

## Health Dept. Report Cites Understaffing Annual Report Reviews Work And Problems

The complexities of its expanded services and some of the problems it faces as it administers its program are discussed in the annual report of the Floyd County Health Department to the Floyd County Board of Health.

The health department, Dr. Russell L. Hall, county health doctor, wrote, is "ominously understaffed." With only two sanitarians to cover the whole of the county with its many restaurants, schools, public buildings and public water supplies.

And the department now has only two public health nurses who have the same territory to cover and varied services to perform. Often nurses are required to walk over roads impassable to motor vehicle, Dr. Hall pointed out, adding:

"This is not to imply that the health nurses begrudge having to walk to render services to the public. The very fact that they do walk attests to the contrary. However, in the crowded routine of daily service there is not enough time which can be allotted to out-of-the-way patients who constitute a majority of the public. Ironical—isn't it?—that those who need health services the most are the very ones who cannot get them."

An instance of the value of the immunization services alone performed by the health nurses is cited in the report. The 9712 immunizations administered without charge during the fiscal year ending last June 30 would have cost, at rates charged by hospitals, it is pointed out, a total of \$53,376, and 4136 tests given were by the same yardstick valued at \$25,482.

The report added that it is hoped the money value of these services alone will serve as an incentive to the future use of this free service to the public.

(In the list of diseases against which immunizations were given typhoid is not included. It is now almost non-existent, but when Dr. Marvin Ransdell came to this county as health doctor in the 1920's Prestonburg was in the midst of a typhoid epidemic, and the disease was almost endemic.)

During the year the health department held these out-patient clinics: TB clinics attended by 487, heart clinics with 258 examined, PKU and renal clinics, 8; crippled children, 84; family planning, 974; cancer (pap clinic), 338.

## Woman Who Died Wrote to Blame Local Hospital

Mrs. Marilyn Goble Osborne, 21-year-old Auxier woman, whose parents said she was denied admittance to the Prestonsburg General Hospital, died Monday at the McDowell Regional Hospital, a few days after the birth at her home of her third child.

A letter addressed to The Times and bearing Mrs. Goble's name contained the statement that "they would not accept my insurance or a personal check from me or a friend. I think it was awful to call the city police and run us off."

Her mother, Mrs. Merlin Goble, of Auxier, confirmed the statement purportedly made by Mrs. Osborne and said her daughter was to have been taken to a Lexington hospital for removal of a brain tumor.

Chalmer H. Frazier, administrator of Prestonsburg General, said the Osbornes had been told on five occasions, the first dating back to five months ago and the last only shortly before Mrs. Osborne appeared for admittance, that they would have to make arrangements for her admission. He said it was explained they could arrange for partial payments, or even for admittance on a charity basis, but that the husband refused to follow these suggestions.

"Of course, if we could have anticipated what happened, she would have been accepted," Mr. Frazier said. "But we didn't, and, no attempt being made to follow the suggestions made about financial arrangements, we did not admit Mrs. Osborne."

He said doctors here told him Mrs. Osborne had varicose veins and died of an embolism—"and that could have happened in any hospital." Frazier said she had been examined by Dr. J. D. Adams and Dr. George P. Archer on separate occasions after the birth of her baby.

Surviving Mrs. Osborne are her parents, Merlin and Olga Walker Goble, her husband, Bill Osborne, Jr., and three children, Douglas, Elizabeth Sue and Christina Louise, all of Auxier; a brother, Bert Goble, also of Auxier, and two sisters, Mrs. Linda Rose, Warsaw, Ind., and Mrs. Mary Craft, of Auxier.

Funeral rites were conducted at 11 a.m., Wednesday, at the Auxier Free Will Baptist church by the Revs. Alex Patton and Hobart Holbrook. Burial was made in the family cemetery at Auxier under direction of Hall Brothers Funeral Home.

## Warrant Names Man As Writer Of 'Bad' Checks

The flood of spurious checks drawn on a non-existent Allen firm resulted Monday in the issuance of a warrant for one man and the prediction that others will be accused in the case later.

