Mud Creek Work Ready for Start

EDA Issues Work Order This Week

Pre-Construction Talk With Contractors Set Here Friday Morning

What began as a dream almost four years ago will begin to assume the aspect of reality next week when contractors will move machinery into Mud Creek to begin construction of a water distribution system.

Final approval of contracts and all other phases of the undertaking was received here Tuesday from the Economic Development Administration, and a notice to proceed with construction was issued, John T. Hill, engineer on the project, said.

A pre-construction conference with the four contractors is scheduled to be held at the courthouse here Friday morning. After that, they are expected to begin moving equipment onto the job.

Major portion of the work will be done by the H. B. Ranier Construction Co., Prestonsburg, whose bids on two contracts for laying of water lines total \$905,587.60. The bids of all contractors total \$1,229,145.60.

Other contractors and their bids are:

Miles P. Brown Boiler Works, Franklin, Pa., construction of reservoirs, \$115,516; L & R Construction Co., Hamlin, W. Va., reservoir foundations, access roads, etc., \$139,542; Claude Wilburn, Lynn, Ky., pump station, \$68,500.

Mr. Hill began work as an engineer for the Mud Creek Water District in July, 1967 in planning and promoting the big project. Eighteen months or more before that, residents of the area affected began the initial move toward a modern water distribution system.

GROUP OK'S GRANT PLEA

Area Disposal System Talked by Directors Of Council at Meet

The Big Sandy Area Development Council voted recently to apply for a grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission to finance the cost of a pilot solid waste disposal system to serve Floyd and four neighboring counties.

Announcement of the Council action was made here this week by Dr. George P. Archer, Prestonsburg, chairman of the council board of directors.

Disposal of solid wastes such as metals, paper and plastics has become a major problem in Eastern Kentucky, as elsewhere, and communities such as Prestonsburg have been threatened with action on air pollution charges growing out of the burning of paper and other flammable materials.

The board of directors referred the proposal for such a project to the Area Comprehensive Health Planning Committee for further study. It recommended that if the project is undertaken it be planned to serve Floyd, Johnson, Pike, Martin and Magoffin counties.

Cost of such a disposal system was estimated at \$35,000 a year. The present population of the area it would serve is about 148,000.

Area Development Group Views Information Gap

Officials of the Big Sandy Area Development Council, Inc., in a meeting at May Lodge Wednesday afternoon, explored ways to increase the flow of information about developments taking place in the five-county area served by the council.

Improved communications relating to the objectives of the District program and the progress of various projects now under way were considered essential, if the people within the area are to be aware of new opportunities to be offered.

During the past two years the district has launched programs to improve health services, educational facilities, to bring tourists and industry to the area and to expand manpower training among other programs. To assure that these advantages are known to the public as they develop and that the services are adequately used, district leaders plan to report events to all communications media on a regular basis.

The possibility of a series of radio or television programs was

also discussed. It was suggested that the series not only report on events relating to the development of the area but also announce employment opportunities and job vacancies along with job counseling.

Holding more public hearings on issues of concern to the area was also discussed. The District will examine the problems that are to be observed in the near future and attempt to broaden citizen participation in finding solutions and in carrying out projects.

Regional Hospital Is 'Marking Time'

Its drive for local support of the proposed regional hospital to be built on US 23, near Auxier, successfully completed, the Highlands Hospital Corp., sponsor of the \$5.2 million facility, now is marking time, awaiting plans for the structure.

"If we had the plans completed, we could advertise for contractors' bids tomorrow," Dr. George P. Archer said Wednesday.

But the plans aren't complete. Engineers were here recently, and the target date for groundbreaking is set for August or September.

The fund drive staged by Highlands had a goal of \$150,000. More than \$180,000 was pledged.

Another development is possible for the Auxier area, Dr. Archer said this week. When the Economic Development Administration approved funds for the construction of a sewer line from the Kenwood site to connect with the Paintsville disposal plant, Mayor Archer told EDA representatives Prestonsburg may ask help on a sewer line to connect Auxier with the Prestonsburg treatment and disposal plant.

He was told that EDA "will look favorably" on the project.

DAM WORK BIDS ASKED

Change in Outlet, Paving Are Included In Improvement Plan

Bids will be received next month by the Huntington District, Corps of Engineers, on improvements at and around Dewey Dam.

Opening of bids on the work of removing existing steel windows and one personnel door in the intake structure and replacing these with aluminum windows and insulated panels and an aluminum door will be on June 11.

June 18 has been set for the opening of bids on furnishing and placing bituminous concrete pavement on the existing boat dock access road and overlook parking area at the right abutment of Dewey Dam.

Work on the intake windows and doors is to be completed within 45 days after receipt of work order. The paving work is to be completed in 30 days.

MINISTERIAL GROUP HERE STUDIES CARE CENTER NEED

The Prestonsburg Ministerial Association is trying to determine if there is a need for a Child Day Care Center in Prestonsburg.

The center would receive children ages 3 through 5 and keep them from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. daily, Monday through Friday. The cost would be approximately \$15 per week, and this would include the noon meal and in-

On a less encouraging note was the news received recently from the architect preparing plans for the proposed new city building here. The cost was estimated at \$340,000—and that is roughly \$100,000 more than the maximum the city can afford, the mayor said. He explained that cost of the structure, which would house all departments and services of city government, is planned to be amortized through rental income.

