# Codell Has Contract On Martin Rail Work

### Firm To Begin Work This Week On 8½-Mi. Line

Contract on construction of the first 81/2 miles of the 24-mile railway which will tap the huge coal reserves of Martin county was awarded this week to the Codell Construction Co., Winchester, Ky., The Times has learned.

The rail spur will leave the main Norfolk and Western railway, near Kermit, cross the Tug fork into Martin county at Lovely and drive into the Wolf Creek section, an area of virgin forests and untapped coal reserves. Work was expected to begin this week, with the contractor maintaining headquarters at Lovely.

Once the railway penetrates deep into Wolf Creek, a tunnel through the mountain will provide rail access to the coal-rich Rockcastle section. Production is not expected till 1972.

One of the companies which will develop the new field is the Martin County Coal Corporation, which is now doing roadbuilding and site preparation work in Wolf Creek. It also has done some preliminary mine-opening work there, Raymond Bradbury, of Prestonsburg, the company's general manager, said. After the present 8½-mile contract is completed, another eight miles will be necessary to reach this operation. The company, an affiliate of the A. T. Massey Coal Co., has not yet awarded a contract on construction of the big coal preparation plant it will operate in connection with its coal development.

The other firm which will have a mining operation ready for work when the railway reaches it is the Island Creek Coal Company. Island Creek eventually will open a second operation in the Martin county field, it is said.

Planned to produce 2,000,000 tons of coal a year, the mines will employ an estimated

### Plan To Dismiss **Quarterly Court** Cases Discussed

An error appeared in last week's Times when a paragraph was omitted and the omission went unnoticed by the proofreader.

Sherman Cook, Clarence Martin and Ashland Joseph were erroneously listed in a quarterly court story as being defendants in liquor transporting cases when, in fact, they were charged with liquor posession for the purpose of sale. The names of the two men accused of transporting-Jason Moore and Alvis Lee Smith-were omitted.

Joseph said later that the possession charge against him has been dismissed in quarterly court. The Sheriff's office said this is true, but added that the dismissal was made in order to get the case before the grand jury for possible circuit court trial.

Because quarterly court trials without a jury drawn from a jury drum may be attacked by appeal to circuit court and the Court of Appeals, the plan now is to dismiss all liquor cases in the lower court so that grand jury indictments may be made later and trial by jury in circuit court may be had, the Sheriff's spokesman explained.

### Latta Among 6 To Follow NEA Probe in State

State Senator Clifford B. Latta, D-Prestonsburg, has been named to a special six-member subcommittee to follow the National Education's investigation next fall of Kentucky education. The investigation has as its aim a decision on whether to impose sanctions against the state.



"We, of course," he added, "would expect to have information of our own about the investigation without having to read about it in a newspaper."

The order, issued by the judge of the Boyd circuit court in the absence from this county of Circuit Judge Hollie Conley, seeks to enjoin the local union from maintaining a strike in violation of the prevailing labor contract and from maintaining a picket line in order to prevent others from working.

## Copies of Plan Sent Worldwide By Eng'r Corps

The plan for a channel improvement project at Martin has brought credit from the top to the Army Corps of Engineers' Huntington district.

The Corps' top echelon at Washington, D. C. has distributed copies of the plan throughout its world-wide organization as an outstanding example of environmental application to an engineering project, according to Col. Maurice D. Roush, Huntington district engineer.

The project is designed to reduce local flooding along Beaver Creek at Martin. The work consists of widening more than four miles of channel with some realignment. Col. Roush said, "It's pleasing to receive recognition for the efforts we have been making toward the blending of functional

engineering with aesthetic values." The Chief of Engineers' office called special attention to the landscape planting

In areas where the banks are stripped of vegetation by necessity of construction. and where excess earth is deposited, the plan calls for certain species of plants in a specific arrangement.

The planting scheme takes into consideration the cost of maintenance and long range further development by Martin officials.

The plantings are designed to screen less sightly areas and provide a scenic drive along Ky. 80.

Local interests must furnish rights-ofway, relocation of utilities and roads, and provide maintenance throughout the life of the project.

The project was authorized by the Congressional Flood Control Act of 1965. Col. Roush said construction of the project could begin next spring, if all local conditions are met by the community.

Current cost estimate of the job is approximately \$4 million.

# Schools in Trouble On Vehicle Insurance

Floyd county's and all other Kentucky school systems are in trouble as they have not yet found insurance for their school buses and other vehicles, with the opening of schools only a few weeks away.

