Steel Co., Evans Join In Beaver Coal Mine

Knott Mine Plans Told Here Today

Caney Creek Operation Slated for Production In Spring of Next Year

The Right Beaver section of Floyd and Knott counties, where coal-mining has been almost non-existent for several years, today (Thursday) received the promise of a large-scale revival of the industry.

Formation of the Beaver Creek Consolidated Coal Company was jointly announced by Richard E. Thompson, vice-president of purchasing and traffic, National Steel Corporation, and George E. Evans, Jr., president of Evans Industries of Kentucky, which has an interest in the new company. Mr. Evans has been named president of the company and will manage its operation.

The company, it was announced, will begin operation next year of the Stinson Mine on Caney Creek, a tributary of Right Beaver Creek, a few miles from Wayland in this county. The mine will be named in honor of George A. Stinson, president of the National Steel Corporation.

The Stinson mine will represent National Steel's first investment in an operating coal company in the Elkhorn coal field of Eastern Kentucky, although it has had extensive coal reserves in the area for many years. The new mine will be located on Caney Creek, approximately four miles from the juncture of that stream with Right Beaver Creek. A spur railway line will be constructed from the mouth of Caney to the mine location.

The mine will tap one of the largest and finest coal reserves in Eastern Kentucky. Its coal (See Story No. 7, Page 5)

BETSY LAYNE PASTOR DIES

Rev. Senters, Minister 40 Years, Victim at 67 At Huntington Hospital

The Rev. Carl L. Senters, of Betsy Layne, pastor of Free Will Baptist churches in this county for 40 years and long a sales representative in the area of wholesale grocery firms, died Tuesday at Cabell-Huntington Hospital, Huntington, W. Va., 30 minutes after his arrival there. He was 67 years old.

The minister had been in failing health for some time, and had been a patient at the Pikeville hospital until his removal Tuesday to Huntington for treatment. He suffered a heart condition.

The Rev. Senters was a son of Daniel and Lucille Taylor Senters and was born Aug. 14, 1901. He retired in 1963 as a salesman for the Tur River Grocery Company, Williamson. He had been a member of the Free Will Baptist Church 45 years and also was a member of Zebulon Masonic Lodge here and the Shrine. After operating his own general merchandise store he represented various wholesale grocery firms, and was postmaster at Drift for four years. A staunch Republican, he was a candidate for Congress from the Second district in 1939. Mr. Senters also was a trustee of the orphanage operated by his church at Louisa. At the time of his death he was assistant pastor of the Betsy Layne Free Will Baptist Church.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Ethel Miller Senters; eight sons and four daughters, Willis Senters, Lorain, O., Clyde Senters, Dundee, Iowa, Grover C. Senters, Jacksonville, Fla., Fred and Buddy Boy Senters, both of Betsy Layne, Bobby Senters, Detroit, Mich., Irvin Senters, Taylor, Mich., Curtis Senters, Prestonsburg, Mrs. Ruby Garrett, Evanville, Mrs. Norma Jean LeTourneau and Mrs. Clotene Woods, both of Detroit, and Mrs. Georgette Irick, Marion, O.; and six brothers, B. G. and Proctor Senters, both of Louisa, Perry Senters, Cincinnati, O., Andrew, Charles and Luster Senters, all of Ashland.

ASK DAMAGE OF \$547,945

Electrocution Death Claim over \$1 1/2 Million Among 3 Suits Filed

Plaintiffs in two suits filed in circuit court here within the week ask a total of \$537,945 in damages, and a counterclaim filed to an earlier damage suit asks an additional \$10,000.

In an action filed Saturday against the Kentucky Power Company and Charles Ray Adkins, Mrs. Ethel Gearheart claimed a total of \$502,095 in the death of her son, Stephen Eugene Gearheart, 18, May 17 of last year. Young Gearheart was electrocuted when, according to the suit, he came into contact with a drop line leading from a telephone line, over the top of an uninsulated power line, to the home of Frank Hall on Red Morg Branch.

Plaintiff claims the power company wrongfully maintained its power line along the branch and paralleling the telephone line, and knowingly permitted the drop line to pass above its uninsulated power line. She also alleges that the company maintained excessive power on its line and that Adkins pulled the drop line onto and over the uninsulated line and "instructed and caused" young Gearheart to come into contact with it.

Calvin and Phyllis Herrick filed Monday a damage suit on behalf of themselves and their son, Alan, naming Ishmael Caudill, Magoffin county coroner, doing business as the Caudill Funeral Home. They seek a total of \$35,850 damages for injuries and loss of their auto in a collision with Caudill's auto. They allege the wreck resulted from defendant's gross, willful and reckless operation of his vehicle. (See Story No. 6, Page 5)

It's Mental Health Week . . .

Mental Health Services, On-the-Spot Exponent

Mental Health Week, which began today (Thursday) and will continue through May 7, has its strongest and most unusual on-the-spot exponent in the Region 20 Mountain Mental Health Services headquartered here, and over a wider area the week will be marked by a series of programs on Kentucky Educational Television.

