

Slayer's Identity Baffles Officers

Man Is Shot 4 Times; Car Driven Away

James Chaffins Slain Sunday on Arkansas; Robbery Not Motive

State police and other authorities are at least temporarily baffled as they seek to unravel elements of mystery surrounding the gunshot death on Arkansas Creek, near Martin, Sunday morning of James M. Chaffins, 27.

Gunshots were heard at about 3:45 a.m. Sunday, near the home of Columbus Conn, on the head of Arkansas. Members of the Conn family also heard a man's voice calling for help. They found Chaffins dying, with four bullet wounds in his head, chest and back.

Questions which stump investigators involve not only the identity of the gunman but also the motive for the slaying.

State Detective Chester D. Potter, who went with Commonwealth's Attorney Harold Stumbo and Coroner James J. Carter, to the slaying scene, said robbery was not a probable motive, since approximately \$40 was found on the body.

Chaffins' auto, in which he had driven from Louisville to this county, was missing but was later found, its gas tank empty, off the highway, near David. Bloodstains were in the car. A window had been smashed.

Chaffins, an enameller for American Standard Corp., Louisville, left home almost exactly four hours before he was reported wounded, officers quoted his wife as saying. It is not known if he was accompanied by any other person on the trip to visit his parents, near Garrett. Nor is there any known clue to the identity of the person who drove the car from the death scene to Middle Creek.

State police have done fingerprint work but how successful this has been was not made known. (See Story No. 3, Page 5)

Ballard F. Connors, Jr., formerly of Estill, was the flight engineer aboard the four-engine EC-121 Navy radar patrol plane which was shot down over the Sea of Japan last month. The Times learned last week.

None of the more than 30 crewmen has been reported alive. The attack on the U. S. plane was made by North Korean aircraft at a time when the EC-121 was reportedly 90 miles outside Korean territorial waters.

Young Keith Williamson Gets Kidney Transplant

Paintsville's Bryan Keith Williamson, 11, has the kidney transplant and chance for a normal life for which hundreds of Eastern Kentuckians worked and prayed in a fund-raising drive to pay the cost of the youngster's delicate operation.

Keith underwent surgery at Mt. Sinai Hospital, Cleveland, O., at 4:45 a.m. Monday, immediately after the kidney of a 30-year-old male traffic victim had been made available. Since that time, every report of his condition has been encouraging. His father, Carroll Williamson, manager of Floyd Dry Cleaners & Laundry here, described him 12 hours later as "alert." At noon Monday he waved from the isolation room, where he is scheduled to remain till Wednesday, to his parents standing outside a glass partition. Tuesday night, Mr. Williamson told relatives his son is doing "real well."

A hospital spokesman said doctors were "very satisfied" with Keith's condition but added it will be several days before the results are definitely known. They are hoping he will be able to go home in two weeks.

The boy has been in Cleveland since last January receiving treatment through an artificial

Pike Man's Condition Serious after Head-On Collision at Stanville

The head-on collision of a Volkswagen and a truck hauling a camper at Stanville last Friday night resulted in the serious injury of William Turner, Jr., of Pikeville, and lesser hurts to an Ohio woman.

Turner, occupant of the compact car, suffered pelvic, leg and rib fractures, a dislocated hip and multiple lacerations. He was first taken to the Methodist Hospital at Pikeville and later transferred to Good Samaritan Hospital, Lexington, for surgery.

The truck-camper was driven by William Moder, of Rockbridge, O., returning north from a Florida vacation. Mrs. Moder was treated for minor injuries. Her husband and six-year-old daughter were unhurt.

HIGH COURT DENIES BRIEF

Sets Appeal Deadline On Judge's Decision Involving New School

The appeal filed on behalf of the Floyd County Board of Education from the decision of Special Judge James D. Stephenson was dismissed last week by the Court of Appeals, and residents of Martin, plaintiffs in the suit, were given 20 days from April 28 in which to file appellants' brief.

The appeal was filed by the board of education, although Judge Stephenson's decision favored it in holding that the board may proceed with construction of the proposed school structure at Eastern to serve several communities.

W. W. Burchett, attorney for the board, said it is obvious that the Appellate Court was right in dismissing his appeal, since he had no adverse decision to appeal from, but added that the appeal served its purpose — to get quick action on an appeal. (See Story No. 4, Page 5)

Floyd Native, Retired Insurance Executive, Heart Attack Victim

Body of James J. Hatcher, 67, retired insurance executive who died in Huntington, W. Va., early Sunday morning, was brought home Tuesday for burial in the Holbrook cemetery on the Middle Creek road.

Stricken by a heart attack at the Up-Towner Inn, Huntington, Mr. Hatcher was dead on arrival at the Cabell-Huntington hospital. The fatal seizure came while Mr. and Mrs. Hatcher, residents of Hollywood, Fla., were visiting Huntington relatives and friends.

A son of Mrs. Nora Arnett Hatcher, of Houston, Texas, and the late John H. Hatcher, he was born in this county Jan. 7, 1902. He was educated in the Floyd county schools and at Berea College. Mr. Hatcher at one time was employed in the land department of the Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company, took an active part in Democratic politics in this county, and later entered the insurance field. He moved to Huntington in 1946 and became general agent for the Paul Revere Life Insurance Company, retiring two years ago and moving to Florida.

