## Coal Firm Enjoins Striking Workers

### Left Beaver Dispute Idles 3 Operations

#### Division Manager Says Mines' Future Imperiled As Stoppages Continue

The Spurlock, Price and Wheelwright operations of the Elkhorn Division, Island Creek Coal Co., have been strikebound since last Thursday, idling several hundred workers.

Island Creek has been granted a temporary injunction to restrain Local Union 1373, its members and officers from picketing its mines at Spurlock and Wheelwright, and its price preparation plant, and from preventing their operation. No dispute exists at Price and Wheelwright, the company claims. The action followed a meeting of the local Tuesday afternoon to consider a possible solution to the dispute. No decision was reached.

Transfer of workers from a day repair shift to a night shift at Spurlock without posting names or positions open is said to constitute the main bone of contention.

The strike is one of a series. The first, said Raymond Bradbury, manager of the Elkhorn Division of Island Creek, in an affidavit accompanying the petition for the restraining order, began Aug. 18 and lasted for two days. The second, of five-day duration, began Aug. 21. The present stoppage followed a parley between management and workers at the Spurlock mine, Sept. 3. Workers did not resume work at Wheelwright for the 12:01 a.m. shift last Thursday when pickets appeared and miners refused to cross the picket line, the affidavit says.

## JUDGE WAITS STATE PLANS

### Offer of Computer For County Accounts To Get Consideration

County Judge Henry Stumbo said this week he has not been given details of the state's offer of computer service to help all counties keep check on expenses and allotments, and so could not say if Floyd county will accept the offer.

State Auditor James Thompson said the computer program is strictly voluntary. He added that the service will be free to any county desiring it, since state equipment that is not in full use can be put to work on it.

"If you wish," Thompson wrote Kentucky's 120 county judges, "a monthly analysis of your county treasurer's disbursements can be furnished, compared with budget allotments, showing trends and potential problem areas. . . . We feel it will be helpful in the day-to-day operation of the county."

## FLOYD MAN FOUND DEAD

### Delay in Reporting Death of Reynolds Arouses Questions

A delay of more than 60 hours by Georgia authorities in reporting the death of a Floyd county war veteran has puzzled relatives and friends.

A policeman at Jonesboro, Ga. reported that he found 22-year-old Ralph Graham Reynolds, of Martin, dead by hanging at the Jonesboro jail. The time of death was placed at 10 p.m. Friday. Not until shortly before noon the following Monday was the death reported to relatives, and then Mrs. Doris Pinson, of Florida, aunt of the victim, was notified.

An autopsy was performed to determine the cause of death, but no report of findings has been made. It was said that Reynolds may have been arrested on a speeding charge as he was en route home from Florida where he had been employed.

He was a son of Ralph and Stella Curmutte Reynolds, of Martin, and was wounded while serving with U. S. forces in Vietnam. Besides his parents, he is survived by two daughters; five sisters, Mrs. Peggy Jean Thompson, of Ashland, Rebecca, Nancy Kathryn, Carol Sue and Alice Leigh Reynolds, all of Martin, and two brothers, James David and John Oliver Reynolds, also of Martin.

Funeral rites were conducted at 2 p.m. today (Thursday) from the Martin Church of Christ, the Rev. Jack DeRossett officiating. Burial will be made in the John Allen cemetery near here, under direction of the Hall Brothers Funeral Home.

## County Fair Ready For Monday Start

The Floyd County Fair will begin Monday with 10 amusement rides and assorted concession stands furnished by Gooding Amusement Company.

Exhibits will be brought in next Wednesday, between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m., and will be judged Wednesday night.

Flower exhibits will be brought Friday, between 10 a.m. and 12 noon, and will be judged at 1 p.m.

Kids Day will be Friday from 3 p.m. until closing time. Most rides will have reduced prices for children.

Two bicycles, a boy's and a girl's will be given away at 5 p.m. Saturday afternoon. Tickets are being distributed through all the schools in the county.

The 1968 attendance was approximately 9,000, according to J. L. Lafferty, Sr., vice-chairman of Floyd County Fair Board. If fair weather prevails, an attendance of 10-12,000 is expected this year.

Livestock exhibits will be brought to the fair Saturday morning, September 20, between 10 and 12. Animal judging will be at 12:30 p.m.

School exhibits will be centered on Wednesday, September 17, Categories for high school, consolidated schools and two or three-room schools have been established with the theme, "Art in Floyd County Schools."

Mr. Lafferty said, there will be no band parade through Prestonsburg this year but all bands in the county have been invited to give a concert at the Fair Grounds in Archer Park. The Floyd County Fair Board will give each participating band \$25 to help defray expenses.

## COURT DRAGS DURING WEEK

### Prosecutor's Illness Slows Trials; Murder Case Slated, Monday

Illness of Commonwealth's Attorney Harold Stumbo slowed trial work of circuit court this week, and upon his recovery depends the trial of Charles Jackson next Monday on a murder charge. Only minor cases were heard this week.