"It was a beautiful building, as planned," Archer said, "but we had to ask that architect take the plans back and cut the cost \$100,000."

12 PROJECTS ARE ADVISED

Republican Leaders Say They Requested Road Jobs in Floyd

Jack Hyden, Floyd county Republican chairman, and Lawrence Keathley, manager of Governor Nunn's campaign, said this week they have recommended a dozen road, bridge and street projects on which they expect the Rural Highway Department to begin work immediately.

They listed the projects, as follows:

- Bonanza-Big Lick Fork road, 3.5 miles, bituminous surfacing;
- Garrett-Turkey Creek road, 2.25 miles bituminous surfacing;
- Melvin-Weeks road and bridge construction, 2.8 miles south of the junction with KY 122; KY 114, Martin-Buck's Branch-Spurlock road, 4 miles bituminous surfacing to the Mountain Parkway;
- Twin Bridge road, Martin, 2 mile, surfacing; highway from upper railroad crossing in Martin to P. M. Dingus home, 1 mile, bituminous surface;
- Martin to Cracker Bottom road, 2.3 miles, bituminous surfacing;
- Little Paint to Whittaker road, 2.1 miles, grade and drain;
- Slick Rock, 1 mile, bituminous surface;
- Goble-Roberts Addition, roads and steets, bituminous surface;
- Dinwood road, .75 mile, surfacing;
- road from Ky 80 to Floyd County Fish & Game Club grounds, Johns Branch, 2 miles, bituminous surfacing.

Keathley and Hyden promised other projects in the county are to be announced soon.

Perkins Report Grant Of \$86,566 to PCC

Kentucky schools would get \$104,375,000 in additional federal funds for public education if Congress enacts legislation introduced earlier this month.

The bill, drafted by the National Education Association (NEA), was introduced by Rep. Carl D. Perkins (D-Ky.) and co-sponsored by Rep. Edith Green (D-Ore.). It would appropriate \$7.8 billion in general federal aid.

The legislation would provide a basic grant of \$100 per school-age child, or a total of about \$5.25 billion per year. The other \$2.5 billion would be allocated on the basis of an equalization formula designed to give extra help to states with a greater number of

Group Says Nunn Staged "Lockout"

The Better Welfare Committee, whose address is given as Highland and Friend streets, Prestonsburg, this week accused Governor Louie B. Nunn of secrecy and "lockout" in his refusal to have an early meeting with welfare groups as cuts in financial help and medical care for "the state's hungry and sick children" are impending.

This source quoted Jay Blevins, of Harold, a spokesman for the Eastern Kentucky Welfare Rights Organization, as terming the governor's refusal "an attempt to keep the government from the people."

Blevins also was quoted as saying the only way to combat a "lockout" is a sit-in.

Meeting to plan a militant response to the June 16 date set by Gov. Nunn for the meeting with welfare groups, will be held next

week, it was said, in Floyd, Pike, Boone, Kenton, Campbell, Jefferson, Knox, Harlan, Fayette and McCracken counties. These groups claim the June 16 date set by Nunn is too late to effect the federal July 1 deadline which threatens the state's payments for medicare and public assistance payments.

Kentucky's alleged unwillingness to make concrete plans concerning federal provisions in the Social Security Act is said to be the center of the continuing conflict between Nunn and the poor. Welfare groups estimate failure to meet federal deadlines could result in the loss of \$10 million in medicare funds.

All states must bring their standards and payments up to 1969 standards of living as of July 1, federal requirements specify.

families on poverty-level incomes. Kentucky's allocation would include \$85,800,000 as a basis grant and \$78,775,000 for equalization. The latter is based on a computation showing that Kentucky has 3.2 percent of the nation's poor.

Perkins, who introduced the bill known as the General Education Assistance Act of 1969, is chairman of the House Education and Labor Committee.

Calling on the nation to "gear up to the enormous task of putting its education house in order," Perkins said the measure-HR 10833-would "protect the essential educational authority of the states" while "relieving the strain on state and local taxation resulting from ever-increasing demands on our school systems."

Perkins, too, pointed to that problem when introducing the NEA-drafted bill on behalf of himself and Mrs. Green. He said, "Our national economy and the very quality of American life is impaired by lack of well-educated and skilled workers."

The problem seems in large measure, he added, from the inability of the schools to attract and hold good teachers.

He pointed out that starting pay for an elementary teacher in some areas is as low as \$2400 a year in spite of a strenuous effort on the part of taxpayers to maintain good schools.

Under Perkins' bill, at least half of the money would be used by the states for increasing teacher salaries—strengthening their efforts to attract and hold good teachers. The remainder would be used, at the discretion of the state education agency, for providing pre-school and summer programs, shared-time programs, and the hiring of additional staff.

More than half again as large as any education bill yet enacted, and \$1.8 billion larger than last year's NEA-sponsored bill, the measure would supplement—not replace—existing federal categorical or earmarked programs, including the \$3.9 billion Elementary and Secondary Education Act. The proposal would affect 53 million school-age pupils.

free to watch Democrats have at each other, or to "sic" the dogfight on.

Approximately 28,000 Floyd countians are eligible to vote in the primary, the registration lists at the County Clerk's office show. Although this is high for a county of 41,000 population, the list is approximately 1,000 lower than last year's, it was said.

No more than half of those eligible to vote are expected to go to the polls. The absentee balloting apparently will be the lightest recorded in an election for county office here. Only 290 applications were filed with the clerk's office for absentee ballots.

