## Howard Attorneys Plan Venue Change

### File Notice That Action Is Planned

#### Claim Wide Publicity, Family Relationship Bars to Fair Hearing

Joe P. Tackett and Paul E. Hayes, attorneys for Larry Howard, Greenup county charged with involuntary manslaughter in the auto deaths of three Floyd county women, served notice Wednesday that they will seek a change of venue when the case is called for trial, September 25.

Howard was accused in a single indictment in the deaths of Mrs. Elder Wright and her daughters, Mrs. Brenda Crum and Miss Teresa Wright.

The notice given Commonwealth's Attorney Harold Stumbo alleges that a fair and impartial trial cannot be had in the Floyd circuit court. Among the reasons cited in support of venue change were these:

The wide range of the Wright family relationship in Floyd county.

The unusual volume of radio and newspaper publicity given the case.

The erroneous listing by The Floyd County Times of Howard's bond at \$45,000 after it had been reduced to \$25,000.

The fact that Howard at first denied having driven the car which collided with that occupied by Mrs. Wright and her daughters but later admitted he was the driver.

Circuit Judge Hollie Conley will rule on the change of venue motion following a hearing. If a change is granted, the trial will be held in an adjoining county.

## Court Approves School Building Finance Plan

## Court Approves School Building Finance Plan

The bond issue is calculated to supply the county's share of the cost of the Right Beaver high school at Eastern, the Betsy Layne high school gymnasium and a six-room addition to the Stumbo elementary school at Grethel.

Charles A. Hirsch & Co., Cincinnati, and (or) Robert R. Meyer were designated fiscal agent for the sale of the bonds.

County Supt. Charles F. Clark said recently that the forthcoming bond issue will be the limit of the school system's bonding capacity for several years.

The Betsy Layne gym and Stumbo addition work are already under contract to Astor Meade, Prestonsburg contractor, on bids totalling \$576,150.

Contract on the school at Eastern is expected to be awarded in December. It must be awarded by February if the county board is to benefit from \$300,000 in Title I federal funds.

## 15 STUDENTS ARE INJURED

### School Bus, Auto Crash in Magoffin Tuesday Afternoon

Magoffin county barely escaped a tragic parallel of the Floyd county school bus tragedy Tuesday afternoon when one of its school buses loaded with about 75 pupils was sideswiped by an automobile at Maggard, 10 miles west of Salyersville.

Fifteen students were injured, but the most serious hurt was that of one who suffered a broken collarbone. Seven of the bus passengers were taken to Prestonsburg and Paintsville hospitals and eight were treated at the office of Dr. Hall in Salyersville. Most had cuts and bruises.

Fillmore Spriggs, of Magoffin county, driver of the auto which figured in the wreck, was listed in serious condition. He was transferred from a Paintsville hospital to Lexington, Woodrow Jenkins, 53, driver of the school bus, escaped with minor injuries.

State police were quoted as saying the Spriggs car rounded a blind curve in the path of the bus and when the driver sought to cut back into his lane, or to stop, his car skidded into the bus. The left wheel of the bus climbed the car, causing the bus to tilt over.

The bus landed on its top, near a 35-foot drop. With a seating capacity of 54, it had about 75 pupils from Salyersville high school and Millard-Hensley grade school aboard.

## RICE JAILED IN ISON CASE

### Johnson Sheriff Says Prisoner Confessed Cab Driver Slaying

The Johnson county sheriff's office told The Times Wednesday that George Darrel Rice, 19, who was arrested Tuesday, has confessed the murder of Richard Eugene Ison, 42, Louisa cab driver, whose body was found Sept. 7 in Johnson county.

Prie, a resident of Louisa but a former resident of the Johnson county neighborhood where Ison's body was found, was removed from the Johnson county jail later Tuesday and transferred to the Lawrence county jail. A jailbreak was staged at the Johnson jail, only a few days ago, and the move was interpreted as a security measure.

Johnson county Sheriff Preston said Ison had been shot in the back with a large caliber pistol—perhaps a .45—and apparently died almost instantly. Sheriff Preston theorized whoever shot the taxi driver might have shot through the back seat.

Commonwealth's Attorney Jack Lewis confirmed that robbery was considered the motive in the death, quoting friends of the victim as saying he usually carried \$300 to \$400 in cash.

Reportedly the victim had only five \$1 bills and some change on him when found.

Authorities had been seeking a young man, described as about 18 or 19 years old, who was seen getting into Ison's cab at his Louisa cab stand.

Witnesses said Ison and his passenger drove off, heading from Louisa toward Paintsville.

Ison was not seen again until his body was found about three hours later, authorities said.

## Fiscal Court Sets Lower Tax Rate

Although an appeal from the "blanket" increase made by the State Revenue Department is yet pending, the Floyd fiscal court this week adopted a new tax rate based on the assessment asked by the state.

If the blanket assessment boost stands, the figures on farm and residential rural non-farm property values would be raised 20% over the assessment totals as they stood at the end of the tax commissioner's work and adjustments by the tax supervisors this year. A raise of 10% would result on all other real estate, excluding oil rights.