The Mountain Mental Health Services provide a broad range of mental health and mental retardation services to the area consisting of Floyd, Pike, Johnson, Martin and Magoffin counties. Its clients include the disturbed child, the distressed parent, the mentally ill adult, the mentally retarded and families or marriage partners with problems.

It is emphasized that this is a program, not a place, that nobody is denied service because of ability or inability to pay the fee, and that the individual may seek help from the program on his or her own or by referral from a physician, school, minister, or other professionals and agencies.

Care and treatment are provided at offices of the program in Prestonsburg, Pikeville, Paintsville, Salyersville and Inez. Outpatient services are available at the county-seats of each of the five counties. These services also are available monthly at the Appalachian Regional Hospital in South Williamson and bi-monthly at the McDowell Appalachian Regional Hospital.

An alcoholism program is being developed to serve the person whose drinking causes himself or his family suffering.

Family therapy services are available for families torn by marital strife, child management problems, teen-age problems and the like. Vocational rehabilitation is planned for those experiencing job difficulties because of mental health or retardation problems. (See Story No. 3, Page 6)

THIRD MAN NOT NAMED

Candidates Spoil Democrats' Chance On Election Board

The State Election Commission this week named two of Floyd county's three election commissioners, but the naming of the third will depend upon ability of the two already named to agree upon the state commission itself.

Ellis Martin, of Lancer, was named the Democratic commissioner; L. B. Moore, of Prestonsburg, the Republican. Ordinarily, the sheriff would round out the county election commission as an ex-officio member, but Sheriff Joe W. Lewis cannot because he is a candidate. The law provides that if the sheriff disqualifies, the circuit clerk shall be named, but Circuit Clerk Frank DeRossett is a candidate.

As matters stand, County Clerk C. "Ollie" Robinson will notify the two appointed commissioners to meet on the appointment of a third commissioner. Then, if they fail to agree, the matter goes back to the state commission. May 3 is the deadline for a choice to be made. After that, the county election commission will name the election officers to serve at the polling places on primary election day.

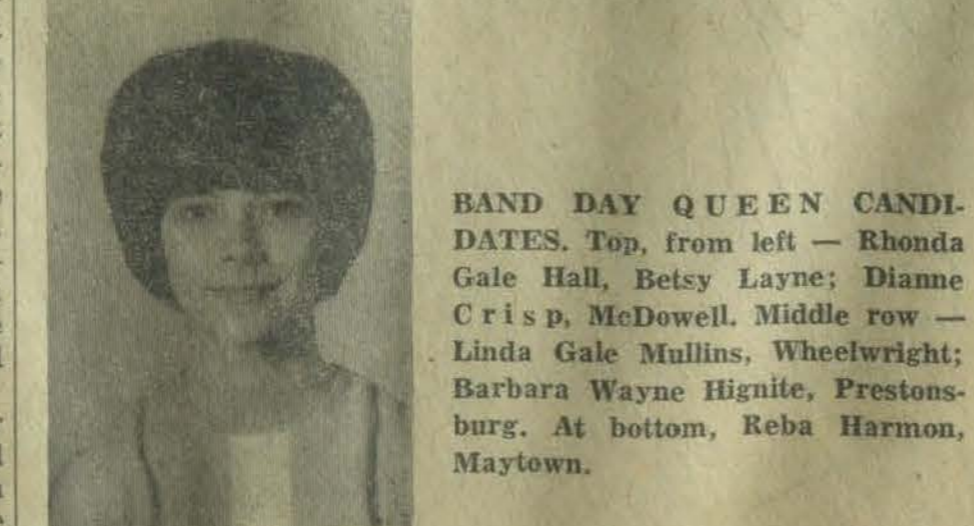
UNDERGOES SURGERY

Search on for Two In Station Holdup

State and city police set roadblocks and joined in an intensive manhunt Wednesday morning after two men had held up at gunpoint an attendant at Crum's Texaco Service Station here and rifled the cash register of approximately \$150.

The station attendant, Burr Rice, said two men in the 19-21 age-range entered the service station at about 2 a.m. Wednesday and bought a package of potato chips. Rice opened the cash register to give them change and when he turned he faced a revolver in the hands of each. He said they shoved him into a back room of the station, rifled the register and drove off, headed south. Rice was quoted as saying he had earlier noticed the car used by the two men when it was driven down the highway and parked. When it returned, he said, the occupants parked the car a short distance above the station and walked back. He described the car used by the holdup pair as green. One were large men and one wore a beard, he said. They were unmasked. Plans for Control Of Floods Readied

If federal funds were made available, the town of Martin would be getting relief from the floods which have plagued it over the years.

The U. S. Corps of Engineers has completed design of the big channel improvement and flood-wall job there that has been "in the mill" for five years or longer. The engineers have planned widening of the bottom of the stream channel from the "Forks of Beaver," a short distance above Martin, to a point roughly 4 1/2 miles downstream. A floodwall is planned to afford additional protection to the town of Martin itself. The stream bottom would be widened to 75 feet.