Mr. Hatcher was a member of the First Baptist Church, Hollywood, Fla., Zebulon Masonic Lodge, Prestonsburg, and the Ft. Lauderdale (Fla.) Elks. In addition to his mother, he is survived by his widow, Mrs. Myrtle Holbrook Hatcher; a daughter, Mrs. Robert K. Cales, Jr., Huntington, W. 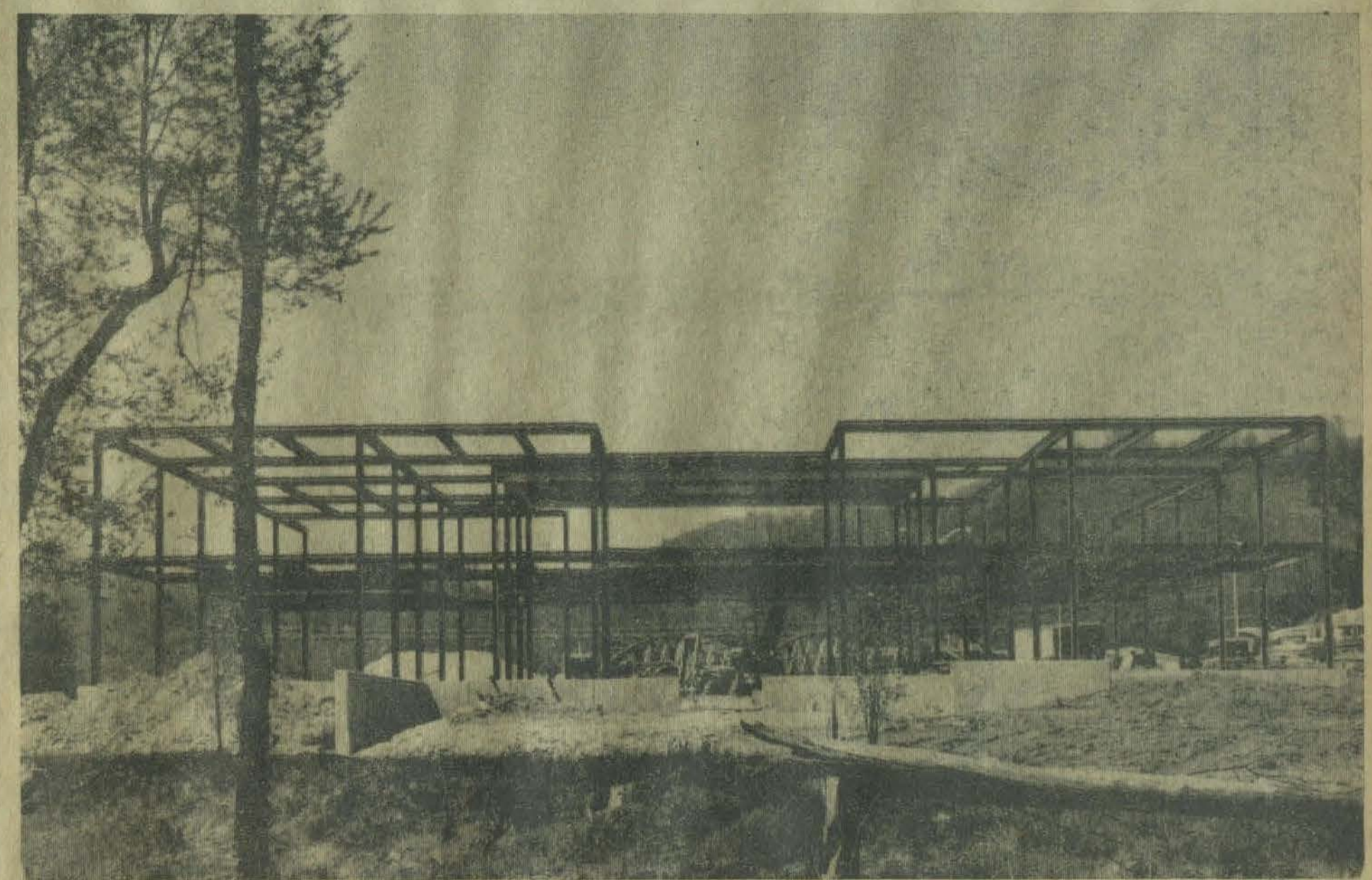

ACCUSED GET TRIAL DELAY

Trial of Two Named In Slaying of Sexton Scheduled Next Month

Trial of James Rife and Ellis Ingram, charged with murder in the Magoffin county slaying of Billy Sexton, former Garrett man, was continued by Circuit Judge John C. Cornett, of the Magoffin circuit court, this week till the reopening of the recessed term on June 3.

The trial was scheduled to begin Monday but was postponed after the accused men reported to the court that they did not have an attorney. Earl Cooper, Salyersville attorney, was named to represent them.

Sexton was slain at his trailer quarters on Howard Branch, across the mountain from David. The Magoffin grand jury did not hear testimony relating to the recent gunshot slaying of County Attorney A. W. Mann. A Coroner's jury ruled Mann's death a homicide.

In addition to the Rife-Ingram case, four murder cases are docketed for trial at Salyersville in June and July.

The court has three murder trials which were continued due to illness of Commonwealth Attorney Afton Smith on original trial dates. Charges against Jackson Pinks for the slaying of Arnold Miller were re-docketed for June 5; James Arnett, Paul Brown Jr. and Russell Arnett, charged in the shooting of Carl Adams, June 24, and Oscar Summa, charged with the slaying of his nephew, Warren Summa, July 16.

City Garbage Truck Is Wrecked Friday

Prestonsburg's garbage disposal service was curtailed this week as the result of the wreck of the newest of its two garbage trucks last Friday at Sugar Loaf.

John Endicott, an employee, suffered head injuries, and K. C. Reed, driver, was bruised when the heavily loaded truck overturned. There was no estimate of the truck damage.

BOARD ACTS TO GET ETV

Quantity Purchase Of TV Sets Okehed Through State Dept.

The Floyd County Board of Education approved Saturday the purchase of between 160 and 170 television sets to make possible on a system-wide basis educational TV reception next year. The purchase is being made through the State Department of Education.

Educational TV already is being received in some schools of the county but only through the use of privately owned sets which have been loaned to the schools. Where cable systems are in operation ETA will be available to schools with the beginning of the next school term. Engineers from the Educational Television Authority will come to this county soon to locate signals and plan reception equipment necessary for schools not served by cable.

In other action the board of education, on recommendation of the superintendent, employed Judy Marshall and William Paul Skeans as substitute teachers and Gail Collins, Glenn Moore and John Shepherd as substitute bus drivers.

Two leaves of absence were granted—to Denver Johnson for the next school year to return to college, and to Olive Belcher because of illness.

But they couldn't agree, and so the problem was certified to the state commission.

 For the Circuit Court



It may be that our present Circuit Judge should be given credit in having made certain improvements in what may be called "The Dignity of The Court." However there are areas in the Administration of Justice which are equally — indeed, more important — to those involved in cases in the Circuit Court. I mention only two in this article and two others on another page in this paper:

1. Written Opinions On Major Decisions.
 Present practice, generally, is for the judge to give his decision from the bench, directing the lawyer winning the case to prepare the written judgement. This often leaves the losing party with little explanation as to why the judge decided as he did. As Circuit Judge I will support all major decisions by a recorded or written opinion.

2. Speedy Action On Cases.
 In only one week of campaigning, I am surprised by the number of people who complain of long delays in deciding their cases. However, the speedy movement of cases is the direct responsibility of the Circuit Judge.

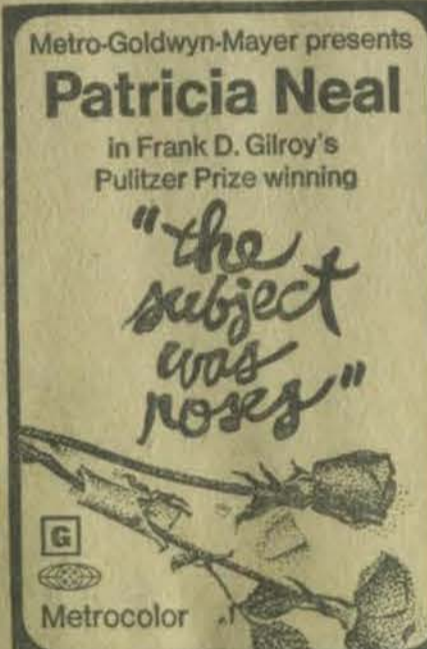

"I don't want to jump on the mining industry. I understand they're trying through use of water sprays and the like to cure this coal dust problem. I've seen 'em gasping for breath. It's a pitiful situation. We're going to hear a lot more about black lung as time goes on."

