John Leslie, an official of Spindletop Research, Inc., in Lexington, which made the basic economic projections, said the bright forecast of new plants and businesses assumes that the nation will continue to pursue a full-employment economic pol-

That means continued economic expansion and economic expansion will depend on where

"That trainable work force in Eastern Kentucky is going to be your magnet," Leslie said. "You've got the access, you've got the labor supply, then you remove the bottlenecks to development-the flat land and the available water. Then that area can compete with other areas for new plants."

From this logic, Spindletop analysis drew a statistical portrait of how Magoffin county can expect to grow over the next 50 years - the increased jobs, wages, taxes and private investments which will justify the public expenditures on the dam.
