

Chamber Plans Tourism Study In Smokies Tour

William O. Goebel, president of the Prestonsburg Area Chamber of Commerce, announced Monday that a group of 35 Prestonsburg businessmen will make a three-day tour of the Great Smoky Mountains vacationland, sometime next month.

Purpose of the tour will be to revisit the area visited by a similar Prestonsburg group in 1961, to survey tourist attractions, and study tourist promotion and growth with a view to applying the knowledge gained to promoting tourism in this area.

The tour, to be made in air-conditioned buses, will include overnight stops in Gatlinburg, Tenn., and Cumberland Falls State Park, with visits to Asheville, N. C., Chattanooga, Tenn., and other points. It is estimated that the cost per person will be approximately \$40.

Reservations for the tour should be made within the next two weeks with either Mr. Goebel or Curtis Clark.

The Floyd quarterly court had its jury panel this week, properly drawn from a jury drum, but it had no jury at work as of Tuesday afternoon.

The jury was idle because no defendant demanded a jury trial. If one does, he or she will be required to advance the jurors' pay.

No cases were called for trial Monday. Next day, several were called. Trial Commissioner Glenn G. Burchett said several cases were "filed away" (dismissed) when neither state police nor deputy sheriffs appeared as witnesses.

The docket is so large, Mr. Burchett said, that its reduction is necessary. He indicated that cases three or four months old will be dismissed when complaining witnesses fail to show up for their trial.

Danielsons' Kin Crash Victims

Four persons were instantly killed Tuesday afternoon in a two-car, head-on collision on Interstate 75, near Lexington, relatives of three of the victims were notified here.

One of the victims was Mrs. Timmye Stone, 20, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Danielson, of Prestonsburg. Her husband, David Lewis Stone, 22, a University of Kentucky student, and their four-month-old daughter, Angela, also were killed. The fourth victim was Mrs. Virgie Robinson, 58, of Lexington.

The crash resulted, Fayette county officers said, when Mrs. Robinson drove into the wrong lane of I-75, the two cars meeting.

Former Employee Of Health Dept. Is Blaze Victim

John Dennis Sturgill, 33, Hindman native who at one time was associated with the Floyd County Health Department, was burned to death last Thursday night in a fire which swept his apartment in Lexington.

Body of Mr. Sturgill, who was controller of the Blue Grass Comprehensive Health Program, was found the following morning. The blaze, it was said, apparently originated in wiring between floors of the Higgins Apartments where Mr. Sturgill resided.

The victim was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Sturgill, of Hindman. Besides his parents, he is survived by one brother, James Billy Sturgill, of Hindman; a foster-sister, Mrs. Howard Stone, of Florida, and one foster-brother, Larry Breeke, of Hindman.

Funeral rites were conducted Monday from the Milward Mortuary in Lexington, and burial was made in Frankfort cemetery.

Island Creek Lays Off 330 In Cutback of Production

Had You Heard?--There'll Be An Election, Next Tuesday

In the paragraph which follows is what is perhaps the least interesting item ever recorded in this newspaper:

The 1970 primary election will be held next Tuesday.

The main interest that lies in the coming event is the possibility that there will be no election in some precincts of this county. This, however, is a possibility only if some of those who have been named precinct officers carry out their threats not to appear for duty at the polls and if no substitutes can be found. Four election officers are required at each precinct.

Only members of the Republican party will vote in this and other counties of the Seventh district, since the Democratic

incumbent, Congressman Carl D. Perkins, is unopposed. One observer said he "will be surprised" if more than 500 vote in this county.

If no more than 500 vote, the cost of the election in this county will run around \$10 per vote cast, since the pay to election officers, to the sheriff for his work in serving notices, to the county clerk for providing a complete voting list, plus other items, is expected to cost \$5000 or more.

In perhaps 10 of the state's 120 counties there will be no election because of lack of opposing candidates.

One of the two Congressional candidates in this district is H. H. Wheeler, formerly of Paintsville, but now a resident of Lexington. The other is Herbert E. Myers, of Louisa.

Raiding Party Boards Lake Boat for Search

Sheriff Frank Leslie and four of his deputies constituted a boarding party Saturday afternoon when they took to boat to reach another craft in Dewey Lake for which they had a search warrant.

Seven Sections Closed Friday, 3 Yet Operated

The Island Creek Coal Company, largest coal producer in the county, last Friday cut back production, eliminating work at 7 of the 10 sections operating in its Wheelwright-Price complex and laying off 330 employee-members of the United Mine Workers of America.

The action was the first taken by any major coal company in the area in response to the economic squeeze resulting from compliance with the new mine safety law.

The economic shock to the area was reflected in the estimate that the cutback will cost \$600,000 a month in payrolls. No company estimate of the payroll loss was available, however, and some hold the \$600,000 figure above what the loss actually will be.

