## P'Burg Featured In June Coronet

### Towns That Would Not Die Listed

#### Story of Successful Fight for Survival Here Is Recounted

The June number of CORONET Magazine, which went on sale Tuesday, has the article, "Seven Small Towns That Refused To Die" — and Prestonsburg is one of the seven.

The article which features Prestonsburg was written by James P. Cushman, and it points out that at a time when many small towns are becoming obsolete, others such as Prestonsburg are growing and thriving.

In a note to THE TIMES, the editor said:

"Thanks to the townspeople who consider small-town life to be good life, these towns are still on the maps of America."

The six other communities sharing the honor with Prestonsburg are Plainville, Kans., Sanford, Maine, Gwinn, N. D., Harlowton, Mont., Mora, Minn., and Zionsville, Indiana.

Prestonsburg is described by the CORONET writer as "The Town That Vanquished Unemployment." The article points out that automation and strip-mining in the coal industry had brought unemployment to 75% of the working force; the high school dropout rate was one of the highest in the nation; most migrated north for jobs; few went to college, and of those who did, eight of every ten never returned; property values shrank, despair deepened.

Then, aroused to the situation, a Community Development Committee (Co-De-Co) was formed, enlisting the interest and work of many citizens and organizations. A cleanup campaign followed, promotion of tourism and enticements to industry were featured. A group of citizens backed their talk with cash, built a 30,000-square-foot building for Kentucky Appalachian Industries (KAI), and the number of unemployed was quickly reduced by some 350.

Later, a successful drive for money with which to buy a site for a U. S. Shoe Company plant was carried out, and a second industry came to Prestonsburg. (See Story No. 2, Page 6)

## NO POLITICS IS WARNING

### CAP Director Tells Members, Workers Of Reports Heard

"Lay off the politics," Harry Eastburn, executive director of the Big Sandy Area Community Action Program, has, in effect, warned staff members and employees.

In a memorandum addressed to all personnel and the staff of the Big Sandy Area CAP and delegated programs, Eastburn said:

"It has come to my attention that some members are circulating stories that this elected official or that elected official has got them their job. This is not true. While the elected officials from each county are on the Board, they do not hire or fire.

"This is a notice for all personnel to refrain from making such statements. . . A continuation of attributing your hiring to any specific person running for office may be interpreted as campaigning under the Hatch Act and may result in termination of your job."

## TOWN WORKS ON UTILITIES

### For Kenwood Plant; Paintsville To Lay Sewer Line to Site

The city of Paintsville, with the help of federal agencies, will spend an estimated \$800,000 to provide water and sewerage services to the Kenwood site where American Standard, Inc. is moving toward the building of a \$5.7 million plant, Paintsville Mayor J. B. Wells said last week.

Of that total, approximately \$500,000 will be spent on a sanitation sewer project to connect the site with the Paintsville sewage disposal plant. The water line extension was recently completed to the future plant at a cost of \$390,000.

Outlining plans for the sewerage facility, Wells said the city will have an investment of around \$75,000 in the two undertakings.

In addition to this work, the Johnson County Board of Education is planning construction of an elementary school to serve the Kenwood vicinity.

The Paintsville City Council was joined in a study of the proposed sewer line construction by representatives of the EDA, the Kentucky Pollution Control Commission, the Kentucky Extension Service, city consulting engineers and the board of education.

The American Standard plant is being designed to employ 250, mostly men, immediately on its completion next year.

## Sturgill Resigns, Airs CAP Conflict

A brewing rift in the organization of two Floyd county programs materialized Monday when Cecil Sturgill, of Harold, resigned the chairmanship of both the Floyd County Community Program and the Floyd County Planning and Development Association.

Sturgill mailed notice of his resignation Monday, with an immediate effective date, a few hours prior to the scheduled meeting at the courthouse here of both groups. Neither group selected his successor. Daniel Akers, vice-chairman, presided at the meeting, and both organizations recessed, as is usual during the summer months, till the second Monday in September.

Sturgill gave a conflict of opinions and interest as the reason for his resignation. He said a personality conflict had existed between him and Floyd CAP Director Douglas Morrison and Big Sandy CAP Director Harry Eastburn.

"We just don't agree on programs, personnel and activities in which Floyd county is participating," he said, adding that more difficulties have recently developed into what he described as an "intolerable situation." The differences, he said, involve recent personnel hiring and placement and the organization and operation of the two programs.

Sturgill had earlier preferred charges against Morrison and had sought removal of the latter from his post in this county.