Two appeals from Prestonsburg police court last week resulted in stiff penalties. Circuit court jurors fined Tom Nelson \$100 and added a 10-day jail term on his appeal from his police court conviction on a charge of driving on a revoked license. Larry Douglas Frazer, the second appellant, was fined \$200 on a drunk driving count.

James Poston's application for probation after his conviction on a grand larceny charge was denied, and he was sentenced on the first day of the term to imprisonment at La Grange for one year.

Dennis Rife entered a plea of guilty Tuesday to a breaking and entering charge and was given a two-year sentence. The grand larceny count against him was dismissed.

The \$1,000 bond of Gary Combs, accused of grand larceny, was forfeited when he failed to appear for trial Tuesday. The trial of Combs and Wilburn Arnett was set for Sept. 22. Also forfeited was the \$500 bond of Dawson Deal, charged with child desertion.

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## Federal Fund Cut Not School Threat

The proposed cutback in federal spending on highways and buildings is not expected to affect plans of the Floyd County Board of Education to build the Right Beaver high school at Eastern, Superintendent Charles Clark said this week.

He based this belief on the fact that the federal funds are already in the bank for that purpose.

The board of education at its Saturday meeting instructed its attorney, W. W. Burchett, to move as rapidly as possible to get settled the appeal made from Franklin Circuit Court Judge Henry Meigs' opinion in the stream pollution action filed by Martin residents. Judge Meigs held that the Eastern location of the school will not result in pollution of Right Beaver Creek, but the case is now in the Kentucky Court of Appeals.

Settlement of that phase of the litigation involving the school is necessary before bonds can be sold.

Members of a Martin committee had been invited to attend the board meeting after they had requested a conference with Clark and the board, but the invitation was not accepted, it was said. The board, however, reaffirmed its pledge to use insurance collected after the loss to fire of the gymnasium and grade school there for the remodeling of the old high school building, with the view to using it for grade school purposes. This, said Clark, can be done when litigation is resolved or dismissed.

One of the barriers to Eastern school construction may be the "bad" bond market, the superintendent said.

## Former Floyd Girl One of 83 Victims

A former Prestonsburg girl was one of 83 persons who died Tuesday in the mid-air collision of a single-engine plane with an Allegheny Airlines jetliner, 10 miles southeast of Indianapolis, Indiana.

The Floyd county victim was Miss Alana Reed, 19, daughter of Mrs. Vada Reed Young, of Ashland, and the late Alan Reed.

Miss Reed was one of the 82 persons aboard the jetliner and was en route to Columbia, Mo., to enter Stephens College for her sophomore year.

Allegheny Airlines has notified relatives that Miss Reed's body has been recovered. Funeral arrangements have not been made. Burial will be in Davidson Memorial Gardens, Ivel, it was said.

Survivors include her mother, Mrs. Vada Reed Young, her stepfather, Matthew Young, and a sister, Joan Reed, all of Ashland, and her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ward Reed, of Drift, and Mr. and Mrs. Willie Hall, of McDowell.

Names of others lost in the tragedy, which is described as Indiana's worst air disaster, had not been released, Wednesday morning.

The jetliner was Flight 853, which originated in Boston and picked up passengers at Baltimore and Cincinnati, en route to St. Louis via Indianapolis. The collision occurred as the plane was descending from 6,000 feet altitude to 2,500 feet in a landing approach at Weir Cook Airport, in partly cloudy skies. The smaller plane piloted by Robert W. Caley, of Indianapolis, had filed a flight plan from McCordsville, Ind. to Bakalar Air Force Base, Columbus, O., and back.

Fred Spitzer, a farmer who saw the collision, said the smaller plane made a popping noise as if the engine were misfiring.

"My brother and I were standing there looking at it and all at once he yelled, 'They're going to hit,'" Spitzer said.

"About the same time, the smaller aircraft hit the tail section of the large one. There was nothing left of the small one."

"The big one nosed over. There were people coming out the rear of the larger aircraft."

## Jury Names 2 for Murder; Drug Possession Alleged

Two murder indictments and two others naming Floyd county men for possession of narcotics featured the work of the Floyd circuit court grand jury which ended its work last Friday.

Orville Moore, of McDowell, was named in one of the indictments for the shooting slaying last May 30 of his son-in-law, Don Gayheart, and in the other David Akers was named for the slaying on Mud Creek, Aug. 13, of Charlie Hall.

In its probe of the sale and use of marijuana in the county the grand jury came up with two indictments. One of these named James Allen, of Printer, on a charge of possession of narcotic drugs for sale or use. The other named James Cooley for the possession of drugs for personal use. Cooley himself was the only witness listed in his indictment, and some question as to its validity has arisen. Four witnesses, including Police Chief Bill Potter and an FBI agent, were listed against Allen.

## 3 SUSPECTS BACK IN JAIL

### Two Men, Girl Held To Bond in Robbery; Missing Cash Found

Two men and a 15-year-old girl who have been in jail here in connection with the robbery Aug. 28 of the Phelps branch of the Pikeville National Bank and Trust Co., were held Monday to the federal grand jury after a hearing before U. S. Commissioner Harry C. Campbell at Pikeville. They were returned to jail here.

