

Crisis Point Threatened In Program

OEO Voices Threat Of Phase-Out; Meet Slated by Groups

The troubled affairs of the Floyd County Comprehensive Health Services Program are expected to come in for study and possible action at a joint meeting here Thursday evening of its board of directors, the Big Sandy Community Action Program board and the staff of the health program.

The meeting was called Monday by John Burton, acting health program director, at the telephoned request of Miss Wendy Wheat, program analyst for OEO's Health Affairs Office in Washington. Other Health Affairs officials are expected to attend the 6:30 p.m. meeting.

The possibility that a period of crisis in the life of the program is near was impressed on board members Tuesday when they received from OEO a letter claiming that the effort of John Burton, acting director, to formulate a workable program has failed. It was claimed that his letter was unresponsive to the memorandum sent the board, outlining necessary changes in the program.

"We are therefore initiating action which may result in the suspension of Grant No. 8996," the OEO letter added.

The grant referred to is the one which funds the program.

The threat voiced recently by the only doctor in the program and its nurses to resign unless the board of directors reconsidered restitution to his job of a man who had resigned has not materialized. Instead, they have written an open letter to Earl Compton, the employee whose reinstatement was involved, and to news media in clarification of their original statement. This latest communication said, in part:

"We would like to make it very clear that we in no way intended to attack the personality of Mr. Earl Compton. . . . We were trying to bring to the attention of the board

The bullet, allegedly fired by Paul D. Collins, shattered on the buckle and inflicted only a flesh wound in McGue's abdomen. Collins was jailed by Deputy Sheriff Buddy Ward and was released Monday when he executed bond.

Shepherd Draws 21-Yr. Sentence In Wife's Death

The jury in the trial of Olin Shepherd, 30, of Middle Creek, for the slaying of his wife, Susan Slone Shepherd, 32, returned a verdict of guilty, shortly after 11 a.m. Tuesday, and fixed his penalty at 21 years in the state reformatory.

The trial was begun Monday, and it moved more swiftly than the usual murder case to its conclusion.

The defendant testified he does not remember firing the shot which killed his wife, and Prestonsburg General Hospital personnel said he remarked when he brought her to the hospital that he did not know what had happened.

Shepherd's sister-in-law, Mrs. Juanita Shepherd, at whose home near David the shooting took place, told of the defendant firing three shots outside the house and of threatening to kill his wife and Morris Mullins. Other members of the victim's family told of similar threats.

State Detective Chester D. Potter and a gun expert said the revolver from which the fatal shot was fired was not defective. This testimony countered a possible contention that the revolver could be fired without the trigger being pulled.

The trial was the only murder case on the current court docket. The criminal session will be followed this month by an equity term which does not require the services of a jury.

Among the civil cases heard during the present session was the condemnation action by the Department of Highways against Mrs. Della Stumbo, widow of John Stumbo, of Harold, and members of her family. The jury awarded her \$63,950 for property taken at Harold by new US 23, and it was said this week the state will not appeal from the verdict. Value of the right-of-way was set by county appraisers at \$105,000.

Bids on US 23 Slated June 4, Hadley Says

Bids on construction of US 23 between Prestonsburg and Allen and of the bridge spanning the Big Sandy at Allen will be opened by the Department of Highways on June 4, Bruce Hadley, the department's public information officer, told The Times Monday.

This sector of highway and the bridge were earlier slated for bids this month, but suspension of the Davis-Bacon Act by President Nixon and the consequent relaxing of wage scales created a situation which temporarily stalled bidding. When the Act was reinstated the Department of Highways found that it had such a backlog of projects that to advertise all at the same time would result in a letting of \$200-\$300 millions in contracts at one letting. It was explained that the Department then moved to advertising projects in rotation.

The Prestonsburg-Allen highway project is the last to be advertised for bids on the four-laning of US 23 between Prestonsburg and Pikeville. Construction is well under way on most of the remainder of the route.

Low bid on the painting of bridges on various highways in Floyd, Pike and Letcher counties was \$52,780, submitted by the Saran Painting Co., Indianapolis, Indiana. The contract for the work has been awarded the Indiana firm.