Asked for comment on the situation, Morrison said, "Mr. Eastburn and I have no conflict with Mr. Sturgill as far as we know. The only conflict appears to be that his opinions do not always agree with federal guidelines for these programs. I feel that Mr. Sturgill is sincere and dedicated and is entitled to his opinions,

Last Sunday was the 105th day since seven-year-old Beverly Akers was drowned in the Big Sandy river with her mother and younger sister, and the search for her body that day was as fruitless as on all the others.

Sunday's search was made by the Floyd County Emergency & Rescue Squad, which refuses to give up despite all the discouragements of many days of patrolling and dragging the stream.

Squad leaders and members say they will not give up the search until the child's body is found. They are mainly devoting week-ends to the search, and have patrolled the river as far

## Wounded Tram Man Taken To Lexington

John Ed Osborne, 26-year-old Tram man, was transferred from the Methodist Hospital, Pikeville, to a Lexington hospital for treatment, May 2, a few hours after he had been wounded in his left side and arm by a shotgun blast in Pike county.

The shooting took place at 3 a.m. on Lower Chloe Creek, near Pikeville, and Elster Lee, 30, at whose home the altercation took place, was placed under bond to appear for examining trial later.

Pikeville Police Chief Bob May said Lee told him Osborne came to his home, created a disturbance and was put out of the house but returned and opened the door. He said Osborne had a rock in his hand when he fired.

## Help Asked By Probers Of Slaying

### Man's Suitcase Found On Middle Cr. Enters Chaffins Case Study

Leads strongly pointing to the identity of the slayer of James M. Chaffins, 37, who was found dying of bullet wounds on Arkansas Creek, near Martin, the night of May 4, are in possession of State Police but they aren't saying what these clues are.

That a hitch-hiker may be suspect was seen in the television request for information from persons who know of such a person having been in the slaying vicinity or near where the victim's car was found on Middle Creek, roughly 10 miles from the murder spot. But officers do not admit even this.

A man's suitcase was found on the hillside near the mouth of the Open Fork of Middle Creek, more than a mile from where Chaffins' auto was found. State Police laboratories are checking it, and fingerprints taken from the auto are also under check.

Investigators have been told that Chaffins left his home in Louisville with two suitcases. The second bag has not been found. Contents of the suitcase that was found included items of a man's clothing, a razor, toothbrush and other articles.

Because approximately \$40 in cash was found on Chaffins' person probers at first discounted robbery as a motive for the slaying. Now, they are not certain, surmising that the slayer may have been frightened away when lights came on in the nearby home of Columbus Conn, immediately after the shots were fired.

Chaffins was dying of bullet wounds in his head, chest and back when members of the Conn family reached him. He died without identifying his slayer.

## Man's Body Found In Ashes of Home

A search Thursday morning of the ruins of a Lackey residence that had been destroyed by fire a few hours earlier uncovered the charred body of its tenant, 20-year-old Ballard Edward Hall.

Investigators surmised that Hall may have been overcome by smoke during his attempt to leave the flaming structure. They were convinced there was no foul play involved in the tragedy.

The blaze was discovered at about 2:40 a.m. last Thursday by Mrs. Mary Collins, owner of the building. The frame residence stood at the rear of the Collins Hardware and Furniture Store, and the business structure was saved only through the use of

garden hose. Several windows were broken by the heat.

The victim was a son of Gurnies and Beulah Mae Hall, of Estill. Other survivors are six brothers and three sisters, James Hall, of Kite, Phillip Hall, Ft. Knox, Ky., Ray Dwayne, Gary Lynn, Delmas Ray and Gurnies Ray Hall, all of Estill, Donna, of Cleveland, O., Bonnie and Lavonne Hall, both of Estill.

Funeral rites were conducted Sunday at 10 a.m. from the Lackey Free Will Baptist Church, and burial was made in the Rene Hall cemetery on Dry Creek under direction of the Hall Brothers Funeral Home.

## PRESTONSBURG FIRM LOSES \$330,000 STATE CONTRACT WITH DEPT. OF HIGHWAYS

A spokesman for Highway Commissioner Eugene Goss announced in Frankfort Monday that the Department of Highways has cancelled a \$303,375 personal service contract with the East Kentucky Construction Co., Prestonsburg, for rental of heavy equipment.

The Prestonsburg firm's original contract, the Frankfort source said, was for \$330,000. No projects were under way when the contract was cancelled, it was said.

Commissioner Goss' department said he is cancelling "opened" contracts such as this in favor of a policy of writing individual contracts for specific projects. This may mean that an owner of heavy equipment will

have no contract with the state until a specific need for his machinery arises and might discourage firms from holding equipment in readiness for work that is uncertain.