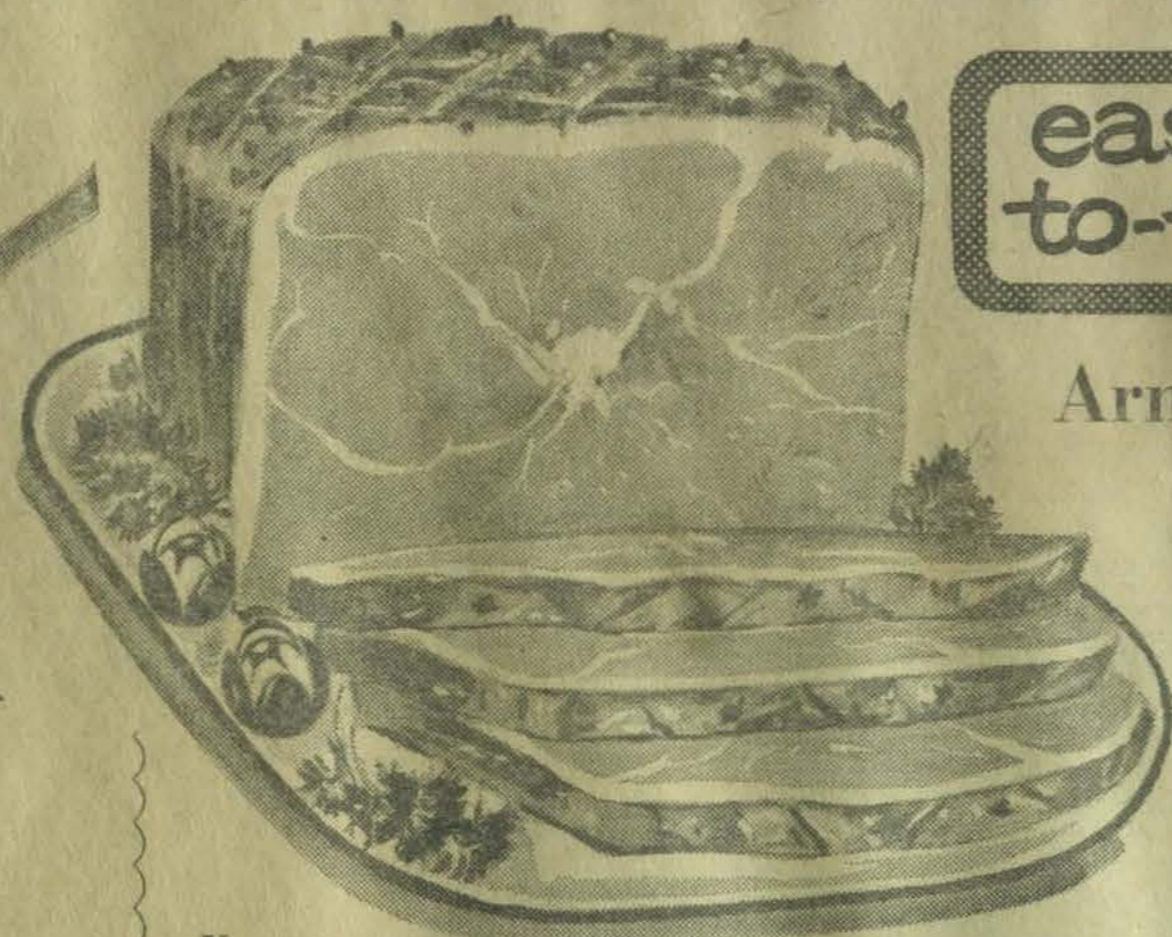

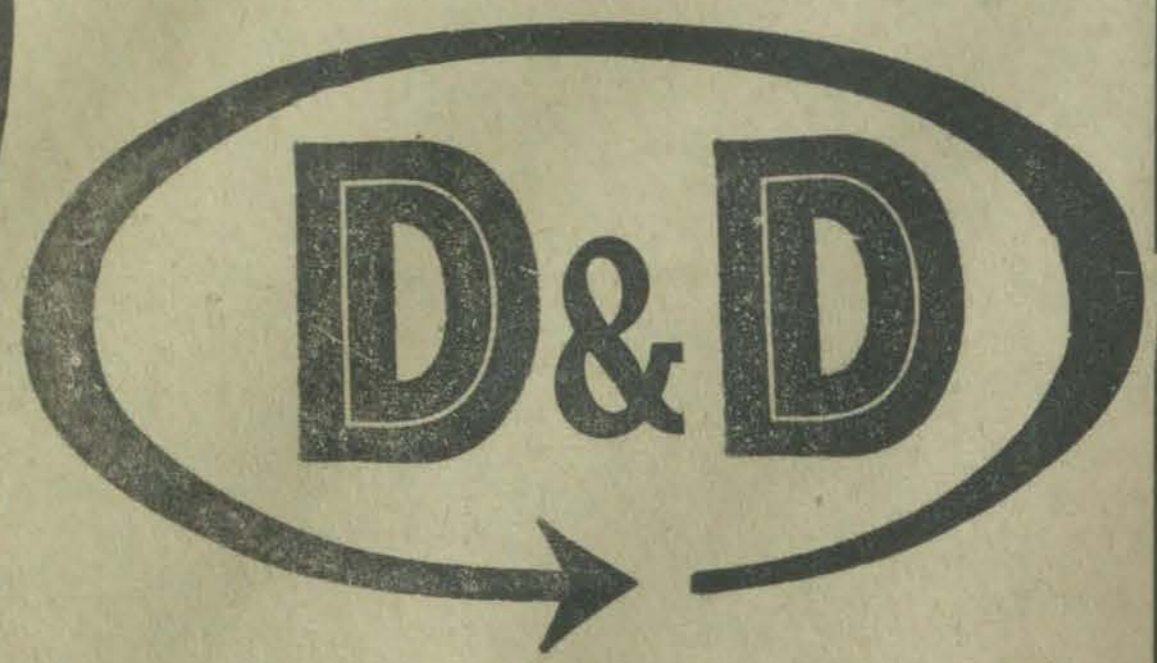

Certainly no Political considerations should be involved. Citizens I have talked with complain that present probate practices have no rhyme or reason. Rest assured if I am elected your Circuit Judge, I shall set up such a policy — and in writing.