Kenneth Wayne Jones was named in a warrant charging him with forgery and obtaining money under false pretenses. The warrant was issued from the County Judge's office on affidavit of State Detective Chester D. Potter, who joined the Sheriff's office and the Federal Bureau of Investigation in the probe of the case.

Address of the accused man was not given. The charges against him were based on checks cashed here Nov. 3 by Thompson's IGA Store.

Checks totalling around \$4000 have been cashed in this and at least four other Kentucky counties and in border counties of Virginia and West Virginia. The checks bear the name of the R. K. Allen Music Co., Allen, Ky., a firm which operated a short time last year. Most of the checks were signed by Jones and a Kilbourn Comery. One or more bore the signature of Ralph A. Roop.

## Would End Such Clutter As This

When the Senate Committee on Public Works last week approved the omnibus rivers and harbors bill of 1970, authorizing public works projects by the Army Corps of Engineers on rivers and harbors for navigation, flood control, and other purposes, Senator John Sherman Cooper (R-Ky.), ranking Republican member on the committee, moved to include in the bill a provision to give the Corps of Engineers enforcement powers against dumping or disposal of refuse, garbage, rubbish, trash, debris, or litter of any kind at water resource development projects under the jurisdiction of the Corps.

The Kentucky Senator told the committee that the beauty of many man-made lakes is threatened by heaps of trash and litter which are strewn across the banks of many Corps projects.

Senator Cooper said, "I think it is a disgrace that many camping and picnicking areas and the banks of many Corps lakes are cluttered with debris and trash." He told the committee that local groups in Kentucky have become increasingly concerned about the unsightly conditions at many recreational areas. He also noted that visitation figures at Corps lakes throughout the country are growing rapidly and that new authority is needed to preserve the beauty and cleanliness at many of these areas.

Upon investigation, Senator Cooper found that the Corps of Engineers now has no penalties for littering nor enforcement powers against it. His proposal would provide penalties and enforcement powers for the Corps of Engineers, identical to those already in existence for the National Park Service and the U. S. Forest Service.

It would authorize the Corps to issue regulations prohibiting dumping and litter, with penalties of not more than \$500 or imprisonment for not more than six months, or both, for any violation. Persons designated by the Chief of Engineers would have the authority to issue citations for violation. Persons charged with a violation could pay the citation or appear before a United States magistrate for trial.

Another provision authored by Senator Cooper would authorize the Corps of Engineers to cooperate with the state of Kentucky, the Forest Service, and the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation of the Department of Interior in planning a national recreation area encompassing the Kentucky River palisades and reservoir projects in the upper Kentucky and Licking River basin, including the Red River Gorge and the Cave Run reservoir.

The Senate committee bill also would authorize the Corps of Engineers to cooperate in a comprehensive undertaking to construct an "open cut" in the hills at Pikeville. The open cut would rechannel the Big Sandy River and provide for the relocation of U. S. Route 23 and the C. and O. Railway. Portions of the existing channel of Levisa Fork would be filled creating several hundred acres of land ideally suited for industrial, commercial, and residential and civic development. The comprehensive plan has been developed by the city of Pikeville under its Model Cities program, with the assistance and cooperation of the state of Kentucky, the Appalachian Regional Commission and a group of participating federal agencies, and has received national attention. The total cost of the project has been estimated at about \$23 million.

## VISTA To End Stay In County, Dec. 31st

Floyd county apparently will start the new year without VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America), one of the earliest poverty groups to come to the county after the OEO program to combat poverty in Appalachia was instituted.

B. I. Cherry, Jr., chief of VISTA operations, has notified leaders of the Highway 979 Area Community Action Council at Teaberry on Mud Creek that its operations will be terminated as of Dec. 31. He said the project has been denied Governor Nunn's approval.

Mr. Chaney quoted Lynn B. Frazer, Kentucky OEO director, to the effect that non-approval of the project amounted to the "exercising of veto rights."

At the October meeting of the Big Sandy Community Action Program committee at

Paintsville a resolution authored by County Judge Jordan, of Lawrence county, was adopted, asking Governor Nunn to veto VISTA funds and to request OEO to remove the project.

Those connected with VISTA work in the 979 area protested that the project is needed and that it has established a ceramics shop as a community project and had a woodworking shop planned to add to activities there.

