At one time, the teen-ager played in the high school band and later formed his own rock 'n' roll group which played at a number of functions here.

Meeks was reared by his grandmother, Mrs. Dixie Bleyins, who lives at Offutt, Johnson county.



A .- You are not entitled to aid and attendance benefits unless you are entitled to basic penion or compensation benefits. However, disabled veterans with imited incomes are entitled to pensions, and veterans 65 years of age or older are presumed to be disabled for pension purposes. If you think you might be eligible, check with your nearest VA office.