The work will cost an estimated \$2,600,000. Because the completed plans

differ from the tentative proposals formerly agreed to, a new letter of intent was required by the Corps of Engineers from the Floyd fiscal court. This document established the willingness of Floyd county to assume its share of the cost, including rights-of-way, easements and maintenance costs. The non-federal funds involved are set at \$203,000, and the maintenance would involve about \$6,000 a year.

After County Judge Henry Stumbo and County Attorney Barkley J. Sturgill had conferred recently with Peter Baer and Harry Burkett, of the Huntington district office, U. S. Corps of Engineers, the fiscal court met and authorized Judge Stumbo to give the district engineer the requested letter of intent, pledging the court's cooperation.



A Business Approach

This will establish work routines and improve efficiency.

Funds provided by the annual budget supplemented by Federal aid employees labor should provide excellent all weather roads to every rural home in Floyd County.

Harmon Is Speaker At Wayland Club

"In 1775 the term, 'United States,' was first used," Mr. Harmon said. This took five months to accomplish and our Constitution was finally ratified by all the states in 1789."

"A serious error in the Constitution was made in that it did not recognize the colored man as a person and made no provision for his freedom," he explained. He also advised that while ours was the first constitution in the world, and has been in continuous use since its ratification, "it is now under more stress than at any time in the history of our nation."

Power Politics In Campaign For Circuit Judge

My opponent, your present Circuit Judge, during the past two weeks or more, has been traveling about the county with one or more other county officials who also seek reelection.

Voters who have been so approached by these other candidates traveling with my opponent, report that such statements as "A vote against this fellow is a vote against me," was made to them. I cannot bring myself to blame other elected county officials seeking reelection for taking advantage of the power of the Circuit Court to help them get votes, but voters must be protected from this type of campaigning.

Every profession, and many occupations, have a code of practice and a code of ethics. A code for the conduct of Judges has been adopted by the Court of Appeals as law. In three sections of this code there is a direction that Judges "should avoid . . . the public endorsement of candidates for political office." (See Canons of Judicial Ethics Secs. 28, 30, 34). I ask you, the voter, if the conduct of our present Circuit Judge during the past week or more is, or is not, "the public endorsement of candidates for political office."

Election history in Floyd County shows that this "gang type campaign" has caused the defeat of one or more of those involved.

If you want a Circuit Judge who seeks to use the power of his office to elect your other county officials vote for my opponent. If you want a non-political Circuit Judge then my plea is — vote for me.

The counter-claim of \$10,000 was filed by Ronald Lawson and Joseph M. Hall, doing business as the Community Sunoco Service Station. This amount is claimed as damages because, they allege, Billie Harris Elswick and Delmer Elswick, have harassed and annoyed them and their customers over a period beginning in September, 1967. They also ask the court to enjoin the Elswicks from such actions in the future.

The original suit filed by the Elswicks against Lawson and Hall also named Mayor Archer and members of the Prestonsburg City Council, claiming construction of a retaining wall had damaged their property and prevented access to their property.

Lawson and Hall in their answer say the retaining wall was built for the purpose of making their service station level with the highway, that the plaintiffs knew the reason for the construction and made no objection to it until about 15 months after its completion.

storage is such that it will support mining operations for at least 30 years, it was said.

Except for scattered truck mines, the Right Beaver Creek valley at this time does not have a mine in operation.

Reading Our Own Obituary

Over in Sweden one morning late in the 1800's a fellow awoke from his sleep to find himself dead. Well, not really dead. It was just that the newspapers had him confused with his brother and when they printed the obituary they had printed his by mistake. Imagine reading your own obituary. Talk about a shocking experience!

It was a really shocking experience for this particular fellow. For the first time in his life (or death, as it appeared) he saw himself as others saw him. It seems that the reporter, in writing the obituary, referred to him as the "Dynamite King." You see, this man who had supposedly died had spent his entire life in the field of explosives. He had discovered dynamite, blasting gelatin and ballistite, along with detonators for explosives. In the process he had grown extremely rich. And now, with the world thinking he was dead, he didn't like what he was being remembered for.

This fellow didn't like the idea of being remembered as the "Dynamite King." To him the nickname implied something that he thought was destructive. So, at that very moment, he set about to correct the situation. He took his money and put it into a trust fund to promote awards for people who had contributed the most good in particular areas of man's concern each year. He set up five areas including physics, chemistry, physiology or medicine, literature, and peace. The winner of the award in each area annually receives from \$30,000 to \$50,000 for his efforts.

You know, I guess many of us would change a few things if we knew what the world would remember us for. Most of us are like the fellow mentioned above. We are of the opinion that when we die people will pay tribute to us for our great gains or our

hard work. Lot of us would be just as surprised as he was if we could read our obituary, if we could see what we would be remembered for.

One of the real mistakes we humans habitually make is that of thinking more highly of ourselves than we ought to think. A little bowlegged Jew had something to say about that a few hundred years ago. He said we should think of ourselves in "sober judgment." What he knew was that many times we drink until we are drunk with our own pride, selfishness, and ego.

