIKE DATE

### Grievances Are Cited As Gas Workers Set August 18 Deadline

The Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company here has acknowledged receipt of a 60-day strike notice given June 18 after Local Union 3510, International Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers (AFL-CIO) had voted to strike because of alleged grievances.

Negotiations toward a settlement have not been initiated, however. The strike deadline is August 18.

Union grievances arose when the company cut off 17 men from jobs at its Dwsle compressor station, resulting in the elimination of two work classifications. James Lafferty, of Prestonsburg, president of the local union, said the contract between union and company gives the latter the right to reduce its work force but not to eliminate a work classification. He expressed the hope that "things can be worked out" during the time remaining before August 18.

Don Graves, of Jackson, who said he represented stockholders in that area, one of whom was a Kenwood director, announced at the stockholders' meeting Tuesday that he could provide Kenwood an offer of \$4,000 an acre for the entire tract. Board Chairman George Branham pointed out that the offer was not made at a very

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## Assessment Raise May Be 15-25%

### Officials To Protest Boost at Frankfort Hearing Next Week

Floyd county farms and residential property were threatened this week with a blanket assessment increase.

The Kentucky Department of Revenue Wednesday notified county officials that a 25 percent increase on farmland and residential rural-nonfarm property and a 15 percent raise on all other property classified as real estate, with the exception of oil right, are necessary to comply with provisions of the state constitution and law and to equalize the real estate assessment with that of other property in the county.

Any hope that the stiff assessment boosts may be avoided lies in the hearing scheduled at Frankfort next Thursday at 10 a.m. County Judge Henry Stumbo and County Attorney Barkley Sturgill promptly announced they and members of the fiscal court will vigorously protest any assessment increase. The hearing will be held in Room 414, Capitol Annex.

It was said that the blanket raise was proposed because Floyd county's farm and residential rural-nonfarm property assessment total is \$3,276,000 below that of last year.

Department of Revenue officials emphasized there can be no increase in the total property tax burden, because, as a result of the increase, the local tax rate for all taxpayers will be reduced. But this statement did not cover the plight of individual taxpayers.

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## \$90,000 Bond Set In 3 Auto Deaths

Examining trials of two Greenup county men named in three manslaughter warrants each after their auto had crashed into another near here, July 27, fatally injuring Mrs. Elder Wright and her two daughters, were continued last Friday when the defendants appeared before County Judge Henry Stumbo without counsel.

Judge Stumbo set the hearing for next Tuesday at 9 a.m., and set the bond of each at \$45,000—\$15,000 for each manslaughter count.

John Wilburn, 37, one of the men named in the deaths of Mrs. Maggie Flanery Wright, 54, and her daughters, Mrs. Brenda Wright Crum, 25, and Miss Teresa Wright, 16, indicated he would be able to employ an attorney. The other, Larry D. Howard, 28, pleaded his financial inability to pay a lawyer, and the court is now attempting to find counsel for him.

Both men took polygraph (lie detector) tests last week after Howard had changed his story and admitted that he was the driver of the death-car. Earlier, each had named the other as the driver. Witnesses were being interviewed this week, and their statements tended to

confirm the claim that Howard was the driver.

It was said that neither Wilburn nor Howard possessed a driver's license. If it is established, however, that Wilburn was not the driver, the only criminal action that can be taken against him will be on charges of drunkenness and permitting an intoxicated person to operate his car. Howard admitted in his statement last week that both he and Wilburn had been drinking.

The fatal crash took place at night on US 23, near the Plantation Motel. State Trooper Ison, who investigated the tragedy, said the Greenup county car apparently crossed into the left lane of the highway, in the path of the approaching Wright car, and travelled along the shoulder of the road before striking the other car, about midway its right side.

Miss Peggy Wright, 21, driver of the convertible in which her mother and sisters were passengers, was injured but has recovered.

Howard, who had only minor hurts, was jailed immediately. Wilburn was hospitalized here but was transferred to the hospital during the week-end of the wreck.

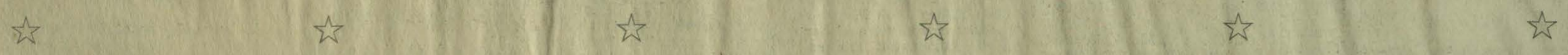

had specific opportunity to provide reason why (the contracts) should not be canceled (and) has not furnished any adequate reason . . .

