## CRIME GROUP FOR REGION IS FORMED

### Prestonsburg Attorney Heads Crime Council To Serve 5 Counties

A regional Crime Council embracing Floyd, Pike, Johnson, Martin and Magoffin counties was organized at a meeting held at county representatives Tuesday evening in the Commons Room of Prestonsburg Community College.

Harris S. Howard, Prestonsburg attorney, was elected chairman; Governor Adkins, Pike county jailer, vice-chairman, and Frank Heinze, Prestonsburg mining engineer, secretary-treasurer.

The regional organization was effected after Gary Foltz and John Greenough, Frankfort, representing the Kentucky Crime Commission, had explained the purposes and workings of the regional councils being formed over the state.

The council headquarters will be in Pikeville, largest of the five county-seat towns in the area. Kentucky has received \$314,650 in planning funds from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration which was constituted under the U. S. Department of Justice. Forty per cent of this amount has been allocated to the 16 regional groups in the state, and the Eastern Kentucky council will receive \$5,728 for fiscal 1969 which has only a month to go. Another apportionment, possibly in the same amount, will be available to the council after July 1, this year.

Aims of the council will be to unite in an effort to construct a (See Story No. 3, Page 7)

## Archer Park Adds Camping Facilities

Archer Park has added to its wide range of facilities a modern camping area of 75-tent capacity, it was announced this week by City Manager Curtis Clark.

The camping area is said to be the only fully equipped public camping facility in Eastern Kentucky. A bath-house was completed, last week-end. Each tent site has electricity, water within 50 feet of every camp, a picnic table at each site and 15 grills already installed. The park expects to have a grill for each campsite, next season. The camp area will accommodate 50 trailers.

Addition of the camping facilities was made to meet an urgent need for tourist accommodations, Clark said. It also is designed to produce revenues necessary to operation and continued development and improvement of the park.

Archer Park, which is almost unique in size and appointments among towns the size of Prestonsburg, has been the subject of study by delegations from various communities in Kentucky and neighboring states. It spreads over 32 acres, has a central playground for children, a new swimming pool, two large buildings for community and other activities, tennis courts, softball and baseball fields and a horse show ring.

Clark said the park is a recreation area not only for Prestonsburg and Floyd county but for the entire area. "Almost as many people from Magoffin county as our own enjoy the park," Clark said.

The playground area will soon be enclosed by fencing purchased by the Prestonsburg Junior Woman's Club at a cost of \$700. Various civic, social and business groups have contributed heavily to the park development.

"Everybody has been so cooperative and given of their time and money so freely that we decided to develop the camping area," Clark said. "We did this, hoping to make the park more self-supporting."

The city manager said he plans at least two innovations at Archer Park soon. "Every child I ever

Two men arrested recently by Sheriff Joe W. Lewis and deputies on liquor possession charges have been fined and their 30-day jail terms probated.

## HIGH COURT MOVE MADE BY STEPHENS

### Election Contestant Seeks To Bar Conley From Trial of Case

Henry Stephens filed with the Court of Appeals Tuesday a motion for writ of prohibition and mandamus to require Circuit Judge Hollie Conley to vacate the Floyd circuit court bench in the trial of his contest action filed last week against Circuit Clerk Frank DeRossett.

The action was taken after Judge Conley had denied a motion filed by Stephens asking him to vacate the bench. In declining to vacate, Judge Conley held that the reasons cited by contestant's affidavit could be a time or conditions under which he might relinquish jurisdiction.

The action in the Court of Appeals may require a Frankfort hearing. The court will adjourn at the conclusion of work June 27 for summer vacation.

Attorneys for Circuit Clerk filed Saturday a motion to dismiss Stephens' suit, KRS 122.620 which, they contend, permits a candidate to contest an election only if he has a number of votes that are equal to at least 50% of the total vote of the winning candidate.

On the face of the returns, DeRossett received 7,187 votes to 2,139 for Stephens. No case has been decided on the basis of this law, however, it was said this week.