"What am I doing that I will be remembered for?" If a lot of us would spend the next ten minutes answering that question — in sober judgment — it could bring about just as tremendous a change in our lives as it brought about in the life of the gentleman mentioned above. He changed, for the good. A lot of us need to do that, also.

If you are wondering about who the man was, his name was Alfred Bernhard Nobel. If you have never heard of him, you may have heard of the Nobel Prize. Those are the awards he established as a direct result of reading his own obituary.

Day treatment is available for the mentally ill person who needs intensive care and treatment but who can maintain himself at home, the patient going to one of the centers every day to become involved in a program of social and daily living activities.

Inpatient psychiatric care is provided through hospitals affiliated with the program—Prestonsburg General, Methodist at Pikeville, Paintsville General, Appalachian Regional at South Williamson and Eastern State at Lexington.

Emergency service is on a 24-hour call-in basis. During regular office hours calls for emergency help may be made to the local out-patient units. After hours, calls are to a central number — in Prestonsburg, to 386-3893. Such calls contact Prestonsburg General Hospital where a nurse will answer and enlist Center staff help.

The mentally retarded are identified by school personnel, family physicians, clergymen, social agencies and others. A full range of services for the mentally retarded is planned. Staff members of Mountain Mental Health Services are available to assist each school district in implementing special education classes. It already has assisted the Magoffin Day Care Training Center in getting started and plans to endorse such units in the other counties of the area. Individual diagnostic study of the mentally retarded is given and in instances where a residential placement is needed, members of the local staff assist with arrangements.

Federal and state funds put the Mountain Mental Health Services into operation in July, 1967. Sustaining funds will have to be generated later at the local level as federal aid decreases 15% each year and ends entirely at the end of five years.

The ETA programs in observance of Mental Health Week include treatment of drinking and drug problems today (Thursday) at 6:30 p.m. Monday at 8 p.m., the subject will be, "Mental Retardation." "Schizophrenia; The Shattered Mirror" will be offered Tuesday at 6:30 p.m., and at 8 p.m. the program on the aging will be, "Where Mrs. Whalley Lives." The closing programs of the series will be viewed next Wednesday — "Mr. Finley's Feelings" (dealing with the emotions) and "Plans Ahead for Mental Health," beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Special Car Hauls Big Generator to New Plant

The giant 280-ton generator for Unit 2 at Kentucky Power Company's Big Sandy Plant near Louisa arrived last Wednesday by special railroad car. The generator will be capable of producing 800,000 kilowatts of electric power when the unit is completed this summer.

Built by the General Electric Company at its large turbine department in Schenectady, New York, the generator traveled on a special G. E. railway car that is almost half as long as a football field. The 136-foot car has 16 axles, 8 at each end with a depressed center which allows the long car to take curves.

In addition to the generator, the car carried other associated equipment which brought the total gross load to above 1,070,000 pounds — more than 535 tons.

Construction on the \$100-million addition to the Big Sandy Plant has been under way for over two years. When the 800,000-kilowatt generating Unit 2 is completed, Big Sandy Plant's capacity will be 1,080,000 KW — the largest investor-owned generating station in Kentucky.

With its installation in the plant, the new Unit 2 turbine-generator, 178 feet long, will be the largest machine (single-shaft, tandem-compound) ever built. The generator was the largest ever shipped by G. E. on its special car.