The hearing followed by a few days the recovery of almost the entire \$26,114 cash haul made in the holdup. The money was found by FBI agents in a pillow case along a country road on Peter Creek Mountain.

Bond for the two men, Artie Lee Young, 27, and Billy Ray Hager, 20, both of the Phelps area, was set at \$20,000 each, but bail of the 15-year-old Detroit girl held in the case was reduced to \$2,500.

## AVs, VISTAs Say Rights Are Denied

### Clark Vows Fight, Sees Loss of Suit Threat to Schools

U. S. District court at Lexington was asked this week to dissolve an injunction barring Appalachian Volunteers and VISTA representatives from Floyd school properties and to enjoin Superintendent of Schools Charles Clark and the Floyd County Board of Education from interfering with these two groups, the Eastern Kentucky Welfare Rights Organization and other individual plaintiffs.

The petition was filed by Howard Thorkelson, attorney here for the welfare groups. In addition to the three groups, individual plaintiffs are Edward Lee Blankenship, Steven Brooks, Hershel Frasure, Palmer Frasure, Verlie Hall, Nick Malliarakis, Barbara Newsome, Woodrow Rogers and David Walls.

Charles Clark was named defendant, individually and as superintendent of schools. Other defendants are members of the board of education, John M. Stumbo, J. H. Allen, Billy Blair, Pete Howard and Ross Cooley; Sheriff Joe W. Lewis and John Doe and Richard Roe, representing all other law-enforcement officers of the county.

## ROAD STATUS NOT CERTAIN

### Highway Spokesman Says Effect of Cut In US Funds Unknown

A Department of Highways spokesman at Frankfort, in response from an inquiry by The Times, said Wednesday that the department is not certain what effect, if any, the proposed 75% reduction in federal spending on highway construction will have on the Appalachian system, particularly new U. S. 23.

"We have had very little from Washington," he said. "Absolutely no guidelines, nothing official."

The spokesman said he had heard everything ranging from a straight across-the-board cut of 75% to a report that the cut would affect only those projects that are 100% federally financed.

"We're proceeding as if no cut will go into effect," he added.

US 23 construction is under way from Louisa to Paintsville and from Pikeville about two miles north (downriver), but the sector from Prestonsburg to the end of Pike county construction remains in the planning stage.

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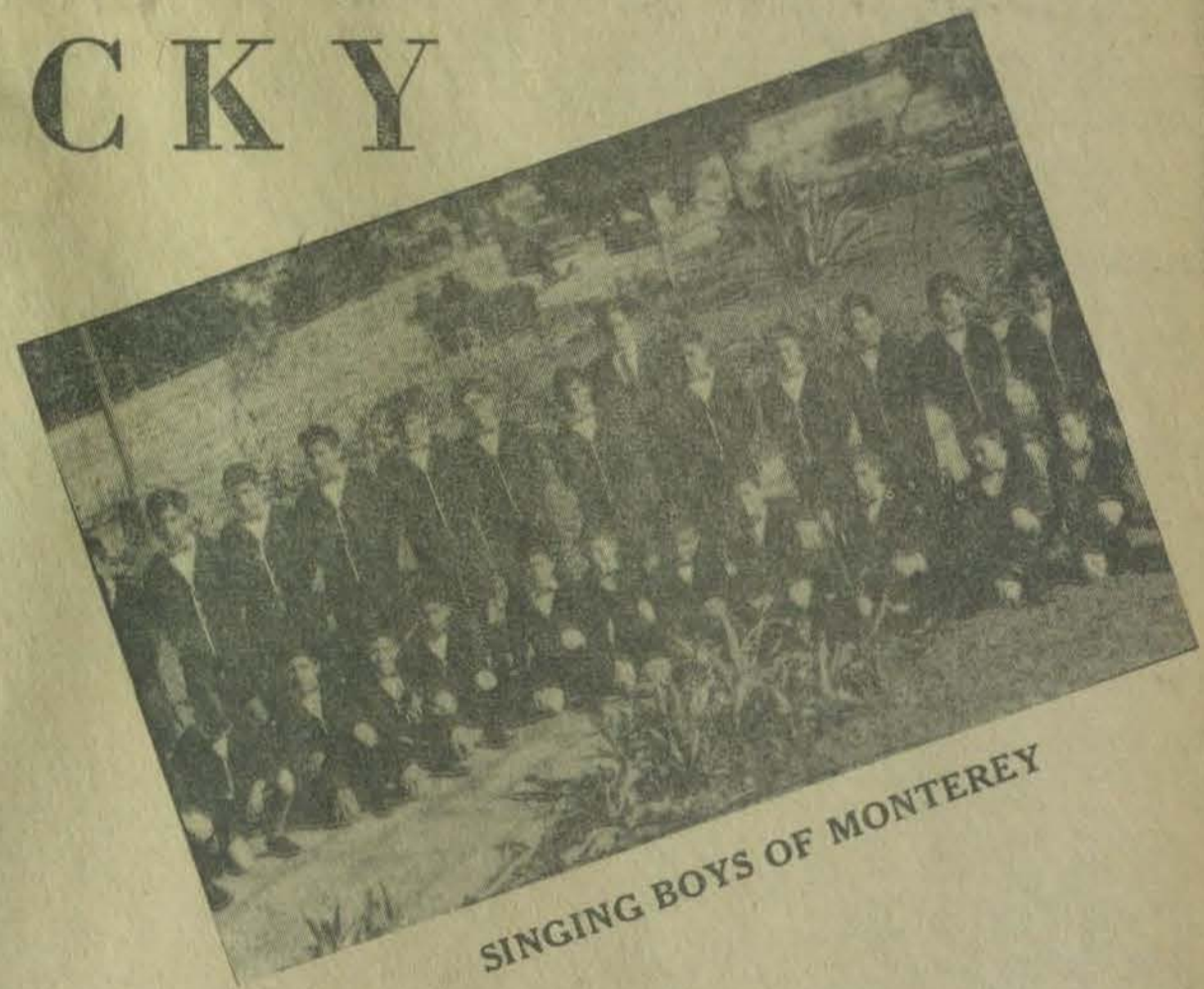