Faced with the task of keeping the amount of taxes actually to be collected this year within the total of last year's taxes, the fiscal court and Ray R. Allen, county auditor, worked all day Monday to arrive at a rate designed to hold the 1968 taxes at last year's level.

## UNITED FUEL WORK BEGUN

### Ranier Has Contract On Line Replacement Over 3-County Area

Pipelines dating back as far as 1898 are being replaced by the United Fuel Gas Company in this and nearby counties at a cost of approximately \$600,000.

The Ranier Construction Company, Prestonsburg, is the general contractor on the replacement work which is expected to be completed by mid-December. The General Construction Co., Clendenin, W. Va., is subcontractor on a portion of the work.

The work includes replacement of 16-inch sections of line between Kermit, W. Va. and Inez, in Martin county, between Martin and Warco, and in the Van Lear vicinity. Work began this week on a two-mile section which was laid in the Warfield vicinity in 1915.

One sector of line, to be replaced, between Louisa and Inez, is said to have been laid in 1898.

Charley Johnson, 59-year-old carpenter, died at 5:20 p.m. Wednesday at his home at Melvin after a lingering illness.

A veteran of World War II, he was born March 30, 1909 in Floyd county, a son of the late Daniel R. and Sally Johnson. His wife, Mrs. Gracie Cole Johnson, survives.

Surviving, besides his widow, are three sons, Charley Johnson, Jr., of Michigan, Ralph Johnson, of Detroit, Mich., and Ernest Johnson, of Indiana; a stepson, Tommy Cole, of Melvin; two daughters, Mrs. Ruth Lewis, of Chicago, Ill., and Miss Opal Johnson, of Indiana; a brother, George Johnson, of Lewis county; three sisters, Mrs. Anner Owens, of Weeksburg, and Misses Ellen and Lucy Johnson, both of Wales, Kentucky. ## LAW IS NOT COLOR BLIND

### Moonshine Owner Pays Only a Fine; Rape Jury 'Hangs'

It's safer to deal in "white" liquor than "red"—if you can stay beyond the coils of the federal law. This was spelled out in circuit court here this week.

Bill Hall, who entered a plea of guilty to possessing "red liker" was fined \$20 and sentenced to jail for 30 days. Carl Jones, who was charged with possession of moonshine whiskey, stood trial and drew only a fine of \$50 — because Kentucky law just doesn't provide for any jail term for possessing the homespun brand.

At night trials were few during the week, another had its odd turn. The jury in the trial of Bobby Griffith on a rape charge returned a verdict of guilty, setting his pen term at two years. But when the verdict was read one juror announced that was not his verdict, that he wanted only to fine Griffith \$500. At this turn of events Circuit Judge Conley held that the jury was disagreed and directed retrial of the case. Date of the second trial was not fixed.

The involuntary manslaughter trial of Clyde Sword was docketed last Friday for Sept. 24 and that of Larry Howard for the following day.

Other convictions during the term: Willie Harris, petit larceny, plea of guilty, \$50 fine and 30 days in jail; William Edward Crace, drunk driving conviction in Prestonsburg police court appealed, failed to appear for trial, fined \$100.

The \$500 bond of Larry Newsome, charged with uttering a worthless check, was forfeited when he failed to appear for trial. Also forfeited was the bond of Kelso Newsome, who failed to appear on two grand larceny counts and another alleging knowingly receiving stolen property.

W. W. Burchett, attorney for the board of education, said dismissal was sought on several points, some of which were:

1. The plaintiffs ask for a mandatory injunction requiring immediate redistricting, but an injunction is valid only where there is no other adequate recourse at law. In this case, the board contends, there is other recourse.

2. The disparity in the number of voters in the several divisions is based by plaintiffs on voter-registration, which is obviously erroneous, and if the disparity is calculated on the basis of actual votes cast it would be less than five percent.

3. The Floyd case, based on the Murphy one-man, one-vote decision, differs from the federal case where there was no other adequate recourse at law. It is argued that in the case here there is recourse other than U. S. court.

An answer to the original complaint will be filed later.

## Bond Issue To Benefit 10 Schools

### Two Buildings Here Near Contract Stage At Cost of \$1,386,276

Of the \$11.6 million in building revenue bonds authorized Tuesday by the University of Kentucky's board of trustees for expansion projects at the state's 10 community colleges, \$1.7 million will go to the Prestonsburg Community College.

Total cost of projects at all 10 of the community colleges is estimated at \$19 million, but remainder of the cost above the bond issue will be covered by federal government Title I grants.

The amount allocated to the Prestonsburg college is more than enough to finance the construction of two buildings on which contractors' bids have already been received. The contracting firm of Akers & Akers, of Dana, was low bidder at \$1,386,276 on the two college structures here, and awarding of a contract is expected soon.

The Prestonsburg college work includes construction of a two-story academic building and a one-story student activities building, plus the renovation of the existing college structure to convert space into music studios, music practice rooms, a band room and the doubling of the size of the college library.

The academic building will include 24 offices, business education rooms, an art studio, an auditorium seating 235 persons, TV studios, home economics, and other classrooms. The student activities building will contain a book store, student work room, student lounge, snack bar, director's office and student government offices.