A company spokesman declined to predict the future of the operations closed last week. Producing sections on the west side of the mining complex were closed, all the way from Wheelwright to Price, a distance of about 10 miles.

Not affected were two operations at Price and one at Salisbury.

The company spokesman said the cutback had cut Island Creek's coal production in this county approximately in half.

The Island Creek mining complex includes the several portals from Wheelwright to Price and the central plant at Price where coal from all the mines is processed for loading.

The layoff, it was said, will include 42 men from the central shop. These will be offered transfer to another Island Creek central shop in Buchanan county, West (See Story No. 4, Page 12)



Youthful Desire for Freedom May Result in Drug 'Hang-Up'

"It's a little like pollution, the bad drug scene we have today. It's the problem of those who abuse the beautiful," according to Dan Armstrong, social worker from Comprehensive Care Center, Lexington. "Drugs are very often the hang-up of kids who say, 'I want to be free, I want to be me!' and then go about it in the wrong way," Armstrong maintains.

Here's a man who has worked with teenagers in deep trouble from drug use. He's the kind of person the University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service is calling on these days to help with their state-wide study and information campaign on drug use.

So far, this year, over 50 Kentucky counties have asked for the "Drug Abuse and Misuse" Homemakers club lesson, prepared by Extension Family Life Specialist Dr. Burt Coody. There are some 1600 Extension Homemaker clubs, with a membership of almost 26,000 rural and urban women. But Extension's responsibility reaches far beyond these groups. For instance, schools all over the state are requesting films, speakers, leaflets, special programs on drugs for their students.

Take Powell county high school in Stanton. Last Tuesday morning, their senior class had a session with Armstrong, Dr. Coody and Mrs. Rose Swope, county home ec agent. They were cued in on the different types of drugs and had a chance to ask questions.

Dr. Coody feels that in many of Kentucky's rural county high schools, drug abuse isn't a problem. But graduating seniors go from there to other communities, jobs, the armed forces and come smack up against this drug thing very quickly.

Powell high school seniors at a recent meeting in Stanton asked about the effects of marijuana and LSD, about "bad trips" and "flashbacks." And they asked Dan Armstrong why kids use drugs.

"Maybe they're saying they don't want any part of this hypocritical, phony society..." He said. "Maybe they're saying, 'I'll take some drugs and turn on, and get some meaning out of life!'"

That's when a pretty blonde teenager intently asked the most important question: "How do you go about finding yourself?"

"Turning on with people is the best way," Armstrong told her.

"You can get high in natural kinds of ways, in situations where people are real with each other..."

"Don't turn on with drugs. Turn on with people. Learn how to express what you think, and feel, and care about, and want... The hippies say that Americans are too phony, that they're not real, that they're phony."

"Do you like hippies?" another senior asked him.

"Sure I like hippies... They can be very beautiful people," he said.

Drug abuse is merely a symptom of underlying causes, according to both Armstrong and Dr. Coody.

Some kids try drugs because they are natural-born experimenters. They have a hunger to know. Others feel trapped within themselves, can't communicate. A good many more are trying to find some easy answers or escapes. Sometimes it's just the forbidden that whets the appetite and gets you sucked in, caught by something you can't handle.

Cooperative Extension works hand in

hand with the Department of Mental Health and other agencies in bringing drug information to Kentucky's youngsters, their parents, and other adults. The Department of Mental Health has 21 Comprehensive Care Centers scattered over the state.

"Most of the kids and grown-ups we see at Comprehensive Care are normal people with social problems, marital or family problems. We use the group approach a lot—people helping people. And it works," says Armstrong.

That's what Cooperative Extension is all about, too—people helping people.

Lonnie Neeley said Monday that he will start work this week on a new store to replace the one which was destroyed by fire recently on the Auxier road, near here.

The blaze, which was thought to have originated from a neon sign transformer, also destroyed the Neeley home and a trailer. The loss was estimated at \$30,000.

Mr. Neeley said the Prestonsburg fire truck did not arrive at the scene till the store was half-burned, and that the fire departments of Van Lear and Oil Springs helped fight the blaze.



Ratliff Tells Why Medicare Doesn't Pay All Nursing Home Bills

Daryl E. Ratliff, social security district manager at Pikeville, explains why some nursing home bills are not paid by Medicare.

Most physicians in this area seem to be well-informed as to the general requirements governing payments for services in nursing homes, Mr. Ratliff emphasizes, but many patients and their families seem to lack an adequate understanding of the intent of the Medicare law on this point.

Medicare can help to pay for services you received in a nursing home if all of the following conditions are met:

The nursing home is approved for Medicare patients. You were in the hospital for at least three consecutive days. You were admitted to the nursing home within 14 days after discharge from the hospital for a condition for which you were treated in the hospital. Your medical needs require continuing skilled nursing care.

