The registration totals for Monday showed 199 fulltime male and 173 fulltime female students, 21 part-time male and 39 part-time female students.

Orientation for freshmen was conducted for the first time in the history of the college, last Friday. Orientation procedures began with welcomes from last year's P.C.C. Student Congress president, Cheryl Rolston, and vice president, Cathy Goble. During the day students were informed of academic and administrative policies of the college. Freshmen students were also assigned advisors and developed course schedules later in the afternoon.

Pupil Loss Costs 11 Teachers Jobs

Contracts of 11 teachers in the Floyd school system were terminated last week and a dozen others were transferred as a result of a budget crisis which demanded that the number of teachers be reduced to conform with the continuing drop in pupil enrollment.

Anticipating the possibility of budget troubles, the Floyd County Board of Education at its recent meeting directed County Superintendent Charles Clark to make a study of the enrollment in the first three days of the new school term and then to act on the basis of his findings.

Announcing the teacher cut Superintendent Clark described the budget crisis as one which has developed "to the point where, two years in a row, a serious operating deficit has occurred." He added that most of the deficit last year resulted from having more teachers than were required for the children in school.

Bernard Baldrige, 52-year-old Junior Conservation supervisor for the Seventh district, Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, died Tuesday at the Methodist Hospital, Pikeville, following an apparent heart attack.

Born August 17, 1917 at Warco, he was a son of the late George and Bertha Hayes Baldrige. He was a veteran of the Army Air Corps in World War II, and was a member of the Church of Christ. Prior to his 25 years as supervisor, he was a conservation officer.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Fanny Helbert Baldrige; a daughter, Merlene Baldrige, at home; two brothers, John Baldrige, of Warco, and Dexter Baldrige, of West Prestonsburg; three sisters, Mrs. Roland Burchett, of Lantley, Mrs. Tom Fannin, of Findlay, O., and Mrs. W. F. Clark, Jr., of Prestonsburg.

Funeral services will be held Friday morning at 11 at Hall Brothers Funeral Home Chapel at Martin, with J. W. Holcomb the officiating minister. Burial will be in the family cemetery at Warco.

BLACKBURN WAR VICTIM Betsy Layne Soldier Is Killed in Vietnam; Rites Slated Saturday

Funeral of Sgt. William K. (Kerry) Blackburn, 22, of Betsy Layne, who was killed in Vietnam August 16, will be conducted at 11 a.m. Saturday from the Betsy Layne United Methodist Church.

The body was removed from the Baker Funeral Home, Pikeville, today (Thursday) and will remain at the home of the victim's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Blackburn, Betsy Layne, till time of the funeral.

Sgt. Blackburn was graduated from Betsy Layne high school and attended Pikeville College and Sue Bennett College. He had been in Vietnam the past several months and in the U. S. Army since May, 1968. Besides his parents, he is survived by his widow, Mrs. Fonetta Akers Blackburn, two brothers, Glenn Michael and Jeffery Blackburn, of Betsy Layne, and three sisters, Mrs. Gleda Larson, Key West, Fla., Mrs. Cheryl Meade, of Stanville, and Miss Leslie Kay Blackburn, Betsy Layne. Officiating at the funeral will be the Revs. James C. Stratton, Cohen Campbell and Charles R. Elswick. Burial will be made in Davidson Memorial Gardens at Ivel, the Baker Funeral Home directing.

Drilling Pioneer, 88, To Dance at Fest

(Tom) Dimick, 88 years old, is a drilling pioneer. He was born in Pennsylvania, he was a "drilliner." The Dimicks accepted him as a pioneer for he could dance.

These days when the Dimicks are popular. A few old-timers can remember Tom Dimick as a young man. He speaks almost reverently of the days when he could dance. "Light on his feet ... could have danced on a plate and never broke it ..."

Well, Tom Dimick, now 88 and living in Huntington, W. Va., is coming back to Floyd county, and he will do the hoedown and play the Jew's-harp at the fourth Kentucky Highland Folk Festival at the Jenny Wiley State Park amphitheatre, Aug. 29-31.

The steps may not be as fast, or as high, as they once were, but they will all be there as the retired oil and gas operator will join a great array of talent in turning back the years, helping festival visitors relive in music, dance, arts and crafts and costumes "the good, old days."