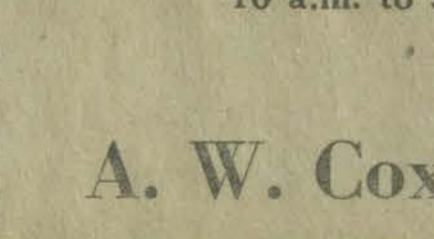
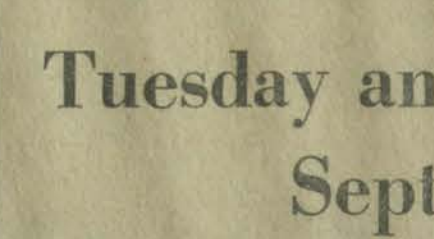
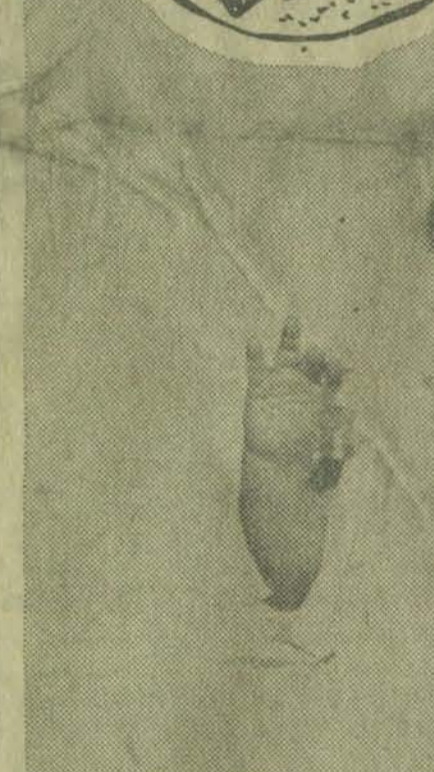

**BRIGHTON ENGINEERING WINS TOLL ROAD PACTS**

Frankfort, Ky.—Brighton Engineering Co. has a personal service contract with the Highway Department for \$350,000 as general consulting engineer on two planned toll roads.

It is the first new contract awarded to the firm headed by William H. May, of Frankfort, under the Republican administration of Gov. Louie B. Nunn, who criticized May during last year's gubernatorial campaign.

However, other contracts held by May during the previous Democratic administration have been continued or revised.

Brighton had the lion's share of consultant and engineering road contracts for the past eight years under Democrats. Nunn had implied he would change the situation.

A Highway Department spokesman said the state branch of the Society of Professional Engineers asked the governor to use Kentuckians as consultants on all four projected new toll roads. The roads will cost nearly \$400 million.

A "pretty thorough survey" was made of Kentucky engineers, he said, and "everyone came up with Brighton."

This is not quite literally true, but a perusal of questionnaires received indicates Brighton was first choice by far over the nearest competitor.

"Four companies in Kentucky could do the job," the highway informant said. "One didn't want it, the second bowed out in favor of Brighton and a third wanted the job and was pretty upset." One of the firms was identified.

The first project is the 73-mile section from Owensboro to Bowling Green and the second the 90-mile parkway from Bowling Green to Somerset.

The Highway Department in effect regards the two turnpikes, as yet unnamed, as one project for contract purposes, although it separated the fees for May into \$150,000 and \$200,000.

The engineering work will cover everything from recommending feasible routes to estimating construction costs.

Then, the Highway Department plans to divide engineering design work among other firms, after which Brighton is expected to pull the projects together and supervise design and construction—for additional fees.

The contracts call for fees of one-fourth of one percent of construction cost for the location

study phase. The \$350,000 total is based on that ratio.

However, if the cost estimate turns out to be higher than the one submitted to the Kentucky Turnpike Authority, Brighton will get more than \$350,000.

In fact, this is the likelihood. When the customary rate of three-fourths of one percent is added for design work and one percent is tacked on for construction supervision, the firm could get two percent of the cost of both turnpikes.

On the basis of the lowest estimate mentioned so far — \$140 million for both new toll roads, Brighton thus is assured of at least \$2.8 million.