Judge Conley has ruled on the motion but is expected to act on it Friday unless the Court of Appeals stalls action in the court here.

## Pay of Teachers Below Ky. Median

LOUISVILLE, KY. — The highest salary a Kentucky teacher at the maximum training and experience level could expect to earn in a local school system during the 1968-69 school year ranged from \$6,900 to \$10,384.

A new Kentucky Education Association (KEA) research division bulletin entitled "Salary Schedules of Kentucky Public-School Teachers, 1968-69" shows the \$6,900 top maximum was scheduled for Rank I teachers in 46 of the state's 195 school districts while the \$10,384 top maximum was scheduled in only two districts — Louisville and Jefferson county.

Rank I teachers are those with a master's degree plus 30 approved college-credit hours beyond the master's. The \$6,900 top maximum could be reached after 10 years experience in the 46 systems of Adair, Bracken, Breathitt, Calloway, Carter, Cumberland, Elliott, Fleming, Fulton, Graves,

Grayson, Green, Hart, Jackson, Knox, Laurel, Letcher, Madison, Magoffin, Marshall, Mercer, Metcalfe, Morgan, Nicholas, Owsley, Pulaski, Robertson, Rockcastle, Russell, Todd, Trigg, Washington, and Whitley and the independent systems of Benton, Berea, Corbin, Dawson Springs, Fulton, Irvine, Jackson, Monticello, Pineville, Richmond, Science Hill, and Williamsburg.

The majority of Kentucky's public-school classroom teachers are in Rank III, which means they have a bachelor's degree.

For Rank III teachers at the maximum level of experience, the KEA research bulletin points out, the highest scheduled salary ranged from \$8,100 in 48 school systems to \$9,676 in two systems — Louisville and Jefferson county. In the latter two systems it took 15 years of experience to reach the Rank III maximum compared with 10 years in the systems paying the \$6,100 top maximum.

## Company and Workers Give Churches Shoes for Needy

The United States Shoe Corporation and its Committee of 300 representing all employees in its new plant here planned to give Tuesday through Floyd county ministers 500 pairs of shoes for underprivileged children of the area.

They wound up giving 800 pairs.

"We found them last night in St. Louis, and they should be here tomorrow," Jack Guggenheim director of employer relations for U. S. Shoe, told a gathering of ministers, citizens and workers at the plant Tuesday morning when shoe allotments to 10 ministers were made.

"If you need more," Mr. Guggenheim added, "let us know. We think we can swing that, too."

The 500 pairs of shoes ready for distribution and 303 pairs on their way here were manufactured in other U. S. Shoe plants. Guggenheim explained that the company and its employees plan jointly to give shoes for distribution to the needy, twice a year. He said that when it became known the shoes would be given away a hundred names were turned in to receive them for distribution.

"We couldn't reach everybody this time, but other ministers will be invited to come and get shoes when we have them."

Representatives of 10 churches were given 80 pairs of shoes each, Tuesday. The footwear ranged from babies' to children's shoes. Those receiving allotments:

The Rev. Ousley spoke briefly for the grateful group of recipients, and he spoke of his pleasure at seeing women and girls employed here at home. "I've got children who had to leave home and go to Michigan for jobs," he added. "You may not be getting highest pay here, but you're at home. When you're homesick and your bed gets so hard you can't sleep, it's better to be at home on bread and water."

Bill Laveck, former manager of the U. S. Shoe plant at Flemingsburg, and now assistant director of manufacturing for the company, told of earlier experiences in giving shoes for use by the underprivileged and described it as one of the finest community programs his company has. Letters received from the children who eventually wore the shoes have in the past

## Says Child Problems Are Tackled Too Late

Frankfort — Children with problems are being reached too late with too little help under this county's present system of care, Dr. Reginald Lourie, chairman of the national Joint Commission on Mental Health of Children, told a conference on childhood emotional problems in Frankfort.