Mr. Dimick recalls that he came to Prestonsburg in 1894 on the steamboat "Fair Play." This was three years after his father, George Dimick, had arrived in this county to begin the first drilling for oil in Eastern Kentucky.

McDowell Clinic Ousts 5 Doctors

Five doctors and 11 others, including a former administrator and secretarial and nursing personnel, were evicted from the Daniel Boone Clinic at McDowell Saturday morning after a restraining order had been issued against them from the Floyd circuit court.

Dr. Mary A. Hall, one of the five physician-defendants, also was enjoined from practice at McDowell, effective Monday, except for the five patients already under her care.

Closing of the clinic offices to the group followed the resignations from Daniel Boone of Dr. Hall, Dr. Romeo S. Bernardi, Dr. Susan J. Branner, Dr. Lowell F. Roberts and Dr. William D. Pratt, and their founding of the Regional Medical Clinic there. Also evicted was William Stumbo, administrator of the new clinic, and these nurses and secretaries associated with the five doctors: Ernestine Hall, Mary Ann Faulkner, Neil R. Riley, Nova Moore, Joyce Gibson, Ruthene Howell, Marie Jones, Irene Moore, Martha Stone and Loretta M. Martin.

The temporary restraining order was granted on petition filed by Herbert W. R. Emrich, principal officer of Willard & Woolsey, Harlan public service corporation, doing business as the Daniel Boone Clinic. Emrich pointed out that the defendants had resigned from Daniel Boone Clinic on July 23, that their resignations were accepted and they were advised to vacate the clinic premises at the McDowell hospital. He alleged that, in spite of the request for them to vacate, defendants "continue to harass and annoy plaintiffs, its agent and representatives."

Hearing of Dr. Hall's suit seeking a declaration of her rights in relation to a clause in the contract which she signed is slated for hearing Saturday before Circuit Judge Hollie Conley here. The clause in the contract provides that upon her separation from the Daniel Boone Clinic she may not practice her profession in a radius of 50 miles of McDowell.

Willard & Woolsey operate clinics at Harlan, Middlesboro, Whitesburg and McDowell, and the system is headquartered at Harlan. (See Story No. 5, Page 3)

Abandonment of the First Baptist Church at Martin for classroom purposes after surface water had invaded the basement rooms was followed last week by an inspection of buildings in temporary use there for elementary pupils.

Superintendent Charles Clark said Williams had later requested a report on improvements made at various schools in response to the state fire marshal's order of a few months ago. Drys Hold Lead in All 4 Districts

Vote Total Short Of 1966 Balloting, Tabulation Shows

Floyd county's Dry forces won their biggest victory Saturday in the five-election history of local option elections held in this county since the repeal of Prohibition.

The county remains legally dry by a majority of 2,654 votes, and every magisterial district polled a lead for the Drys. Only 10 absentee ballots were cast, and of these seven voted "No" in answer to the question on the machine, "Are you in favor of the sale of alcoholic beverages in Floyd county, Kentucky?"

Magisterial Districts 1 and 2, traditionally dry, returned thumping dry majorities, and in a startling about-face Districts 3 and 4, both heavily wet three years ago, joined in adding to the dry victory margin. (See Story No. 2, Page 3)

New Road To Disturb 'Lone Rebel'

Will the next of kin of the late Samuel Bird please step forward? The Kentucky Department of Highways finds it will be necessary, when new US 23 is built from Katy Friend to Allen to relocate his grave, and before doing so it would like to confer with his relatives.

A number of other graves along the route will be moved, and relatives of all the deceased are being sought by the highway department. But Bird's grave occupies a special spot in the history of the county.

For Samuel Bird's is what has been known for more than a century now as "The Lone Rebel's Grave." Its fascination for the thousands who have passed the lonely spot in the gap of Bull Mountain, near Walter Gap, since Bird fell in a skirmish between Union and Confederate forces there, has amounted locally to the reverential curiosity held for the Unknown Soldier.