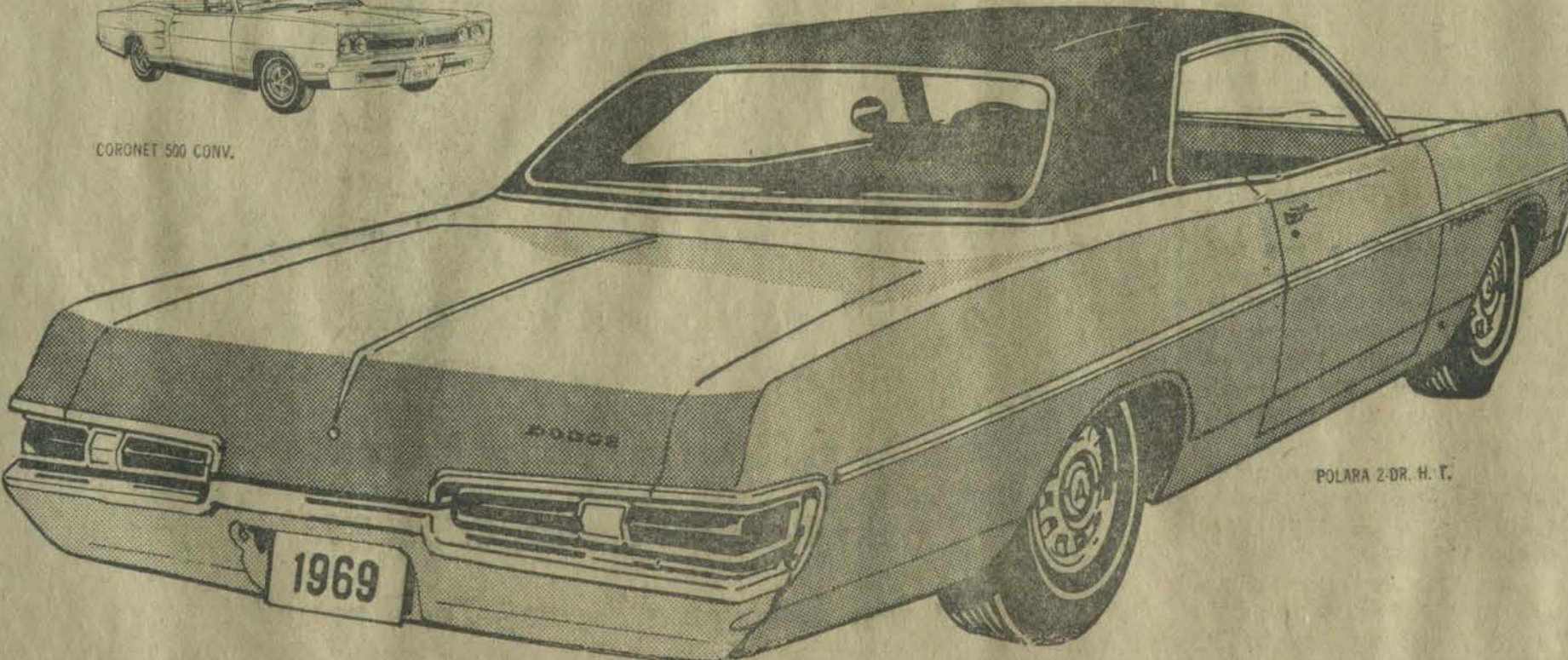

Cooperation among the agencies involved has reached a high level. The Community Action Programs in the area, along with the Kentucky State Employment Service, have done extensive outreach work to identify the people in need of training. Both these agencies are heavily involved in the actual training of the people. This has resulted in EKCEP, Community Action Programs, and Employment Service co-partners in this attack on long-term unemployment in Eastern Kentucky. It is this co-partner relationship that will be the key to EKCEP succeeding in accomplishing its goals, it is hoped.

# COMMISSIONER CLARK EXPLAINS ACTION ON NETS AND SIZE LIMITS

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 10 (Spl.) —Recent regulations governing the taking of commercial fish from specified bodies of water, which become effective on January 1, 1969, were designed to provide quality fishing and sustained fishing for commercial fishermen, Minor Clark, commissioner of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, explained today in a rundown of the recent action by the com-

mission. According to the action of the commission, the mesh size for trammel nets must not be smaller than four inches; for gill nets, not less than four inches, and not less than three inches for hoopnets and wing nets. This mesh size has been increased, as of January 1, so that commercial fishermen will take only the larger fish and will leave the smaller fish, for

which the price is lower, in the waters to grow into a desirable size as required by the fishermen market. The smaller size mesh for the nets caused the taking of a great many smaller fish and thereby lowered the market value of the fish, Bernard Carter, director of the Division of Fisheries, said. By invoking the new regulations, whereby only larger fish, perhaps of the five-pound

variety and upward, are taken, the poundage of fish harvested from Kentucky waters will increase tremendously in a few years over the present take. Another step being taken to assure sustained fishing is the suspension of the use of snaglines in all waters. The snagline, Director Carter stated, is designed to catch fish by snagging them on hooks dangling close together from a line similar to

a trotline. On the snagline there is no bait but swimming fish become entangled in the mass of hooks. Most fish so caught die. Since the line catches croppie, sauger, walleye, white bass and other species of game fish, and since the commercial fisherman is not allowed to sell these species, then a large number of these species caught by snaglines is wasted. That is one of the reasons, the commissioner

said, that the use of such lines has been suspended. Commenting on the minimum size limit of 10 inches for black bass from running water and 12 inches from impounded water, Commissioner Clark said this was done in an effort to bring about the harvest of bigger and better black bass throughout the state. He said that creel checks have shown that a great number of six- and

eight-inch size bass are being taken by the fishermen and that this is a waste of the black bass population. He pointed out that because these smaller fish have been taken from waters, the population of feeder fish, such as bluegill, have taken over in certain bodies of water. This is because the smaller bass are unable to control these feeder fish. "But if the bass are permitted to reach a greater size, then