Vast Estate Again Whets Interest Of Eastern Kentucky Residents

Floyd countians, possibly a few hundred of them, are becoming involved in a renewal of the attempt to unravel the skein which tangles the fabulous Mark Hopkins estate in California.

The first attempt by a Floyd county claimant to share in the estate was made by the late O. C. Hall, onetime commonwealth's attorney, who 40 years ago led an intensive investigation into Mark Hopkins' Eastern Kentucky family connections. Now, Virginia and North Carolina individuals have contacted members of the Hopkins and allied families in this and Pike counties in a revival of the claim.

Mark Hopkins, information at hand says, was a native of North Carolina who moved to Virginia and later to Eastern Kentucky before going west during Gold Rush days. In California he "struck it rich." His holdings extended to railroads and shipping lines. He built the famed Mark Hopkins Hotel, which still stands as a San Francisco landmark.

He was never married and when he died around the turn of the century his estate was valued at \$325 million. Its worth is now placed at \$60 billion. The family in this area

No mention was made by the Colorado sheriff of William T. Clinkscales, who reportedly was arrested at Golden at the same time Benfield was captured.

The Pontiac GTO taken from Mrs. Alice Williams, who resides near the Jenny Wiley Motel, will be released to the owner upon proper identification, it was said.

The two men were objects of a wide search after the robbing of the motel of \$77 in cash on the night of April 11.

County Wins Reprieve On Waste Crackdown

Division Grants Time for Action By Two Counties

The threat of a crackdown on Floyd county for non-compliance with state solid waste disposal laws and regulations was at least temporarily averted here Wednesday afternoon.

Rufus Miller, of the Division of Solid Waste, State Health Department, had told the fiscal court and citizens at a courthouse meeting here that the enforcement phase of the Division's work was at hand—"We've been working on this problem since 1969 and getting nowhere...now, we've got to begin doing something."

He pointed out that all open dumping places must be closed and that the penalty for violation of regulations which became effective in 1968 is \$100 a day, or a jail term of 30 days, or both, and each day in violation constitutes a separate offense. Falmouth, Ky., where, he said, compliance was rejected, already has been fined \$9000.

But the plea made by Joseph McCauley, director of the Big Sandy Area Development District, that the Division delay punitive action until a decision is made by the Appalachian Regional Commission on a pilot disposal program being evolved for Floyd and Pike counties by Spindletop Research, Lexington.

The Kentucky Program Development Office has applied for a federal grant to finance the Floyd-Pike program. Essentially, this plan would provide for the location at strategic spots in rural areas of both counties Dempster Dumpsters (large containers) to contain waste materials, and the operation of trucks to collect their contents at regular intervals and haul them to approved dumping sites. The sites would be of the landfill variety, necessitating the use of bulldozers in keeping waste materials covered.

Earlier in the meeting, Mr. Miller had stressed the need for a garbage disposal district for the county which would be organized along the lines of a water district. The district would either issue revenue bonds or borrow funds for the purchase of equipment—dumpster collection bins, trucks, bulldozers, dumping sites and the like—and would charge each home and business served a monthly fee. Incorporated towns would continue to operate their own garbage collection systems now in effect.

It was estimated that 10,000 homes and

Blaze Destroys Lumber Company At Heavy Loss

The Davidson Lumber Company at the old Porter mining camp, near Lackey, was destroyed by fire at 2:30 a.m. last Friday at a loss estimated between \$100,000 and \$150,000. The loss was uninsured.

Cause of the blaze has not been established. When discovered, the fire had spread to such extent that company employees, the Wayland Fire Department and others could work only to save lumber stored on the yards.

All machinery of the company and much lumber in storage were destroyed, but an estimated \$45,000 worth of lumber was saved.

The mill, one of the largest in Eastern Kentucky, had operated at the Lackey location about 15 years. Its owner, Lee Howard, formerly of Leslie county, lived in nearby Porter Mining Company property which he had purchased. The mill employed 35 to 40 men and bought timber from various suppliers. In addition, Mr. Howard timbered tracts for his mill.