## Pfc. Donald Haywood Drowns in Vietnam

Marine Corps Pfc. Donald Haywood, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Haywood, of Blue River, was reported this week to have lost his life in Vietnam.

His death was not the result of direct enemy action, it was said. The report received here said he was drowned while crossing a river.

Arrival date of the body here has not been learned.

# Everett Akers Supported Black Lung Legislation

The Courier-Journal, in its March 28 issue, in an article by Hugh Morris, of Frankfort, noted Representative Everett Akers' stand on pneumoconiosis or black lung. The Courier-Journal stated that "Improving the state's workmen's compensation law regarding payments to sufferers of pneumoconiosis (black lung)—a respiratory disease to which coal miners are susceptible" would be the subject of a joint legislative committee study.

The Courier-Journal thought that Akers' support of the study and the proposed improvement of the workmen's compensation laws so important that they quoted his support and wrote: "Representative Everett Akers, D-Martin, Ky., said he understands one of the big problems to be the fact that coal miners have to pay as much as \$4,000 to \$5,000 in legal fees to collect, perhaps \$20,000 in compensation."

The Courier-Journal went on to quote Akers: "I think the state ought to set up a medical committee of three doctors and if miners get the disease they ought to be able to go before this committee and get their money without having to give away a third or a fourth of it to lawyers to collect it for them."

"I don't want to jump on the mining industry. I understand they're trying through use of water sprays and the like to cure this coal dust problem. I've seen 'em gasping for breath. It's a pitiful situation. We're going to hear a lot more about black lung as time goes on."

Representative Everett Akers was thus one of the first supporters of Black Lung legislation. This support was just another area of progressive representation at Frankfort.

## FRANCIS AT PARLEY WHERE DEFENSE OF POOR TALKED

As chairman of the National Conference of Bar Examiners, Fred G. Francis, Prestonsburg attorney, is attending the three-day National Defender Conference which began in Washington, D. C., Wednesday evening.

The conference is being sponsored by the American Bar Association, the U. S. Attorney General's office and the National Defender Association.

In circulation before Wednesday's conference opening was a plan advanced by Prof. Lewis R. Katz, of Case Western Reserve Law School, Cleveland, O., to draw prosecution and defense lawyers from a common pool and have them paid by state governments for the defense of the poor.

In spite of its achievements, Katz said, weaknesses pervade the entire system of criminal justice in American cities.

"Whether formal charges are to be made, the nature of the charge actually filed, the quality of the hearing that the accused receives, and the penalty that will be imposed if the defendant is convicted are all too much determined by the district attorney's station in life."

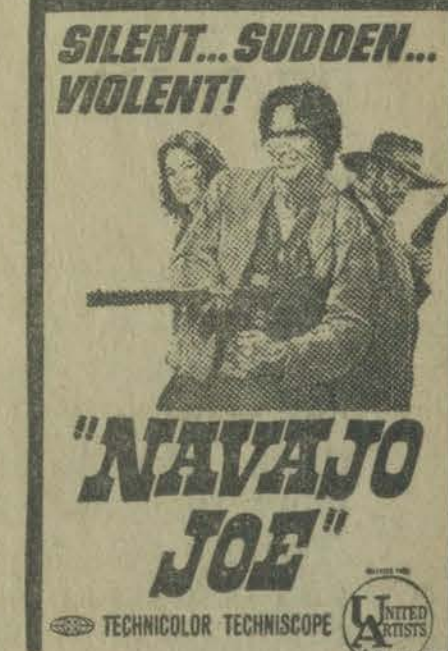

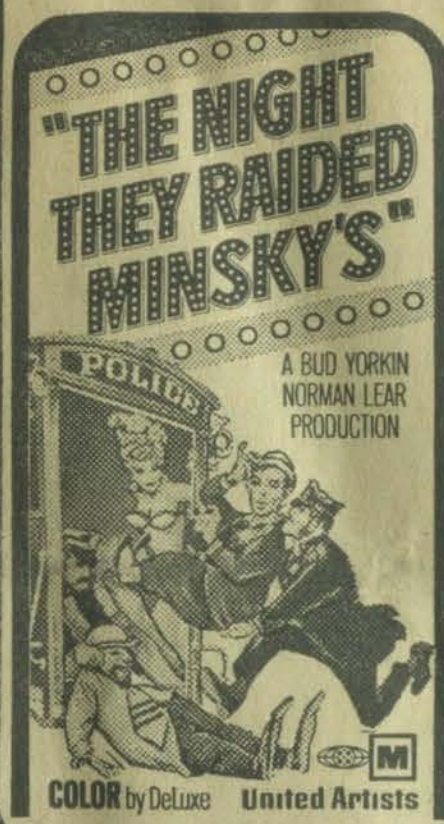

## Judge Hollie Conley Rules In Favor Of Earl Dale In Black Lung Case



Judge Hollie Conley, of Prestonsburg, awarded compensation to Earl Dale, a former Wheelwright miner, in a black lung case, but his decision was reversed by the Court of Appeals. The Louisville Courier Journal carried the following story on March 1, 1969.