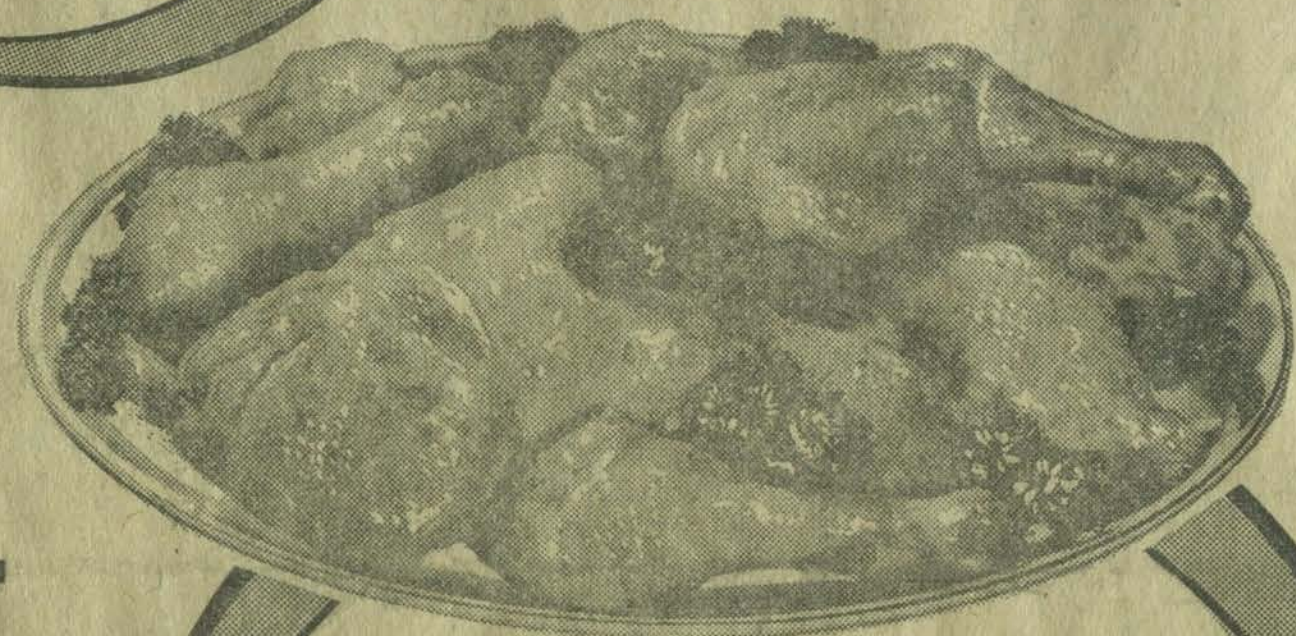
they will devour more of the forage fish and thereby prevent a population explosion which is a sure way to ruin fishing," the Commissioner said. All regulations that have been adopted by the Commission, Commissioner Clark said, are designed with but one purpose in mind—to improve fishing, both sport and commercial.