According to a report received here, Howard will rebuild his business—a work which will require several months.

Prestonsburg Man Returns Relic To Resting Place in Catacombs

The other day, a package was mailed from the Prestonsburg postoffice to Vatican City, Rome—and therein lies a tale.

The parcel, sent special delivery to the office of Pope Paul, contained a bit of bone taken more than a quarter of a century ago from a crypt in the Catacombs, the underground maze of passageways near Rome which is said to contain the remains of 40,000 Christians interred there in the early days of the Christian era.

Its shipment constituted restitution by a well-known Prestonsburg man of what he new feels should never have been disturbed, and it was made by way of expiation for his surrender to sudden temptation.

Charles M. McCoy, owner of the Mountain Metal Company here, was a part of General Mark Clark's victorious Eighth Army which moved up the Italian "Boot" in 1944. In October, that year, he was one of the G. I.'s who enjoyed a leave in Rome and visits to its historic places—among them, the Pantheon, the Coliseum, the Vatican, the Catacombs.

It was while in the Catacombs that the young soldier was seized with an urge to take home a memento of his visit. Now, years later, he tells of the underground tour, of the guide's warning to him and others of the party not to become separated, lest they become lost in the maze of dark passageways. He tells of the monk who served as guide placing a candle in one of the burial niches to reveal a small mound of dust and a few remaining bits of bone.

"A powerful urge hit me to take one of the small bones for a souvenir and an absolute remembrance of the place," Mr. McCoy recalled in his letter to the Pontiff. "One urge would tell me to take it; another says, 'Don't'—it was a seesaw of do's and

don't's—and a last, most compelling urge moved me to reach out and take it. . ."

"At the time I did not realize the full meaning of the wrong in doing this but I came to realize it as the years went by," Mr. McCoy says. Only twice during the 26 years the relic has been in his possession has he opened the container in which it was kept. It has been tightly sealed, the last 10-12 years.

"I thank God," he wrote Pope Paul, "that He has blessed me to live and that I now have the opportunity to return this to its proper place."

Late last January, he first wrote the Pope. Several weeks later came a reply, instructions for shipping, assurance that the Catacombs again would receive the tiny portion of the saint or sinner who was buried there nearly 2000 years ago.

That information at hand, Charles McCoy lost no time in doing what he knew was the right thing.

Full-Scale Program Needed— Not a Mere Spot-Check

Residents and officials of communities such as Prestonsburg, Paintsville and Pikeville, which already have the facilities to give their sewage primary treatment before turning it into the Big Sandy river, find it hard to understand why anti-pollution authorities insist on their spending many more thousands of dollars to provide secondary sewage treatment before a hundred other communities are stopped from dumping sewage, raw and with no treatment whatsoever, into the same stream.

This is not to resist anti-pollution efforts. The pollution of the environment, water, air, earth, must stop. That will not be achieved cheaply, and the price must be paid. But to stop water pollution dead in its tracks at three points on this one stream and to permit it to continue at a hundred others cannot be called an anti-pollution program. It's a mere spot-check.

Two new water distribution systems are in operation along the Big Sandy, in Floyd and Pike counties. Another is under construction on the Beaver Creeks of this county. Others are sought, and we hope they are built. But every such system magnifies the problem of stream pollution. Then there are the scores of villages and smaller towns and an unknown number of farmhouses and mobile homes which have never been required even to install septic tanks to receive their part of the pollution. Their raw sewage goes directly into the nearest stream.

Now it is obvious that these small towns cannot bear the cost of constructing even a primary sewage treatment system. Yet stream pollution must stop, and only government, barring legal teeth, can stop it. So an impasse is reached, were it not for one factor, and that is state and federal financial assistance. In the case of the smaller communities, "assistance" is not the word. The entire burden of cost must inevitably be borne by the federal government, or by both federal and state governments.

Government, then, should implement the national cleanup job that must be done. Money now pouring down various and sundry ratholes must be spent at home.