EVERETT AKERS for Sheriff

Every man in whom the people has entrusted to office should report to the voters upon his accomplishments. He should make his record an open book and ask that it be examined. A good steward can do no less.

As your Representative at present and now a candidate for Floyd County Sheriff I ask the people to study what I have achieved and the diligence with which I have served your interests. Let's look at my record.

U. S. 23 Made Four-Lane

HR 50 introduced, Feb. 13, 1968. This resolution ask the Highway Department "to reconstruct as a four-lane highway that portion of U. S. 23 from Portsmouth, O. to the Kentucky-Virginia line." Became law March 27, 1968.

\$5,000 Homestead Exemption

Worked hard to secure passage of a bill, HB 479, and sponsored the bill with others, to exempt taxation up to \$5,000 value on homestead of every person over 65 years of age. Taxes often become an intolerable burden to the aged and I fought hard to lift some of the load. That it failed of passage was not due to lack of effort on my part and that of several sponsors. That kind of a law is not popular with the tax specialists in this state and they unlimbered their big guns on us. BUT... we tried and tried hard.

Harold and Lancer Bridges

I worked diligently and steadfastly to get the Harold and Lancer bridges constructed. I made special trips to Frankfort to jog the Highway Department into hurrying the construction of these projects. Now that these bridges are going into construction I have a deep personal satisfaction that I expended so much effort and was successful.

New Road Surfacing

Let's look at the road record—Bituminous surfacing has been laid down on 1.4 miles of the Tinker Fork road, 2.9 miles of the Arkansas Creek road, 2.0 miles of the Martin-Prestonsburg road, 1.8 miles of the Hen Pen Branch road, 2.3 miles of the Stephens Branch road, 1.5 miles of Ky. 1929, and 1.7 miles of the Mare Creek road. This is an outstanding road accomplishment for myself and those who aided me in the short span of my legislative service.

Child Welfare

During my tenure in office as your Representative I have been much interested in the child welfare programs. As evidence of this interest I want to quote a letter I received from George Perkins, Acting Commissioner, dated May 20, 1968, in which he said: "I want to take this opportunity to personally thank you for your interest and concern."

Education

No Representative in Frankfort worked harder and more consistently in the interest of education than I. My record on that needs no elaboration as it is well known. I worked for teacher salary raises as all teachers and school administrators are well aware and I made a special effort to see that appropriations for Prestonsburg Community College were adequate for expansion.

UPON THIS RECORD I STAND and I am proud that I was able to accomplish so much for you. I am now a candidate for Sheriff and I will make you the same dedicated servant in that office as I did as your Representative from the 96th District.