A group of people from Martin have been unsuccessful in an attempt to arrange a meeting with Mr. Charles Clark and the Floyd County Board of Education members, to discuss our local school problems.

Please ask some of the questions we would have asked at our proposed meeting:

1. Why not allow Right Beaver Creek to have their school now, at Eastern — without Martin?
2. Why not junk the present plans and exclude Martin from the new ones, so that all suits can be called off and construction begun on a Right Beaver Creek High School and Martin Grade School immediately?
3. How can we in Martin, drop our court suits, knowing the result would mean the loss of protection from hospitals and doctors, fire departments, policemen, etc., for all Martin High School children?
4. Why make the Martin Grade School children suffer because we fight Mr. Clark's and the Board of Education's plan for our high school children? Are our grade school children to attend classes in basements, lodge halls and mobile units indefinitely?
5. Isn't their plan to punish our grade school children until we stop protecting our high school children?
6. Isn't a plan such as theirs potentially catastrophic, that can include a possible repetition of the disaster of the Our Lady of the Angels School in Chicago, where 90 children died?
7. Why were the three classrooms of grade school children in 3rd and 4th grades allowed to attend class for 4 months last winter in rooms that were abandoned two days after the start of the new term, and two days before the visit of the State Fire Marshall, Mr. Billy Williams? Why the successful concentrated effort to obtain three mobile unit classrooms when Mr. Clark learned the State Fire Marshal planned to visit our school?
8. Will the proposed consolidated high school be built at Eastern, even if the Floyd County Board of Education has to provide and/or employ hospitals, doctors, policemen and a fire department? How much of the burden for these facilities will the Floyd County taxpayer bear?
9. Will the Floyd County taxpayer suffer an additional burden for the tremendous cost of an adequate sewage disposal plant for the proposed school?
10. Do not improved highways usually precede such a consolidation as is proposed?
11. Why are petitions on controversial subjects distributed for circulation in some Floyd County schools, but parents are threatened with prosecution when they pass out notices for parents in other schools?
12. Is "influencing parents" part of the Floyd County teachers' job, as Mr. Charles Clark urged in his letter to the Martin teachers of Feb. 11, 1969?

# OEO CHIEF ACTS TO EXPAND STATES' ANTI-POVERTY ROLE

Washington — Steps to expand the role of state governments in operating anti-poverty programs were announced yesterday by Donald Rumsfeld, director of the Office of Economic Opportunity.

The changes announced by Rumsfeld may help to move the anti-poverty legislation off dead center on Capitol Hill.

However, in making these moves Rumsfeld has yet to decide on a politically-explosive poverty grant involving Kentucky that could erode much of the support needed to get the legislation through Congress.

The grant involves \$177,000 to an anti-poverty agency in a Democratic stronghold in Eastern Kentucky. The grant was vetoed by Kentucky's Republican Gov. Louie B. Nunn on the grounds that the poverty program was being used for partisan politics.

If Rumsfeld sustains the governor's veto, he will risk incurring the anger of Rep. Perkins, who represents Eastern Kentucky and who handles all poverty legislation in the House. If Rumsfeld over-rides the veto, he will risk incurring the anger of those who seek more state control of anti-poverty programs.

The anti-poverty legislation has been bottled up in the House Education and Labor Committee because Chairman Carl D. Perkins (D-Ky.) has not received assurances of sufficient Republican votes to

# Air Force Team Watches As 'Disaster' Call Met

Flood and tornado, alarms in the night — these were the "emergencies" which last week-end sent members of two Civil Air Patrol squadrons, Civil Defense represented by the Floyd County Emergency & Rescue Squad, the American Red Cross and others into action while a team of Air Force inspectors stood by to see how well they faced up to disaster conditions.

The mock disaster area ranged from the Goble Branch arm of Dewey Lake to a point below Dewey Dam. Families were stranded by flood, homes devastated by tornado, persons injured. Help was needed, the word came to Petty Thompson, Pres-

tonsburg, head of the Floyd County Civil Defense. Four airdrops of food, medicine and other supplies were made.

