\$881,000 Low Bid On Housing Units

4th Development PCC Spring Semester To Add 78 Units Within a Year

Prestonsburg's fourth housing development will reach the construction stage this month, it was said after contractors' bids were opened here Tuesday on the 78-unit low-rent housing development planned for the Goble-Roberts Addition.

Britt, Bertram & Associates, Vanceburg, Ky., were low among the five contractors who submitted bids. The firm's bid was

Architects had estimated cost of the project at \$1,031,000. Two other bids were below this estimate.

The bids were opened at Green Acres, the original housing development built here. Green Acres and the second low-rent housing complex here, Indian Hills, already have 82 low-rent units available and in use. The rent-supplement project sponsored by the Prestonsburg Ministerial Association, which is scheduled for completion in February, will add another 75 units. Some of the rent-supplement units already are occupied.

Bids opened Tuesday will be taken Monday to Atlanta for review by the Housing Assistance office of the Housing and Urban Development Administration (HUD), and the 360 days which the contractor has for completion of the new job

will begin this month. Thirty of the 78 units in the new complex will be for the elderly, and these will be of one-story design. The remaining units, for family occupancy, will be of two-story construction. Brick with redwood siding will be used. The construction bid includes landscaping and other work.

Judge Tells Jury Public Has Asked Control of Liquor

Circuit Judge Hollie Conley, in his instructions to the grand jury empaneled Monday for the first court term of the new year, called for strict enforcement of the "dry" law in this county.

He pointed to the overwhelming dry vote cast at last year's local option election and told the jury it should work to see that the people have what they obviously want.

Judge Conley said he had received a petition signed by a number of citizens, asking for strict liquor-law enforcement. He suggested that these who signed the petition must know of violations and should be able to supply information. He said he had placed the petition in the hands of Commonwealth's Attorney Harold J

"For the past three or four years," Judge Conley remarked, "our county has been in pretty good shape." He commended outgoing sheriff, Joe W. Lewis, for a job well-done. "I'm sure the new sheriff will do an equally good job," he added.

"Whiskey violations," the judge told the jury, "are not the worst crimes to be brought before you, but many times when there is a murder, a breaking and entering, a child desertion or a broken home, whiskey is involved."____

He called on the grand jury to investigate election violations and to "check out" the work of the county registration and purgation board.

N. L. May, of Prestonsburg, was named grand jury foreman.

Because a number of those summoned for jury duty failed to appear, additional names were drawn for petit jury service, and there was no court session Tuesday while new jurors were being summoned.





Honors Big Sandy Agency Commonwealth Life Insurance Company honored its Big Sandy agency for a company "first" at a dinner, December 12. Big Sandy has become the first of





Assembly convenes for the enacting of new laws, all over Kentucky new county and city officials begin terms of office, or old officials begin new terms which are, in the purview of government, to see that existing laws are enforced.

In fact, it may be true that there are enough laws already on the statute books - if they were enforced. We recognize the importance of the job the Legislature will undertake during the next sixty days, but at this particular time the work of those officeholders at the local level during the days and months of their terms of office seems more important. It is much easier to say, "This is the law" than to breathe life into the pages of the dry statute book through judicial and enforcement effort.

Kentucky's liquor laws, although not perfect, are adequate, if really enforced. The Legislature could improve on them, but in any form they mean little if sheriffs, policemen, judges and others turn violator by violating the oath they take, pledging themselves to honor, protect and enforce.

The state may need more stringent legislation to meet the needs of all its citizens who live under the terror of an atmosphere which may become so polluted a cesspool. But the laws that sometimes be.

Pikeville College and UL Cooperating in Program In Community Development

Pikeville, Ky.-Pikeville College and the University of Louisville are planning a new program for the benefit of residents of Eastern Kentucky and adjacent areas.

A master-of-science degree in community development from the University of Louisville may be earned here in two years under the plan, which is scheduled to begin next month. Most of the work is to be done on the Pikeville campus and the remainder at Louisville, Dr. Robert S. Cope, college president, said.

Since the program is dependent on a sufficient number of students, it is important that persons indicate their interest in enrolling as soon as possible, he added.

The course will be scheduled according to the University of Louisville calendar, with the spring semester running from Jan. 14 to May 19. Enrollment may be made at either Pikeville College or the University of Louisville.

The degree will be offered by the University with the use of the facilities of Pikeville College and the services of some of the college's staff.

The program includes courses in political science, sociology, social work, law, managment, psychology, social science and education.

Scholarships, covering half tuition, can be offered to qualified students.

The classes will be held between 6 and 10 p.m. on Wednesdays, and between 8 a.m. and 12 noon on Saturdays.

Sunday Closing Law May Be Liberalized

What's ahead for the new General Assembly session at Frankfort?

The Legislature's Interim Committee on Cities has recommended that the 1970 General Assembly enact legislation which liberalizes Kentucky's Sunday closing law.

The committee voted 5-4 to have a bill drafted and recommended its passage to the General Assembly. The proposal

Permit drug stores to open for business on Sunday and sell any item legally saleable on Sunday. Allow grocery stores employing no more

than five persons, including the manager or owner, to do normal business on Sunday. Allow local option on permitting dime stores, dollar stores, clothing stores, shoe stores and department stores to remain open on Sundays. Cities of the first, second, or third classes could enact ordinances independent of the county in which it is

Provide that employees required to work Sundays be paid at least time-and-one-half and be allowed time off to attend church services without fear of losing their jobs.

In other action, the committee referred its successors in 1970 proposed legislation which would:

Provide for \$100 supplementary salary payments from state funds for local police and firefighters and provide funding for training programs for them.

Allow local governments to set up their own retirement systems.

Rescind Kentucky's 1965 resolution calling for a federal constitutional convention.

Also passed by Committees on Cities was a report from a hearing on problems of urban government.