"The state Court of Appeals yesterday conceded that the weight of evidence was in favor of a Floyd county coal miner claiming workmen's compensation for black lung disease, but said it was powerless under the law to rule in his favor.

"The court voted 6-1, with Judge Edward P. Hill dissenting, to deny \$19,000 in disability payments to Earl Dale of Hager Hill. The ruling reversed Floyd Circuit Judge Hollie Conley, who awarded compensation to Dale after the state Workmen's Compensation Board refused it."

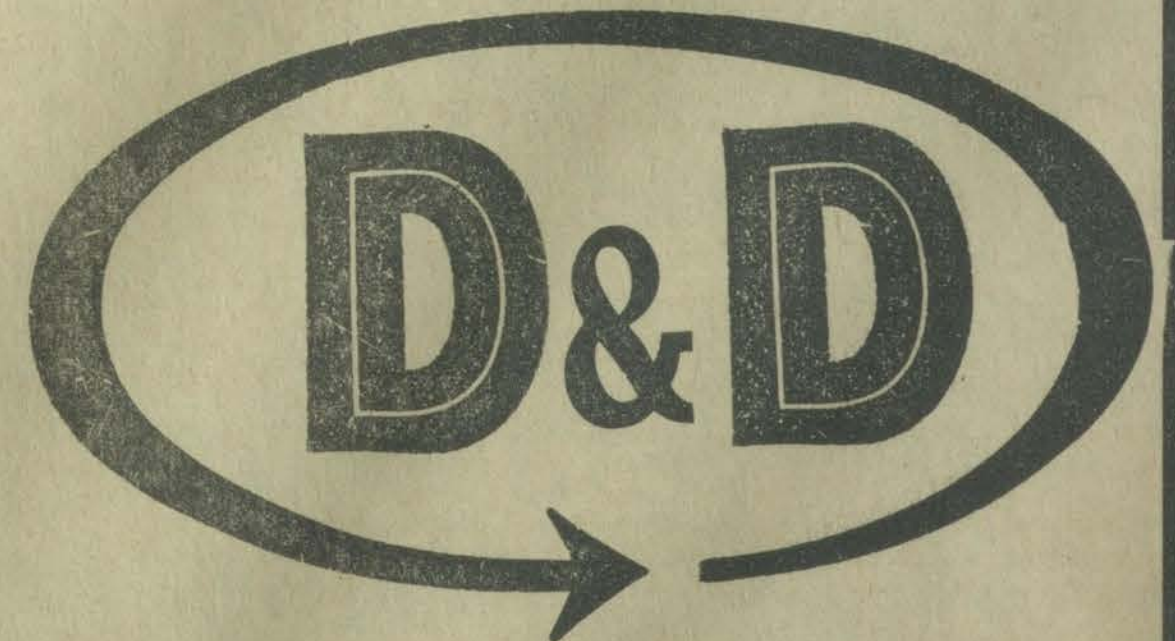

I made special trips to Frankfort to jog the Highway Department into hurrying the construction of these projects. Now that these bridges are going into construction I have a deep personal satisfaction that I expended so much effort and was successful.

### New Road Surfacing

... Let's look at the road record—Bituminous surfacing has been laid down on 1.4 miles of the Tinker Fork road, 2.9 miles of the Arkansas Creek road, 2.0 miles of the Martin-Prestonsburg road, 1.8 miles of the Hen Pen Branch road, 2.3 miles of the Stephens Branch road, 1.5 miles of Ky. 1929, and 1.7 miles of the Mare Creek road. This is an outstanding road accomplishment for myself and those who aided me in the short span of my legislative service.

### Child Welfare

... During my tenure in office as your Representative I have been much interested in the child welfare programs. As evidence of this interest I want to quote a letter I received from George Perkins, Acting Commissioner, dated May 20, 1968, in which he said: "I want to take this opportunity to personally thank you for your interest and concern."