Time was when the office of jailer drew the heaviest crop of candidates, but this year only two Democrats are candidates for the post. The interest has jumped from jailer to sheriff, with 10 Democrats and four Republicans on the ballot for the latter office.

An air of suspenseful uncertainty naturally pervades every race where there is competition, but the Democratic race for sheriff possibly is fraught with more uncertainty than any on the ballot.

ORDINANCE NO. 5-69

In Accordance with authority granted by Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 80, Section 82.080 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, effective 1962, the City of Prestonsburg, of the County of Floyd and State of Kentucky does ordain as follows:

SECTION I For the purpose of establishing uniform rules and regulations the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg hereby adopts the following code:

(A) The National Electrical Code, being particularly the 1968 edition thereof, and the whole thereof including any amendments thereof, if any.

SECTION II Administration

(A) Enforcement Official

(a) The enforcement of this ordinance shall be the responsibility of the official or agency designated by the appropriate appointing power.

(b) For the purpose of making surveys, inspections, and investigations, the Building Official is hereby authorized, upon identification and statement of purpose, to enter, inspect, survey and investigate between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., or at any time if an emergency exists, or if requested by the owner or occupant, all buildings, dwellings, dwelling units, rooming units and general premises. The owner or occupant of every building, dwelling, dwelling unit, rooming unit and general premises, or the person in charge thereof, shall give the Building Official free access to such building, dwelling, dwelling unit, rooming unit or general premises for the purpose of such inspection, survey or investigation.

(B) Permits

1. When Required

(a) Any owner, authorized agent, or contractor who desires to construct, enlarge, alter, repair, move, demolish, or change the occupancy of a building or structure, insert other items, such as heating, electrical, etc. or to cause any such work to be done, shall first make application to the Building Official and obtain the required permit therefor.

(b) Ordinary minor repairs may be made with the approval of the Building Official without a permit; provided that such repairs shall not violate any of the provisions of this code.

2. Form

(a) Each application for a permit with the required fee, shall be filed with the Building Official, on a form furnished by him, and shall contain a general description of the work and its location. The application shall be signed by the owner, or his authorized agent.

(b) Each application for a permit shall indicate the proposed occupancy of all parts of the building and of that portion of the site or lot, if any, not covered by the building or structure, and shall contain such other information as may be required by the Building Official.

SECTION III Saving Clause

Nothing in this ordinance or in the code hereby adopted shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding now pending in any court, or any rights acquired, or liability incurred, nor any cause or causes of action accrued or existing, under any act or ordinance repealed hereby. Nor shall any right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired or affected by this ordinance.

SECTION IV Validity

The invalidity of any section or provision of this ordinance or of the code hereby adopted shall not invalidate other sections or provisions thereof.

SECTION V Conflict With Other Ordinances

In any case where a provision of this ordinance is found to be in conflict with any existing code, ordinance or regulations of the City, the provision which establishes the higher standard shall prevail.

The above named codes listed in Section I, of which not less than three (3) copies have been and now are filed in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, and the provisions as set out in Section II, III, IV, and V are hereby adopted and incorporated as fully as if set out at length herein, and from the date which this ordinance shall take effect, the provisions thereof shall be controlling in the construction, alteration or repair of all buildings and/or structures therein contained within the corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky.

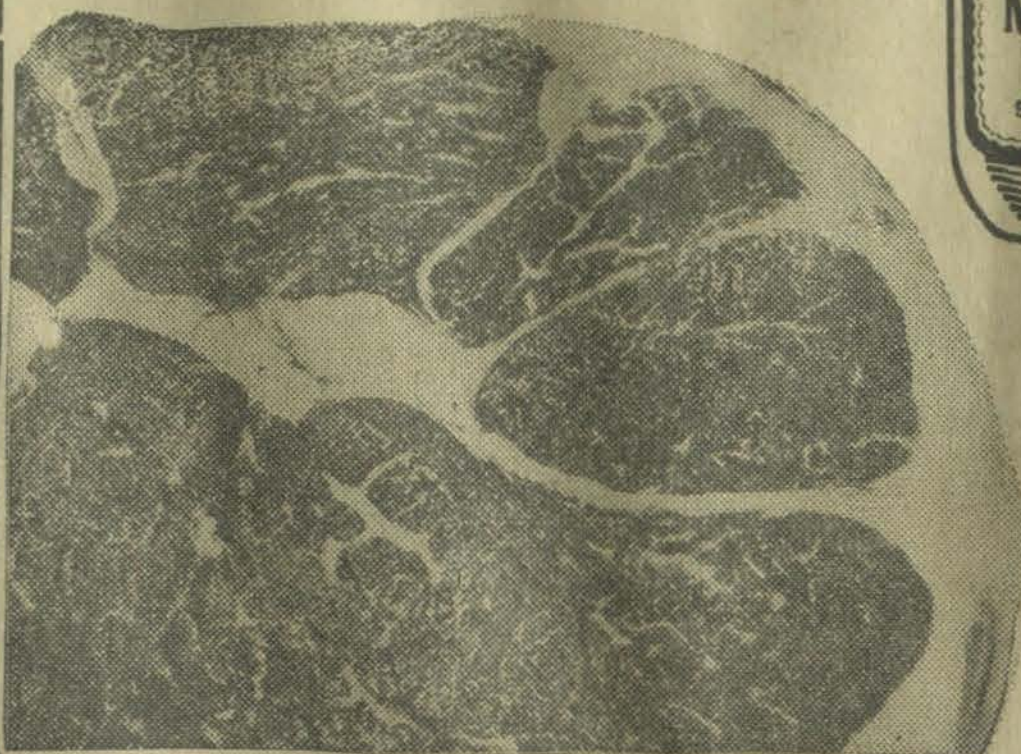

Nature Trails By RUFUS M. REED

Jack-in-the-Pulpit and the Green Dragon

These two members of the Arum family are noted for the very unusual structure of their flower parts. The Green Dragon, a cousin of Jack-in-the-Pulpit, is the only wild flower I know of that has a long, slender tail like the rusty lizard. Jack-in-the-Pulpit is sometimes called "the quaint little preacher of the spring woods."