UNDERGOES SURGERY

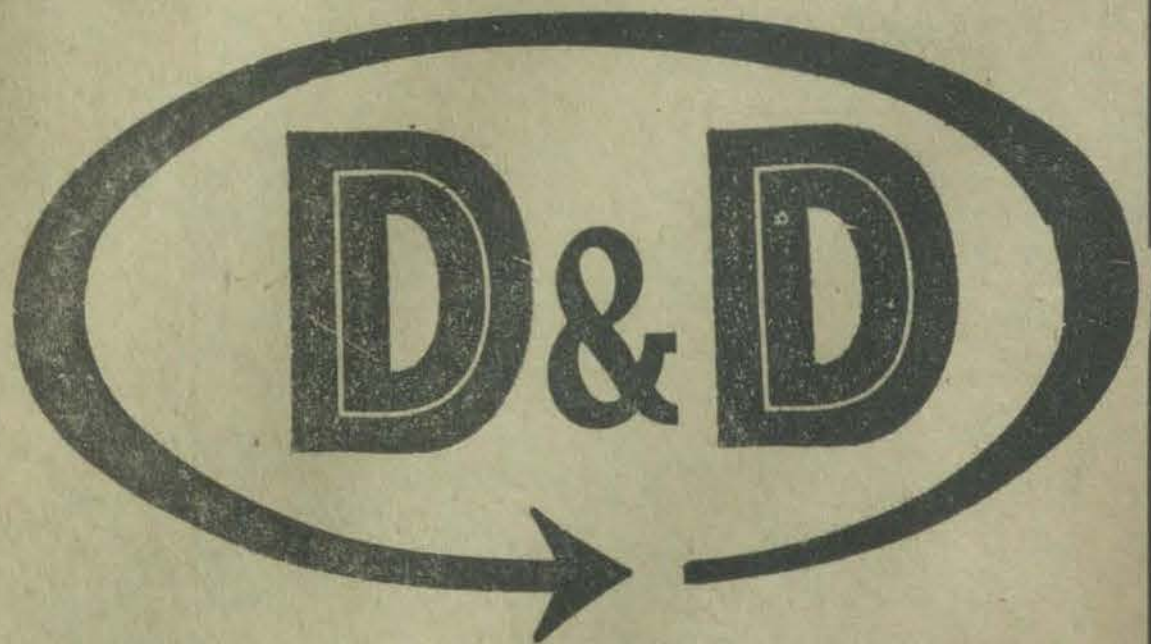

ORDINANCE NO. 2-69

An Ordinance of The City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, providing for the assessment of Real and Personal Property and for the levy of a general property tax at the rate of Thirty Cents (30c) per each One Hundred Dollar (\$100.00) valuation of Real and Personal Property located within the corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, on January 1st, 1969, and a further levy of Poll Tax of One Dollar and Fifty Cents (\$1.50) on each male person over the age of 21 years and under the age of 65 years residing within the corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, on January 1st, 1969, with certain statutory exemptions.

WHEREAS, it is necessary in order to provide the revenue required for general purposes of the city's government, including general expenses of the city, but not limited to general health, sanitation, maintenance of streets, operation of parks, and other necessary and indispensable services, affecting the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, that a tax be levied upon all property, both real and personal, having a tax situs in the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky,

WHEREAS, the total Budget for all such expenses for general purposes during the year of 1969 in said City is in the amount of \$220,500.00 and the budget's source of revenue for 1969, includes an estimated amount of \$76,000.00 to be derived from such property taxes and without such amount to be derived from such property taxes, the revenue required for such general purposes would be insufficient.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. A tax is hereby levied upon all property, both real and personal, having a tax situs in the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, as of January 1, 1969, for general purposes, including general expenses of the City. All monies received hereunder shall be paid to the City Treasurer of Prestonsburg and placed in the credit of a general fund of the City and shall be used in defraying current and incidental expenses of said government. The tax hereby is levied as follows:

A. The sum of thirty cents (30c) for each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of all real and personal property located within the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, as of January 1, 1969.

B. A poll tax of \$1.50 on each male person over the age of 21 years and under the age of 65 years, residing within the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, on January 1, 1969, excepting those persons exempt from tax under KRS 92.300(3) and KRS 142.020.

SECTION 2. The property taxes and poll taxes for the year 1969 shall become due and payable on October 1, 1969, by which date tax notices shall have been mailed each taxpayer, and all taxes paid prior to November 1, 1969, shall be allowed a discount of 2%; all property and poll taxes for the year 1969 becoming due and payable on November 1, 1969.

SECTION 3. All taxpayers who do not pay the tax herein levied prior to January 1, 1970, shall be required to pay a penalty of 6% of the amount of the tax in addition to the tax levied herein.

SECTION 4. All taxpayers who do not pay the tax herein levied on or before the 1st day of April, 1970, shall be required to pay a penalty of 25% of the amount of the tax in addition to the tax levied herein.

SECTION 5. The Delinquent Tax Collector is hereby authorized to advertise for sale in a newspaper having a general circulation in Floyd County, Kentucky, all delinquent taxes on real property placed in his hands for collection and the charge for such advertising shall be added to the amount of the tax bill.

SECTION 6. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed, and this Ordinance shall take effect as of the date of adoption and publication as required by law.

SECTION 7. The provisions of this Ordinance are separable, and if any of the provisions or penalties provided herein shall be held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision of the court will not affect or impair any other section, clause, provision or portion of the Ordinance which is not in itself invalid or unconstitutional.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, we, the members of Local Union 5899, United Mine Workers of America, of Wheelwright, Kentucky, at a regular meeting, are mindful of the many inequities in the present Workmen's Compensation laws of Kentucky, and the need to amend the law in order that the rights of workmen and their dependents can be better protected; and

WHEREAS, we are mindful of the conservative application of our present law by those charged with the administration of it; and

WHEREAS, the shortcomings in the present law and the conservative application of the laws have resulted and will continue to result in rulings and decisions contrary to the best interest of coal miners, their dependent widows and orphans; and

WHEREAS, the membership is desirous of taking positive action to correct these inequities by obtaining more favorable legislation, and by obtaining more liberal interpretation and application of the laws, and toward that end we propose to do everything within our power to obtain the desired results.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That we, the members of Local Union 5899, United Mine Workers of America, will do everything within our power to obtain more favorable legislation and more equitable application of our present and future Workmen's Compensation laws and toward that end we will contact and seek to secure the support from legislators, other local union members, other labor organizations, business, professional and civic leaders.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That we will seek to have the present Workmen's Compensation and Occupational Disease laws amended so as to include, but not limited to, the following:

1. Miners who have spent more than ten years as underground miners and develop disabling respiratory conditions shall be presumed to have contracted such condition by reason of their exposure to harmful noxious smoke, dusts and gases in their employment.