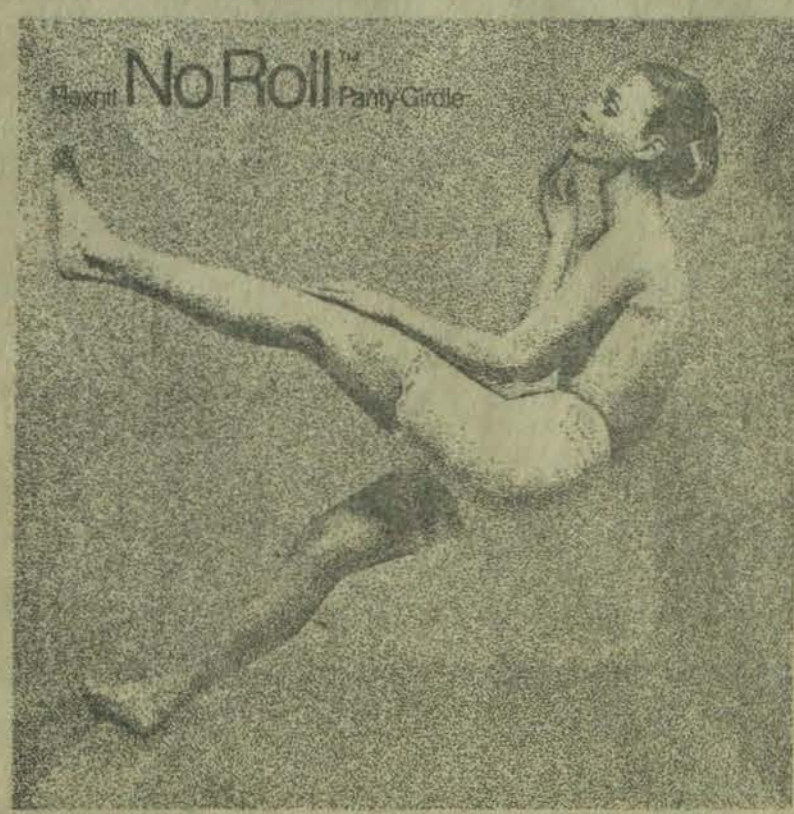
Samuel Bird, believed to have been a corporal, was a member of Company C, 7th Virginia Cavalry, Confederate States of America. Presumably, he was a Virginian. Some think he may have been a distant relative of the Old Dominion's famous Byrd family, despite the variance in the spelling of the family name. Confederate forces advancing up the rough road crossing the mountain ran into two companies of the Union Army's 39th Kentucky Infantry. The fighting lasted about two hours, according to information possessed by Henry P. Sealf, regional historian. The Union detachment retreated.

Bird was killed in the action. It is not clear why the victorious Southern forces failed to bury him, but he was left where he fell. Later in the day, the Rev. William Keith, Methodist minister here, and others dug a grave and buried the soldier.