Its better-known name is "Indian Turnip;" on the roots of the plant there is a wrinkled "corn," which is the turnip. Its sap is ten times hotter than hot pepper, but the Indians and black bears too often dined on the "turnips." How the bears could endure the blistering juices of the turnips is a mystery to me. The Indians got rid of the burning part by grinding the corns into a meal, and drying it, to take away the burning; they used the meal to make cakes and broth. Indians farmed very little and had to depend upon nature for most of their food, so they learned to eat many things the white people cannot eat.

Many a country boy has persuaded his city cousin who is visiting on the farm to try a bite of an "Indian turnip," telling him "if the Indians could eat it, you ought to be able to do the same." So the gullible city boy takes a big bite of the turnip and squeals in pain; all the rest of the day he goes about drooling as he tries to get rid of the fiery taste.

The flower structure of Jack-in-the-Pulpit gives it the book name: "Jack preaching in the pulpit." The pulpit is a green spathe with

white or purple stripes; it has a flap or "hood" which folds over Jack, the little preacher standing inside the "pulpit;" the cover protects Jack from spring winds and cold spells and makes a snug little "pulpit." I like to think that the subject of Jack's sermon is "The Beauty of Spring." Once I wrote the following lines about Jack's sermon:

"The wood folk listen with wonder and awe
As Jack expounds Great Nature's law —
Her power to create beauty and peace,
The urge of life to unfold and increase.
So did Jack-in-the-Pulpit preach his sermon
To the birds and squirrels and a frog named Herman."

Botanists call Jack-in-the-Pulpit ARISAEMA TRIPHYLLUM, as it belongs to the Arum family and each leaf has three leaflets. This wild flower grows abundantly in rich, moist woodlands, or along the banks of mountain streams.

Its cousin, the Green Dragon, grows in open woods along fertile streams and in rich bottomlands. Its roots also produce a corn or turnip with burning sap. The spathe of the flower extends far out of the spathe and forms a long, slender tail that looks like a whip-lash. Both of these plants produce a large cluster of red berries, which gleam in late summer woods. The berries were also eaten by the Indians, bears and by some birds like the grouse. The Indians used the berries to

enrich their soups and meat stews.

While Jack-in-the-Pulpit has only three leaflets, the Green Dragon has from five to as many as seventeen, which are often arranged in a sort of arc at the top of the stalk. Other famous members of the Arum family are the skunk cabbage, whose roots also furnished food to the Indians; also the sweet calamus, or sweet flag, which has highly medicinal roots and is often sought by youngsters in the spring for its sweet roots to eat.

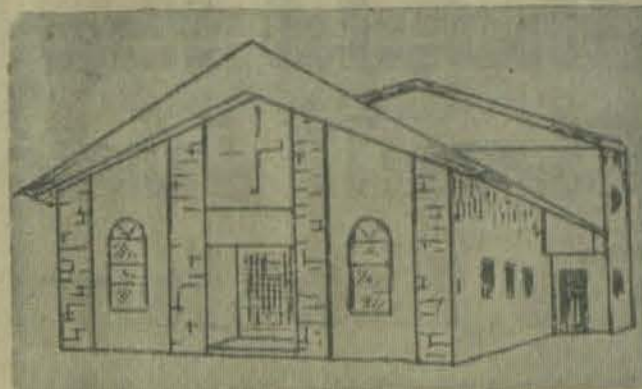

SWISS AMBASSADOR TELLS WHY COUNTRY PROSPEROUS WHILE EAST KY. IS POOR

Why should it be that Switzerland, covered by barren mountains, enjoys great prosperity while Eastern Kentucky, covered by mountains rich in natural resources, doesn't?

Felis Schnyder, ambassador to the United States from Switzerland, a guest speaker at Pikeville College, last week, undertook only to explain why and how the Swiss achieved their wealth in a setting where the land itself was of little use.

He dropped some hints, though, that Eastern Kentucky might copy the Swiss pattern.

Switzerland, he said, started out 700 years ago to make the best possible use of what resources it had, especially its human resources.

"I think some of our success came from thinking small," he said. "By that, I mean thinking about the smallest details. Here, you think big."

He said the Swiss have put emphasis on community spirit, self-reliance, education and pride. "They are not waiting on the federal government to solve the problems."

"The people of the townships and cantons (states) consider it their own business to organize an beautiful," he added as an example.

He said a part of this enterprise was forced upon Switzerland by its location in the center of countries unfriendly with each other, such as the Germans and French during the last war.