### Education

I worked for teacher salary raises as all teachers and school administrators are well aware and I made a special effort to see that appropriations for Prestonsburg Community College were adequate for expansion.

**Education—Everybody's Business**

Tomorrow's businessman, mechanic, engineer — how well will the student of today be trained to meet the skills and requirements these careers demand? How well will the student be able to perform capably in both his job and community living? These questions are causing widespread discussion today regarding vocational education — its importance and future.

Many educators, business and professional people believe that when a student finishes high school he should be prepared for one of the following:

1. College.
2. Entrance into a vocational-technical school.
3. Gainful employment.

According to the latest statistics from the U. S. Department of Education, only one of five high school graduates obtain a 4-year college degree. What success then, if any, can the remaining untrained students expect from life? Vocational education now has an opportunity to provide an optimistic answer, to put interest and drive back in the discouraged student, to teach him what he is wanting to learn — a life trade.

Kentucky has recognized the importance of vocational education in today's world which has entered into the pushbutton age with electronics taking over.

In the last fiscal year, a record 111,625 students were enrolled in vocational education programs in Kentucky. Of this figure, an estimated 70,000 fall within the high school or young adult age levels.

Expenditures for vocational education in the Commonwealth for this current fiscal year amount to \$21,099,782, of which \$10,359,984 comes from state funds, \$2,119,791 is provided from local funds and the remainder falls under federal funding.

The current Kentucky vocational program is being offered in 816 high schools, 6 community colleges, 6 universities, two 4-year colleges, 13 area vocational schools and 29 extension centers. Twenty-two new extension schools are under construction or approved for construction and expansion or improvement of facilities in the 13 area vocational schools is underway.

As a result of last year's Legislature action, 186 new vocational units were allotted to school districts and building additions to 5 area vocational schools totaling \$5,910,019 were completed.

Five new extension centers were completed at a cost of \$1,367,890; construction totaling \$1,594,736 was initiated in two area vocational schools and construction was begun in 11 vocational

extension centers which will cost \$4,601,903.

Progress in the vocational education field has and is being made.

Yet, in order to make a public school curriculum vocational school-oriented, a number of changes must be made:

\*\* We must revitalize curriculum which allows a student to become a "force-out" because of "lack of interest" in the subjects taught.

\*\* We must provide more guidance and counseling services in order to let our students know the choices of trades available to them and geared to their capabilities.

\*\* We must instill in teachers the desire to better prepare their students for industry, assuring a desirable student-teacher cooperation worthy of a boy or girl's interest and eagerness to learn.

\*\* We must train a student in all the varied skills of a vocation — teaching him to keep himself up-to-date on every facet of an industry, not just a part.

\*\* We must channel our vocational monies so that they are applied where needs are at all levels.

While the Federal education budget earmarks 51 per cent of funds for higher education and 38 per cent for elementary and secondary education, only 7.8 per cent is channeled to aid vocational education.

To better educate our young people for the changing world of work, the above changes must be made.

Some people are saying, "Never," and some, "Soon." But many are saying, "Now."

Adults realize that training for a job isn't just a one-time thing, but a process of continuous retraining during a lifetime. It is time we realized this in education. For in this age of science and technology, there is little demand for the untrained and unskilled person.

The Kentucky Department of Education is taking the appropriate steps necessary to face the future's vocational challenge. As evidence, let's look at the new Ashland Area Vocational School which I dedicated April 25.

Completed last August at a cost of \$1,710,000, the new school contains approximately \$750,000 worth of equipment. It has approximately 90,000 square feet of floor space and facilities and equipment for teaching trades which range from general clerical to cosmetology, electronics technology, practical nursing and tool and die making.

The enrollment in this school consists of high school juniors and seniors, post-secondary students, out-of-state youth and adults. In addition to those students who are in full-time training to learn basic skills, there are many already employed personnel who attend classes on a part-time basis to up-grade their present skills.

Since opening last September, a total of 2,200 students have enrolled. Let this figure answer the question, "Does the need for vocational training exist?"

This one example clearly shows what is happening throughout Kentucky — an ever-growing desire on the part of the state's populace to become oriented to the world of work.

Kentucky's vocation program — one willing to change as change warrants — is the beginning of a well-laid plan. A plan geared to avoid the danger of operating industry at the expense of inadequately trained workers.

Reliable information has come to me that two or more candidates for other offices have been telling people that I am too old to be a candidate for office, but at the same time others running for office are about as old as I am and nothing is said about them. Age has nothing to do with competency and efficiency in office. Pike county is considered a progressive county and Pikeville is classed as an all-American City. Bessie Riddle Arnold was never defeated for county clerk and upon her death her father became county clerk at the age of 90 but it seems what is good for Pike county is not good for Floyd county.