Opponents of VISTA pointed to what was termed its poor relationship with the Floyd County Board of Education and the Mud Creek Water District.

## Court Appeals Reduce Prices On Easements

Circuit court trials of three appeals by the Department of Highways from amounts allowed by Floyd county court to landowners for right-of-way for new US 23 in this county have resulted in the landowners being awarded pay totalling \$127,000—only \$18,200 below the original appraisal total allowed by the lower court.

Eighty or more such appeals remain to be heard, and they involve approximately \$2 million. The state has already written checks to cover the amounts allowed by county court-appointed appraisers, and in cases where circuit court judgments are less than the appraisal the landowner is required to refund the difference to the state.

Results of the three appeals heard during the current court term:

Department of Highways vs. James K. and Sylvia Hall, \$25,000—\$15,000 less than appraisal; Mary S. Hill, et al, \$42,000—a reduction of \$3000 from appraisal; Tommy Ratliff, \$60,000—\$200 below the appraisal.

The first right-of-way appeal, heard in October, was from the \$12,000 set by appraisers on the property of A. D. Martin, et al. The jury allowed the landowners \$10,000.

## Hall Enters Guilty Plea In Slaying

### Jack's Creek Man's Case First of Four Docketed for Trial

The first of four murder cases booked for trial at the current circuit court term was over quickly Monday morning when Whirley Hall, Jack's Creek man, entered a plea of guilty of manslaughter in the slaying of Guy Bates.

Bates was shot and killed on Jacks Creek last June by a shotgun blast fired into an automobile in which he was a passenger. Sentence, which may range from 2 to 21 years, will be passed Dec. 14 by Circuit Judge Hollie Conley.

The second murder trial of the term, that of Bob Hall, charged with the slaying at Allen of his father, Edgar H. Hall, is slated to begin Wednesday.

The court term, which until this week has been devoted mainly to the hearing of civil cases, will run far into December. Other murder cases docketed for trial include those of Reece B. Combs, charged with the slaying on Rock Fork, near Garrett, of Claude Conley; and Charles Jackson, who was named in a murder indictment by the last grand jury in the mystery-slaying on Arkansas Creek of James Chaffins.

The Commonwealth has asked however, that the Jackson case be continued.

Olin Shepherd, who has been in jail here since the death of his wife from a revolver shot, has not been indicted. It was said last week that he will soon ask for bond. His recent request that the .32-20-calibre revolver held as an exhibit in his wife's death be examined at the state police laboratory was granted but the tests have not yet been made.

## Newsom Arrest Report Untrue

Information given The Times last week relating to the reported arrest of Freddie Newsom by officers making a raid on his premises on Middle Creek was erroneous.

Mr. Newsom was not at home at the time of the search and was not arrested. No intoxicants were found on his premises, and the automobile which was impounded after alcoholic beverages were found in it had, according to the Sheriff's office, been sold by a Mrs. Price to a Bill Smith. The car was parked at the roadside, approximately 100 feet from the Newsome home.

One arrest on a liquor charge has been reported within the past week. The defendant, Forest Ray Moore, was booked at the county jail by State Trooper Gary Rose on a charge of illegal possession of alcoholic beverages. ## Guest List at Lodge Gives Spending Guide

A sampling of 5,200 registration cards representing 11,272 of those who were guests last year at May Lodge, Jenny Wiley State Park, has been made by the Tourist Information Center to serve sponsors of advertising of the lodge, park and region as a guideline on future promotion spending.

Joseph McCauley, director of the Information Center, said the study hopefully will show where advertising should be placed in order to attract the greatest number of tourists. "If, for instance," he said, "this study shows that only a few visitors come here from California, after the advertising that has already been done, it might be considered unwise to spend more money for advertising in California, which might leave more funds for advertising in areas where the response has been strong."

The study, made by Miss Barbara Yoak, summer intern at the Information Center, showed that the 11,272 persons registered in the sampling stayed at the lodge a total of 23,055 "Visitor Days." Visitor days, it was pointed out, is the category of most importance, because one visitor who spends 20 days in the area will possibly spend more money than five who remain only two days.