2. In the event a workman obtains an award granting him total and permanent disability benefits, and in the event the workman dies before receiving the entire award and leaves a dependent widow and/or children that it shall be conclusively presumed that his death resulted from the injury or disease for which he received compensation during his life, and the remaining compensation due shall be paid to the surviving dependent widow and/or children on a weekly basis.

3. No deduction or discount of the award shall be made for lump sum awards to the workman or his dependents, or for payment of attorneys fee for services rendered in obtaining the award.

4. The maximum disability and death benefits shall be increased to \$25,500.00, payable in weekly installments. The maximum weekly benefits shall be \$60.00 per week payable for 425 weeks and the minimum shall be \$40.00 per week for 425 weeks. The minimum burial benefits shall be increased to \$1,000.00, and the medical payments shall be increased to \$4,500.00 and in extraordinary cases the workman shall have the right to petition the Board for an increase in that allowance.

5. The circuit courts and the Court of Appeals shall have the power and authority to review and reverse the Workmen's Compensation Board on findings of fact and conclusions of law, if the reviewing court finds from a review of the entire record that the decision of the Board is clearly erroneous.

6. If the employer or its insurance carrier has the workman examined by more than two doctors and the report of these doctors is adverse to the workman then in that event the employee may secure additional medical evidence from additional doctors and the employer or its carrier shall pay for the cost of such examinations and the taking of the doctors' depositions.

7. The employee shall have the right to choose his own physician for the treatment of any injuries or disease he may suffer from as a result of an occupational disease or injury.

But my opponent, Lawrence Hale, contested. That was eight years ago, and three and a half months of lawsuit followed. The lower court gave me the election by 26 majority.

More Reforms for Circuit Court Proposed by Paul E. Hayes For Circuit Judge

Here are two policies that should be adopted in the Circuit Court:

1. FACING SQUARELY THE ISSUES.

Sometimes elected, rather than appointed, Judges are tempted to step aside, especially when public questions become "hot potatoes," with large groups of voters on one side or the other. A special judge from out of the county must then be appointed. He cannot possibly know our problems as well as our own. In the opinion of many this happens far too often in Floyd county. 2. A WELL DEFINED POLICY OF PROBATION IN CRIMINAL CASES:

For the Circuit Court**

It may be that our present Circuit Judge should be given credit in having made certain improvements in what may be called "The Dignity of The Court." However there are areas in the Administration of Justice which are equally — indeed, more important — to those involved in cases in the Circuit Court. I mention only two in this article and two others on another page in this paper:

1. Written Opinions On Major Decisions.

Present practice, generally, is for the judge to give his decision from the bench, directing the lawyer winning the case to prepare the written judgement. This often leaves the losing party with little explanation as to why the judge decided as he did. As Circuit Judge I will support all major decisions by a recorded or written opinion.

2. Speedy Action On Cases.

In only one week of campaigning, I am surprised by the number of people who complain of long delays in deciding their cases. However, the speedy movement of cases is the direct responsibility of the Circuit Judge.

Nature Trails By RUFUS M. REED

In so far as man is concerned, here are two kinds of moths—the beneficial ones and those that are destructive. The beneficial moths are the large silkworm moths, which include the most beautiful and useful creatures of earth, as they are the source of the ancient silk industry. This industry has been carried on in China for 5,000 years, where they make silk from the cocoons of large moths. One cocoon may have as many as 3,900 feet of silk. I shall write about these big moths in a later article.

Now is the time to watch out for the small, destructive moths. They are the worst pests we have and many of them are so tiny, they often escape our notice. But their deadly work is in evidence. Some of the worst moths were imported from Europe, among which is the infamous codling moth which causes the "white worm" in the core of the apple.

The tent caterpillar moth is a small, reddish-brown moth, with two white stripes across each of the forewings. It is quite small, about an inch long, and has two feathery antennae which extend out at right angles from the head. This is the moth that lays the eggs to produce the tent caterpillars whose unsightly webs may be seen in trees by the middle of April. Before the first of April is the time to hunt for the egg masses and destroy them. These small moths lay batches of eggs in a solid mass, which is placed around the twigs of wild cherry, apple and plums. The eggs are laid in the fall and are "varnished over" with a coat of something which

keeps them warm through the winter. The egg masses may be found fastened around the twigs; they are oblong in shape and dark brown. These eggs are easily found and destroyed before they hatch. If allowed to hatch, they produce an army of hairy caterpillars, which are quite small at first. But they soon feast on the new green leaves and grow fast, then begin to spin the web or tent, which is anchored to the forks of the tree. It is their living quarters from which they crawl out to feast on the leaves; when their ravenous appetite is satisfied, they crawl back to the tent to rest and grow. Their favorite food is the leaves of cherry, mostly the wild black cherry, which is a highly valuable lumber tree. If not destroyed, these caterpillars will soon devour every leaf on the tree, leaving it bare; it cannot then make the food supply it needs.