"We have been able to keep our doors and windows open for a free exchange of goods with the whole world," he said.
Schnyder and Dr. Wilbur Cohen, secretary of health, education and welfare during the Kennedy and Johnson years in Washington, came to the college as guests of Harry M. Caudill, Whitesburg attorney and author.
Schnyder said his comments were based on the "flattering" question often asked by Caudill. "How could the Swiss do without natural resources what we (in Eastern Kentucky) can't do without them?"

Cohen looked more to the future of the region and the entire country in his brief comments. He said "there is no question in my mind that poverty will be abolished in the United States in the next 16 years, that an educational opportunity will be available to every boy and girl wanting it by 1976, and that by the same year medical care and incomes will be guaranteed to all Americans."

Cohen said he accepted an invitation from President John F. Kennedy to write and push Medicare legislation and stayed around to see more social and economic advancements than the country had seen in the previous 200 years. In that period, he said, 18 million persons have been removed from poverty status.

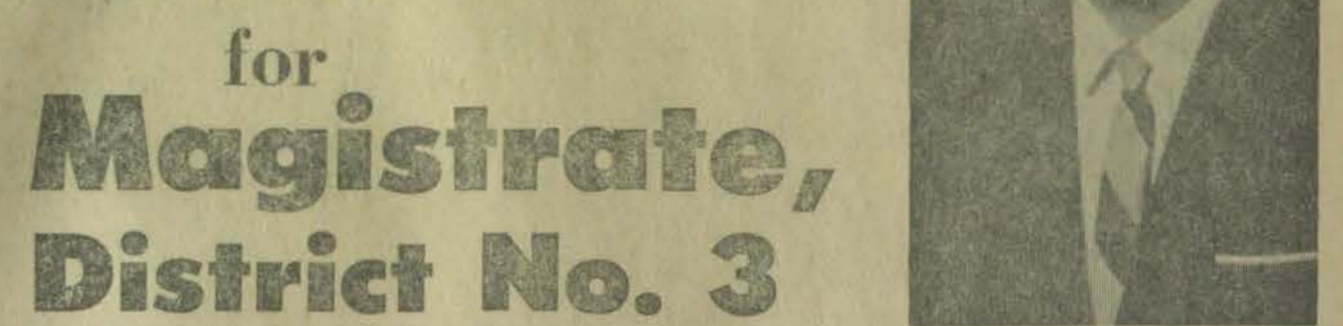

Chalmer Frazier, administrator of the Prestonsburg General Hospital, and Daryl Ratliff, manager of the Pikeville Social Security Office, announced recently an agreement had been reached between the hospital and the Social Security Administration to establish Floyd county's first Home Health Agency. The plan was hailed as "another milestone has been reached in providing medical care for senior residents of Floyd county."

Mr. Frazier said the program will gradually be phased in after adequate personnel are obtained. Present staffing consists of a registered nurse and a licensed practical nurse. When the new hospital near here is completed, Frazier plans to add additional personnel and provide service to Martin, Johnson, and Magoffin counties. Frazier stressed the point, however, that these counties cannot be served until the staffing has been expanded.

Ratliff explained home health benefits may be available under both parts of Medicare for persons over age 65. Under Part A, the hospital insurance, a patient can receive up to 100 visits during the 12-month period following the patients' most recent discharge from a hospital or extended care facility in which he received covered services. But the patient must have been a patient in a participating hospital for at least three consecutive days; be confined to his home or other place of residence; have a plan of care established and reviewed periodically by a doctor (the plan must be established within 14 days of the discharge from the hospital or extended care facility); and, the care provided be for further treatment of a condition for which the patient was treated while an inpatient of the hospital or extended care facility and the visits be under part B, the doctor's insurance. Ratliff said, "a patient receives home health benefits if confined to his home or other place of residence and a doctor establishes and reviews the home health plan. Under this part, the patient is reimbursed 80% of the reasonable cost after and annual \$50 deductible has been met."

He suggested that residents of Floyd county who think they may qualify consult with their physician. Under both parts of Medicare the patient will have to be referred to the home health agency by their physician.

Some of you have served as plaintiffs in one or both of the above litigations.

There is a possibility that the courts will act in time for us to get the building under construction before June 30. Except for the suits your attorneys have filed in your names the building would have been one-third finished by this time and our sons and daughters would have been in the new plant by January of next year. If the idea of the suits was to delay construction, then you have succeeded. The only trouble with delay is that we have \$200,000.00 in federal money hanging in the balance. If this project is not under construction before June 30, 1969, Floyd County will lose this federal money. In this case, we will have to advertise again for construction and that could cost another \$100,000.00 in higher bids. That would result also in the possibility of re-advertising for bids on the bonds and that could cost another \$100,000.00 of your money in interest on the bonds over a fifteen year period.

We do feel that all of you must love Floyd County as well as we do, and would not willingly be a party to costing Floyd County taxpayers an extra \$400,000.00 needlessly. We in the interest of educational progress, must proceed with the consolidation plan and both law and reason is on the side of the Board of Education, or more particularly, on the side of educational progress for our young people. Further delay costs our youth in a lack of better educational opportunity and will cost each of us many extra dollars in school taxes. In order to properly evaluate your own position as a Floyd County citizen, you should ask your attorneys for a frank opinion on whether your cases really have merit, or whether in their opinion delay is the only hope, or whether or not they feel they can win their cases. The deadline is drawing near and only you can make the decision. By directing your attorneys to, in your names, ask that the courts dismiss the cases, you will have saved several hundred thousands of dollars and helped insure better educational opportunity for all our youth.