Problems of racism, violence, leaving difficulties and emotional illness begin in the first three years of life, when the child is experimenting with basic answers and his "brain is growing faster than it ever will again," Dr. Lourie said.

Some \$13 billion is spent yearly in the U. S. for children's services of various

types he said, but it is spent "picking up the pieces," in programs for delinquent and mentally ill children and those with educational difficulties.

The "fragmented, non-system of services for children" available now is missing the element of coordination and continuity, Dr. Lourie said.

About 50 representatives of community mental health centers, universities and state government agencies heard Dr. Lourie preview the findings and recommendations of the Joint Commission. Its report will be released shortly.

Highlight of the report, he said, will be its recommendation for establishment of a "systematic, comprehensive, coordinated" child service, a service to cross the lines of health, education, welfare and mental health disciplines.

The meeting, sponsored by the Kentucky Department of Mental Health, the Kentucky Commission on Children and Youth and the National Institute of Mental Health, was called to "investigate the situation of the child with emotional problems in Kentucky and determine how best to meet the needs."

## 15-MILLION SEEDLING CROP FOR PLANTING NEXT SEASON, HOPE OF FORESTRY DIVISION

Frankfort—With the end of the year's spring tree planting season, the Division of Forestry's three nurseries are hard at work preparing to seed for next year's crop.

In 1970, the Division will make a special effort to increase the number of tree seedlings planted in Kentucky to 15 million. Ten million tree seedlings were shipped from the Division to Kentucky landowners this spring. These seedlings were used to reforest approximately ten thousand acres of idle and eroding land. During the past ten years over 150 million seedlings have been distributed.

With the expected increase in mind for 1970, the Division's nurseries are seeding extra quantities of loblolly, shortleaf, white and Virginia Pine, Black Locust will be seeded early in July. Last fall, hardwood species including black walnut, white oak, red oak, yellow poplar, white ash, and Chinese Chestnut were seeded.

This year the West Virginia Pulp and Paper Company at

Wickliffe purchased nearly one million seedlings for distribution to landowners under their matching seedling program. The company donates the number of seedlings a landowner buys himself. In addition, seedlings are given to schools to start a forest.

The first seed orchard stock grafter by the Division of Forestry using cuttings from selected superior trees in the state was completed in the fall of 1968 and planted in the spring of 1969. Species grafted were 400 white, 300 shortleaf, and 300 loblolly pines. The Division of Forestry now has 33 acres of pine seed orchards.

At Pennyrite State Forest a three acre test planting was made this spring. Seedlings were grown from seed taken from the loblolly pine seed orchard at the Kentucky Dam Nursery.

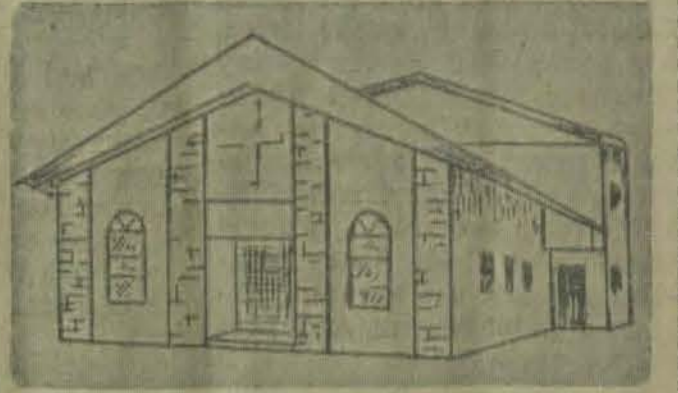

In the thirty-four years that this  
interminable column has been  
running I have often written short  
character sketches of some of my  
Fidelity neighbors. Though the  
number has grown rather large,  
there are still many others who  
should have been included in my  
list of thumb-nail portraits. It is  
through no special desire to for-  
get the others that they have not  
already been introduced as types  
of a self-sufficient neighborhood  
around the turn of the century.