Around 11 a.m. last Thursday, Ford had delivered by hand to Hazelrigg a letter saying it seemed plain to Ford that the contracts with Hall—executed in May—“are no bargain.”

“Since you no doubt looked into the matter at length before signing the contracts and have had opportunity for further research during the past two months, will you please advise me before 2 o'clock today whether there is any reason why the contracts should not be canceled,” Ford's letter asked.

At 3:10 p.m., Ford issued his executive order canceling the contracts. He said he had received a telephone call from Hazelrigg's secretary shortly before the 2 p.m. deadline telling him a reply would be forthcoming “a few minutes late,” but no reply had been received by the deadline.

The plane returning Gov. Nunn to Kentucky, and restoring his full powers as governor, landed at Frankfort Airport about 4:15 p.m.

**Nature Trails**

By RUFUS M. REED

If there ever was a time in the history of mankind when we humans need to get out where we can think, meditate and get rid of the spite, hate and confusion that cloud our hearts; that time is now. The world's too restless, excitable, tense. Men's brains get hot and feverish in today's mad pace.

In the wilds of nature there is peace and relaxation. We have strayed too far from the calm pace and beauty of nature. She is our mother, friend, healer and teacher. But we rush on through life and fall to go to her often enough for inspiration and guidance.

We need to go to the wilds of nature and there relax and be healed and find ourselves and learn the true purpose and meaning of life. This mad race of humans is killing too many with high blood pressure, heart attacks, hypertension—all such are taking a heavy toll. It is well to recall the immortal words of Bryant in "Thanatopsis": "Go forth under the open sky and listen to nature's voice . . . She creeps into man's darker musings and steals away their sharpness ere he is aware."

One of the most restful things you can do is to walk into the green woods, lie down on some mossy, old log and look up through the canopy of trees and watch the leaves tremble and dance, and hear the soft voice of the wind. Far above the trees, you will catch a glimpse of the bright, blue sky and perhaps see little flocks of fleecy clouds sailing leisurely over like lambs grazing in a meadow. Touch a green, silky leaf and feel its texture, its smoothness, its marvelous structure; see its green chlorophyll for use in making starches and sugars, and you will know the leaf as a living, breathing thing, too great and marvelous for man, with all his scientific knowledge, to duplicate.

Pick up a handful of black, virgin soil and reflect upon it and what it is; feel it, smell it, meditate upon it and you will begin to feel that you are close to the source of life, that you hold in your hand the mystery of life; you will feel that you have found yourself in that handful of virgin soil—that it is your origin and keeper, and you will know when you touch virgin soil that you are very close to the mystery of life and the universe.

Peel off a slab of leaf-mold from the forest floor; study it, smell it! It has a dank, primordial smell; something elemental, old as time. It is the maker of the virgin soil that lies beneath it. It is a house of many mansions to multiplied millions of tiny creatures that live and thrive in it. Is it filled with bacteria, protozoa, centipedes, millipedes, beetles, ants, salamanders—a million other creatures!—which live in leaf mold. It is the blanket that warms the earth in winter and cools it in summer; it is the sponge that absorbs the moisture and holds it for use as needed.

Go far into the woods and sit on some old, mossy knoll beneath the spreading trees. Listen for the sounds of nature, for animals calling, for the singing of the birds and insects. As Charles A. Lindbergh wrote: "Myriad qualities of the forest weave and interweave to make you not only aware of things, but aware of your own awareness."

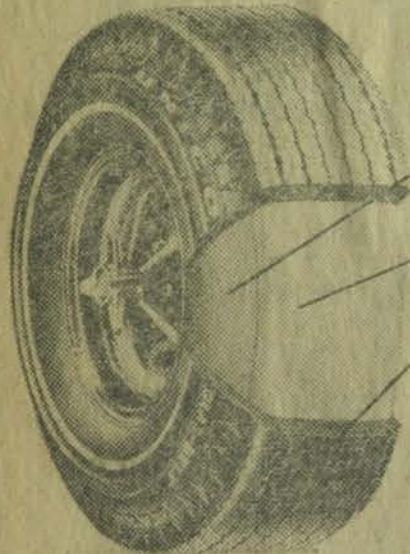

## SHARED-TIME PROGRAMS POSE LEGAL QUESTIONS

Frankfort, Ky. — The State Board of Education has been told guidelines for implementing shared-time programs between public and parochial schools have been delayed because of legal questions which need to be answered.