Sports Afield

Even though you might not be a topwater-angling specialist, the art of fishing surface lures should be a part of every fisherman's bag of tricks — because it catches fish.

Let's talk about those lures with propeller-type spinners. Some have one at each end, while others have a single spinner at either the head or tail end.

These lures have been taking game fish for many generations because of the fatal attraction the spinners have for bass, pike, trout, bluegills, pickerel, muskellunge, carpies and on occasion walleyes and catfish.

Customary methods for retrieving are:

1. A steady retrieve—maintaining a speed that gets maximum action from the spinners. Yet, too many experts never use this method because it requires no skill or imagination. To neglect it, is to miss fish because sometimes it is the only tactic that will take fish.

2. The stop-and-go method. To do this you merely break up the steady retrieve a series of short runs. Reel about two feet, pause and so on. Make it do a fancy dance, occasionally.

3. The big-commotion method looks for all the world like a fisherman trying to scare the scales off fish. It's that noisy and violent. It's done by sweeping the rod tip sharply upward and backward, causing the spinners to create a loud splutter. At times this can be amazingly effective.

Now let's discuss the popping types, and include off-shoots like the pencil lures, and those which only have action instilled by the fisherman.

Tactics one, two and three should be used because they're basic. But, the maneuver which some fishermen call "walking the dog" is most effective with non-spinner lures. This can be learned through practice, and every topwater fisherman should work at it until he masters the technique. Here's how it's done.

After making a cast, reel all the slack out of your line and lower the rod tip until it is just over the water. Watch the lure as you sharply twitch your rod tip. When the lure swings to one side, immediately twitch your rod tip and make it swing

back to the other side. Continue twitching and reeling and the lure will swing from side to side in a weird stagger that triggers fish strikes.

Some fishermen prefer to do this standing up with rod held high overhead. Others can do it effectively sitting, working their rod tip horizontally over the water. Find the best way for you and stay with it until you can do it without thinking.

What about rods? Homer Circle, Angling Editor of SPORTS AFIELD Magazine, prefers a rod with a sensitive tip for making an accurate cast, and working a lure—but he wants muscle in the butt so he can sock it to a big fish when it hits. He uses a 6½-foot rod for maximum leverage.

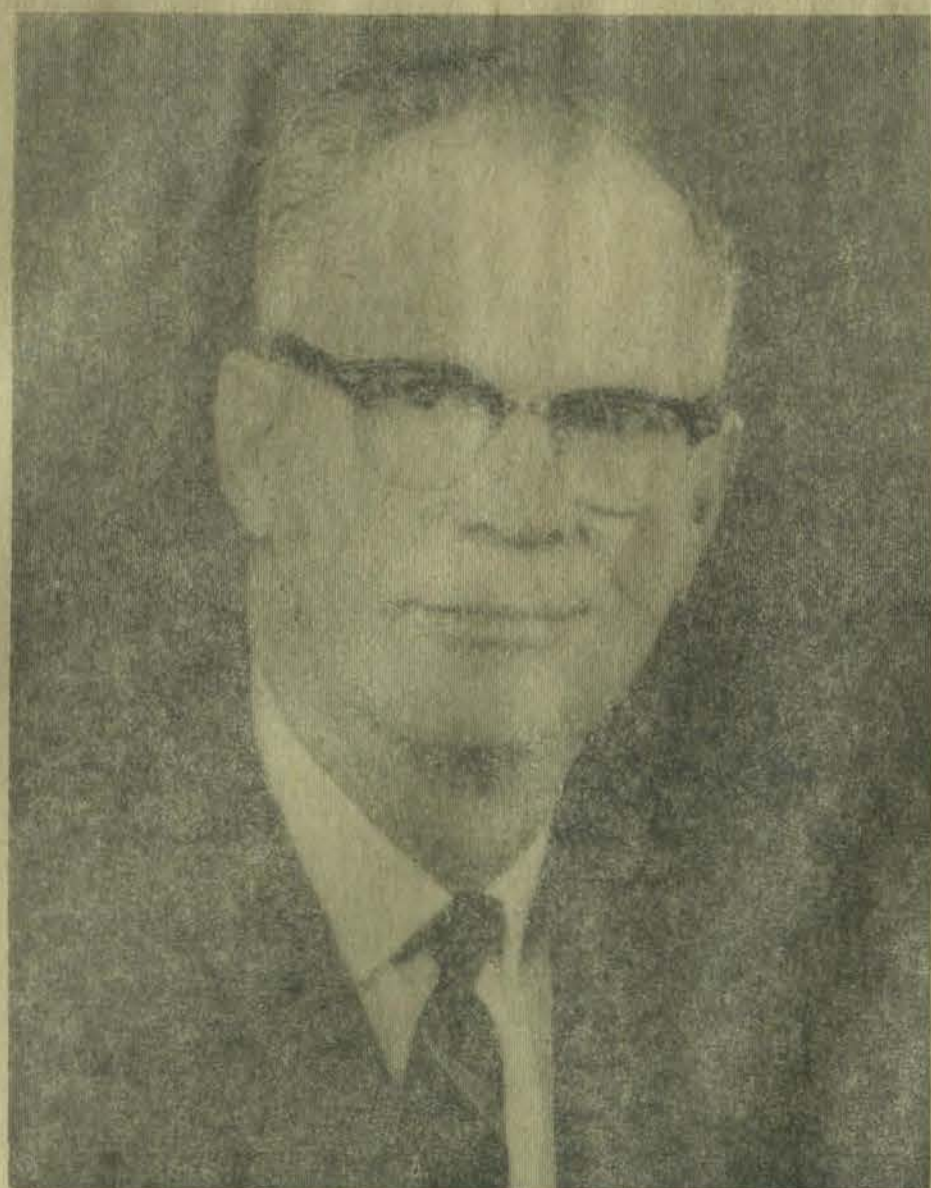

TIDITS of KENTUCKY FOLKLORE

By GORDON WILSON, Ph. D.