Apple trees are also a choice food of the tent caterpillar and they often spin several tents in the same tree. Unless destroyed, they will completely defoliate the tree and cause the loss of the apple crop. They also are fond of wild and domestic plums and may do these much damage. The tents are easily destroyed by fastening a paper torch in a pole and applying a quick flame to the nest. One should do this at a time when all the caterpillars are in the tent; those out feeding on leaves may escape the torch. Here is where our cuckoos come in and help do a good job. However, the trees are usually stripped bare before the cuckoos come back from the south. But they certainly do go after the juicy caterpillars, as they tear into the webs and devour them wholesale. One cuckoo may eat a hundred or more of these caterpillars in a day. So it is wise to protect the cuckoos, as they are our friends which help us fight the pests.

Many of my older readers will recall getting stung by a "pack saddle" when pulling green blades from corn in late summer. Talk about a painful sting! The "saddle-back caterpillar," as the books call it, can deliver a sting the equal of a wasp! The pain burns and has a numbing sensation. I have had the pain to run to my heart with a cold, numbing feeling. The saddle-back caterpillar is a short, green ugly fellow, with double pairs of horns at either end. The horns are covered with stinging

bristles; there are also "stingers" along the sides of this formidable caterpillar. They feed on green corn, wild cherry, pawpaw leaves and are produced from eggs of a small, triangular-shaped moth, which is dark brown with blue spots. A boy who has been stung by a "saddle-back worm" soon learns the hard way not to touch one.

The codling moth is about one-half inch wide. It is brownish with some blue on the forewings and two prominent spots at the ends of these. It is one of the most destructive of the small moths and thrives wherever there are orchards. As soon as the new leaves appear on the apple trees, the codling moths swarm out and lay their eggs on them. The eggs hatch out small, white larvae which bore into the new apples and begin to feed around the core. Their presence in the apple is not easily detected until one cuts the apple open and discovers the "worm."

Fruit growers spray their apple trees as soon as the new leaves begin to appear. Birds also help out. "The black-winged redbird," which is the scarlet tanager, devours many codling moths.

Sealed bids will be received by the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, at the office of its City Clerk in the City Hall in said City until 7:00 P.M., E.D.T., on May 15, 1969, for the purchase at not less than par of all or any of certain designated maturities of \$248,000 of City of Prestonsburg Water, Sewer and Natural Gas System Revenue Bonds, Series of 1969, dated February 1, 1969, registrable as to principal only, of the denomination of \$1,000 each, maturing in numerical order, on February first in each of the respective years, 1970 through 1995, inclusive.

Bidders must bid for consecutive full annual maturities covering the first maturity and all maturities thereafter through at least February 1, 1979, at a price of par value plus accrued interest, and must designate the interest rate or rates for such maturities averaging not more than 4-1/8% per annum, in multiples of 1/8% or 1/10%, with a maximum interest differential of 2%. The beginning of the Stephens family in Floyd County. The Patton family was here many years before the Stephens family. Shepherd, Rose Slone and Sam Hackworth are double cousins of mine. The children and grandchildren of Nancy Slone, who married Elliott Hicks (old Elliott) are cousins of mine. The children and grandchildren of Martha Slone, Green Slone, Jack Slone, Adam Slone and Jack Slone, they are first cousins of my mother, Sally Allen, who married Aboe Shepherd, was a first cousin of mine and they had twelve children and many grandchildren.

Henry Shepherd married Dona Stephens, and they had eighteen children, and many grandchildren. Della Hale, a first cousin of mine, married James Shepherd and they had twelve or more children and many grandchildren. Sam Stephens, my uncle known as (Black Sam) had two different sets of children and many grandchildren. Sam Stephens (known as Horny Sam) had thirty-five children and hundreds of grandchildren. Alex Hamilton married my oldest aunt and they had six children and many grandchildren. Jerry Hackworth, of Middle Creek, was an uncle of my mother, and his wife was a Helton, and they had several children and grandchildren, some of whom are double cousins of mine. Cynthia Stephens, an aunt of mine, married Jeff Justice, an oldtime teacher, and they had several children, and many grandchildren. Joe Morgan Thornsbury married an aunt of mine and they had several children and many grandchildren. Tommy Thornsbury married a first cousin of mine and they had several children and many grandchildren. Hager Ousley, of the Cold Spring section, married an aunt of mine, their children being Tommy Ousley, Cleveland Ousley, Alex Ousley, Bill Ousley, Nancy Ousley, who married Rev. M. C. Wright, one married to Hoss Prater, of Prater Fork of Brush Creek. Robert Ratliff married a cousin of mine and they had several children and many grandchildren. Dan Howard, who married an aunt of my father, had many children and several grandchildren. Mr. Howard came from the Quick sand section of Knott County. John Stephens and Jim Stephens, brothers, married sisters of Jim Salisbury, and their children and grandchildren are cousins of mine.