Supt. of Public Instruction Wendell Butler told the Board he will ask Atty. Gen. John B. Breckinridge, whose opinion last April apparently opened the door for shared-time programs, for rulings on the following five points:

1. Can public schools receive state aid credit for non-public school students enrolled in public schools for less than half the school day?
2. Would state aid credit be given a public school district for non-public school children who attend a state-operated vocational school on a shared-time basis?
3. Is it legal to use federal vocational education money to furnish transportation for non-public school pupils attending a

state-operated vocational school part-time?

4. It is legal for a teacher who is paid from public money to teach non-public school children in a non-public school?
5. Would non-public school transportation for a non-public system have to pay for bus school pupils who spend part of their day in public schools?

Butler said he hopes to have the rulings and a broad set of guidelines ready for the Board's consideration at its July meeting.

The shared-time program simply means a student may get part of his education in public schools at public expense and part from a parochial school.

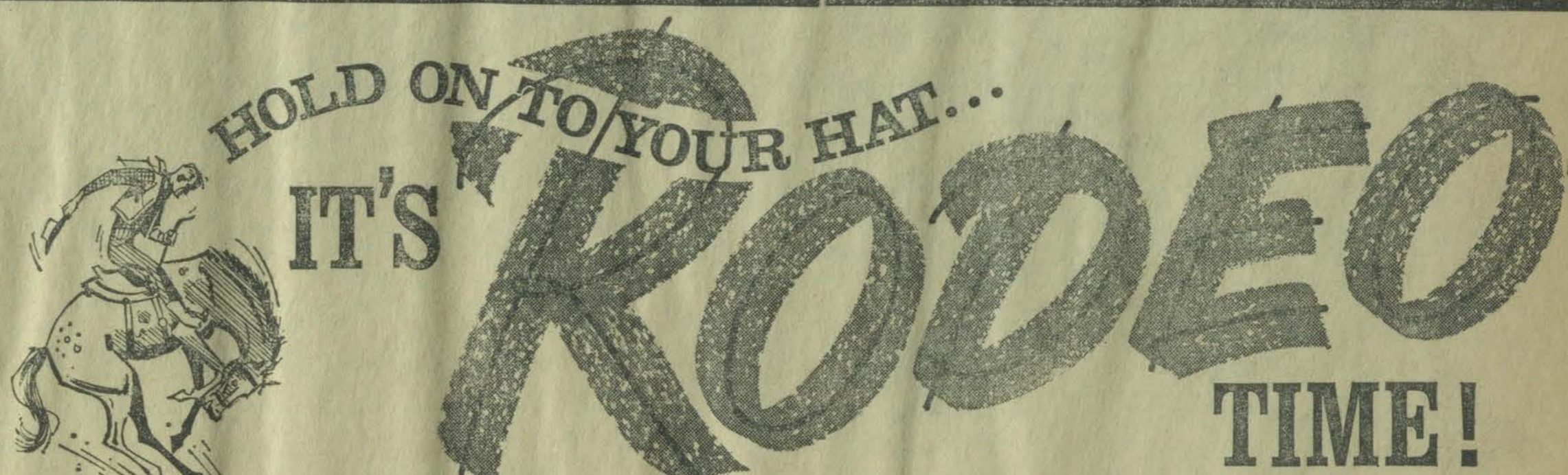

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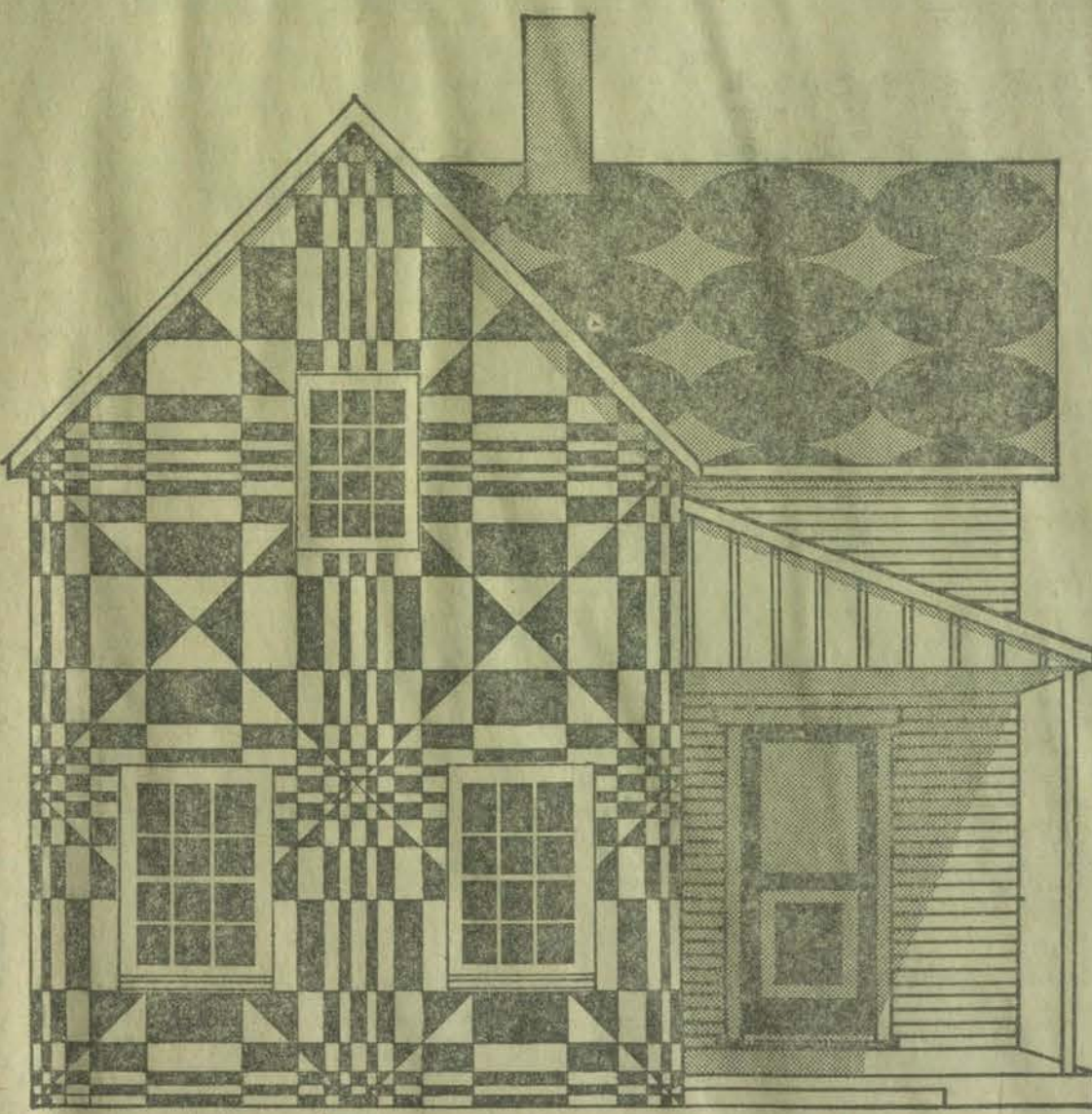
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### Nunn Names Stafford To Succeed Colvin On Vehicle Board

Frankfort, Ky. — Kentucky Auditor Clyde Conley said all 120 counties have been audited according to an annual schedule as Sunday, June 30, marked the end of the 1967-68 fiscal year.

Averaging 10 counties per month, 10 auditors researched the County Treasurer's records both for the benefit of the county and for the benefit of the state in assessing state fines and state taxes. Conley said some counties are audited in a period of three days; others, such as Jefferson county, require approximately two months.

In addition to the counties some state departments and agencies were also audited during the past fiscal year. Among those listed were: T. B. Commission, Department of Libraries, Department of Commerce, Department of Corrections, Aeronautics, Banking, Labor, Murray State University, Kentucky State College, and Western Kentucky University.

"All records were found to be in good order," Conley said.

