Health Dept. Report Cites Understaffing

Annual Report Reviews Work And Problems

The complexities of its expanded services and some of the problems it faces as it administers its program are discussed in the annual report of the Floyd County Health Department to the Floyd County Board of Health.

The health department, Dr. Russell L. Hall, county health doctor, wrote, is "ominously understaffed." With only two sanitarians to cover the whole of the county with its many restaurants, schools, public buildings and public water supplies.

And the department now has only two public health nurses who have the same territory to cover and varied services to perform. Often nurses are required to walk over roads impassable to motor vehicle, Dr. Hall pointed out, adding:

"This is not to imply that the health nurses begrudge having to walk to render services to the public. The very fact that they do walk attests to the contrary. However, in the crowded routine of daily service there is not enough time which can be allotted to out-of-the-way patients who constitute a majority of the public. Ironicvices the most are the very ones who cannot get them.

An instance of the value of the immunization services alone performed by the health nurses is cited in the report. The 9712 immunizations administered without charge during the fiscal year ending last \$53,376, and 4136 tests given were by the son's IGA Store. same yardstick valued at \$25,482.

The report added that it is hoped the money value of these services alone will serve as an incentive to the future use of this free service to the public.

(In the list of diseases against which immunizations were given typhoid is not included. It is now almost non-existent, but when Dr. Marvin Ransdell came to this county as health doctor in the 1920's Prestonsburg was in the midst of a typhoid epidemic, and the disease was almost endemic.)

During the year the health department held these out-patient clincis: TB clinics attended by 487, heart clinics with 258 examined, PKU and renal clinics, 8; crippled children, 84; family planning, 974; cancer (pap clinic), 338.

Woman Who Died Wrote to Blame Local Hospital

Mrs. Marilyn Goble Osborne, 21-year-old Auxier woman, whose parents said she was denied admittance to the Prestonsburg General Hospital, died Monday at the McDowell Regional Hospital, a few days after the birth at her home of her third child.

A letter addressed to The Times and bearing Mrs. Goble's name contained the statement that "they would not accept my insurance or a personal check from me or a friend. I think it was awful to call the city police and run us off.'

Her mother, Mrs. Merlin Goble, of Auxier, confirmed the statement purportedly made by Mrs. Osborne and said her daughter was to have been taken to a Lexington hospital for removal of a brain

Chalmer H. Frazier, administrator of Prestonsburg General, said the Osbornes had been told on five occasions, the first dating back to five months ago and the last only shortly before Mrs. Osborne appeared for admittance, that they would have to make arrangements for her admission. He said it was explained they could arrange for partial payments, or even for admittance on a charity basis, but that the husband

refused to follow these suggestions. "Of course, if we could have anticipated what happened, she would have been accepted," Mr. Frazier said. "But we didn't, and, no attempt being made to follow the suggestions made about financial arrangements, we did not admit Mrs.

Osborne.' He said doctors here told him Mrs. Osborne had varicose veins and died of an embolism-"and that could have happened in any hospital." Frazier said she had been examined by Dr. J. D. Adams and Dr. George P. Archer on separate occasions

after the birth of her baby. Surviving Mrs. Osborne are her parents, Merlin and Olga Walker Goble, her husband, Bill Osborne, Jr., and three children, Douglas, Elizabeth Sue and Christina Louise, all of Auxier; a brother, Bert Goble, also of Auxier, and two sisters. Court Appeals Reduce Prices On Easements

Circuit court trials of three appeals by the Department of Highways from amounts allowed by Floyd county court to landowners for right-of-way for new US 23 in this county have resulted in the landowners being awarded pay totalling \$127,000—only \$18,200 below the original appraisal total allowed by the lower court.

Eighty or more such appeals remain to be heard, and they involve approximately \$2 million. The state has already written checks to cover the amounts allowed by county court-appointed appraisers, and in cases where circuit court judgments are less than the appraisal the landowner is required to refund the difference to the

HallEnters Guilty Plea In Slaying

Jack's Creek Man's **Case First of Four Docketed for Trial**

The first of four murder cases booked for trial at the current circuit court term was over quickly Monday morning when Whirley Hall, Jack's Creek man, entered a plea of guilty of manslaughter in the slaying of Guy Bates.

Bates was shot and killed on Jacks Creek last June by a shotgun blast fired into an autombile in which he was a passenger.

Sentence, which may range from 2 to 21 years, will be passed Dec. 14 by Circuit Judge Hollie Conley.

The second murder trial of the term, that of Bob Hall, charged with the slaying at Allen of his father, Edgar H. Hall, is slated to begin Wednesday.

The court term, which until this week has been devoted mainly to the hearing of civil cases, will run far into December. Other murder cases docketed for trial include those of Reecie B. Combs, charged with the slaying on Rock Fork, near Garrett, of Claude Conley; and Charles Jackson, who was named in a murder indictment by the last grand jury in the mystery-slaying on Arkansas Creek of James Chaffins.

The Commonwealth has asked however, that the Jackson case be continued.

Olin Shepherd, who has been in jail here since the death of his wife from a revolver shot, has not been indicted. It was said last week that he will soon ask for bond. His recent request that the .32-20-calibre revolver held as an exhibit in his wife's death be examined at the state police laboratory was granted but the tests have not yet been made.