In reading over all the essays  
that have appeared in the column,  
actually proving the typescript  
volumes that have been made of  
them under a grant from the Re-  
search Committee of Western's  
Graduate School, I noticed again  
how I came back to actual peo-  
ple, no matter how many times I  
discussed folk customs and folk  
beliefs and folk psychology. After  
all, folklore is what people do and  
believe and fear and love; it is  
not something in a book and there  
alone. My rural scholar, my lover  
of flowers, my country doctor, my  
country-store keeper, by retired  
Methodist preacher, my village  
wag, and all the rest were people,

flesh-and-blood people, not just  
something I "dreamed up."  
And recently, while doing this  
reading, I have rediscovered  
many of these same people and,  
as an old man, relived the years  
that I spent among them. A com-  
mon characteristic of the ones I  
have written about is that they  
were individuals, not figures, and  
yet they also were types; for just  
about any one of them, with a  
few local touches, would have  
been just as much a part of your  
own Fidelity as they were of  
mine. Conditions in those semi-  
pioneer times produced similar

characters all over our cultural  
area. Basically we had the same  
political and social and religious  
and educational history; some-  
times, as at Fidelity and around  
Mammoth Cave, these conditions  
remained off the beaten path a  
little longer and hereby acquired  
a quaintness as seen by younger  
generations. And, also a charac-  
teristic common to all such places,  
there was never any apology for  
being different. And those of us  
who grew up in such places and  
then had to adjust to different  
conditions elsewhere began to see  
the strange value of these differ-

ences in times of stress or sorrow  
or great change. Sometimes the  
rural philosopher, unlettered or  
just barely literate, could come  
up with an answer to some puzz-  
ling question that allied him, not  
with the village half-wit but with  
the neighborhood scholar, even  
with the most scholarly people we  
had met in the Big World.

Maybe some of the many whom  
I have not mentioned were not so  
different; maybe they were so  
like each other that they seemed  
like the proverbial peas in a pod.  
There have been nothing wrong  
with their philosophy, but they  
promulgated it in such an ordi-  
nary way that it did not strike us  
forcibly. The ex-slave, with his  
marvelous takes of his former  
grand folks often had developed  
a style in story-telling that made  
his ignorant speech almost liter-  
ary. The hired hand, with nothing  
to gain or lose, had his say and  
went on following the mule in the  
cornfield. The unrestrained child,  
often a bit pert in his remarks,  
said what all of us thought and  
wished for a good chance to say.  
It was easy to quote the child  
ever afterward, and society could  
guess whether we agreed with its  
wisdom or not. Here in my old  
age I have wanted to set down a  
whole series of "Thank-yous" or  
seek out the living ones and tell  
them face to face how I am in-  
debted to them. That would be  
an impossible task, for former  
Fidelity people are scattered all  
over the habitable globe. I would  
have to have at command a jet  
plane to get me to the places  
where they live or to their surviv-  
ing families. Since country news-  
papers, my kind, go to so many  
parts of the world, this little es-  
say is a sort of belated "Thank-  
you" for the ones who, because  
they were different, added some-  
thing to my own life and to hun-  
dreds of other lives.

## THIS MAY BE THE PROVERBIAL STITCH IN TIME

The announcement made recently by Dr. George P. Archer, chairman of the Big Sandy Area Development Council, that the council had voted to apply for a grant to finance a pilot solid waste disposal system for a five-county area attracted, at the best, only passing interest.

But a copyrighted article appearing in the nation's daily newspapers this week may help to awaken this area as well as the rest of the country to the fact that we are in danger of burying ourselves in our own refuse. This is not waste that can be piped through a sewer system to a modern sewer plant and rendered fit for pumping into a nearby stream and sent on its way. It is the paper and other combustibles which, if burned, add to the major problem of air pollution; the plastics which even time does not deteriorate; bottles, jars, cans, automobiles and all the mass and mess of rubble that accrues from modern living.

It is estimated that each inhabitant of the United States, and that includes the children, adds a ton of refuse a year to the growing problem of waste disposal. In less than twenty years the load of garbage and solid wastes has increased 60%, and in the next ten years it is expected to jump another 50%.