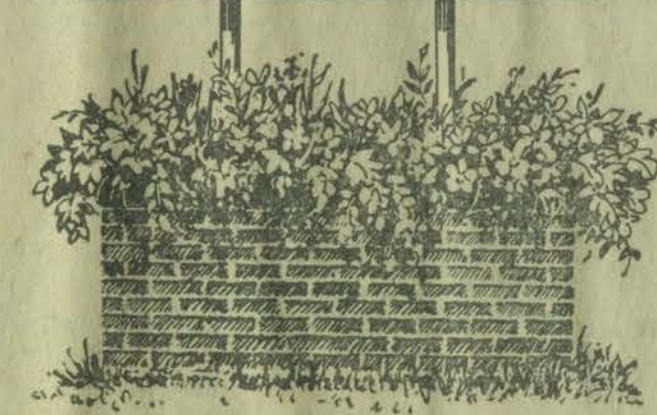
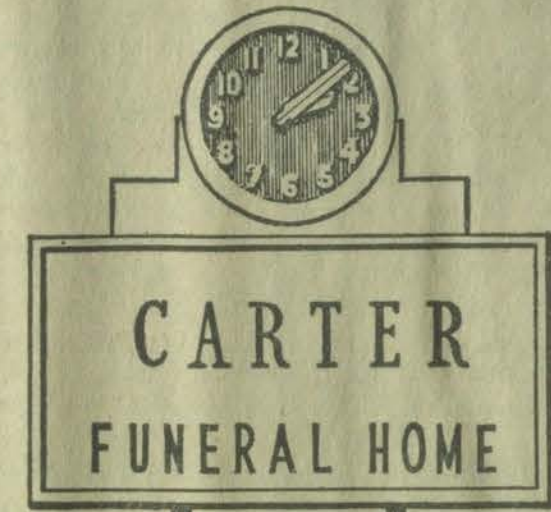

"Office practice and legal bibliography" is one of the courses taught in the University of Kentucky School of Library Science. The course is designed primarily for law students and is taught in the law school.

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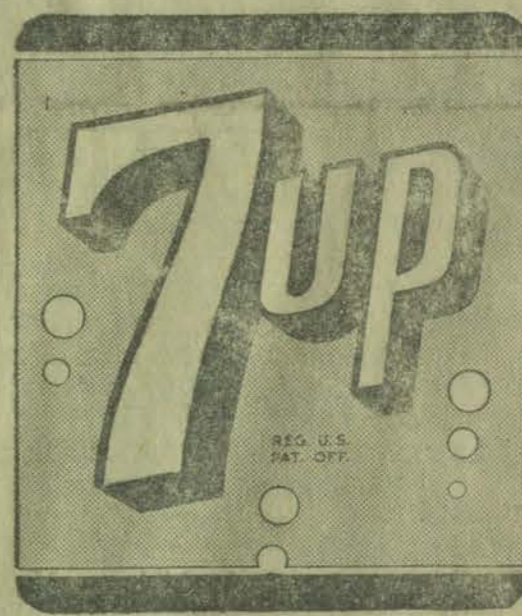

It's a two-way street because more people apparently recover from lightning bolts than are killed, and even seemingly dead victims often can be resuscitated, says Dr. Helen B. Taussig, of the Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore, Maryland.

"If you are with persons who have been struck by lightning, remember that those who are stunned but alive are not the ones who most urgently need help," she says.

"Such persons will probably soon recover. It is the man who is 'dead' who needs help. Artificial respiration may get him

breathing again and his heart going again." Dr. Taussig writes in the June issue of the Annals of Internal Medicine.

"When the heart starts," she adds, "continue artificial respiration until you get the man to the nearest hospital.

"He has traveled on one of the few two-way streets to Heaven. Although his trip to Heaven was fantastically short, and his trip back may take days or weeks, he may yet return to life and, what is more, the chances are that he will be uninjured by the trip."

Dr. Taussig, famed among other things for initiating "blue baby" heart surgery with the late Dr. Alfred Blalock, reviewed the medical literature on "death" from lightning after

instances in which friends had been struck.

Most of the medical reports concern spontaneous recovery, "and in strikingly few reports was any effort made to resuscitate the person who had been killed," she comments.

"Respect a severe thunderstorm," Dr. Taussig advises. "Don't take refuge under a tree; cast aside your fishing rod, your golf clubs, and even

your umbrella. Don't run, don't telephone, and don't go swimming.

"Just lie flat on the ground, but away from trees and poles. If you have a rubber raincoat, lie on it.

"If indoors, don't stand between an open door and an open window, as lightning may strike horizontally between the door and the window along a current of hot or moist air."