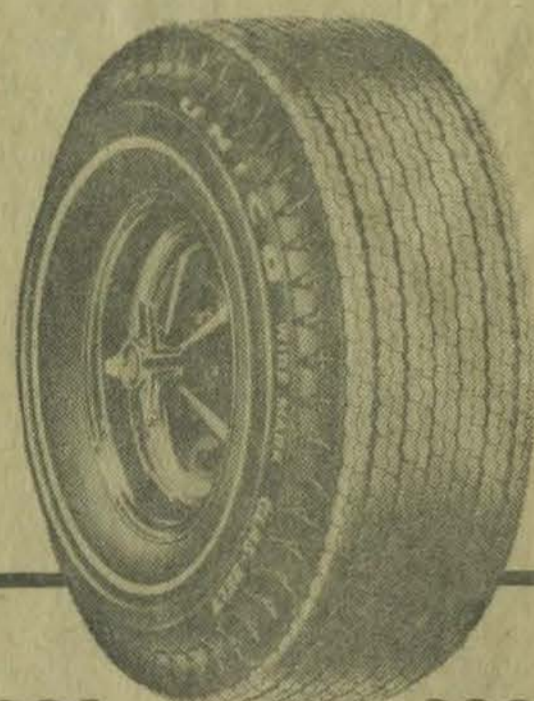

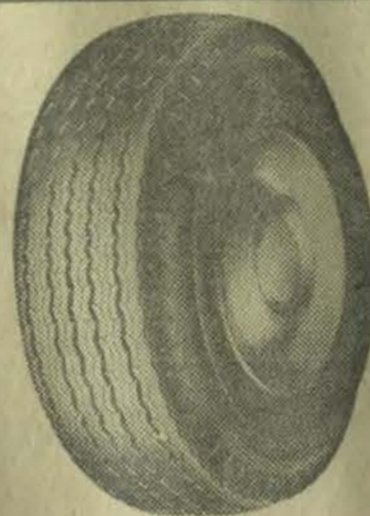

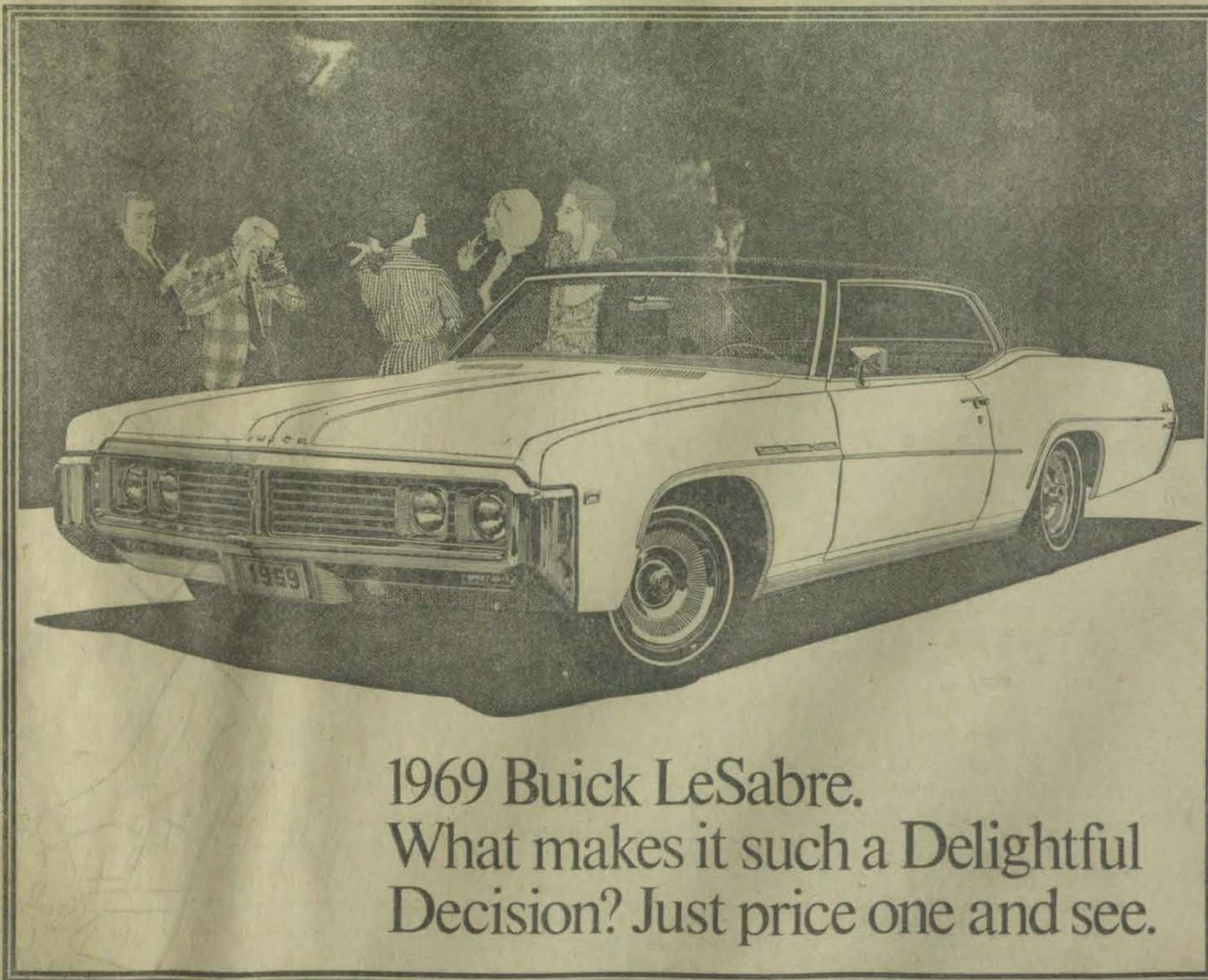

Judge Hollie Conley, of Prestonsburg, awarded compensation to Earl Dale, a former Wheelwright miner, in a black lung case, but his decision was reversed by the Court of Appeals. The Louisville Courier Journal carried the following story, on March 1, 1969.

"The state Court of Appeals yesterday conceded that the weight of evidence was in favor of a Floyd county coal miner claiming workmen's compensation for black lung disease, but said it was powerless under the law to rule in his favor.

"The court voted 6-1, with Judge Edward P. Hill dissenting, to deny \$19,000 in disability payments to Earl Dale of Hager Hill. The ruling reversed Floyd Circuit Judge Hollie Conley, who awarded compensation to Dale after the state Workmen's Compensation Board refused it."

HEART DISEASE REMAINS STATE'S BIGGEST KILLER

Disease of the heart again led the list in causes of death in Kentucky and the United States, according to the vital statistics report for 1967 recently made available to the public by Dr. Russell E. Teague, commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Health, through the Office of Vital Statistics.

Heart disease claimed the lives of 12,350 persons, with a rate of 387.7 per 100,000, higher than the national rate of 366.2. One death from heart disease occurs every 43 minutes in Kentucky.

Second leading cause of death in Kentucky, and also in the United States in 1967, was malignant neoplasms (cancer), causing 4,891 deaths in Kentucky, a rate of 153.5, slightly lower than the national rate of 159.0.

Third and fourth leading cause of death on the state and national level were:

Vascular lesions affecting central nervous system (strokes) claimed 3,894 in Kentucky at a rate of 122.2, higher than the national rate of 102.6.

Accidents totalled 2,105 at a rate of 66.1, higher than the national rate of 55.1. Accidents proved to be the leading cause of death for people under the age of 35 in Kentucky in 1967.

Others in the top ten, in order, in the state: Influenza and pneumonia, except pneumonia of newborn; certain diseases of early infancy; general arteriosclerosis; diabetes mellitus; other bronchopulmonary diseases; other diseases of the circulatory system. The last two were reversed in order on the national level.

Resident deaths by accident were down slightly in 1967 from 1966.

The leading accidental death cause was the motor vehicle, a total of 995, a rate of 31.2 per 100,000 people, down from 1966.

Falls claimed the lives of 342 Kentuckians in 1967, also down slightly from 1966.

Burns and conflagration, 177, down from 1966; drowning and submersion, 96, slightly higher than 1966; firearms, 83, also slightly higher than 1966. Other accidental causes, residual, claimed the lives of 412, slightly higher than in 1966; deaths by suicide, 350, and homicide, 235, also rose slightly in 1967.

Other significant aspects of Kentucky's health picture over the last decade include these facts:

Kentucky's population increased 7.2 per cent, a growth from 2,972,700 in 1957 to 3,185,600 in 1967.

Live birth rate (by residence) decreased 29.5 per cent, from 25.1 to 17.7 per 1,000 population.

Legitimacy, on the upswing in Kentucky and the United States, from 43.8 per 1,000 live births in 1957, to 80.0 in 1967, an increase of 82.6 per cent.

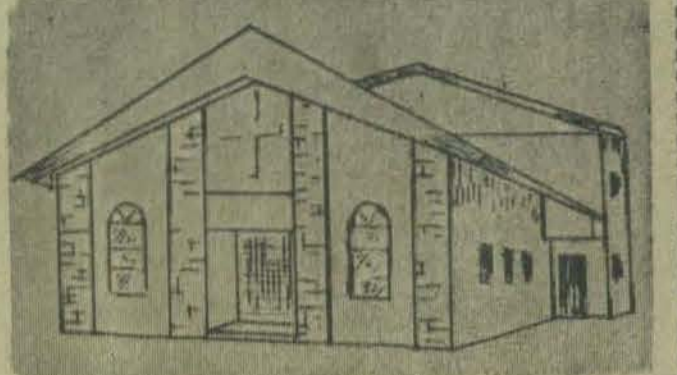
A train crew spotted the dynamite sticks at 9:15 a.m. State police were being assisted in their investigation by railroad

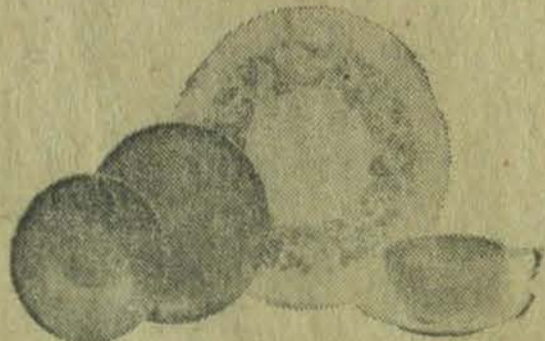

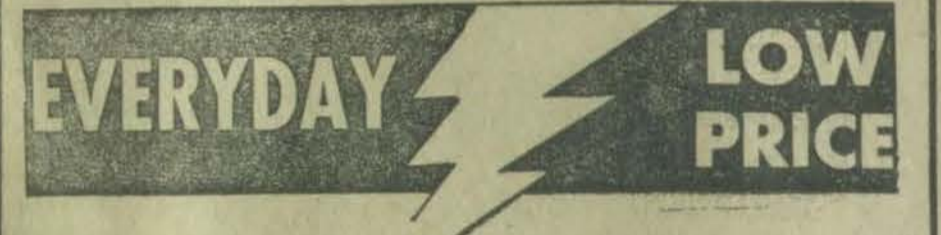

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, we, the members of Local Union 5899, United Mine Workers of America, of Wheelwright, Kentucky, at a regular meeting, are mindful of the many inequities in the present Workmen's Compensation laws of Kentucky, and the need to amend the law in order that the rights of workmen and their dependents can be better protected; and