Most municipalities are well-nigh bankrupt, and that includes the large cities as well as the small. Individual taxpayers cannot shoulder too much more of the burden (in the case of sewage treatment, these are the consumers of water who are charged higher sewer fees and water rates). Poverty-stricken individuals get financial help. There are hundreds of pauper towns and cities over the land which should qualify for the same assistance, especially so when the money given them is to help the whole.

The problem will require a monumental effort. One thing is certain: The problem of water pollution will not be solved by cracking down on a relatively few communities which already have improved their local situations while doing nothing about those which haven't taken even the first step toward pollution control.

Cincinnati church building burns
CINCINNATI (AP)—Fire caused \$30,000 damage yesterday to a storage building on the grounds of St. Ignatius Church in suburban Monfort Heights. Athletic equipment in the building was heavily damaged by the blaze of undetermined origin.

In reference to Mr. Clark's recent release to the news media, that an 18-room school facility is being constructed at Eastern, Kentucky, and in view of the fact that 18 classrooms will not adequately house the enrollments of the four high schools, Wayland, Garrett, Maytown, and Martin, as originally planned to fill the facility at Eastern, we ask this question:

Has Martin been excluded from the original plan? If so, may we obtain a copy of the correspondence from the Department of Education approving the change of plan?

In the April, 1971 Board meeting, Dr. Adams suggested we bring such matters as pupil discrimination before the board for solution. Last month we brought the matter of the denial of the use of the Martin school lunchroom for PTA meetings before the board. Today we present the account (see advertisement in the newspaper) of the April 26 PTA meeting to the board for review and make this request:

We request an official statement in the form of a board order as to the position of approval or disapproval of the Floyd County Board of Education, of parents, teachers and students working together in local PTA units, to promote the general welfare of children. If granted, we ask that this board order be presented to Mr. Norman Allen for publication.