It is the term, "continuing skilled nursing care," which has caused the greatest misunderstanding, Ratliff pointed out. Some people feel that if their doctor has recommended nursing home care, Medicare should pay for the services. Only care, which must be provided by or under the supervision of trained and skilled professional personnel and needed on a continuing basis, can be paid for by Medicare. Care is not always considered skilled even though it may be administered by a medically-trained person. The fact that someone at home is not physically able to look after the patient, is not reason enough to expect Medicare to pay for care in the nursing home, Ratliff said.

When the care received is primarily to help meet the needs of daily living, such as assistance in bathing, dressing, eating, walking or taking medicine on a regular schedule, the level of care is not such that Medicare can pay for the services.

Ratliff advised that the basic consideration in determining the level of care are the patient's medical needs, the specific services required to fill these needs and the personnel required to adequately provide these services.

"Your nursing home administrator of a facility approved for Medicare patients will be most willing to assist you with questions about covered and noncovered care, or more information about any phase of Medicare, is available from your Social Security office," Ratliff said.

The requirement that a notary public must witness signatures on affidavits required of non-service-disabled veterans seeking VA hospitalization has been discontinued.

Explosions Precede Inez Store Blaze

A series of explosions followed by fire late last Wednesday night destroyed the Inez Supermarket with damage estimated at \$75,000. The initial blast came about 8 p.m., just after two customers had left the stove. Nobody was injured.

The supermarket, owned by Derrell Walker, of Inez, was engulfed in flames by the time the lone pumper of the Inez volunteer fire department arrived. The ceiling and walls of the 75 by 100-foot cinder block building collapsed during the fire.

Drinking Driver Curb Planned in Campaign

Frankfort, Ky., May 13—At a meeting of Kentucky women leaders sponsored by the Kentucky Traffic Safety Coordinating Committee, Governor Louie B. Nunn this morning announced that he is launching a two-month long campaign against drinking drivers.

Governor Nunn said that he had asked for the cooperation of the state police, local law enforcement agencies, county judges, the mass media, trade associations, and the general public.

He also said he had instructed police to enforce the laws strictly and for county judges to interpret them with the utmost stringency.

The women in attendance, representatives of various statewide women's

organizations, expressed concern for the growing problem of safety on the highways and agreed to carry word of the program's merits back to their respective groups.

The meeting was called at the request of several women leaders interested in traffic safety to bring them together in an effort to coordinate all women's organizations in furthering traffic safety. The ultimate result is to hit the highway safety problem at its most effective level—the local community—by involving all the women's organizations in a concerted effort.

Retarded Children Council Elects Officers for '70

The Floyd County Retarded Children Council at its annual meeting May 11 at the Floyd County Board of Education building here elected the following as officers:

President, Lawrence Baldrige; vice president, Dr. Frances Sherman; secretary, Blanche Dingus; treasurer, Blaine Smith.

The board of directors is composed of Byron Brashear, Mrs. Virginia Brashear, Mrs. Beatrice Collins, Gorman Collins, Rev. C. H. Furman, Mrs. C. H. Furman, Birchell Hall, Johnny Hall, Rev. Dan Heintzleman, Carl Martin, Mrs. Charlotte Martin, Mrs. Jerri Martin, Rev. Robert Martin, Mrs. E. R. May, Mrs. Isabell Reed.

Mrs. E. R. May was appointed chairman of the publicity and public affairs committee; Mrs. Jerri Martin and Miss Nora Martin, to the ways and means committee.

The next regular meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. Monday, June 8, at the Martin school lunchroom.

The Council has been active since 1955 and has carried on continuously since that time, in spite of extreme difficulties. At the time of its inception, there was no other organized mental health or mental retardation program in the county. The continuity of its services to a group of retarded children was made possible by the efforts of a few volunteers and the generosity of the people of the county who supported the various money-raising projects. Among the most successful fundraising activities was the annual radio auction sponsored by WPRT.

This past year, the Council has undertaken a broadening and growth plan. This includes a membership drive which is in progress now. Also The Council is in the process of affiliating with the Kentucky Association for Retarded Children (KAR), which, in turn, gives the Council affiliation with the National Association for Retarded Children (NAR). Anyone in the county interested in becoming a part of this worthwhile organization should contact any one of the officers or members.

The group of children which the Council supports consists of the retardates classified as trainable and who are not eligible to be included in the County Board of Education program for exceptional children. The group is designated as a Day Care Center, with no age, race, creed or financial criteria required. The activities are carried out in a class room at the Faith Bible Church in Martin. The teachers is Miss Nora Martin, of Printer.

This year, a much-needed source of financial aid is being provided by the Regional Mountain Mental Health and Mental Retardation Association. This makes it possible for the Day Care Center to carry on its activities during June and July.