It has been said that nowhere in this growing world are there people who possess concern and compassion for their neighbors as do the people of the Kentucky highlands and foothills. 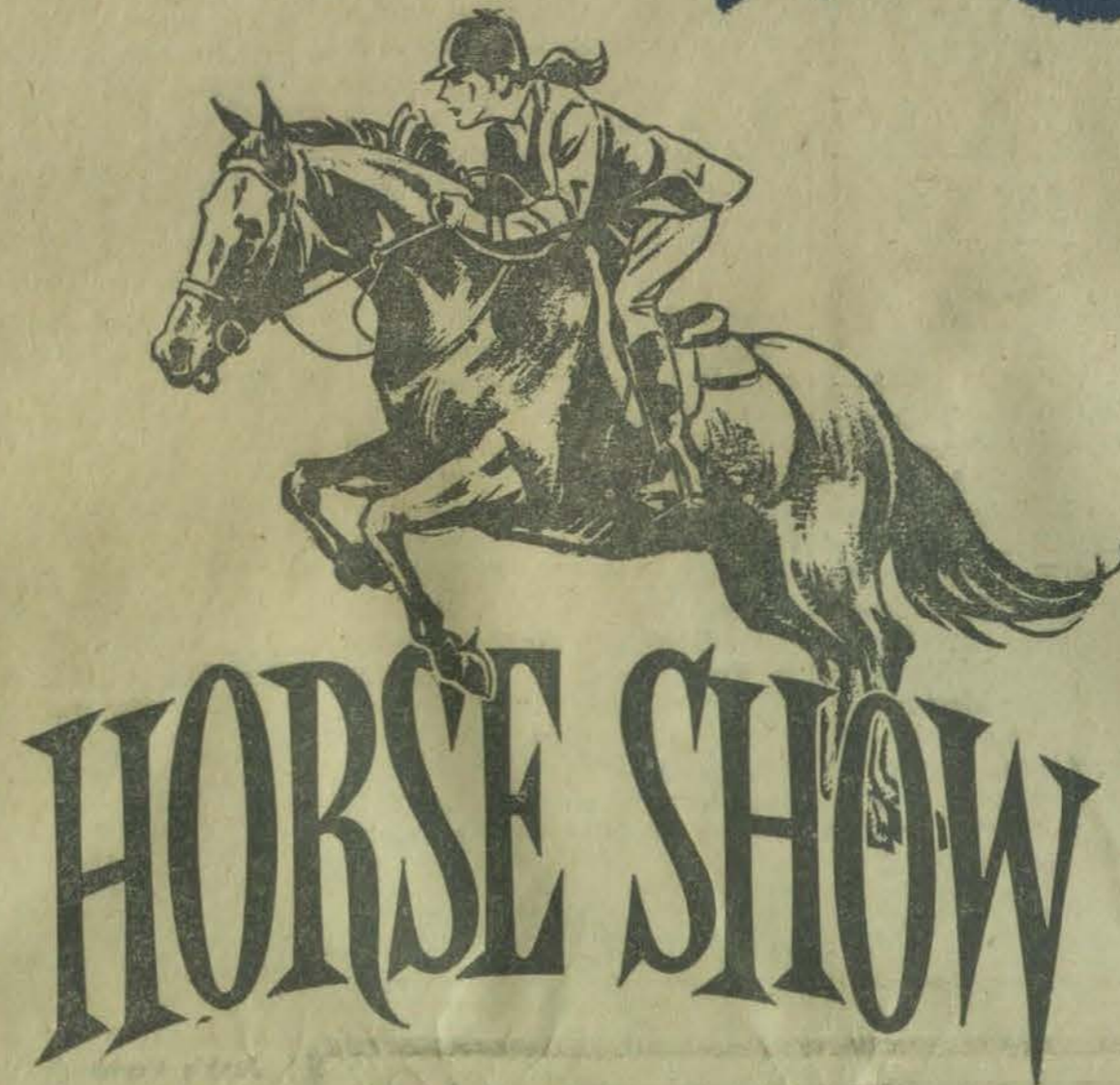

District 1 polled 2,899 dry votes to 1,059 wet for a majority of 1,840 for the Drys; District 2 voted dry, 1,240 votes to 626 wet for a lead of 614; District 3 added 64 votes to the dry margin with 1,408 "No" votes to 1,344 "Yes," and District 4 polled 1,166 dry votes to 1,004 for the wet cause.

At the 1966 countywide local option election the dry victory margin was only 85 votes. At that election only Martin precinct in District 3 was dry, and in District 4 all precincts except Mouth of Mud and Betsy Layne polled wet majorities. In practically every case where a precinct remained in the wet column Saturday it did so with a majority much reduced from that of three years ago. All but 12 of the county's 43 voting precincts voted "No" in last week's election.

Despite the wide lead established by the dry forces, fewer votes were tabulated Saturday than in the 1966 local option poll. A total of 10,786 votes were cast Saturday as compared to the 11,035 cast three years ago.

The election was held in perfect weather, and the voting was held in orderly fashion. The official tabulation of votes was completed early Saturday night.

The positions, both with a salary range from \$5,760 to \$8,520, are that of Senior County Sanitarian and Educationist. Senior County Sanitarian's duties include seeing that sanitary regulations are carried out; making sanitary inspections of dairies, meat packing plants, foods and milk plants, hotels, tourist courts, swimming pools, summer camps, sewage disposal systems; making sanitation recommendations for improvements and related work as required.

To qualify for this position the applicant must be a graduate of a college or university of recognized standing with courses in one of the biological or physical sciences.

Duties of the Educationist, who works under the direction of a health officer and the technical supervision of the division of public health education of the state Department of Health, include assisting in carrying out public health programs for the local health department and related work as required. Examples of this work may be planning and writing press releases, pamphlets, radio scripts, other educational literature; helping in community organization work preparatory to visits of mobile health units such as x-ray, dental and cancer control; assisting in conducting community health surveys and organizing community health councils.