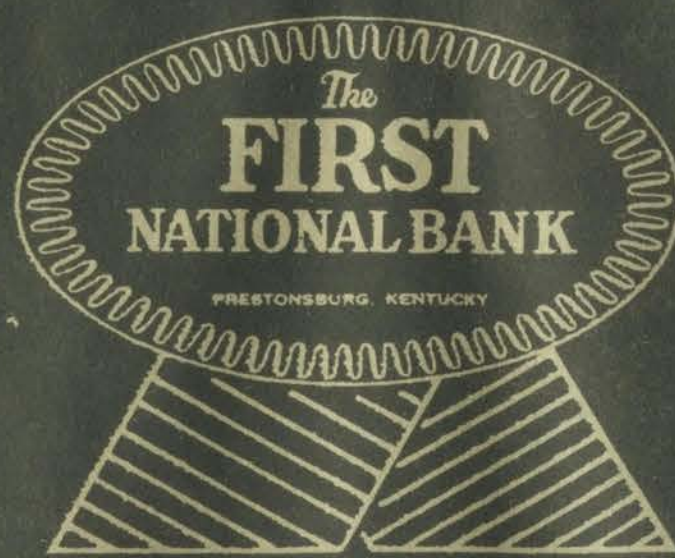

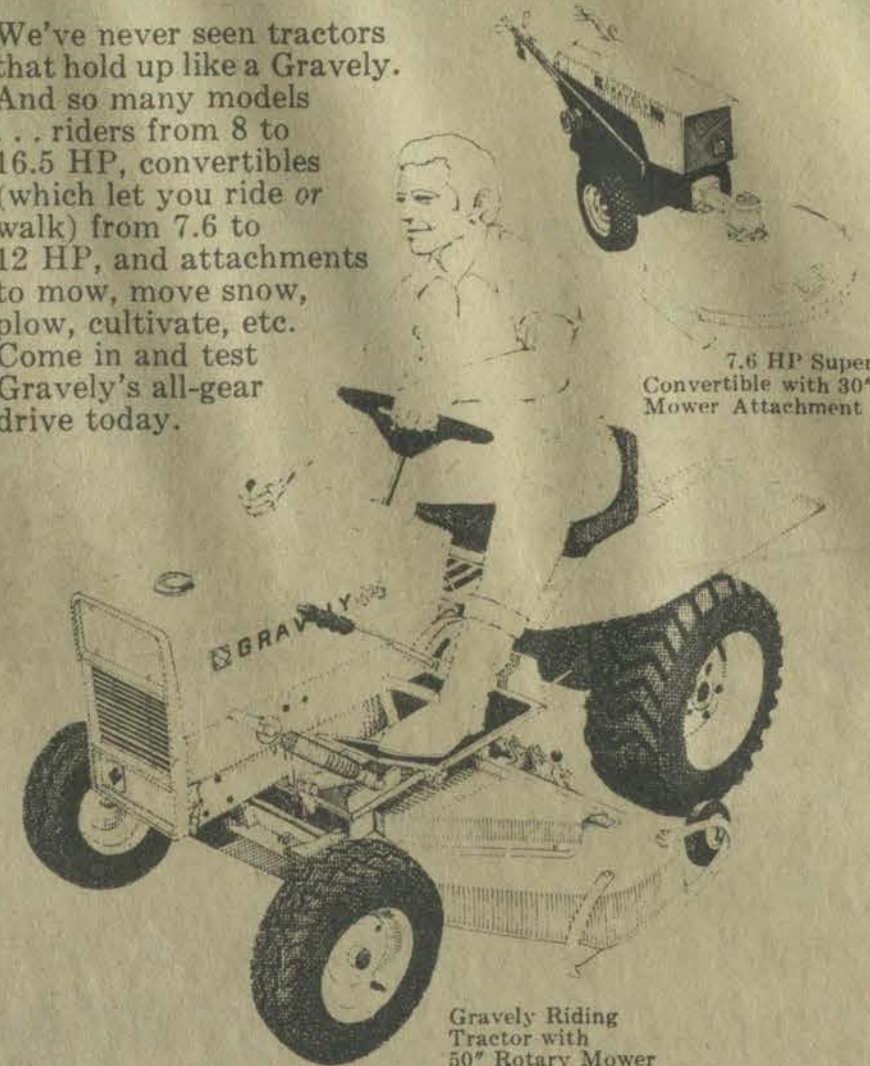

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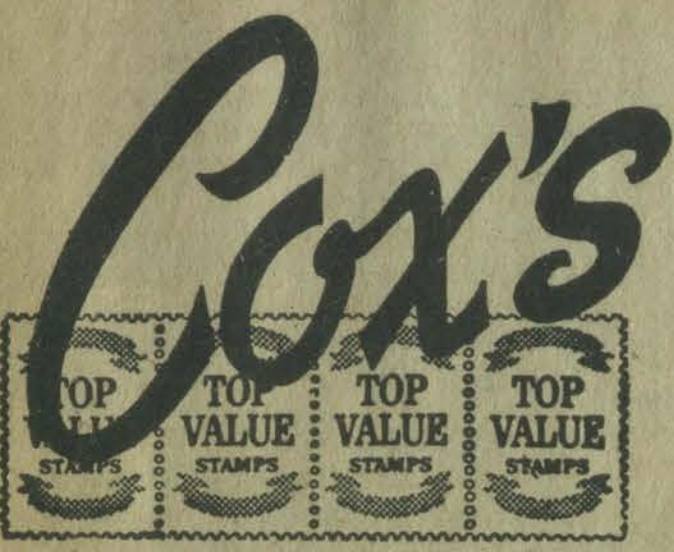

Some of the other candidates seeking this railroad post are railroaders, or are retirees from the railroad. This is a tremendous compliment to me, and will boost my campaign overwhelmingly. I hope I can represent the Third District on the Railroad Commission come January, because there is some upgrading to be done for the laboring men who have chosen the railroad industry as their livelihood."

INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Floyd County property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 3 through May 7, 1971. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of his deputies, any property owner may inspect the tax roll to check the assessment of his property and compare it with the assessment of comparable property to determine whether it is equitably assessed. The tax roll may not be inspected for any other purpose.