WHEREAS, we are mindful of the conservative application of our present law by those charged with the administration of it; and

WHEREAS, the shortcomings in the present law and the conservative application of the laws have resulted and will continue to result in rulings and decisions contrary to the best interest of coal miners, their dependent widows and orphans; and

WHEREAS, the membership is desirous of taking positive action to correct these inequities by obtaining more favorable legislation, and by obtaining more liberal interpretation and application of the laws, and toward that end we propose to do everything within our power to obtain the desired results.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That, we, the members of Local Union 5899, United Mine Workers of America, will do everything within our power to obtain more favorable legislation and more equitable application of our present and future Workmen's Compensation laws and toward that end we will contact and seek to secure the support from legislators, other local union members, other labor organizations, business, professional and civic leaders.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That we will seek to have the present Workmen's Compensation and Occupational Disease laws amended so as to include, but not limited to, the following:

1. Miners who have spent more than ten years and develop disabling respiratory conditions shall be presumed to have contracted such condition by reason of their exposure to harmful noxious smoke, dusts and gases in their employment.

2. In the event a workman obtains an award granting him total and permanent disability benefits, and in the event the workman dies before receiving the entire award and leaves a dependent widow and/or children that it shall be conclusively presumed that his death resulted from the injury or disease for which he received compensation during his life, and the remaining compensation due shall be paid to the surviving dependent widow and/or children on a weekly basis.

3. No deduction or discount of the award shall be made for lump sum awards to the workman or his dependents, or for payment of attorneys

fee for services rendered in obtaining the award.

4. The maximum disability and death benefits shall be increased to \$25,500.00, payable in weekly installments. The maximum weekly benefits shall be \$60.00 per week payable for 425 weeks and the minimum shall be \$40.00 per week for 425 weeks. The minimum burial benefits shall be increased to \$1,000.00, and the medical payments shall be increased to \$4,500.00 and in extraordinary cases the workman shall have the right to petition the Board for an increase in that allowance.

5. The circuit courts and the Court of Appeals shall have the power and authority to review and reverse the Workmen's Compensation Board on findings of fact and conclusions of law, if the reviewing court finds from a review of the entire record that the decision of the Board is clearly erroneous.

6. If the employer or its insurance carrier has the workman examined by more than two doctors and the report of these doctors is adverse to the workman then in that event the employee may secure additional medical evidence from additional doctors and the employer or its carrier shall pay for the cost of such examinations and the taking of the doctors' depositions.

7. The employee shall have the right to choose his own physician for the treatment of any injuries or disease he may suffer from as a result of an occupational disease or injury.

ADOPTED at a regular meeting of this Local Union at Wheelwright, Kentucky, this 12th day of April, 1969. The membership does hereby authorize the President, Financial Secretary, Treasurer and Recording Secretary to sign this Resolution in their official capacity and place same in the Minute Book of this meeting.

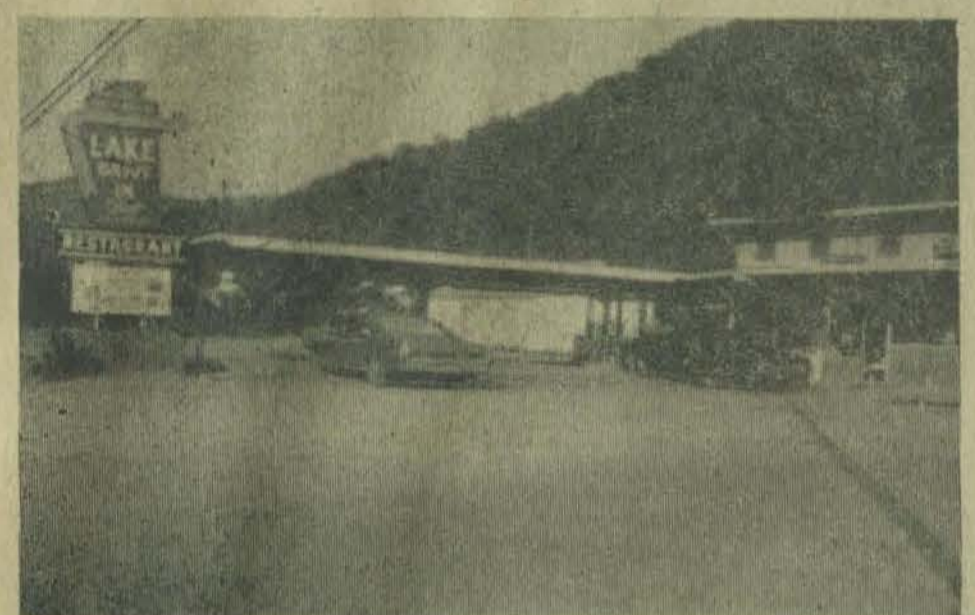

New Louisville Zoo Has Opening, May 1 For Every-Day 'Run'

The Louisville Zoological Gardens opened May 1 on a regular schedule, and will be open every day of the year. In summer the hours are 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. and in winter, 9 to 5.

The zoo is on Trevilian Way, just east of Popular Level Road. Out-of-town visitors can best reach Popular Level Road (Ky. 864) via the Watterson Expressway, which is I-264. Popular Level is between Preston Street and Newburg Road.

Among the 250 animals to be seen at the 58-acre zoo are elephants, giraffes, antelopes, zebras, baboons, rhino, lions, seals, camels, exotic and native birds, llamas, kangaroos, and monkeys. The exhibits are arranged in containers with all the African animals grouped together, Asian, Australian, American, etc. Landscaping and shelters are an integral part of each exhibit area.

The Children's Zoo, a "zoo within a zoo," is especially appealing to the small visitor as it allows closer contact with young animals, both wild and domestic. Special food is available for feeding the animals. The walk-through aviary houses a selection of hardy native and Asiatic birds.

TIDITS of KENTUCKY FOLKLORE
By GORDON WILSON, Ph. D.

THE BIRD MAN

Once, many years ago, while I was out on a very cold day to see birds, I ran into a still. I was almost on it before I saw it and its owner. I spoke, somewhat stiffly, I suppose, and the man spoke, too. He said, "I guess you wonder what I am doing; I am making myself a 'fife whiskey.'" Very quickly I told him I was not looking for him or his still but was — he beat me to the draw: "I know, you're that bird man." My, how much relieved I was, and I felt considerably better when I walked a little farther around a cliff and had a whole hill between his firearms — if any — and me.