The Lexington and Maysville Civil Air Patrol squadrons reported for duty. Except for their leaders, these were boys 14 to 18 years of age. The Floyd County Emergency & Rescue Squad, old hands at meeting crises, sent all its facilities into action. Floyd Red Cross Chapter set up a first-aid station at Combs Airport, center of the mock disaster operation. The Prestonsburg fire department had a truck standing by for possible service. In all, 70 individuals were involved.

The disaster call came at a.m., Saturday, and the operation ended at 4 p.m. the following day.

How well the units met the situation will be officially known when the Air Force inspection team makes its report.

Bradbury said UMWA district field representatives have been asked to prevail on the workers to stop the strike and picketing and that he believes these representatives have made a sincere effort to persuade the men to return to work. He also claims the coal company is ready to try to settle the dispute under machinery provided by the 1968 contract but that such machinery cannot be used during a "wildcat" strike.

The request for an injunction says that unless strikers and picketers are restrained irreparable damage to the company will result "and actually tend to completely ruin and destroy said mines..."

Local union officers named in the petition for temporary injunction are Charles O. Webb, James Hall, Sanford Ousley and Thomas B. Armes. Dester Hamilton was the only individual member named, although all members were included as defendants.

Superintendent Clark, who was not caught unawares by the federal court action, said Tuesday, "We will fight this litigation to the fullest extent of our ability. If they win this case — I am not exaggerating — they could create an untold amount of fuore in the school system. We need to find some means — legal, of course — to stop this running fight."

On Aug. 2, the Floyd county school board passed a resolution barring AV and VISTA members from entering the school grounds. The resolution said the board had tried to work with both groups but "got nothing but trouble from them."

The board later obtained a circuit court order backing up its resolution.

The petition filed in U. S. court contends that the school board order, among other things, violates the plaintiff groups members' rights to free speech and to associate freely with others for lawful purposes.

The plaintiffs, most of whom live in the Mud Creek area, say that since the circuit court order was issued Aug. 12, they have not been able to visit schools to discuss their children's education or well-being.

They also claim they were not able to vote in the recent local option election because many of the polling places were on school property.

The U. S. court action is the most recent development in 10 months of sparring between the plaintiff groups and school officials.

A main point of contention has been disagreement over operation of the school-lunch program in the county. Plaintiff groups have charged that the school officials have failed to provide information or free and reduced-price lunches in line with new federal guidelines issued last November. School Supt. Charles Clark said, after the federal court suit was filed, "We have no secrets at all. We were being harassed the most while we were in the process of developing the policy. Their demands were unreasonable, illegal and ridiculous."

Relations between the two groups deteriorated this summer with the publication of an article in Impact Magazine that was sharply critical of the Floyd county school-lunch program.

The board of education approved a resolution "declaring all schools and school property off limits to the VISTA and Appalachian Volunteers." Clark said, "We felt at the time that we either had to take the action that we took or have our school system totally destroyed."

**EARLY KENTUCKY EXHIBIT  
IS FESTIVAL ATTRACTION**

**HENRY P. SCALF**

An auxiliary attraction of the Kentucky Highlands Folk Festival directed by Edith F. James, held at the park amphitheatre recently was the exhibit, Rediscovering Early Kentucky, sponsored by Pikeville College's education workshop class. The display was held in the lounge of May Lodge, Jenny Wiley State Park. Miss Goldie Benedict, Pikeville College teacher, directed and supervised the exhibit.

Featuring the aggregation of utilitarian pioneer tools were demonstrations of shoemaking by Bert Willan, Key West, Fla., and hickory broom making by Claude Bostic, Council, Va. Displayed on the wall of the lounge by Mrs. Thelma Pruitt were scores of pioneer superstitions and sayings, all surmounting a collection of pioneer tools, dishware and kitchenware.

Accenting the exhibit was an early school presentation by Mrs. Norah J. Scalf, Stanville. Featured were post-Civil War school

books used by two Floyd county teachers, Andrew and Hiram Stratton, in the 1880's. A school bell, in constant use since 1882 by Stratton teacher descendants, was shown.

The show on pioneer life was held Friday and Saturday and was visited by hundreds of tourists. Kentucky Highway Commissioner Eugene Goss appeared and asked to be photographed with those dressed in pioneer clothes. One item that attracted considerable attention were the spectacles of Jenny Wiley, shown by Mrs. Scalf. They had been in the Stratton-Scalf families since 1825. The accent on Jenny Wiley, the borderland Indian captive, was increased by a presentation of the will of John Sellards in 1838, brother of Mrs. Wiley and Floyd County pioneer; a painting of Mrs. Wiley by Harold Simpson, Johnson County; and an artistic depiction of Mrs. Wiley escaping from the Indians, also by Simpson. The Simpson paintings were sponsored by Edward Hazelett, president of the Johnson County Historical Society, Paintsville.