Kentucky led in the number of visitors with 5,489 out of the total sampling, or 48.7 per cent of all guests, but since these remained here an average of only 1.77 days the state's visitor-day percentage was only 42.2 per cent. Ohio, on the other hand, had only 3,322 guests at the lodge but these averaged 2.32 days per visit and so their percentage of the total visitor-days was better than one-third of the total.

In most cases guests from more distant states remained longer. Those from Illinois, 189 of them, were here an average of 3.42 days; 102 Pennsylvanians spent an average of 2.19 days; 80 from New York,

3.20 days; 189 from Illinois, 3.42 days; 301 from Michigan, 2.84 days; 415 from Indiana, 2.43 days.

West Virginia had 785 of the 11,272 total, but these remained only 1.77 days, which is the exact length of stay by Kentuckians at the lodge.

The survey showed guests last year over 1968 for Kentucky, up .6 per cent; Ohio, 3.6 per cent. But West Virginia dropped last year 2.3 per cent, Illinois was down 2.2 per cent and Michigan also lost in visits to the lodge by .7 per cent.

More than half the Kentucky visitors at the lodge came from Lexington and Louisville. Cincinnati supplied half of the Ohioans, and Charleston and Huntington provided all but 60 of those who came from West Virginia. Indianapolis sent 44.9 per cent of Indiana's visitors to the lodge, and Chicago supplied half of those from Illinois. Of Michigan's 301 guests, 199 came from Detroit.

Although 90.3 of the visitor-total came from Kentucky and neighboring states, two neighbors, Virginia and Tennessee, supplied only 1.7 per cent of them.

Practically every state had visitors during 1969 at May Lodge, and Germany, Argentina and Puerto Rico supplied five. A "sampling" of registrations at the lodge for this year shows that the strong Ohio-West Virginia traffic declined 4.9 per cent from the preceding year while the number of Kentuckians rose 3.2 per cent.

This might suggest an undesirable trend, it is pointed out, if the state park system is to be used as a drawing card for those living outside Kentucky. "On many occasions this summer," the survey report said, "the personnel at the local Tourist Information Center were unable to secure rooms for out-of-state tourists. At the same time, however, it was difficult to secure rooms at local motels."

**'Phone Service Reduces Visits**

A new telephone service at the Pikeville Social Security Office can handle "most social security business" without requiring personal visits to the office by the public, according to Daryl E. Ratliff, Social Security District Manager.  
"We call it Teleservice," Ratliff said. "With it, we can handle a great deal of the paperwork by phone that involves such social security matters as application for benefits, change of address for prompt delivery of monthly checks, and general and specific questions about social security programs, including Medicare."  
With Teleservice, Ratliff said, social security personnel can, in many instances, fill out an application for benefits over the phone, then mail the form to the beneficiary for his or her signature.  
"We can also accept change of address information by phone from beneficiaries who are moving, so that delivery of their checks will not be interrupted," he said. "And, of course, we can answer questions affecting workers' retirement, Medicare, disability and survivors protection."

"That record needs no defense and needs no justification to a group from outside the state," the governor wrote.

# Preece Sells Coal, Oil, Timber On 7000 Acres for \$900,000

Phil Preece, former Lawrence county sheriff, has sold coal, timber and oil rights on 7000 acres of land which he has been accumulating over most of his 92 years to a Texas businessman for \$900,000.

Of the sale to Corbin J. Robertson, Houston, Texas, The Elliott County News reports:  
Mr. Preece has been acquiring the land in pieces since 1917. The valuable tract is located on the Point Section between Levisa and Tug forks of Big Sandy, and some of it extends over into Martin and Johnson counties.

The 55-page deed shows the 7,000-acre block is composed of 19 tracts, nearly all of it in southwest Lawrence county in the Peach Orchard and Richardson sections. Mr. Preece received \$300,000 in cash and is to get two annual installments of like amounts.

Principal tract in the big boundary is the 2,408-acre holdings of the old Peach Orchard Coal Co., and the 3,000-acre tract once owned by Evans Oil and Gas Co. Other tracts are as small as a house seat.

Chesapeake and Ohio Railway borders one side of the property, along the Levisa Fork.