Guest List at Lodge Gives Spending Guide

guests last year at May Lodge, Jenny Wiley State Park, has been made by the Tourist Information Center to serve sponsors of advertising of the lodge, park and region as a guideline on future promotion spending. Joseph McCauley, director of the Information Center, said the study hopefully will show where advertising should be placed in order to attract the greatest number of tourists. "If, for instance," he said, "this study shows that only a few visitors come here from California, after the advertising that has already been done, it might be considered unwise to spend more money for advertising in California, which might leave more funds for advertising in areas where the response has been strong.

The study, made by Miss Barbara Yoak, summer intern at the Information Center, Of Michigan's 301 guests, 199 came from showed that the 11,272 persons registered in Detroit. the sampling stayed at the lodge a total of 23,055 "Visitor Days." Visitor days, it was pointed out, is the category of most importance, because one visitor who spends 20 days in the area will possibly spend more money than five who remain

Kentucky led in the number of visitors with 5,489 out of the total sampling, or 48.7 per cent of all guests, but since these remained here an average of only 1.77 days the state's visitor-day percentage was only 42.2 per cent. Ohio, on the other hand, had only 3,322 guests at the lodge but these averaged 2.32 days per visit and so their percentage of the total visitor-days was better than one-third of the total.

'Phone Service **Reduces Visits**

A new telephone service at the Pikeville Social Security Office can handle "most social security business" without requiring personal visits to the office by the public, according to Daryl E. Ratliff, Social

Security District Manager. "We call it Teleservice," Ratliff said. "With it, we can handle a great deal of the paperwork by phone that involves such social security matters as application for benefits, change of address for prompt delivery of monthly checks, and general and specific questions about social security programs, including Medicare."

With Teleservice, Ratliff said, social security personnel can, in many instances, fill out an application for benefits over the phone, then mail the form to the beneficiary for his or her signature.

"We can also accept change of address information by phone from beneficiaries who are moving, so that delivery of their checks will not be interrupted," he said. "And, of course, we can answer questions affecting workers' retirement, Medicare, disability and survivors protection."

sheriff, has sold coal, timber and oil rights on 7000 acres of land which he has been accumulating over most of his 92 years to a Texas businessman for \$900,000.

Mr. Preece has been acquiring the land in pieces since 1917. The valuable tract is located on the Point Section between Levisa and Tug forks of Big Sandy, and some of it extends over into Martin and Johnson

The 55-page deed shows the 7,000-acre block is composed of 19 tracts, nearly all of it in southwest Lawrence county in the Peach Orchard and Richardson sections. Mr. Preece received \$300,000 in cash and is to get two annual installments of like

Principal tract in the big boundary is the 2,408-acre holdings of the old Peach Orchard Coal Co., and the 3,000-acre tract once owned by Evans Oil and Gas Co. Other tracts are as small as a house seat.

Chesapeake and Ohio Railway borders one side of the property, along the Levisa

The Peach Orchard tract was partially mined out by the old Peach Orchard Coal Co., which commenced production in 1850 with Wm. B. Mellon as developer. The coal was hauled out by the old Chatterawah Railway down Big Sandy, which later was purchased by Chesapeake and Ohio.

The tract has four coal seams, one of them reputedly 13 feet thick. But the coal is not of the type to be gassified and a longrange program of that nature is not proposed, Robertson said. The coal however is a utility coal very much in demand right now by coal-burning electric

"We will hold the property, look, study the idea of leasing-anyway we are not firm on it yet," Robertson said. Also a final decision has not been made on what will be done with the fine timber on the tract, he said.

During the formal public hearings last week at Louisville's Holiday Inn East, Haubner emphasized that the sevenmember investigating committee would not recommend either the imposition or the non-imposition of sanctions. That was not

Instead, Haubner explained, "the primary function and purpose of this committee is to analyze and evaluate in-

formation that has been presented." He added that any recommendation for the imposition of sanctions—if made by the national PR and R Commission to the NEA Executive Committee-"would be accompanied by a statement of those conditions that would lead to the imposition of sanctions, so that those people who are in a position to change those conditions could do

"A national sanction," according to NEA's definition, "is a formal, public notice of censure or condemnation by the National Education Association of an agency, organization, or community, resulting from the violation of standards judged by the NEA as essential for the maintenance of an adequate educational program. Such violations are to be determined by thorough, objective investigation."

The sanctions investigation was requested by KEA after the governor failed to recommend and the 1970 legislature failed to enact most of this year's KEA legislative program. NEA's PR and R Commission authorized the investigation after a preliminary investigating team that visited Kentucky "found evidence to support the claim of KEA of inadequate educational conditions and insufficient educational financing."

Governor Nunn and the General Assembly declined to take part in the hearings, although the General Assembly sent some of its members as observers. In addition, two Democratic legislators-House Speaker Julian Carroll of Paducah and House Majority Leader W. Terry McBrayer of Greenup-came to testify as individuals.

More than 50 persons appeared to testify at the invitation of KEA. KEA also introduced 82 documents as exhibits, 34 of them having been collected jointly by the KEA Research Division and the Legislative Research Commission. Testimony centered around factual information contained in the exhibits.