The problem is one in which every populated corner of the country shares. The larger population centers already are concerned. The move to get Appalachian Regional Commission financial help to finance a disposal system for Floyd and adjacent counties at least offers the hope that the problem is being tackled in a systematic way before Eastern Kentucky and its comparatively narrow valleys become literal junkpiles.

The 50 systems paying the \$6,500 top maximum for Rank II teachers were the county systems of Adair, Ballard, Breathitt, Calloway, Carter, Cumberland, Elliott, Fleming, Fulton, Graves, Grayson, Green, Hart, Jackson, Johnson, Knox, Laurel, Lawrence, Letcher, Madison, Magoffin, Marshall, Menifee, Mercer, Metcalfe, Morgan, Nicholas, Owsley, Pulaski, Robertson, Rockcastle, Russell, Todd, Trigg, Washington, Whitley, and Wolfe, and the independent systems of Benton, Berea, Corbin, Dawson Springs, East Bernstadt, Fulton, Jackson, Monticello, Pineville, Richmond, Science Hill, and Williamsburg.

In the Floyd county school system the highest (maximum) salary scheduled was \$6,765 for Rank I teachers, \$6,365 for Rank II teachers, and \$5,965 for Rank III teachers. The lowest (minimum) salary scheduled was \$5,855 for Rank I teachers, \$5,455 for Rank II teachers, and \$5,055 for Rank III teachers.

Minimum Rank I salaries scheduled ranged from Harrodsburg's \$5,406 to Beechwood's \$7,200.

Harrodsburg also had the lowest minimum salary scheduled for Rank II teachers—\$5,253—while Beechwood again had the highest—\$7,100.

The top minimum salary scheduled for Rank III teachers was Beechwood's \$6,900. The lowest—\$5,000—was in 10 systems: Murray independent system plus the county systems of Harlan, Hopkins, Lewis, Menifee, Metcalfe, Morgan, Nicholas, Robertson, and Washington.

been specially prized, he said. "They warm the heart," he said.

Mr. Guggenheim pointed out this week that in 1967, prior to his company's decision to locate here, U. S. Shoe management personnel became acquainted with more than 2,000 residents of the area through a survey. The caliber of people they met that day quickly persuaded them to become a neighbor of the people of this area, his statement added.

The company's production buildup and contribution to the economy, it is pointed out, has exceeded every commitment.

More than 300 new jobs have been created, and unit production at the plant here is well past the halfway mark toward final capacity.

regional plan for improvement of law-enforcement and crime prevention, to deal with the courts, areas of corrections, juvenile workers and the like, and to document existing facilities in each area, defining what is wrong and making recommendations.

One-third of any grant to the regional organization may be spent on salaries. But none of the \$63 million appropriated by the federal government after its Safe Streets Act was voted can go into police salaries. And better pay and training for police was one of the aims discussed at the meeting.

This money, said Mr. Foltz, will have to come from other sources. "What we're really shooting for," he said, "is somehow to create a vehicle which can go to the State Legislature and say, 'Here it is—what the regions have, what they need, what they want,' and ask the Legislature for \$10 to \$15 million. With this kind of money we can improve the total system."

All counties in the region except Magoffin were represented at the meeting.

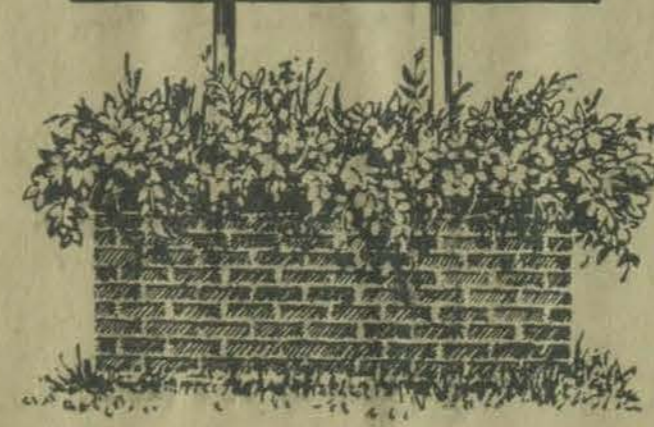

### Betsy Layne Graduate Gets Highway Department Scholarship

Highway Commissioner Eugene Goss presented scholarship certificates Monday to 26 boys including one Floyd county, who will enter the University of Kentucky as civil engineering students this fall.