The Peach Orchard tract was partially mined out by the old Peach Orchard Coal Co., which commenced production in 1850 with Wm. B. Mellon as developer. The coal was hauled out by the old Chatterawah Railway down Big Sandy, which later was purchased by Chesapeake and Ohio.

The tract has four coal seams, one of them reputedly 13 feet thick. But the coal is not of the type to be gassified and a longrange program of that nature is not proposed, Robertson said. The coal however is a utility coal very much in demand right now by coal-burning electric plants.

"We will hold the property, look, study the idea of leasing—anyway we are not firm on it yet," Robertson said. Also a final decision has not been made on what will be done with the fine timber on the tract, he said.

But, Pocahontas Land Co., the land

division of N and W Railway, has acquired thousands of acres of coal land nearby in eastern and central martin county, and N. and W. now is building a 24-mile branch railroad from Kermit, W. Va. to take out the coal from several big mines being developed. It is presumed that Robertson will deal with C. and O. Railway on the other side of The Point Section to develop

new mines for the C. and O. to haul to coalburning plants.

Preece started as a youth hewing crosses in his native Martin county. By hard work and shrewd management he has become one of the Big Sandy Valley's richest landowners. He has lived in Louisiana many years where he has been an extensive cattle and real estate trader.

## East Ky. Counties In Recreation Area

food service establishments, 35 hotels and motels, 21 trailer parks, 3 recreational facilities, 129 retail food markets, 4 food storage places, 2 food and water vehicles, 6 public buildings, 2 industrial establishments, 2 public water supplies, 4 public swimming pools, 103 schools, 24 solid waste disposals, 4 miscellaneous.

Although Kentucky last year had 211 laboratory-confirmed cases of rabies, Floyd county contributed not one case to this total. The health department in its report emphasizes the point, however, that a continuing program of immunization can be expected to reduce the incidence of the disease.

Other phases of service cited in the report cover plumbing, health education, vital statistics and special services which include rubella, rabies and X-ray clinics.

Related services included the maternal and infant program—preventive health service and medical care for high-risk expectant mothers and infants; and the

Office of Health Mobilization which is housed in the health department building and headed by Willis Hall, an employee of the Office of Health Mobilization.

Mr. Hall supervises 13 packaged disaster hospitals in eastern Kentucky. A packaged disaster hospital is a 200-bed hospital intended to be set up as a supplement to an existing hospital in case of disaster in which hospital supplies would be destroyed, or in the event of an emergency involving a large number of people. There are 46 such packaged hospitals in the state of Kentucky.

Mr. Hall also supervises medical stockpile rotation in 15 hospitals in Eastern Kentucky. The federal government stockpiles medicine in strategic locations in the event of emergencies in which hospital supplies would be cut off. The medical supplies in these stockpiles are constantly updated.

During the past fiscal year, Mr. Hall conducted a survey of the various ambulance services in eastern Kentucky, an attempt to comprise a comprehensive plan of emergency medical service.

As a result of the Office of Health Mobilization (known as Emergency Health Services on the federal level), 71,992 people in Kentucky have been trained in Medical Self-Help. 624 of these in Floyd county. The Medical Self-Help Program is conducted chiefly by high school teachers, but it is available at the college level and to adult groups as well. The health educator at the Floyd County Health Department also teaches the program and hopes to arouse county-wide interest in it.

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## Sanctions Investigators Set Next Meeting in February

The seven-member committee that conducted the recent sanctions investigation of Kentucky school conditions will reconvene in early February to complete the tentative draft of its report to the National Education Association (NEA) Commission on Professional Rights and Responsibilities (PR and R).

Paul Haubner, hearing examiner for the committee and senior staff associate of the national PR and R Commission in Washington, D. C., said the draft will then be sent on a confidential basis to the three parties concerned—Governor Louie B. Nunn, the General Assembly (through legislative leaders of both political parties), and the Kentucky Education Association (KEA).

This will give each an opportunity to file further evidence, raise objections, or enter rebuttals to statements in the tentative draft, Haubner said. The final report will then go to the national PR and R Com-

mission, which will make it public and transmit it to the Executive Committee of NEA. Such action is expected in April.