TODAY COUNTS, TOO

Through the many years that I have been writing the essays of this column I have occasionally been accused of referring too lovingly to older times and slighting the present. Such has never been my intention, for I lived a long time ago and I am still around here. In fact, I seem to myself to have often been pretty critical of older times, especially when sanitation, neighborhood morality, and general enlightenment are concerned. One of my longtime friends has often said that I remember too well the uglier sides of other times.

As a teacher I could not escape teaching even if I wanted to. Consequently, most of these interminable essays are designed, consciously or unconsciously, to "point a moral or adorn a tale." To look at any present-day fact honestly, we must admit that it had backgrounds. Things do not "just happen." When some fad or other human, foible appears, it often had been forming for years; we were too busy to realize that it was developing. If you will look back on the numerous fads that you older ones have seen rise and fall, you will see how they usually followed the same pattern. That may be the reason that I, as an old man, have not become as alarmed as some of my generation when some oddity of human conduct got too much attention. I am always reminded of a phrase from Horace — "in the consulship of Plancus." He is referring to the fact that he is not such a sheik or whatever the Latins called it, not so bouncy, not so much given to attracting attention as he once was. I like the phrase, also, to date some outbreak of human conduct that can be dated quite as effectively and accurately as a consulship or a Presidential term. Remember, you old-timers, how often, in your boyhood, you heard older people fear that the whole race is sliding down a steep hill to ruin. The subject might be just anything: politics, for example, furnished a lot of Fidelity talk; just one more such campaign as, say, the one of 1900, and our country would be a ruin. Or maybe it was dress, that perennial subject for conversation since away back when: the way young people were dressing, about the time I left Fidelity, back in 1906, seemed the last scenes of the tragedy. Why, women, young and old, were wearing rats, horrible things in themselves and sure signs of a break-up or breakdown of morals! And patent-

leather shoes for men furnished many a text for lamenting the corruption of the young. Every new style in clothes or hair brought out a standing army to defend the status quo or, usually, some perfect time of moral conduct, as in the days of Father and Mother or, preferably, Grandpa and Grandma.

Having spent most of my life in studying folklore in its many forms, I can recall dozens of similar fearful times. "Whatever is, is wrong" could have been taken as a text for many of the critics of the human race as they chawed their tobacco around the country-store stove in winter or in the shade of the trees in summer. Reading satirical flings at the stupid human race often sounds more contemporary than any other type of writings from older times. A very few adjustments to later gadgets can make an age-old satire sound as if it had been recently accepted by the NEW YORKER or some other modern supercilious journal that looks at humanity with laughing eyes. In my lifetime of teaching Chaucer I found my students were more interested in his quaint picturing of just plain folkishness than in any other phase of his always-charming writings.

The sermons of my childhood that I now best remember were based on some account of how humanity used to act or think, but the unschooled preacher, taught in the school of Common Sense, saw in the ancient stories people like those of Fidelity. If he did not actually say so, we knew that the Bible story he was using as a text sounded mighty like what we all had seen, even in some short lives. This kind of sermon was strangely effective and, fortunately, is recalled gladly rather than the one of bitter denominational bickering.

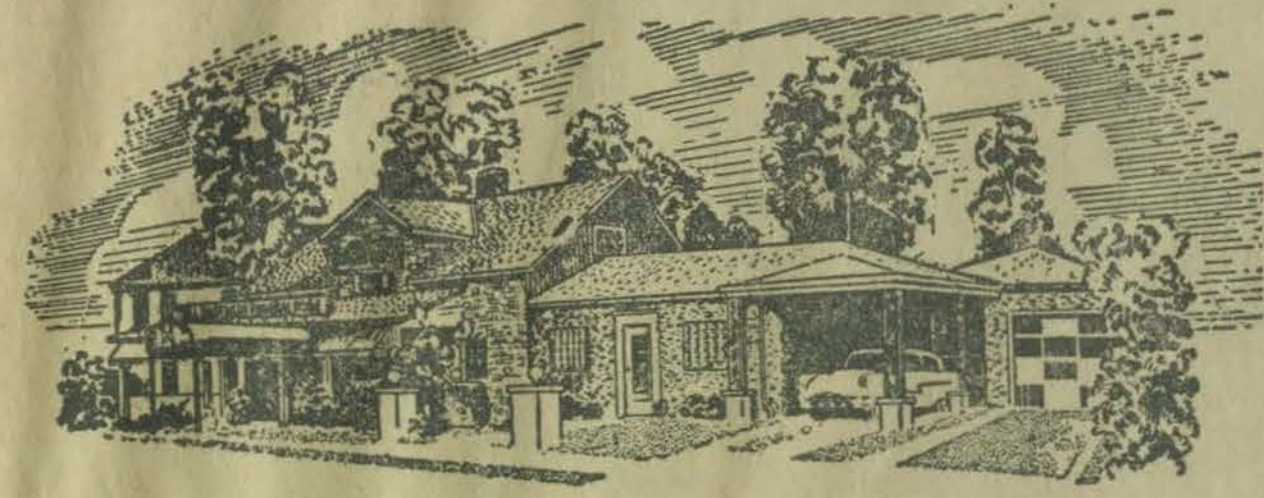

Elliott County-Seat Observes 100th Birthday

FRANKFORT — The fourth of July will be a gala weekend celebration in Eastern Kentucky this year as Sandy Hook commemorates its 100th birthday.