I know the names of those who are talking about my age but it seems to me that they have plenty to do in their own behalf without trying to pass judgment upon me, and if they don't know better they will know on May 27th. I have never made it a practice to attend churches and funerals for political purpose, since I think the public does not approve of it; however, it is different when one regularly does attend such services. Some candidates only do this every four years.

There has been appearing in The Floyd County Times a statement that is supposed to be that of Charles Bailey, but so far I have been unable to locate such a man, but he seems to know all about political matters in Floyd county, and it is my opinion that Mr. Bailey did not himself prepare such statement. Since I could not locate him, I did find in the office of the County Judge where a Charles Bailey was tried and fined by a jury, which appears upon Order Book No. 10, Page 357, March 24, 1969.

I assume there will be an attempt to form a slate of candidates and I know that I have been on slates and they were shattered to pieces and I was left out, fully and completely. Usually when a big money pot is formed those who donate the most are left on the sidelines. If there is such a slate, it will not work, except maybe in a few places. I know it will not work. I have tried it, and it never did work for me.

Any voter who cannot read or write is required to make an affidavit that he or she is unable to do so, and then it becomes the duty of judges of the precinct election to show them just how to vote. But if the judges are lined up with certain candidates the person so voting may be voted for whom the judges are supporting and the voter leaves the polling place, thinking he voted for those whom he or she desired, but that may not be the case at all. In short, his vote has been stolen, which is a criminal offense. I made an effort during the last meeting of the Legislature to have such voters protected by amending the Act in this regard and to permit such persons the right to choose whoever they desired to assist them just how to vote for their choice of candidates. However, such amendment was never introduced.

I am in this race of my own will and no one urged or requested me to do so, but I was urged to run for one of two other offices which I declined. I have always acted upon my own judgment. Sometimes I was right and sometimes I was wrong, but if I made a mistake, it was my own. Most all of your judges of the Supreme Court are old men and their decisions are considered wise and just, in most cases.

As a Democrat, I wish to state that I have contributed more money to the cause of the Democratic party in Floyd county than any man, living or dead. The most important matter before the American people today is the constant increase in taxes and higher and higher salaries and less efficiency and performance in office. You may put this down in your little red book that there will come a time that the taxpayers will revolt and rebel against these constant increases. It is now being heard in the Congress of the United States. The people who pay the bill want to know where and how their money is being spent and whether it is doing any good or not.

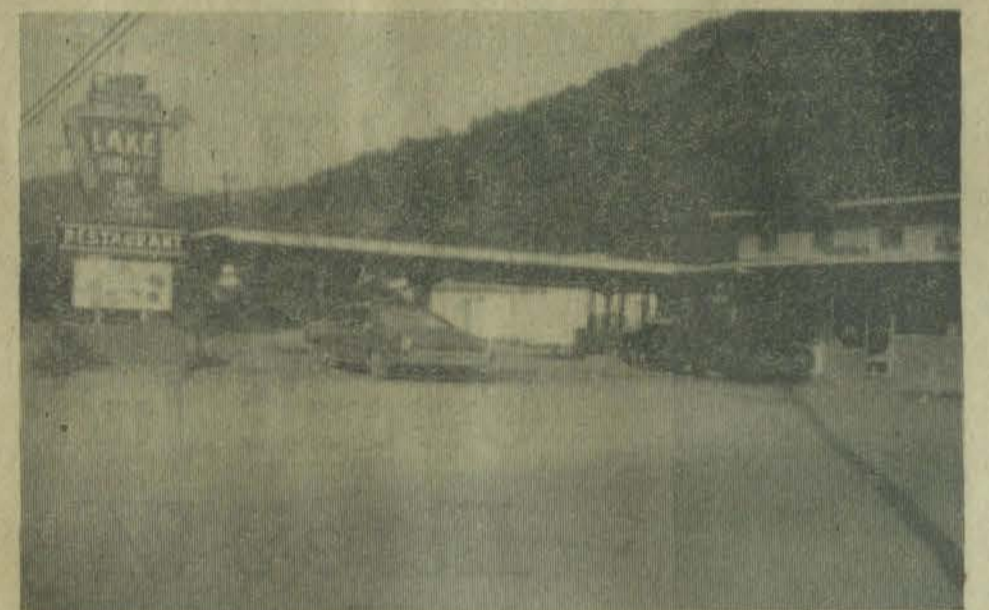

WILDFLOWER TREASURE**

It's not too late to plan for an outing in the woodlands of state parks in Eastern Kentucky and enjoy a hike on a trail that leads to wildflower treasure.