Under NEA procedures, the Executive Committee has the sole responsibility to apply national sanctions. Recommendations for the application of national sanctions—if such recommendations are made—are reported to the Executive Committee by the PR and R Commission.

During the formal public hearings last week at Louisville's Holiday Inn East, Haubner emphasized that the seven-member investigating committee would not recommend either the imposition or the non-imposition of sanctions. That was not its purpose.

Instead, Haubner explained, "the primary function and purpose of this committee is to analyze and evaluate information that has been presented."

He added that any recommendation for the imposition of sanctions—if made by the national PR and R Commission to the NEA Executive Committee—"would be accompanied by a statement of those conditions that would lead to the imposition of sanctions, so that those people who are in a position to change those conditions could do so."

"A national sanction," according to NEA's definition, "is a formal, public notice of censure or condemnation by the National Education Association of an agency, organization, or community, resulting from the violation of standards judged by the NEA as essential for the maintenance of an adequate educational program. Such violations are to be determined by thorough, objective investigation."

The sanctions investigation was requested by KEA after the governor failed to recommend and the 1970 legislature failed to enact most of this year's KEA legislative program. NEA's PR and R Commission authorized the investigation after a preliminary investigating team that visited Kentucky "found evidence to support the claim of KEA of inadequate educational conditions and insufficient educational financing."

Governor Nunn and the General Assembly declined to take part in the hearings, although the General Assembly sent some of its members as observers. In addition, two Democratic legislators—House Speaker Julian Carroll of Paducah and House Majority Leader W. Terry McBrayer of Greenup—came to testify as individuals.

More than 50 persons appeared to testify at the invitation of KEA. KEA also introduced 82 documents as exhibits, 34 of them having been collected jointly by the KEA Research Division and the Legislative Research Commission. Testimony centered around factual information contained in the exhibits.