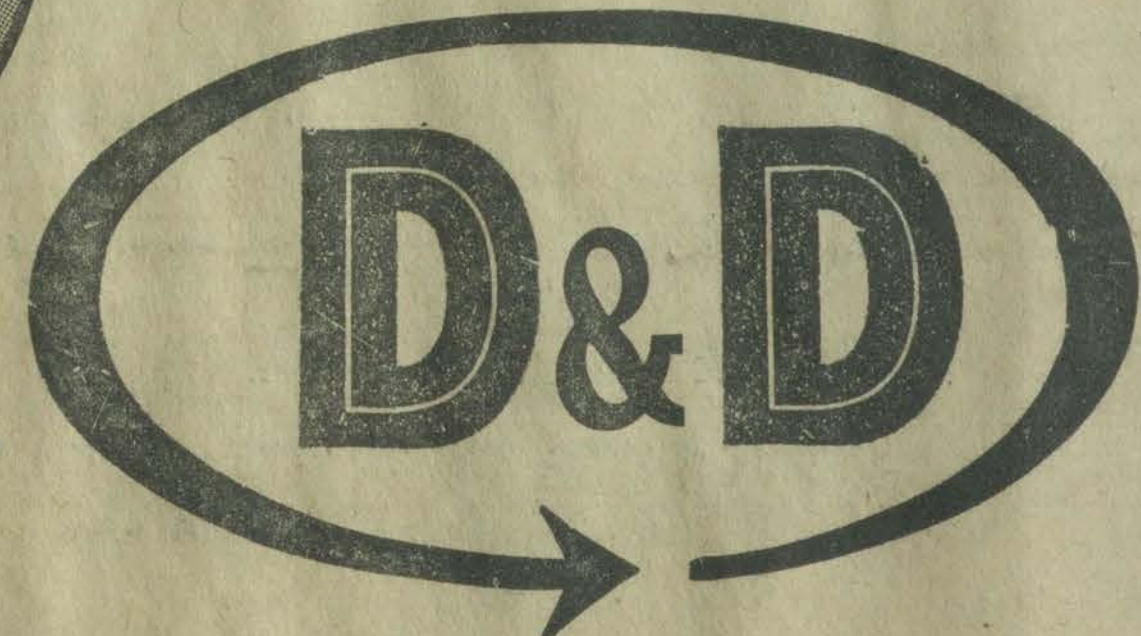

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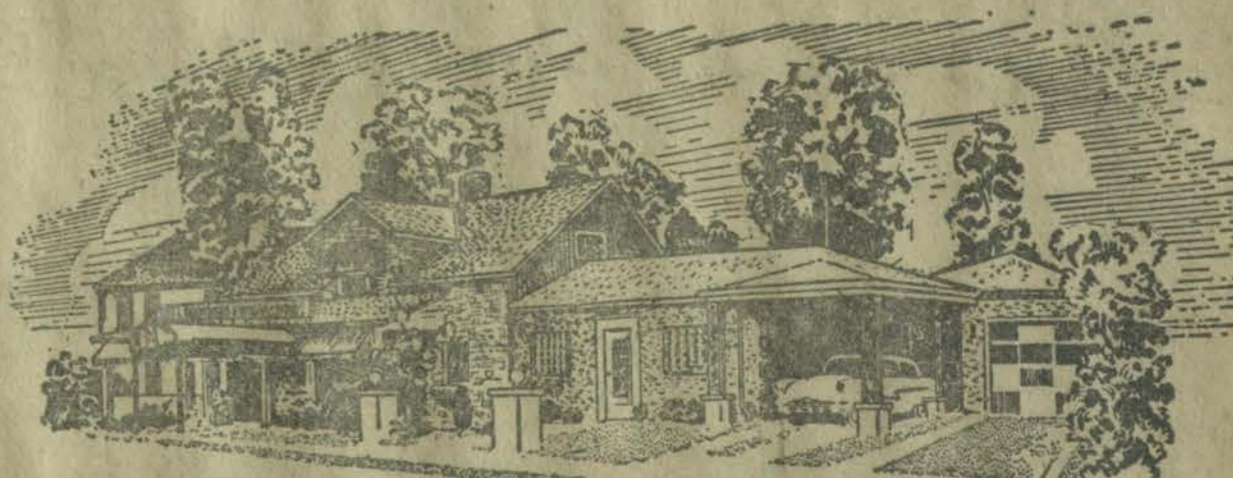

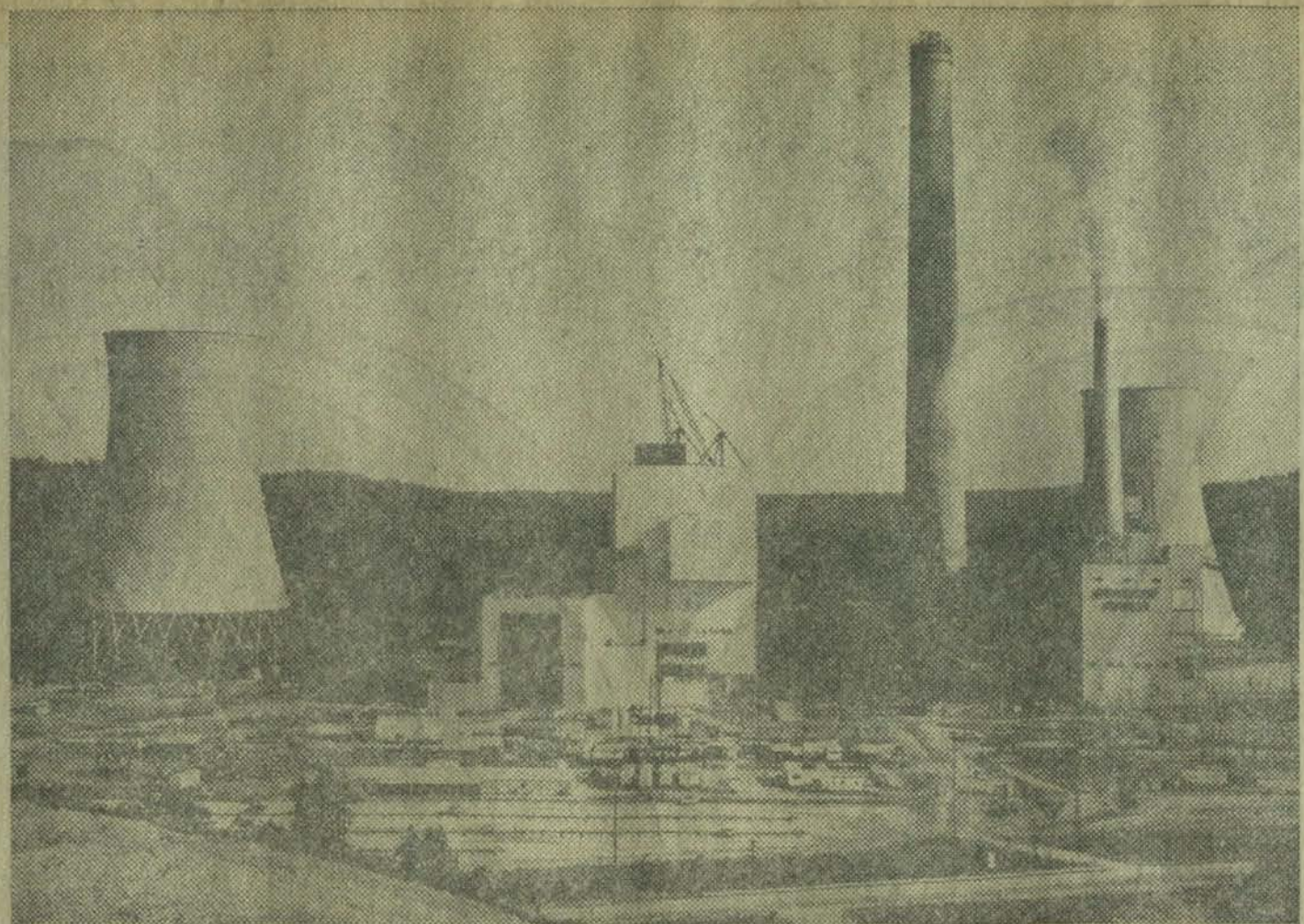
Meek, now 20, attended Meade Memorial high school for two years but dropped out before the start of the next term.