There are several projects which, at present, are dreams of the Council. These include playground equipment for the children, a vehicle to transport the children to and from the Center so that it will not be necessary for the teacher to use her personal car, as is being done now. Another dream is a Sheltered Workshop, a project which provides employment for selected retarded persons in making saleable items which are sold for a profit. This would give the retardate a source of income and, hopefully, make the workshop at least self-supporting, if not profitable.

An urgent invitation is extended to the people of Floyd county to become an active part of the Floyd County Council for Retarded Children by securing a membership to the Council, attending all the meetings and participating in all its activities.

An important facet of the University of Kentucky is its library system of more than 1,000,000 volumes housed in the Margaret I. King Library and in the smaller, highly selective libraries of various colleges and departments. The special libraries include the collections of the Agricultural Library and the Medical Center, as well as those of Architecture, Art and Music, the Biological Sciences, Chemistry and Physics, Education, Engineering, Geology, Law, Mathematics and Pharmacy.





Daryl E. Ratliff, district manager for social security in Pikeville, reminds newlyweds that up-to-date records are important if earnings are to be recorded properly and without delay.

These earnings records will help to determine how much is paid some day in retirement, survivors, or disability benefits. Records which are incomplete or incorrect can result in delay or even in reduction of amounts payable.

"Today's bride could receive social security payments long before she and her husband reach retirement age," Ratliff said. "More than 8 million Americans under 65 now get regular monthly checks."

Virginia. No supervisors were laid off, but 20 to 25 will be transferred to other operations of the company.

"Island Creek," said the company spokesman, "is making every effort to place as many of its laid-off employees as possible in other existing properties, including Western Kentucky, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Virginia."

The cost increase which contributed to the decision to cut down the work-force and close several operations arises from the new safety law, but federal "black lung" legislation supplies only a small part of economic stress laid on the company, it was said. There was no official confirmation of the report that labor troubles over a period of years had played a part in the decision.

The reaction in the town of Wheelwright itself was mixed. Vern Bailey, a member of the city council, commented on the fact that Island Creek is the major employer there—"in fact, the only major one." Veteran miners and their families talked in subdued tones of the prospects.

The Mountain Investment Company, which owns the town of Wheelwright itself, is not pessimistic. Said Gordon Brown, president of Mountain Investment:

"The impact of the layoffs on Wheelwright itself is relatively small, because of the total laid off few are from Wheelwright. The workers with seniority reside here, but others who were employed later drive here to work, maintaining residence elsewhere."

Mr. Brown also said opening of other mines in the area is anticipated and that employers in three different areas of industry are looking at Wheelwright as a possible location.

"We have offered them space in existing buildings for new industry, and we have housing ready for their workers," Brown said. "We have hope that one or more of these will locate here. Don't count Wheelwright out."

Wheelwright has long been regarded a model mining community. It was the first town in the Big Sandy watershed to install a sewage disposal system. Indoor plumbing was installed in every home while the Inland Steel Company owned both town and coal operations. The town has a nine-hole golf course, a swimming pool, clubhouse and library. It began in 1916 with development by the Elk Horn Coal Corporation. Inland Steel Company bought Elk Horn's interests in 1930, and Island Creek acquired the mines five years ago.

Pollution Law for Boaters To Be Enforced This Season

Rumor notwithstanding, pleasure boat owners can expect full enforcement this summer of state standards requiring that marine toilets be equipped with approved disposal systems.

House Bill 500, requiring approved water pollution control devices on motorboats with toilet facilities on board, does not become law in Kentucky until next Jan. 1. Conflicting information recently has been circulated among boaters about the status of the state's enforcement program during the 1970 season, said Public Safety Commissioner William O. Newman.

The confusion exists probably because the new law does not become effective until Jan. 1, 1971, but even so, present regulations of the Water Pollution Control Commission contain essentially the same provisions as HB 500 and they have been in effect since last July 1.

Any toilet-equipped motorboat registered in Kentucky or operated on Kentucky

waters must have a disposal system approved by the commission, and boat owners are being required to sign affidavits at the time of registration that they have approved systems, Newman said.

"Anyone refusing to sign, or not having an approved system, will not be allowed to register his boat," Newman said.

The regulation, in effect since July 1 last year, stipulates that approved disposal systems must fall into one of three categories:

Those with holding tanks built so waste can be discharged by pump and vented to prevent escape of gases.

Those with vented incinerators capable of reducing waste material to ash.

Those with a new type effluent discharge device, subject to individual prior approval by the commission.

But, boats with marine toilets rendered inoperable in a manner approved by the commission are exempt from the requirements.

Newman said further information concerning approved systems could be obtained from the Water Pollution Control Commission, Kentucky Health Department, 275 East main St., Frankfort, Ky. 40601.