The first week in May found wildflower enthusiasts enjoying more than 45 species of flowers along trails in the Red River Gorge.

The following were among those identified and listed:

Jack-in-the-pulpit, wild ginger, blue cohosh, chickweed, sweet pepperbush, stone crop, toothwort, trailing arbutus, teaberry, wild geranium, dwarf crested iris, yellow mandarin, Solomon's seal, False Solomon's seal, great white trillium, and red trillium, pink trillium, showy orchis, blue phlox, wild strawberry, bluets, partridge berry, bishop's cap, foam flower, sweet white violet, smooth yellow violet, halberd leaved violet, wild white violet, meadow violet, birdfoot violet, long spurred violet and bellwort.

There were many other spring flowers not quite in bloom, meaning that the same trails soon will be thick with blossom of Mountain Laurel and Rhododendron. Wild herb plants were noted as well

as different mosses, grasses and various kinds of ivy including (beware) the well-known and disliked poison ivy.

Some steep areas at the bases of tall cliffs were thick with white trillium as if they had been spattered in a great snowball fight. Violets, iris and showy orchis were outstanding in their delicate beauty.

## National Geographic 'Discovers' Kentucky

Frankfort — The prestigious old National Geographic magazine, whose forte is portraying the natural beauty and wonders of the world, is beginning to "discover" Kentucky.

The "discovery" was made recently in a brief flight, arranged by Gov. Louie B. Nunn, over Central Kentucky for the magazine's vice president and associate editor, Gilbert M. Grosvenor,

and his wife, Donna.

The Grosvenors, who travel the world over, writing and photographing as a team, left Kentucky impressed by its scenic and rugged beauty and expressed a desire to return in a mobile home for a four or five-day tour, according to a state public information officer who accompanied them on the flight.

Among views which most impressed the Grosvenors were The Palisades and the curving Kentucky River in northern Mercer county, which Grosvenor said is more beautiful than the Potomac River, historically known for its beauty.

Highlight of the flight, however, was to have been over the controversial Red River Gorge, which the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers had planned to flood — until Gov. Nunn and others interceded — by construction of a dam, but the trip was cancelled because of thunderstorms over the Gorge.

Instead, the Grosvenors viewed scenes of the gorge through color transparencies, and Grosvenor, seeing the unusual rock formations, boulders and wild flowers that abound in the gorge area, said he could understand why Gov. Nunn and other conservationists wanted to protect it.

The Grosvenors, who are used to congestion in the populous eastern states and particularly in Washington, D. C., where they reside, also expressed surprise at the amount of open space and the uncluttered countryside they observed on their flight from Louisville to Lexington.

Other featured views from the air were a race at Keeneland and horse farms around Lexington, particularly Calumet Farm and its miles of white fence.

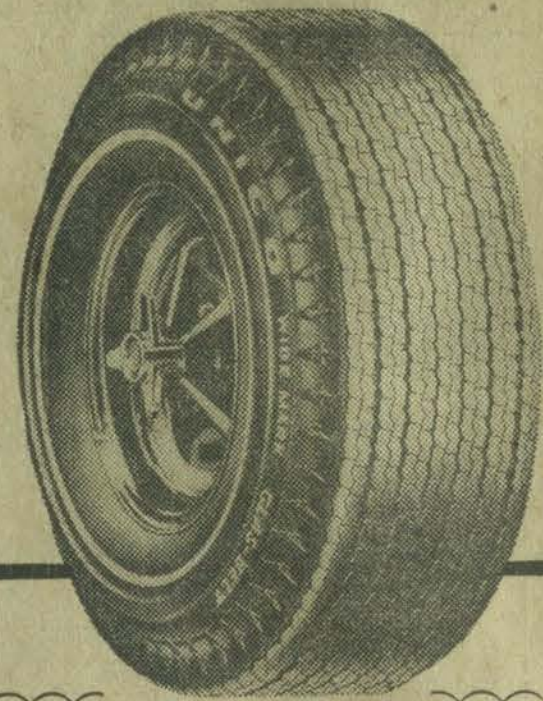

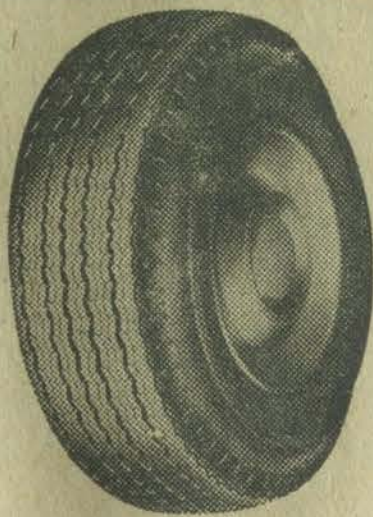

### Near Quarter-Million Unsafe Vehicles Ruled Off Roads Permanently

Frankfort — Nearly a quarter of a million unsafe vehicles were permanently removed from Kentucky's highways last year.