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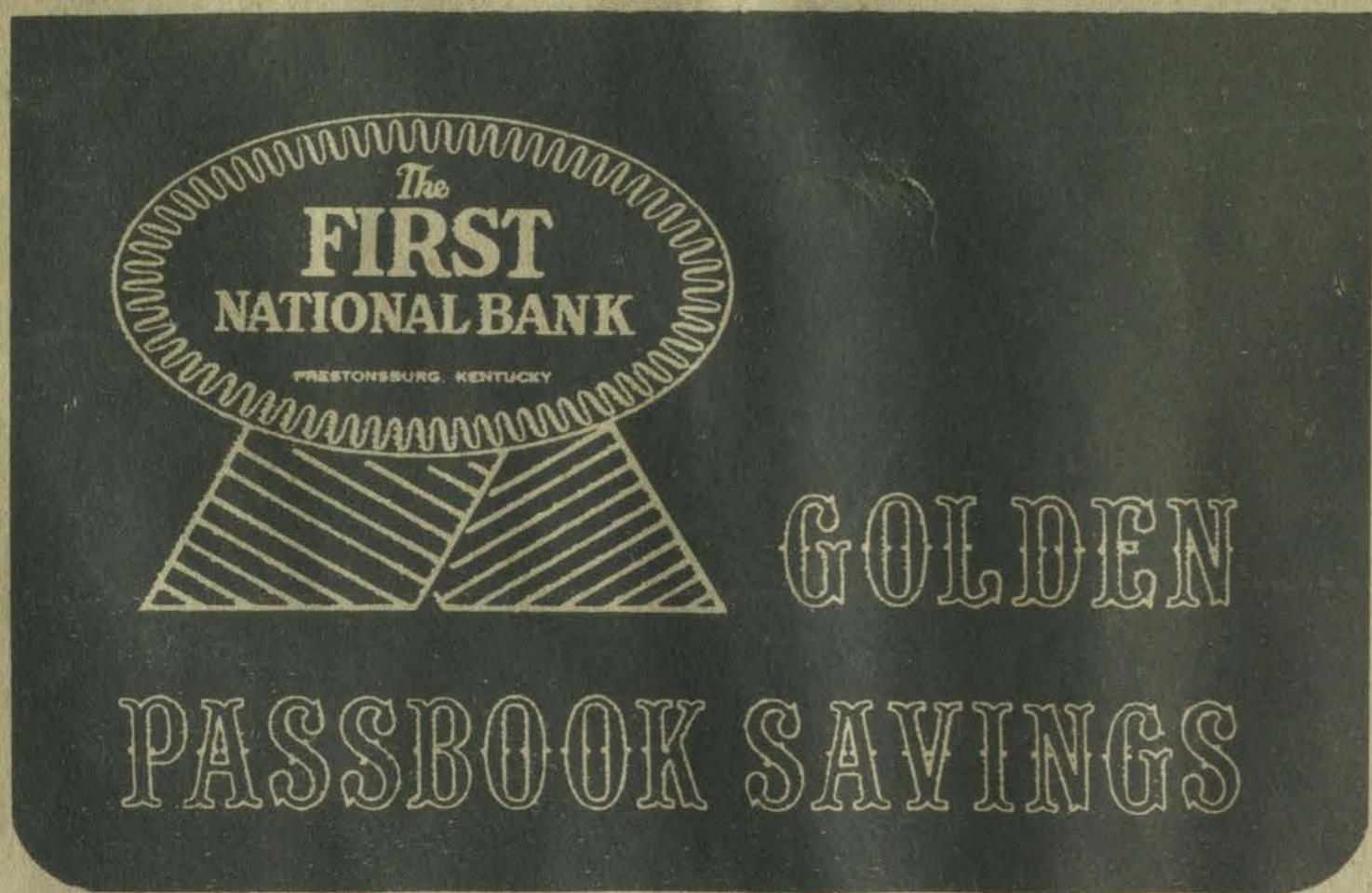
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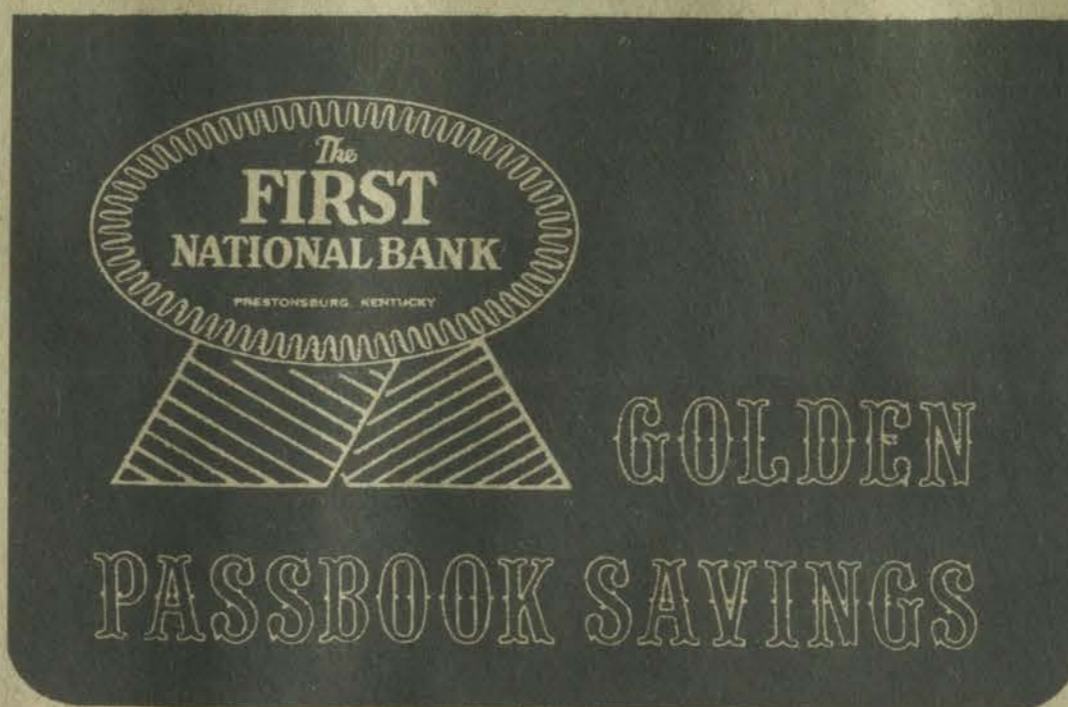
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