Floyd Davis and John Griffith, Prestonsburg high school graduates and now college students, presented an exhibit of pioneer tools and social artifacts that they had assembled a few years ago to show at the high school here. Other exhibits on pioneer life were a button collection of Mrs. Winnie Johns, Prestonsburg, and pioneer clothing, much of it more than a century old, by Miss Benedict. Another exhibit drawing attention was the old store account book of John Spurlock, pre-Civil War merchant of Left Beaver Creek, for the years 1854 to 1858.

Shown with the display was a gallery of paintings by Russell May, Prestonsburg artist. May's paintings were of many historical scenes, particularly of the Samuel May home built here in 1817; Thomas Witter's Fort, Tazewell county, Virginia, and the present Prestonsburg railway station. A total of eight paintings were offered. Mr. May, a successful painter and businessman, only began serious painting two years ago and the popularity of his work is attested by the competition of the public to procure his work.

Colored slides, made of the original Rediscovering Early Kentucky exhibit at Pikeville College in late July, were continuously shown by Mrs. Scalf. Many tourists asked for repeat showings.

Participants in the exhibition, which closed Saturday afternoon, were recognized at a dinner at La Dale restaurant Saturday afternoon by a representative of Pikeville College.

**Amendments of 1967  
Make Many Eligible  
For Hospital Benefits**

Daryl E. Ratliff, district manager of the Pikeville Social Security office, said this week that the social security amendments of 1967 have made it possible for some people to be eligible for hospital insurance benefits who would not have been eligible under the old law.

People who reached 65 in 1968 and who were not entitled to monthly social security or railroad retirement benefits, would be eligible for hospital insurance benefits if they have three (3) calendar quarters of coverage or about nine months of work under social security. Under the old law, these people needed (6) calendar quarters of coverage or about 1 1/2 years of work.

People who reach 65 in 1969 will need six calendar quarters of coverage. Those who reach 65 in 1970 will need nine quarters. Each year the required number of quarters will increase by three until eventually the amount of work required for hospital insurance protection will be the same as that required for monthly cash benefits. However, no work credits under social security are needed by those who qualify for monthly benefits as a dependent or survivor of an insured worker. Ratliff emphasized that all persons who are nearing 65 should apply for Medicare within the three-month period before the month they become 65 whether they intend to retire or continue working. This is necessary to insure that their coverage under the voluntary medical insurance plan will begin on the first day of the month they become 65.

It is not necessary to be required to qualify for Medicare. For further information contact the Pikeville social security office which is located at 2nd and Division Streets or call 432-2177. The office is open from 8:45 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

**Floyd, 5 Other Counties To Get Recreation Plans**

Recreation planners from Morehead State University are moving into Floyd and five other counties as a \$25,521 project funded by MSU and the U. S. Office of Education.

Community recreation programs were established in 12 counties during the first two years of the project, and new plans will be devised this year for Floyd, Campbell, Bourbon, Montgomery, Perry and Martin.

The work is financed with \$17,000 under Title I of the Higher Education Act of 1965 and with \$8,521 in university funds. All ser-

vices are free to the counties and cities involved.

Recreation programs will be designed for 14 communities in the six counties, according to Dr. Rex Chaney, project supervisor and director of programs in recreation at MSU. Carl Stout is project coordinator.

Plans already have been drawn for Boyd, Elliott, Mason, Johnson, Pike, Rowan, Menifee, Fleming, Carter, Lawrence and Greencamp counties.

The project staff works closely with city, county and school officials to design programs tailored for each specific area.