The Floyd County Board of Education recently advertised for bids on fleet insurance. There wasn't a bid offered.

"Insurance companies don't want our business, and when we find one we know the premium will be twice what it has been," James Salisbury, director of transportation for the Floyd board, said. He said the fleet premium for the 1969-'70 school year was approximately \$9000. It now appears that the premium for the new school year will run as high as \$20,000.

The higher cost of insurance and insurers' reluctance to bid, it was said, stem from the higher cost of repairs for any damage that may be incurred by a vehicle, plus the fact that there is a tendency to "stick" insurance companies on damages.

### New Suit Filed To Curb Board's Eastern School

Shortly before The Times completed its preparations for printing, a suit was filed Tuesday by Everett Akers, J. R. Key and Frank Salisbury, of Martin, seeking both a restraining order and a mandatory injunction against the Floyd County Board of Education, its members and Superintendent of Schools Charles Clark.

The temporary restraining order asked would enjoin the defendants from: 1. Constructing a high school at Eastern.

2. Discontinuing or removing the present high school or any grade from out side the corporate limits of Martin.

3. From accepting any bids on the proposed \$650,000 issue which would finance construction of the Eastern school. 4. From transporting any children attending the Martin school to any other outside the city limits.

The mandatory injunction requested would require the defendants to begin, forthwith, construction of an 18-room school, with gymnasium, at Martin.

The sale of the \$650,000 bond issue has been planned for Aug. 20.



#### The State Defends the Law

The hue and cry against destruction of Kentucky highways by coal truckers has at last caused departments and officials of the state to admit what they knew from the first—that the law was deliberately being violated.

Highway Commissioner Goss and the Department of Motor Transportation have taken action in the Perry Circuit Court to uphold the law which they and all others with authority are bound by duty and by oath to protect.

We hail their departure from the See-No-Evil, Hear-No-Evil attitude that has so long characterized Frankfort's policy of permissiveness and favoritism.

This done, it may be that Commissioner Goss and Attorney General Breckinridge can now work together and end their use of the situation as a ring for political sparring. Mr. Goss, on the Republican side of the house, has chided Mr. Breckinridge, Democrat, about his failure to take action, remarking that Breckinridge is the state's chief enforcement officer, and taking a sharp jab in return from Breckinridge, who reminded him that he, Goss, well knows that Governor Nunn is the state's chief enforcement officer. The Commissioner has argued that enforcement of the law does not lie in the domain of the Highway Department, and the Attorney General with equal accuracy has said that he is only the state's chief legal ad-

But either can act when he wants to do something about a situation such as this. Any private citizen can go to court and ask a restraining order, and Mr. Breckinridge didn't merely advise when he called on grand juries, a few months back, to indict coal companies which were operating without workmen's compensation.

So, really, the sparring means little. What counts is the depth of official interest in the law which they profess to honor.

Perhaps the younger generation will find now that, after all, the law is not fashioned to serve some and oppress others. This discovery is important to them, for the hypocritical closing of eyes to the offenses of some and the close watch on the aberrations of others has deprived many the knowledgeable teenager of the respect he once held for what we like to call law and order.





#### RUBELLA IMMUNIZATION PROGRAM SCHEDULED AT SCHOOLS, AUG. 12, WITH STATE DEPT. ASSISTANCE

A rubella (German measles) immunization program will be conducted at the Prestonsburg and McDowell elementary schools Wednesday, August 12, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., for immunization of Head Start children and all other children, ages 1 through 12, who have not previously received the rubella vaccine.

Dr. Russell L. Hall, Floyd county health officer, said two teams from the Kentucky State Department of Health will be assisting county health department personnel, using jet-injectors to administer the

All children to receive the vaccine in this program should be accompanied by a parent or guardian, so that pertinent information and written parental consent may be obtained prior to immunization. Parents will be responsible for getting their children to and from immunization sites.

Rubella, a mild illness for children, is hazardous to unborn babies whose mothers contract the disease during the early months of pregnancy-often causing spontaneous abortions, stillbirths, or infants born with severe birth defects such as blindness, deafness, heart defects and

mental retardation. The last major epidemic of rubella in Kentucky in 1964, caused an estimated 285 fetal deaths and 360 children born with serious birth defects. These major outbreaks of rubella tend to occur in 6-9 year cycles. The entire state is participating in a rubella control program in the hope that the next epidemic may never happen.