Dan Wicker, of Knott county, married an aunt of mine and they had several children and grandchildren. Dr. Russell Hall, married one of his grandchildren. Alամander Coburn married a sister of the mother of my father. Some of the children of Alámander were Andy (or A. J.) Coburn, Woots, Polly, Juber and others and a great number of grandchildren. Columbus Crisp married a cousin of mine and they had several children and grandchildren. Jake Crisp married a cousin of mine and they had several children and grandchildren. Logan Dingus, of Martin, first married Ann Osborn, who was a cousin of mine, and they had several children and several grandchildren, and upon the demise of his first wife he married Sidney Stephens, and they had several children and grandchildren. The children of Hall Flannery, whose wife was a first cousin of mine, had several children and grandchildren. Bill Flannery married a cousin of mine and they had several children and grandchildren. Newt Stephens was a cousin of mine, and he married a Flannery and they had several children and grandchildren. Susan Stephens May, a cousin of mine, married Felix May, and they had several children and grandchildren. Hie Bradley, a first cousin of mine, married Florence Stephens and they had several children and grandchildren. Harris Bradley, a first cousin of mine, married Rhoda Flannery, and they had several children and grandchildren. Mousie Bradley, a first cousin of mine, married Lee Risner, and they had several children and grandchildren. Sarah Bradley, a first cousin of mine, married Billie Shepherd, and they had several children and grandchildren. Sam Bradley, a first cousin of mine, married Dora Ousley, and they had one girl, who married Goble Wireman, and they had several children and grandchildren.

David Kennedy, a cousin of mine, married a Stephens, and they had one daughter, and she married Wes Hale, and they had several children and grandchildren, who are double cousins of mine. The children of Sam and Dent Osborn and grandchildren are cousins of mine. The children of Albert Osborne and grandchildren are cousins of mine. Ran Spurlock married a daughter of Logan Dingus, thereby Ran's children are cousins of mine. Ebb Pratt first married a Stephens, a cousin of mine, and his second wife's mother was a Hale, also a cousin, and to both marriages twenty-two children were born and many grandchildren. The mother of Dr. J. H. Allen, and his brothers and sisters was a cousin of mine. The wife of Dosh Osborn was a cousin of mine, and including many grandchildren. Mary Stephens, who married a man by the name of Johns, she and her children and grandchildren are cousins of mine. The mother of my father was a Handshoe, and her mother was a Prater. Joe Johnson married a daughter of Sam Stephens (Horny), and they had fifteen children and a great number of grandchildren, all of whom are cousins of mine. L. M. (Lem) Johnson married Susan Whitaker, and they had several children, and so they are cousins of mine. Morgan Baldrige of Little Paint, married Martha Stephens, an aunt of mine, and they had several children and grandchildren, also cousins of mine. Zach Stephens, a cousin of mine, married a sister of Jeff Brown and lived on lower Stephens Branch, and they had several children and grandchildren. My uncle, George Hale (Big George), had several children and grandchildren and they are also my double cousins. Joe Wallen, John Wallen, Mart Wallen, Newt Wallen, Banks Wallen and their sisters are cousins to me on the Hale side, since my mother was Delilah Hale, and the Wallens had several children and grandchildren. The children of John Stephens, ex-superintendent, are double cousins of mine. Jeff (Bunk) Bingham married a sister of John Stephens and of his brothers and sisters, and Mr. Bingham had several children and grandchildren and they are double cousins of mine. Rube Hale, and Kelly Hale and their brothers and sisters are first cousins of my mother, and they had several children and grandchildren. One of their sisters, married, as I remember, Jasper Hicks, and another one married a Hicks and they all had several children and grandchildren. Jack Hale, who lived on Toler Creek, was married and had several children, as well as Emery Hale, and their sister married Dave Perry and some of their children or grandchildren are cousins of mine. One married W. J. Turner (Big Bill) and another married Keen Martin. Jarvey Caudill, who lived on Hollybush, in Knott county, married an aunt of my mother, and they had several children and grandchildren who likewise are cousins of mine. George Carpenter married Darcus Stephens, an aunt of my father, and they had several children and grandchildren. Dan Wireman married an aunt of mine and they had several children and grandchildren. John Mainer Hale was a first cousin of my mother and he and his wife had many children and grandchildren. A. B. (Albert) Stephens married Anna Mayo Clark, and they had ten children and several grandchildren. A. B. Stephens was a first cousin of my father.

My sister, Cynthia, married R. C. Fitzpatrick (Cobb) and they had three children, Delilah, Woodrow and Rhoda. Another sister of mine, Ella, first married Simon Haywood, and they had one child who married Add Slone and they had several children and grandchildren. Upon the death of Simon Haywood my sister married Oscar Miller and they had eight children and many grandchildren. Malc Stephens, who was a cousin of mine, married and had several children and grandchildren. Eli Stephens was a cousin of mine and was married and he had several children and grandchildren. There are several Reeds who are cousins of mine, mostly on Salt Lick. Ned Gearheart married Miranda Stephens, a first cousin of my father, and they had several children and grandchildren. I had one cousin who married a sister of W. J. Vaughn (old Bill). The Herald family on Cow Creek and their children and grandchildren are cousins of mine. Nathan and Nelson Salyers and their sister, Helen, are my cousins. Helen first married a man by the name of Holbrook and one child was born to that union, and she married J. J. (Jimmy) Hatcher and upon the death of Mr. Holbrook Helen married a Johnson, and they had several children and grandchildren. One of the daughters married Rev.