The Floyd scholarship recipient is James B. Newman, 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Thurman Newman, of Grethel. He is a 1969 graduate of Betsy Layne high school where he won the Science Award, played both basketball and baseball and was a member of the 4-H and Beta clubs.

The scholarship recipients were selected on the basis of their scores on the American College Test, their rank in the upper two-fifths of their high school classes and the recommendation of their principals, mathematics teachers or guidance counselors. Selections were made by the University of Kentucky Scholarship Committee.

### Kentucky Fair In 1816 First West of Alleghenys

Kentucky's first fair was in 1816 in Fayette county. It was the first livestock exhibition west of the Allegheny Mountains.

Each scholar chosen is required to work in the summer with the Department of Highways until time to report to U. of K. to begin the fall semester. The two winners from the Highway Department in District One will work in that district. All the others will work out of the Division of Highway Planning in Frankfort.

The salary for the first summer's employment will be at the regular scale for an engineering helper and each boy will be given a monthly stipend during the school year. Summer employment after the first year will be in accordance with aptitude and qualification for promotions in line with the regular scale for engineering employees.

Those who remain in the scholarship program after the first year will receive annual increments with the amounts depending on the academic year in school. Each freshman scholarship student is required to agree by contract, with the approval of his parent or guardian if he is under eighteen years of age, to serve the Department of Highways during the summer preceding his scholarship and for at least one year immediately after graduation or as soon as released from military obligation. In no case will an agreement be for less than one year.

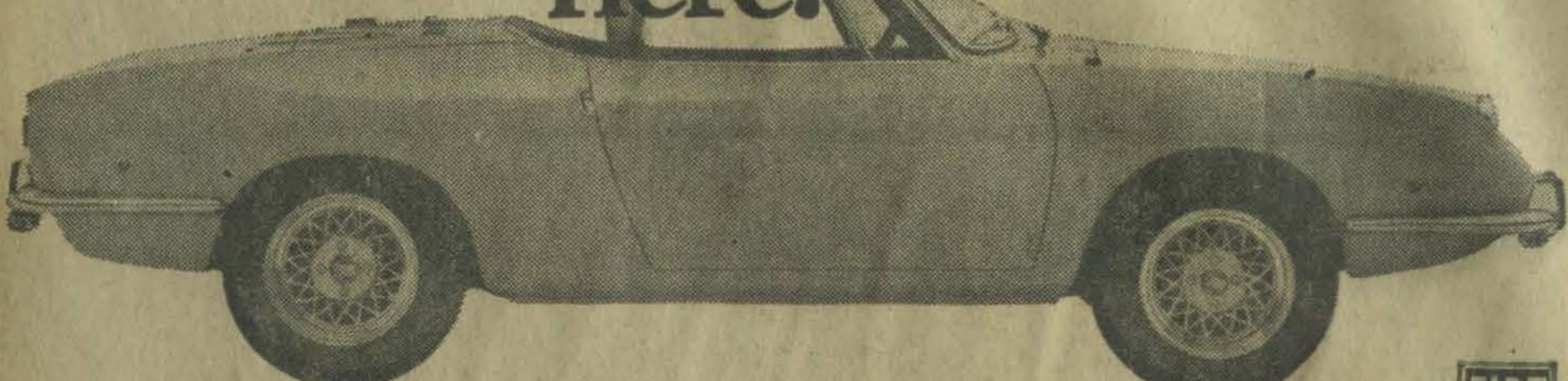