This is the January 1, 1971 assessment on which state, county, and school taxes for 1971 will be due on September 15, 1971.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

ORDINANCE NO. 71

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY, PROVIDING FOR THE ASSESSMENT OF REAL AND PERSONAL PROPERTY AND FOR THE LEVY OF A GENERAL PROPERTY TAX AT THE RATE OF THIRTY CENTS (30c) PER EACH ONE HUNDRED DOLLAR (\$100.00) VALUATION OF REAL AND PERSONAL PROPERTY LOCATED WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY, ON JANUARY 1ST, FOR 1971, AND A FURTHER LEVY OF POLL TAX OF ONE DOLLAR AND FIFTY CENTS (\$1.50) ON EACH MALE PERSON OVER THE AGE OF 21 YEARS AND UNDER THE AGE OF 65 YEARS RESIDING WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY, ON JANUARY 1ST, 1971, WITH CERTAIN STATUTORY EXEMPTIONS.

WHEREAS, it is necessary in order to provide the revenue required for general purposes of the City's government, including general expenses of the City, but not limited to general health, sanitation, maintenance of streets, operation of parks and other necessary and indispensable services, affecting the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, that a tax be levied upon all property, both real and personal, having a tax situs in the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky.

WHEREAS, the total Budget for all such expenses for general purposes during the year of 1971 in said City is in the amount of \$363,448.00 and the budget's source of revenue for 1971, includes an estimated amount of \$110,600.00 to be derived from such property taxes and without such amount to be derived from such property taxes, the revenue required for such general purposes would be insufficient.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. A tax is hereby levied upon all property, both real and personal, having a tax situs in the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, as of January 1, 1971, for general purposes, including general expenses of the City. All monies received hereunder shall be paid to the City Treasurer of Prestonsburg and placed in the credit of a general fund of the City and shall be used in a defraying current and incidental expenses of said government. The tax hereby is levied as follows:

A. The sum of thirty cents (30c) for each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of all real and personal property located within the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, as of January 1, 1971.

B. A poll tax of \$1.50 on each male person over the age of 21 years and under the age of 65 years, residing within the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, on January 1, 1971, excepting those persons exempt from tax under KRS 92.300 (3) and KRS 142.020.

SECTION 2. The property taxes and poll taxes for the year of 1971 shall become due and payable on October 1, 1971, by which date tax notices shall have been mailed each taxpayer, and all taxes paid prior to November 1, 1971, shall be allowed a discount of 2 per cent; all property and poll taxes for the year 1971 becoming due and payable on November 1, 1971.

SECTION 3. All taxpayers who do not pay the tax herein levied prior to January 1, 1972, shall be required to pay a penalty of 6 per cent of the amount of the tax in addition to the tax levied herein.

SECTION 4. All taxpayers who do not pay the tax herein levied on or before the 1st day of April, 1972, shall be required to pay a penalty of 25 per cent of the amount of the tax in addition to the tax levied herein.

SECTION 5. The Delinquent Tax Collector is hereby authorized to advertise for sale in a newspaper having a general circulation in Floyd County, Kentucky, all delinquent taxes on real property placed in his hands for collection and the charge for such advertising shall be added to the amount of the tax bill.

SECTION 6. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed, and this Ordinance shall take effect as of the date of adoption and publication as required by law.

SECTION 7. The provisions of this Ordinance are separable, and if any of the provisions or penalties provided herein shall be held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision of the court will not affect or impair any other section, clause, provision or portion of the Ordinance which is not in itself invalid or unconstitutional. 500 businesses would be served by such a system. Miller expressed the opinion that this county could for a fee of \$1.75 a month to homes and a larger fee to businesses collect 70 per cent of the county's garbage.

The program being developed by Spindletop, Mr. McCauley said, would have the help of federal funds at the outset, then its operation would ultimately be financed through monthly or annual fees.

"It all boils down to money," commented County Judge Henry Stumbo. County Attorney Barkley J. Sturgill pointed out that financing of such a program with county funds is almost an impossibility.

Judge Stumbo also pointed out that \$56,000 for this very purpose was included in the budget for the Floyd County Comprehensive Health Program, and that Washington hailed the item as "great." But, he added, when the budget was finally approved that item was cut to only \$16,000.