**VETS' ADMINISTRATION ANSWERS QUESTIONS**

Q.—I received a Veterans' Administration Certificate of Eligibility for education in the fall of 1967 but I never used it. I now plan to go to school this fall and will be entering the same school and taking the same program for which I originally applied. Do I need an updated Certificate of Eligibility?

A.—No. Since you are going to the same school and taking the same program as stated in your original Certificate, you need not apply for an updated Certificate.

Q.—I am a World War I veteran and not in receipt of Veterans Administration benefits. However, I am a patient in a private nursing home. Am I entitled to aid and attendance benefits?

A.—You are not entitled to aid and attendance benefits unless you are entitled to basic pension or compensation benefits. However, disabled veterans with limited incomes are entitled to pensions, and veterans 65 years of age or older are presumed to be disabled for pension purposes. If you think you might be eligible, check with your nearest VA office.

Q.—I would like to know if a widow of a World War I veteran could sell her home and buy more property without the profit from the sale of the home being considered as income. Would this "profit" cause her to lose her pension?

A.—Most widows receiving VA pensions are under the "new law" in effect since July 1, 1960, which does not consider such profit as income.

Other widows are receiving pensions under a still operative "old law" which does define profit from the sale of property as income. Therefore net profit payments extending for a period of years beyond the year of

sale are counted as income. However, if a lump-sum payment is received in the year of the sale, no reduction or discontinuance of pension would be made solely on the basis of the nonrecurring one-time payment. If you want further information for your case, check with your nearest VA office.

The official seal of the Commonwealth was described in a bill passed by the General Assembly on Dec. 20, 1792, six months after Kentucky joined the Union. The seal shows two friends embracing each other, with the words "Commonwealth of Kentucky" over their heads and around them the words, "United We Stand, Divided We Fall." By custom and in conformity with the description of the flag contained in the statutes, two sprigs of goldenrod in bloom are shown in the lower portion of the seal. Colors of the seal are blue and gold.

### NUCLEAR ENERGY EXHIBIT SET FOR FLOYD SCHOOLS

A program presenting peaceful uses of nuclear energy will be given at three Floyd county high schools by Morehead State University and the Atomic Energy Commission, September 17-19.

The exhibit, called "This Atomic World," will be at Wayland high school, Sept. 17; Betsy Layne high, Sept. 18; and Wheelwright high, September 19.

Charles Mays, a 1968 Morehead graduate with a Bachelor of Science degree in physics and chemistry, will be in charge of the exhibit, which will be presented at a 40-minute assembly program at each high school.

Using a specially-designed van-type truck to transport the exhibit, Mays will visit one high school each day, presenting the nuclear energy peacetime story first at an all-school assembly program and later in classroom sessions.

Mays, who took eight weeks of intensified training in atomic energy and the presentation of the exhibit at Oak Ridge, will be available at each school for special counseling with inter-

ested students and guidance counselors.

"The assembly program is designed to interest all students. It will cover in student terms such basic nuclear physics highlights as radioactivity, chain reaction, reactors and their uses, transmutation, and the application of radioisotopes in medicine, industry and agriculture," said Dr. Charles A. Payne, chairman of the Division of Physical Sciences at Morehead.

A more detailed discussion is presented in the classroom session later. Aimed primarily at the science students, the topics discussed in the classroom include atomic structure, the nucleus, radiation biology, fission and fusion, Mays said.

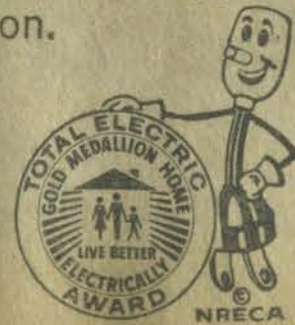

**Witnesses Plan Danville Meet**

The Paintsville congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses is completing plans to attend a three-day ministerial convention in Danville, Sept. 20-22, at Pioneer Playhouse.

Meredith Spurlock, presiding minister of the group, said the Danville program will draw about 25 ministers from the Paintsville area. In addition, a number of car groups of interested persons are planning to attend the sessions, all of which are open to the public.

**Breaks Parks Bids Received in Part; Readvertising Seen**

Elkhorn City, Ky. — Bid opening for a \$1.2 proposed construction program at Breaks Interstate Park resulted in partial bidding and the prospect of readvertising another bid opening for a major portion of the project.

Bids were submitted for the electric power lines and recreational facilities in the park and the park's proposed sanitary sewage system.