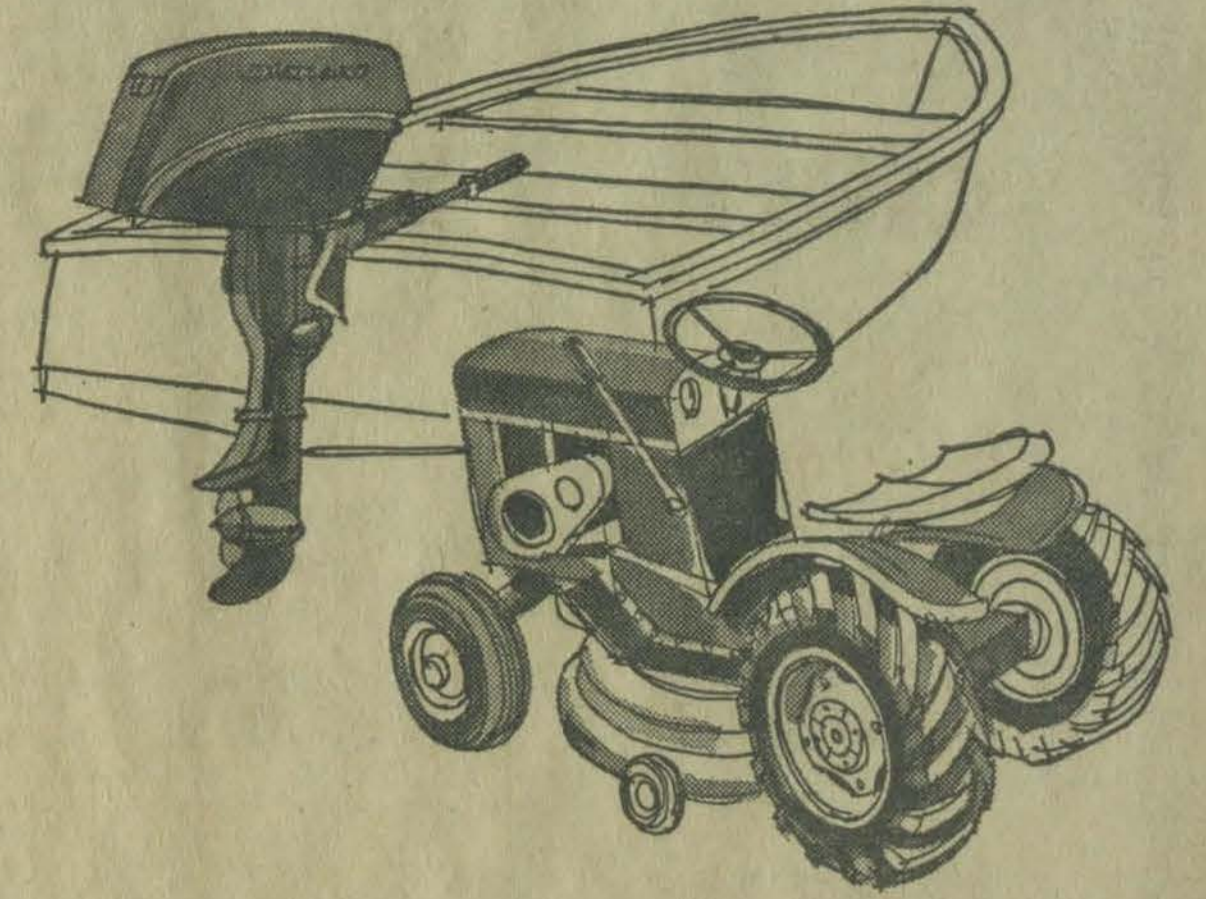

Pike College Tells How Expenses in 50-Fold Jump

Pikeville, Ky. — A 50-fold jump in expenditures locally by Pikeville College in the last 46 years is indicated by comparative budget figures of the college. Ralph T. Kilgore, vice president of the business affairs for the college, has announced that the college's budget for the 1969-70 fiscal year is an estimated \$2,014,000.

That is an increase of more than a quarter of a million dollars over the budget for the year just ended, 1968-69, when the amount was \$1,753,000.

The budget figures for a particular year represent the total expenditures for that year, and Kilgore pointed out that most of the money is spent locally.

He also noted that this is in addition to money brought to the community by out-of-state students and spent here for personal expenses.

The 1969-70 estimated budget is more than twice that for 1965-66 when it was \$942,000. It is approximately 13 times as large as the \$165,553 listed for the 1947-48 fiscal year, and almost exactly 53 times the 1923-24 budget figure of \$37,963.

The number of personnel employed and the teachers' salaries paid have increased accordingly. Some of the figures include: 1947-48: 34 employees; teachers' salaries, \$79,142; total expenditures, \$165,553.

1965-66: 66 employees; teachers' salaries and total expenditures, \$942,000.

1968-69: 112 employees; teachers' salaries, \$816,000; total expenditures, \$1,753,000.

The difference between teachers' salaries and total expenditures is accounted for by equipment, maintenance, supplies, food for dining room, library, administrative salaries, residence halls, and other expenses.

**Fred B. Bullard, 56, Ky. Coal Ass'n Head, Victim in Lexington**

Fred B. Bullard, president of the Kentucky Coal Association and a pioneer developer of radio in Eastern Kentucky, died Aug. 27 at the Good Samaritan Hospital, Lexington.

Bullard, 56, had been in ill health for several months.

He established radio station WKIC in Hazard, one of the first stations in the mountains, following World War II, and was a former publisher of the Hazard Herald, which at the time was a daily newspaper.

A native of Knox county, Bullard lived most of his life in Hazard. He moved to Lexington in 1962.

He served as executive secretary of the Kentucky Coal Association, a statewide organization of coal producers and other coal-related businesses, from 1957 to 1961, when he was elected president. He was also executive secretary of the Hazard Coal Operators Association.

He was a director and chairman of the board of the Bank of Lexington and a member of the Lexington Rotary Club, the Kentucky Association of Organizational Executives, the Kentucky Science and Technology Advisory Council, the Kentucky Water Pollution Control Commission, the Kentucky Natural Resources Advisory Council, a director of Spindletop Research, Inc., a trustee for the Lexington Theological Seminary, and chairman of the Legislative committee of the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce.

He attended the University of Kentucky and George Washington University in Washington, D. C.

**Enrollment Near 10,000 At Community Colleges**

Enrollment for the 1969 fall semester at the University of Kentucky now stands at 27,499 — as of Thursday, August 28 — reports UK's Dept. of Admissions and Registrar Elbert W. Ockerman.

Late registration, which continued until September 3, should bring the figure close to the 28,000 mark, if all predictions hold.

A breakdown of the total figure includes 15,808 on the Lexington campus, 916 in the evening class program, 9,975 in the 15 community colleges, including the Lexington Technical Institute, and 800 in the extension class program.