Wall Heads System
Of Community Colleges



Dr. Stanley Wall, a Casey county native who joined the University of Kentucky faculty in 1946, has been appointed to the vice presidency of the Community College

The UK board of trustees named the veteran educator to succeed Dr. Ellis Hartford, who retired July 1. Dr. Hartford, dean of the system since 1964, will return to a faculty post in the College of Education. He is ineligible, because of age, to continue in an administrative position.

President Otis Singletary told the trustees that Dr. Wall's appointment had been recommended by a committee that included student and faculty representatives as well as administrators and advisory board members from the Community College System.

"I am particularly pleased," he noted, "that the committee, after considering many highly qualified administrators from far and near, settled upon one who is already among us. It proves beyond question that the University is producing very able leadership from within, and this is always the mark of a good institution."

Dr. Wall has been associate dean of the system since November 1966, with primary responsibilities in the area of program development. In addition, he has served as director of the Summer Session since 1965.

From 1956 to 1966 he had been associate dean in charge of the instructional program in the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, following an earlier ten-year association, 1946-56, with the vocational education department of the College of Education.

He began his career as a teacher of vocational agriculture with the Garrard County Board of Education in 1938, transferring in 1940 to Jefferson county, where he taught vocational agriculture until February 1946, when he joined UK.

Both his advanced degrees, the MS in Agricultural Education (1947) and Ed. D (1954), were earned at the University. He received a BS in Agriculture from Berea College in 1938.

Dr. Wall and his wife, the former Ruby Hamm, are the parents of five children. They are members of Broadway Christian Church, Lexington, where he teaches a Bible class.

### 'Lifetime' Card Causes Arrest

A warrant issued here last Wednesday charged a girl with fraudulent use of a credit device.

According to South Central Bell Manager Bill Gibson, the girl said she was given a toll credit card number by a friend who told her that actor Paul Newman had bought a lifetime toll credit card and advertised it for general use.

"This is not the first time we have heard this or a similar story," Gibson said. "In fact over \$34,000 worth of toll calls have been charged to the number to date and the card number which is being used has never been issued to anyone. There is no such thing as a lifetime credit card."

"I am especially concerned about the involvement of young people in this case," Gibson said. "Arrest and conviction records are a lifetime black mark which cannot be erased and which can have a negative effect on a young person's future. Persons who stoop to fraud should recognize the possible consequences involved."

Gibson said the investigation by South Central Bell Security Manager Kenneth Williams is continuing in an effort to identify and prosecute other area residents who may have been involved in the fraudulent use of the credit card number.

ACT scores. Questions pertaining to orientationregistration or the fall semester should be directed to the admissions office.

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

#### **Ensign Newsome Earns Navy Wings**

CORPUS CHRISTI, TEXAS-Ensign Larry D. Newsome, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Newsome, of Harold, Ky., was designated a Navy aviator during ceremonies at the Naval Air Station in Corpus Christi, Texas.

He received his "Wings of Gold" about 18 months after arriving at Training Squadron-31 at Corpus Christi for his advanced phase of training.

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The SEC is asking a court injunction to prevent what it alleges would be further violations of the Securities Exchange Act, the Investment Company Act and the Securities Act.

Most of the charges in the suit involve alleged failure to file statements as required by law, but some of the defendants were accused of accepting illegal compensation and fraudulent dealings.

The 20-page SEC suit contends compensation-not as salary-in violation of federal law during a merger of Commonwealth Security and Daniel Boone.

It also accuses Nave of using false statements in the sales of Daniel Boone stock. Among these statements, the suit says, was one that entertainer Sammy Davis Jr. was vice chairman of the Daniel Boone board of directors.

The Daniel Boone firm already has been placed in permanent receivership by Fayette Circuit Court with the receiver, Lexington attorney James Amato, under orders to liquidate the firm.

Amato told the state court an investigation during a month when he was temporary receiver revealed the company lost about \$2 million in its three years of operations. He said current assets are slightly more than \$1 million.

At least 24 suits have been filed against the Daniel Boone firm, most of them for labor and materials, but Amato said some of these appear to be defensible by Daniel Boone lawyers.

Lawyers for both sides in the SEC suit said they would be glad to have Judge Swinford hear the case despite his son's stock ownership, but the judge declined on grounds it would violate judicial ethics.



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