That was a long time ago. But it brings back memories of how folksish was the attitude I used to find when I went walking "over the river and through the woods." An occasional land-owner or merely a fellow out hunting would be greatly puzzled that I was wandering around without a boat paddle or a fishing pole or a gun. I did a lot of explaining on numerous occasions but was never harmed or bullied by anybody. Now here's what I am coming to: a half century later I am warmly received everywhere by people on whose farms I look for birds. Some of these people were among my earliest friends and have remained to this day, in Biblical phrase. Some are the children and grandchildren of my earlier friends. And I have so often visited certain places, at all seasons of the year, alone or with a companion or two, that I am actually expected and am good-humoredly scolded when I fail to come by to see the birds on the farm. That is one of the strange joys of growing older, for I am everywhere greeted with questions about birds and with reports of new or old species that have shown up here and there. If a

week went by without some personal encounter with some questioner about birds or without a telephone call or two, I would think that I was back when being a bird man was slightly suspicious at best and maybe considerably worse with many people.

Just before Christmas, 1968, there appeared the third edition of my booklet on the birds of Mammoth Cave National Park. In 1946 I had put out a small booklet on my finds in the park area since my study began there to determine what changes were being made by the growing up of the old farms. In 1953 I had issued another booklet, with my observations of fifteen years in the park, showing a considerable change in bird life. Then, late in 1967, the third edition, called BIRDS AND THEIR HABITATS IN MAMMOTH CAVE NATIONAL PARK, appeared the summary of thirty-one years and almost 700 days and 250 nights in the park. This booklet is a sort of tribute to the changing attitudes toward bird-watchers as well as an ecological study that I have worked so hard to bring to completion or as near completion as the return to forest will now warrant. Ray Harm gave me permission to use on the cover of the booklet a colored picture of the Pileated Woodpecker, in many ways a very memorable bird of the park. The National Park Service brought out the booklet in a very attractive form.

In being a pioneer in studying the changes in bird life in such an area I have had hundreds of helpers: members of our Kentucky Ornithological Society, groups of science teachers from everywhere, groups of our students and faculty; and always I have had the respect and help of the various officials of the park and of the concessions. "That bird man" sounded like a title of honor; and those very words were used over and over, though few of the Mammoth Cave people ever heard the story that I used at the beginning of this article.

Nature Trails By RUFUS M. REED

The Great Trio of Mockers
This great trio consists of the mockingbird, the brown thrasher and the catbird; these are among the most gifted and famous birds of America. But the name "thrushes" is a misnomer, because they are not closely related to these birds; they are the renowned mimics of bird-land.

The mockingbird heads the list and is beyond doubt the most versatile songster of the bird world. Its popularity is shown by its selection by five southern states as the official state bird. These are Arkansas, Florida, Mississippi, Tennessee and Texas. It runs the cardinal a close second as being the state bird; the cardinal is the state bird of seven states.

The mockingbird is sometimes called "the American nightingale," as it often flies high in the air at night to perform some of its classical numbers. It is undoubtedly the Metropolitan Opera star of the bird kingdom; it is a whole bird choir, all wrapped up in a single bird! Once I heard the mockingbird singing the songs of the cardinal so true and perfect it seemed better than the cardinal singing his own song! The mockingbird can imitate the songs of almost any bird and sing them to perfection; it can mock the sounds

of almost anything it hears. If the bird hears the notes of an organ, it listens carefully and imitates them. It can imitate the postman's whistle, the bark of a dog, the creak of rusty hinges, the crowing of a rooster, the cackling of a hen, the plaintive cheeps of young turkeys — just about any sound it hears, the bird imitates perfectly. The mockingbird is one of the great miracles and mysteries of nature; one often wonders why nature bestowed such a gift of genius on this bird and neglected to give certain others the ability to sing. In the mating season, the bird sings both day and night, and in the cotton fields of the south, its ancestral home, the colored folks often say, "Dat ol' mockingbird sings down the chimney all night long." But he is very popular with the southerners and often builds the nest in hedges or shrubbery near the house.

A slender gray bird, it is ten inches long, with a long tail bordered with conspicuous white, and large, white patches on the wings, also two white bars on wings. The eye is light yellow. It is often seen in our region during winter, but does not often nest here; it seems to prefer the cotton fields and plantations of the south as a place to rear the young. The bird is a brave fighter and has been seen to flog a large tomcat and put him on the run; it will even attack a dog or any large animal that comes close to its nest.

THE BROWN THRASHER.
For musical genius this bird runs the mockingbird a close second. It is the state bird of Georgia. It is perhaps more handsome than its cousin; is 11 inches long and is reddish-brown on back and tail. The breast is a light, creamy color and is heavily streaked with black; the throat is white, the bill is long, slender and curves down. The eyes are yellow. Early in the spring, the brown thrasher returns from the south to our region and is usually one of the earliest of the songsters to be heard; it mounts the topmost boughs of a tree and literally pours out its song in a wild torrent of melody. It repeats each note or phrase and emphasizes each with a thrashing movement of the long tail, which is used like the old-time flail with which farmers thrashed their oats — hence the name, "thrasher." This bird's song rouses the farmers and gets them in the notion of plowing and planting. Its song has been interpreted as saying: "Corn is sprouting, corn is growing,

Plowing, hoeing, raking, sowing
Plant it, plant it!
Hoe it, hoe it!
Gather it, gather it!
Hide it, hide it,
I see you, I do do," etc.

The brown thrasher likes to build around the premises of man and usually builds in tangles of vines or thorny shrubs. The bird is of great value to the farmer, as it devours hordes of grasshoppers, caterpillars and various kinds of bugs and beetles.