And approximately 2 1/2 per cent of all cars checked under Kentucky's motor vehicle inspection program since Jan. 1 of this year about 121,000 vehicles have been rejected by safety inspectors because of mechanical defects.

Reporting on the progress of the Commonwealth's inspection program, Deputy Commissioner for Public Safety Robert Shirley said that the number of mechanically-defective vehicles uncovered to date is indicative of the significant impact which such a program can have on statewide highway safety efforts.

Although safety experts generally agree, Shirley said, that realistic appraisal of any such program's effectiveness can not be made until it is at least four years old, "a review of our efforts within the short space of 15 months since motor vehicle inspection was first inaugurated reveals that much has already been accomplished."

**RESOLUTION**  
WHEREAS, we, the members of Local Union 5899, United Mine Workers of America, of Wheelwright, Kentucky, at a regular meeting, are mindful of the many inequities in the present Workmen's Compensation laws of Kentucky, and the need to amend the law in order that the rights of workmen and their dependents can be better protected; and  
WHEREAS, we are mindful of the conservative application of our present law by those charged with the administration of it; and  
WHEREAS, the shortcomings in the present law and the conservative application of the laws have resulted and will continue to result in rulings and decisions contrary to the best interest of coal miners, their dependent widows and orphans; and  
WHEREAS, the membership is desirous of taking positive action to correct these inequities by obtaining more favorable legislation, and by obtaining more liberal interpretation and application of the laws, and toward that end we propose to do everything within our power to obtain the desired results.  
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That, we, the members of Local Union 5899, United Mine Workers of America, will do everything within our power to obtain more favorable legislation and more equitable application of our present and future Workmen's Compensation laws and toward that end we will contact and seek to secure the support from legislators, other local union members, labor organizations, business, professional and civic leaders.  
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That we will seek to have the present Workmen's Compensation and Occupational Disease laws amended so as to include, but not limited to, the following:  
1. Miners who have spent more than ten years in or around the mines and develop disabling respiratory conditions shall be presumed to have contracted such condition by reason of their exposure to harmful noxious smoke, dusts and gases in their employment.  
2. In the event a workman obtains an award granting him total and permanent disability benefits, and in the event the workman dies before receiving the entire award and leaves a dependent widow and/or children that it shall be conclusively presumed that his death resulted from the injury or disease for which he received compensation during his life,  
and the remaining compensation due shall be paid to the surviving dependent widow and/or children on a weekly basis.  
3. No deduction or discount of the award shall be made or lump sum awards to the workman or his dependents, or for payment of attorneys fee for services rendered in obtaining the award.  
4. The maximum disability and death benefits shall be increased to \$25,500.00, payable in weekly installments. The maximum weekly benefits shall be \$60.00 per week payable for 425 weeks and the minimum shall be \$40.00 per week for 425 weeks. The minimum burial benefits shall be increased to \$1,000.00, and the medical payments shall be increased to \$4,500.00 and in extraordinary cases the workman shall have the right to petition the Board for an increase in that allowance.  
5. The circuit courts and the Court of Appeals shall have the power and authority to review and reverse the Workmen's Compensation Board on findings of fact and conclusions of law, if the reviewing court finds from a review of the entire record that the decision of the Board is clearly erroneous.  
6. If the employer or its insurance carrier has the workman examined by more than two doctors and the report of these doctors is adverse to the workman then in that event the employee may secure additional medical evidence from additional doctors and the employer or its carrier shall pay for the cost of such examinations and the taking of the doctors' depositions.  
7. The employee shall have the right to choose his own physician for the treatment of any injuries or disease he may suffer from as a result of an occupational disease or injury.  
ADOPTED at a regular meeting of this Local Union at Wheelwright, Kentucky, this 12th day of April, 1969. The membership does hereby authorize the President, Financial Secretary, Treasurer and Recording Secretary to sign this Resolution in their official capacity and place same in the Minute Book of this meeting.