Qualifications for this position require that the applicant be a graduate of a recognized college or university with a degree in one of the natural sciences, social science, English, journalism, teacher education, art or a related field. The applicant must have the ability to interpret programs and activities verbally and in writing, to prepare and give talks.

While in eastern Kentucky the Encampment visited Berea College and Alice Lloyd College at Pippa Passes, and last week the Imperial Elkhorn Mine at Ligon. Encampment students have en-

joyed visits to Jenny Wiley and General Burnside Island State Parks and the German Picnic Grounds, last Thursday. They stopped at Natural Bridge State Park en route back to Louisville, where the six-week encampment ended Saturday.

Helping to arrange for the group's visit to Floyd county were Rev. William G. Poole, of the Floyd County Catholic Parish, and Anthony W. Pappano, director of Programs in Appalachia through Christian Effort (PACE). Rev. 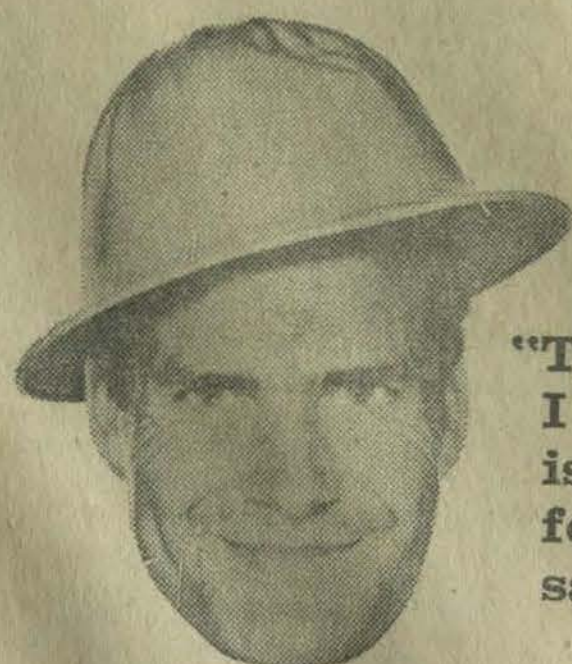

