### ORDER ENDS PCT. DIVISION FOR COUNTY

Registration Disparity Held Below Minimum; One Member Dissents

Redistricting effected Saturday by the Floyd County Board of Education of the county's five educational divisions eliminates the splitting of precincts and holds the disparity in voter registration between the largest and the smallest divisions well below the permissible 15 percent, County Supt, of Schools Charles F. Clark said this week.

### TALK ABOUT HOT NEWS . . .

(An editorial in The Paintsville Herald) We received a bit of information from an out-of-town subscriber this past week-end with mixed emotions.

Our good friend was "home" for Thanksgiving, and dropped by the ortice to renew his long-standing subscription, Like a few other subscribers, he has failed to get his Herald several times. Usually, when this happens, it is our fault, or so we assume, either as the result of a damaged addressing plate, carelessness in wrapping or some other human error. We do our darndest to eliminate such incidents, but occasionally they will happen anyway.

Sometimes, however, we can find no reason for a subscriber not to have received his paper, and are at a loss for an ex-

planation. It just so happens that our out-of-town visitor checked with his postolfice, and they in turn checked with their regional center. The local postmaster, our friend told us, was advised at the regional center that newspapers arequently were burned when the mail load became too heavy.

We have no reason to doubt the veracity of this story. The visitor was not the type to fabricate such a report . . . and it is not the first time we have heard it, from other areas.

What irritates us the most is not the action so much as the attitude. Since zip coding was initiated, our work and our cost or malling has roughly tripled, and we seldom get by more than three weeks without receiving some change in procedure. We also seldom make it through three weeks without a written reprimand from a faceless postal official who says we should be mailing certain zip codes in different groups, putting them in different bags, going through a sectional center of doing some other mane function to theoretically speed the mailing of our publication.

Exactly why we should help speed it to a bonfire is uncer-

Some of the regulations make about as much sense as the mail circuit to Salversville. Anything we mail to our neighboring city, some 15 miles to the west, goes first to Louisa, Ashland, Lexington and only then to Salversville, in case you didn't know.

Like everyone else, we now are paying more to send our mail. It is unfortunate that such an important service seems to become more unwieldy as its size and costs grow. We were pleased to learn that a lapse in mailing to at least one subscriber was apparently not our fault, but we were less than happy to hear about the apparent cause. It seems that increased mailing rates are not a solution to postal problems, and perhaps, as has been recommended, that function should be taken over by a non-government corporation.