But no bids were offered on the park's physical building improvement. The improvement includes a large swimming pool, an addition to Rhododendron Lodge to seat 200 diners, expansion of the motor lodge to 30 units from the present 20 and the construction of six family cottages.

Low bidder for power line construction and related facilities was the Kingsport Armature and Electric Co., of Tennessee, with a figure of \$47,644 for power line construction, \$44,741 in Item 2 for camping area facilities, picnic shelters and other recreation facilities and \$46,688 in Item 3 which included other construction.

Low bidder on the sanitary sewage system was Robinette Contractors, Roanoke, Va. They gave a bid of \$136,174 and a low alternate bid of \$137,788.

All bids must be approved by a meeting of the park commission and later submitted to the Economic Development Administration for final approval before a contract may be signed.

Park officials had hoped to get all contracts awarded by Sept. 20. Part of the construction recently met the approval of the EDA for a \$540,000 grant. The commission will furnish the remainder of the funds.

After contract awarding time the longest construction time allowed is 280 days from the date the contract becomes effective.

**'GRANDMA' COMBS PROVES ABILITY TO RUN THE JOB**

Supervising paroled prisoners may not be the average grandmother's cup of tea, but then Mrs. Lucy Combs, of West Van Lear, may not be the average grandmother.

There are not many grandmothers who can pop a squirrel from the top of a tree with a rifle and know how to deal with defiant and trouble-prone people.

Those are a few of Mrs. Combs' abilities which officials in the Kentucky Department of Corrections believe indicate she can supervise, as a probation and parole officer, convicted male felons on parole.

"We seldom find a woman suitable for this kind of work," said Patrick J. Hurley, director of the Division of Probation and Parole, noting that Mrs. Combs' training and background makes her an exceptional case.

He pointed out the corrections department has one other woman probation and parole officer but she, Mrs. Mabel Thompson, supervises the state's some 30 women parolees.

Hurley said Mrs. Combs "did well" in the probation and parole division's annual in-service training program held recently and his staff is well pleased with her work since she assumed the post last July 1.

If there had been any doubt Mrs. Combs, 56, could manage the tough physical problems parole work might pose there is none now. She was successful in the supreme test when she apprehended a parole violator and returned him to the Kentucky Reformatory at LaGrange.

What made Mrs. Combs an outstanding candidate for the post and what impressed correction officials was her experience and training.

For four years (1942-46) Mrs. Combs was a civilian security guard at Wright-Patterson Field, Dayton, Ohio, where she not only underwent 16 weeks of military training including close-order drill and training in judo and various small fire arms and the machine gun.

She admits nearly failing the close-order drills, saying she barely passed the "skipping stage," but she excelled with the .45 calibre pistol and other weapons which she practiced shooting at least once a week.

Noting there were 18,000 military and civilian personnel on the airbase, which was under wartime security, Mrs. Combs said she also trained in the use of tear gas in riot conditions.

## JENNY WILEY AMONG PARKS IN YEAR-ROUND PROGRAM

Most regard Labor Day as the end of the vacation season, but at six of Kentucky's state parks, including Jenny Wiley here, it marks a swing into the fall activities of a year-round program.

Half of Kentucky's 12 state resort parks will remain open after the others close in mid-November. For them, something will be going every minute, throughout the year.

Any day this fall and winter, a state park may program a sing-along, a nature hike, a card party or a slide talk by a professionally trained specialist. Square dances and bridge tournaments know no season, so there will be plenty of both in the all-seasons program. There is a recreation leader at each of the six parks to offer other ideas to suit the weather or the whim.

Nature trails take on a new face as the seasons change, and autumn's manifold colors will suggest a scenic motorcade for photo fans and those who simply

want to go for the ride and the view. You can golf on the lighted nine-hole course at Jenny Wiley State Park any time of the year. Swimming pools at Lake Cumberland and Kentucky Dam Village will have heated water and wind screens. The year-round programs at Cumberland Falls and Natural Bridge will include a Fall Color Week-end for those who want to time it just right to be there when the leaves turn.

Kentucky Dam Village and Lake Cumberland, whose lakes have always lured fishermen and boaters, will be among the all-year parks. The parks already mentioned, plus General Butler at Carrollton, will feature special activities for the various fall and winter holidays—Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's.

This is the first time that any state parks system in the U. S. has established a year-round recreation program under the supervision of recreation specialists. Five college-trained recreation leaders have been assigned to the parks.

Kenneth Tate, of Hazard and Lexington, a graduate of Eastern Kentucky University, has been assigned to Jenny Wiley State Park.

## Vanceburg Company Contracts To Build Harold Post Office

Postmaster General W. Marvin Watson has announced that a contract has been awarded to build a new postoffice at Harold.

The building will be owned by Property Development, Inc., 201 Main St., Vanceburg, Ky., and the firm will lease it to the Post-office Department for eight years with renewal options running through 20 years. It will be located on Back street.

Preliminary estimates indicate that the initial investment in the project will total approximately \$20,000. The one-story building will be air-conditioned and offers more working room than the present building. It will have an interior space of 1,014 square feet, compared with a total of 900 in the present building, and an area of 4,000 square feet for parking and movement of postal vehicles.

The new postal station is expected to be completed by May 1, next year. L. L. Sturgill is postmaster at Harold.