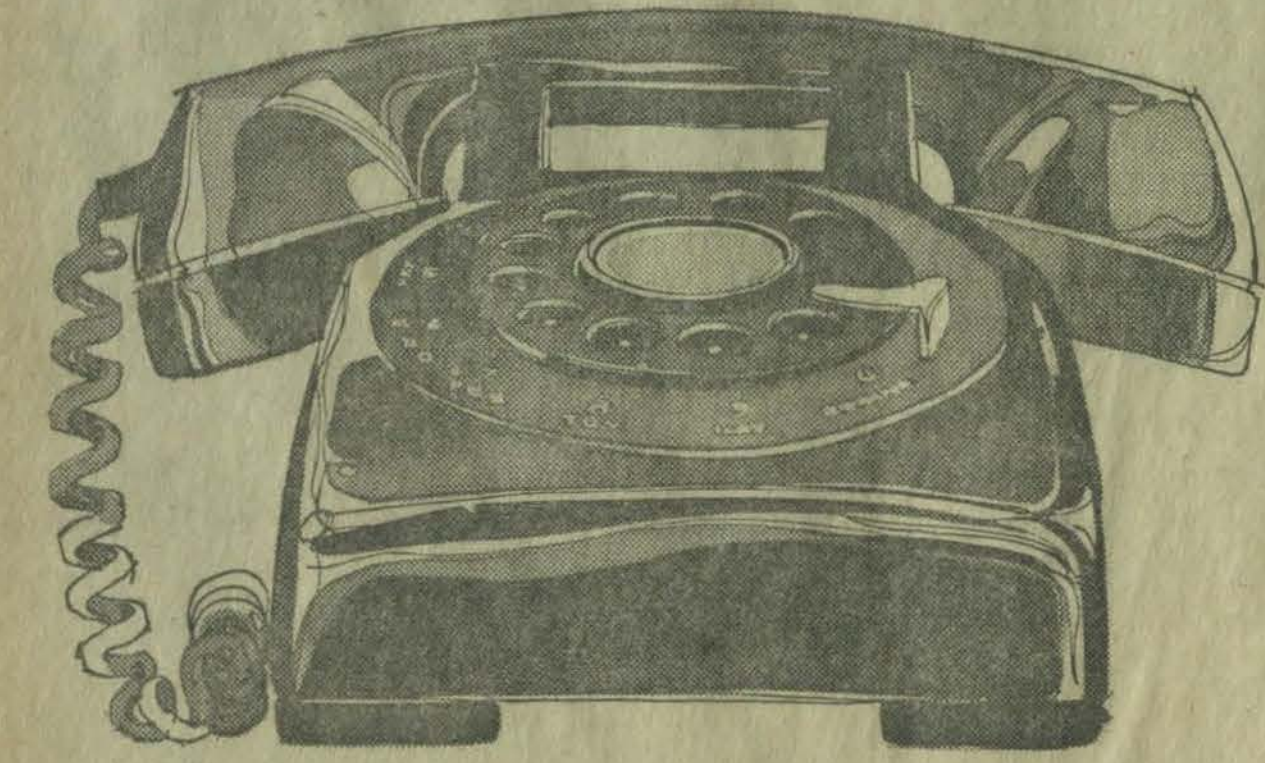

Mechanics Violating Laws on Inspection To Be Prosecuted

State-certified auto safety checkers had better beware — if they happen to be among those station operators or mechanics who tend to wink at Kentucky's Motor Vehicle Inspection laws.

The next car they wave through the inspection lane without a safety check might turn out to be driven by an MVI field officer. And the results could be more than just embarrassing as one Jefferson county operator and another at Covington would be quick to agree.

Pleading guilty to charges of issuing an MVI certificate of inspection without making an actual check of the vehicle concerned, Donald Davis, owner of Don Davis Standard Service at 5202 Greenwood, Road, Pleasure Ridge Park, was assessed a fine during a recent session of the Jefferson county quarterly court, according to a statement released by Public Safety Department officials.

Davis' arrest earlier this year, and release from confinement bond pending trial, followed the successful completion of an investigation by MVI officers into reports alleging that Davis had issued several safety stickers without conducting the state-required inspection.

The warrant for Davis' arrest was issued by the Jefferson County Court after an MVI informant purchased a two-dollar sticker at Davis' station without even bringing a vehicle in for inspection.

At Covington, Floyd Fisk, owner of Fisk's Standard Service, was handed a suspension notice by the Public Safety Department, charging him with failure to comply fully with State inspection requirements.

Fisk came under suspicion after MVI officers checking his station found he had never rejected any vehicle brought into his station for inspection.

"We have several cases being readied for court hearings now," MVI Deputy Chief John Parrott said, "and we intend to continue pushing this thing until every questionable operator is eliminated from the inspection program."

State Buys Lilly's Wood In Letcher for \$271,558

Lilly's Wood in Letcher county, 554 acres of virgin forest, has been purchased by the state for \$271,558 from heirs of the late Lilly Cornett so future generations may see what this country was like when the first settlers arrived.

The wood is reputed to be the largest tract of completely virgin forest in the eastern United States. It is a place where never a fallen or a rooted tree has been removed.

State Budget Director Lawrence Forgy, Jr., said about half the acreage will be slightly developed for use by tourists but that the entire tract will be maintained as a biological and natural laboratory.

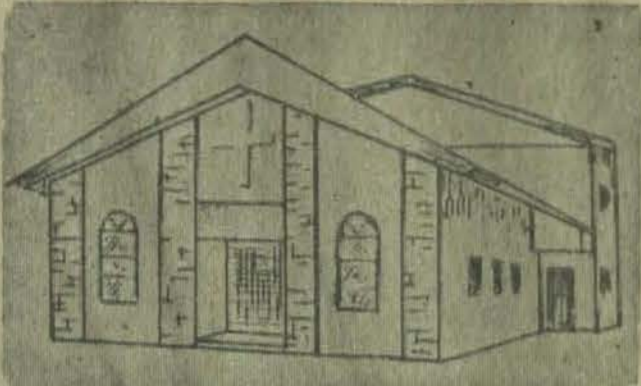