Dr. Ockerman noted a three and one-half per cent drop in the number of out-of-state freshmen over last year's ratio. There was a 38 per cent increase in the number of community college transfer students — an increase of nearly 200 students.

"The total number of entering freshmen was up about 12 per cent over last year, with the number of transfer students remaining about the same as last year," Dr. Ockerman said.

The community college breakdown includes: Ashland, 956; Elizabethtown, 614; Ft. Knox, 591; Hazard, 240; Henderson, 610; Hopkinsville, 442; Jefferson at Louisville, 1,814; Madisonville,

## Two from County Serve Aid Work in 4 Colleges

Two Floyd countians serve four Kentucky colleges as counsellors in the Higher Education Project at these institutions which pays living costs of "high potential" students whose families receive public assistance.

Seven years ago, one of the two counsellors, David Nutter, was a Maytown high school sophomore with no greater aspiration than "to graduate, get a job and go to work." A year later, however, he began thinking about further education. But his family was on the public assistance rolls, and money needed for a college education seemed as distant as the higher education itself.

This week, David Nutter began working as counsellor at Morehead State University for about 100 students who receive funds through the Department of Eco-

nomics Security's Higher Education Program. These are students whose ability shows promise of success in college but who might not be able to attend college for lack of cash.

And the work young Nutter is doing at Morehead will help him attain a college degree.

The other Floyd countian in a like capacity is Mrs. Eva Allen Horn, who serves Higher Education Project students at Prestonsburg Community College, Ashland Community College and Pikeville College. Mrs. Horn's office is in the Department of Economic Security building on North Lake Drive here.

Nearly 1,100 students have been attending college under the program since it began three years ago. Some started college under the program; others were already in college at the time they began receiving aid under the Higher Education Program.

Of the nearly 1,100, there are 49 who have been graduated. Another 133 will begin their senior year this year. Nearly 450 others, including about 200 freshmen, will also be sitting in college classrooms this fall as a result of the program's \$50 a month per student.

When the program began in 1968, it was financed entirely by the federal government as a pilot project. This year it is financed on a federal-state matching basis, with Washington paying \$394,578 and the state \$180,000.

Nutter, like many impoverished youths, began his higher education at Alice Lloyd College at Pippa Passes in Knott County. He calls the program "a very fine opportunity" for youngsters who deserve help but would otherwise not have a chance to get a college degree.

## LRC Hears Opposing Views On Miners' Compensation

Frankfort — More adequate ways to determine whether coal miners are disabled by pneumoconiosis (black lung) were urged in a recent Legislative Research Commission subcommittee hearing to accumulate facts about the disease.

Witnesses at the hearing, representing varied groups interested in the disease's effects, called for an overhaul of the state's workmen's compensation law. A Uniate existing inadequacies. But the witnesses differed on where the inadequacies exist.

Some, representing the miner's point of view, claimed too few miners are able to get awards under the state's present workmen's compensation law. A University of Kentucky professor and former member of the Workmen's Compensation Board said the "real weakness" of Kentucky's law is placing on the coal miner with black lung the burden of proving that the disease was caused by his occupation.

Others, representing the coal industry, claimed Kentucky's existing law is liberal toward the miner; that the miner is being compensated for black lung, and no change in the law is needed.

Testifying at the hearing were representatives of the coal industry, organized labor, public health agencies, insurance officials, and governmental agencies.

The special subcommittee was appointed from Legislative committees on Health and Welfare, Labor and Industry, and Agriculture and Natural Resources. Members are Representatives Mitchell Denham, D-Maysville; Ed Dewhirst, D-Hazard; Richard Hopkins, D-Calhoun; J. Quentin Wesley, R-Sturgis; Lavey Floyd, R-Pointier; and Senators Francis Burke, D-Pikeville; and Pearl Strong, D-Ary.

The committee plans to recommend action to the 1970 General Assembly.

In other legislative action, subcommittees of the Committee on Labor and Industry have taken steps to study needs for legislation on subjects ranging from professional negotiations for teachers and collective bargaining for public employees to elevator safety codes and regulations of fee employment agencies.

Also to be studied are prevailing wages, working hours for females, wage and hour regulations, workmen's compensation laws, and building codes. Interested parties and special interest groups will be contacted for information and opinion in the areas of study.

Creation of a new bipartisan state elections board, with a permanent staff under merit system coverage, is being studied by the Legislature's joint committee on Elections and Constitutional Amendments.

The committee plans to make a recommendation to the 1970 Legislature about the proposal presented during a committee meeting last week by Attorney General John Breckinridge and State Treasurer Thelma Stovall.

The new board would study and report on each election in an atmosphere which would remain nonpartisan, according to Breckinridge and Mrs. Stovall. The present board is composed of the secretary of state and one Democrat and one Republican appointed by the governor for one-year terms.

Other election "reforms" such as penalties for "slow" vote total

reporting and periodic purging audits, will be considered by the committee. The committee also has under consideration changes in the election financing law to make large ticket sales accountable and to reduce the number of reports required of candidates.