THE CATBIRD is perhaps more familiar to people of rural America than either the mockingbird or thrasher. While it is not the state bird of any state,

it is sometimes called "the true Kentucky Colonel." It has many of the characteristics of this aristocratic breed; it is sleek, vain, suave and has a touch of humor in its makeup; it is an extrovert, a show-off and likes to be seen as well as heard. It always looks sleek and handsome in a slate-gray suit, a jaunty black cap and a mischievous look in the eye as it mocks the cat. The first sign of the catbird's return from the south is the contented news coming from the yard or orchard. While it ranks third as a songster in this trio, it is by no means lacking in musical talent. It puts its heart into its musical offering and pours it out, hours at a time. Some of the notes are harsh but many are musical, suggesting the notes of a violin or a flute. It can also reproduce the songs of other birds like the wood thrush and the oriole. 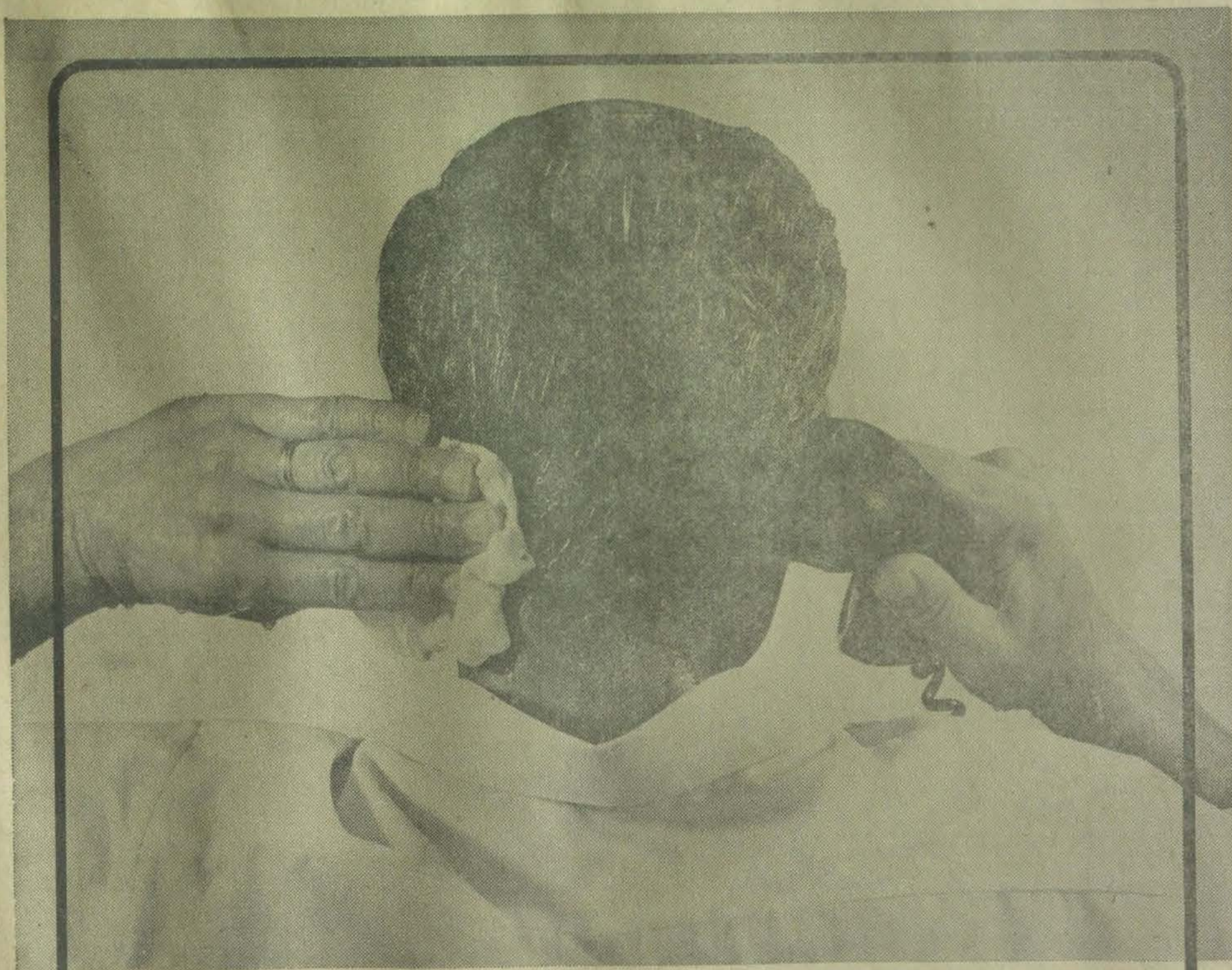

ORDINANCE NO. 2-69

An Ordinance of The City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, providing for the assessment of Real and Personal Property and for the levy of a general property tax at the rate of Thirty Cents (30c) per each One Hundred Dollar (\$100.00) valuation of Real and Personal Property located within the corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, on January 1st, 1969, and a further levy of Poll Tax of One Dollar and Fifty Cents (\$1.50) on each male person over the age of 21 years and under the age of 65 years residing within the corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, on January 1st, 1969, with certain statutory exemptions. WHEREAS, it is necessary in order to provide the revenue required for general purposes of the city's government, including general expenses of the city, but not limited to general health, sanitation, maintenance of streets, operation of parks, and other necessary and indispensable services, affecting the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, that a tax be levied upon all property, both real and personal, having a tax situs in the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, for all such expenses for general purposes during the year of 1969 in said City is in the amount of \$220,500.00 and the budget's source of revenue for 1969, includes an estimated amount of \$76,000.00 to be derived from such property taxes and without such amount to be derived from such property taxes, the revenue required for such general purposes would be insufficient. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY, AS FOLLOWS: SECTION 1. A tax is hereby levied upon all property, both real and personal, having a tax situs in the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, as of January 1, 1969, for general purposes, including general expenses of the City. All monies received hereunder shall be paid to the City Treasurer of Prestonsburg and placed in the credit of a general fund of the City and shall be used in defraying current and incidental expenses of said government. The tax hereby is levied as follows: A. The sum of thirty cents (30c) for each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of all real and personal property located within the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, as of January 1, 1969. B. A poll tax of \$1.50 on each male person over the age of 21 years and under the age of 65 years, residing within the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, on January 1, 1969, excepting those persons exempt from tax under KRS 92.300(3) and KRS 142.020. SECTION 2. The property taxes and poll taxes for the year 1969 shall become due and payable on October 1, 1969, by which date tax notices shall have been mailed each taxpayer, and all taxes paid prior to November 1, 1969, shall be allowed a discount of 2%; all property and poll taxes for the year 1969 becoming due and payable on November 1, 1969. SECTION 3. All taxpayers who do not pay the tax herein levied prior to January 1, 1970, shall be required to pay a penalty of 6% of the amount of the tax in addition to the tax levied herein. SECTION 4. All taxpayers who do not pay the tax herein levied on or before the 1st day of April, 1970, shall be required to pay a penalty of 25% of the amount of the tax in addition to the tax levied herein. SECTION 5. The Delinquent Tax Collector is hereby authorized to advertise for sale in a newspaper having a general circulation in Floyd County, Kentucky, all delinquent taxes on real property placed in his hands for collection and the charge for such advertising shall be added to the amount of the tax bill. SECTION 6. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed, and this Ordinance shall take effect as of the date of adoption and publication as required by law. SECTION 7. The provisions of this Ordinance are severable, and if any of the provisions or penalties provided herein shall be held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision of the court will not affect or impair any other section, clause, provision or portion of the Ordinance which is not in itself invalid or unconstitutional.