Located in Elliott county, this county-seat community was established by an act of legislature on April 1, 1869.

Created from Morgan, Carter, and Lawrence counties, history compiled by Ashland attorney Estill Hutchinson discloses that in April, 1869, four commissioners met on land belonging to J. K. Hunter, and marked off boundaries for the county seat and a 60-foot plot for a courthouse.

"Sandy Hook, aptly named for a hook shape in the stream that flows through the town, was formerly known as Martinsburg, according to a history of the county compiled in 1873, and had a population of 62 inhabitants at that time," says Mrs. Irene Brown Resco, in her book entitled, "It Took Courage."

According to the county history, the name was again changed back to Sandy Hook, after being known for a time as Martinsburg.

In recalling the reason for the temporary name change, Mrs. Bert White, who lives near Sandy Hook remembers, "I've heard my mother say thousands of Martins occupied the old frame courthouse. The birds created quite a problem, and folks would try to get rid of them by carrying the birds from the courthouse in sacks."

Today, Sandy Hook has a population of approximately 600 people. The county's centennial celebration began April 1, the date 100 years ago that Elliott became a county.

Pack was described by his coach as being the "best boy I've seen in our area and I know he will be an asset to the basketball program at Austin Peay," Cox concluded.

During his three years as a regular for Wayland high school, Pack, who stands 6-2, earned three varsity letters; was an honorable mention Kentucky All-Stater at the end of his junior year, and was named to the third team All-State squad this past year.

Pack was also a member of the All-Floyd County Conference team in both his junior and senior seasons; and was named to both the All-District and All-Regional tournament teams this year.

APSU assistant coach Fred Overton, who signed Pack to the grant-in-aid Monday night, was elated over the signing of the hardwood ace.

"We are naturally delighted to

sign Jack because he chose us from a host of major college offers. In addition, we are quite happy because he is highly endowed with basketball ability," Overton continued.

"Jack is a tremendous offensive player. His finesse, shooting ability and quickness of execution make him a very difficult player to handle defensively," Overton said.

"These facts can be backed up with his scoring averages for each of his three years of varsity play. The fact that he is a bonafide guard at 6-2 also makes him a terrific prospect."

"We definitely feel that he will make an outstanding contribution to our basketball program," Overton concluded.

In addition to playing basketball, Pack is an outstanding baseball performer, having hit over .400 while playing third base in high school.

Before reporting to Austin Peay this fall, Pack will conclude his high school play by participating in the Kentucky East-West All-Star game this summer.

Judge Hollie Conley, of Prestonsburg, awarded compensation to Earl Dale, a former Wheelwright miner, in a black lung case, but his decision was reversed by the Court of Appeals. The Louisville Courier Journal carried the following story on March 1, 1969.

"The state Court of Appeals yesterday conceded that the weight of evidence was in favor of a Floyd county coal miner claiming workmen's compensation for black lung disease, but said it was powerless under the law to rule in his favor.

"The court voted 6-1, with Judge Edward P. Hill dissenting, to deny \$19,000 in disability payments to Earl Dale of Hager Hill. The ruling reversed Floyd Circuit Judge Hollie Conley, who awarded compensation to Dale after the state Workmen's Compensation Board refused it."

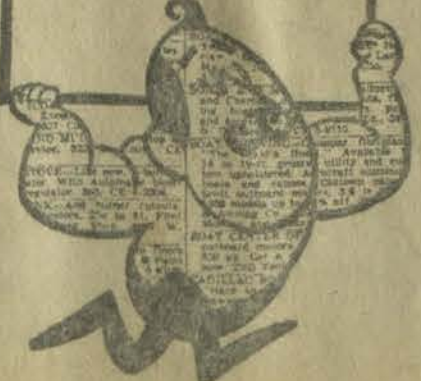

Fewer Non-Residents Registering at U. of K.

The University of Kentucky is receiving fewer applications for next fall's class from non-Kentucky residents and more applications from Kentucky residents, according to Dr. Elbert W. Ockerman, UK dean of admissions and registrar.

Out-of-state tuition fees climbed sharply in the fall of 1968, he points out.

UK received a total of 1,772 applications from freshmen through April 17, compared with 1,829 received through the same date in 1968. This is a drop of 2.7 per cent, Dr. Ockerman said.

Comparing the 1969 figure with the 1967 figure, the drop is 3.7 per cent, which means "it is going down steadily," he added.

Comparing the figures for actual enrollment of out-of-state freshmen, 542 enrolled at UK in the fall of 1967, representing 22 per cent of the UK freshmen class. In the fall of 1968, 477 enrolled, representing only 13 per cent of the freshmen class.

"On the basis of applications received to date, it looks as if the number of freshmen out-of-state students enrolling in 1969 again will go down," Dr. Ockerman says.