John Milton Stumbo, of the Comprehensive Health Services Program, said the program has funds which would provide a landfill site of 6 to 7 acres and a bulldozer for a period of about three months.

The closing of the dump on Cow mountain was particularly stressed by Mr. Miller, who said numerous complaints had been received concerning its operation. He added that all other open dumps must be closed. The dumping area on Sizemore mountain is the only site used by the county at this time, but private individuals continue to dump on Cow Creek mountain and elsewhere.

"If," said Mr. McCauley, "we're to compete with the Blue Grass section of our state and with other states for the tourist business and for plant locations, we've got to clean up."

Mr. Miller said the entire country is going to the landfill method of garbage disposal but that this is not the final word. Eventually, he predicted, recycling of waste materials will be done, resulting in the reuse of glass, paper and other materials.

Magistrate Eddie Caudill told of the cleanup work in his Left Beaver district. He said two trucks are hauling garbage at a charge \$2 a month per customer but that the problem is where to dump it.

And that remains the problem for the county this spring, at a time when county trucks normally are operated in rural areas to collect waste materials that have piled up at farmsteads over the year. Because of this problem, no schedule for collection has been announced.

Two Million May Lose Food Stamps Under New Rules

WASHINGTON—Two million of the 10.5 million persons getting food stamps will lose part or all of their allotment under new federal regulations, a government memorandum released yesterday said. Other estimates say the figure could go higher.

The proposed changes, resulting from the Department of Agriculture's interpretation of revised food-stamp legislation passed by Congress last year, were announced April 15 and are to take effect within 30 days.

The department's original announcement gave no estimate of how many persons would be affected but a memorandum from a Department of Health Education and Welfare (HEW) official said:

"Agriculture estimates that, out of 10.5 million food-stamp recipients, 340,000 will be made ineligible by the new schedule and another 1.7 million will be made worse off."

It added, "Many recipients will receive higher benefits than they get now," but gave no figures.

The memo was from James R. Storey of HEW's Family Planning Assistance Section and was addressed to Robert Patricelli, a HEW deputy undersecretary. When the Agriculture Department announced the new regulations, it proposed that national income-eligibility standards be set up for operating the food-stamp programs uniformly in all states.

In the past, all welfare recipients were eligible for food stamps. Now, income will be a determining factor as well as financial

reserves such as bank accounts.

For example, families of laid-off workers such as those from the Boeing Corp. in Seattle, Wash., who have no income but money in the bank, would no longer be eligible, the aides said.

Another provision eliminates stamps for unrelated persons living together. The aides said this could penalize many elderly couples who live together but are not married.

Senate nutrition committee aides disclosed yesterday that prepared testimony by Ronald Polack, director of the Food Research and Action Center in New York City, asserted that more than a million others may suffer under other provisions of last year's bill.

Another witness, Arthur Schiff, of New York City, had prepared testimony claiming that of 1 million food-stamp recipients in New York City between 500,000 and 600,000 will suffer total or partial loss of food-stamp benefits.

State Abandons Mt. Tunnel Plan

Highway Commissioner B. E. King has announced that state engineers have abandoned a proposal to tunnel a highway through Pine Mountain between Harlan and Letcher counties, and have chosen instead to build a section of new U. S. 119 up and over the massive divide.

The proposed highway is a critical section of the Appalachian highway network, but has posed some of the knottiest engineering problems in Kentucky road-building history.

King said test drilling on the mountain had revealed the presence of a subsurface fault which eliminated the tunnel idea from consideration. The fault meant that the grade would have been so steep as to have necessitated the construction of a third passing lane. This would have upped the total cost of the project around \$10 million.

Ironically, King pointed out, the route has the least projected traffic on an Appalachian highway in Kentucky, yet it will be one of the most expensive.

According to Cecil Hatter, chief locating engineer, the route now favored can be built for an average cost of about \$3 million per mile, but he said one mile at the top will cost \$5 million—the most expensive rural mile of road ever built in Kentucky.

The road at the top will feature a 250-foot cut and a 200-foot fill—the deepest cut and highest fill on a Kentucky highway.

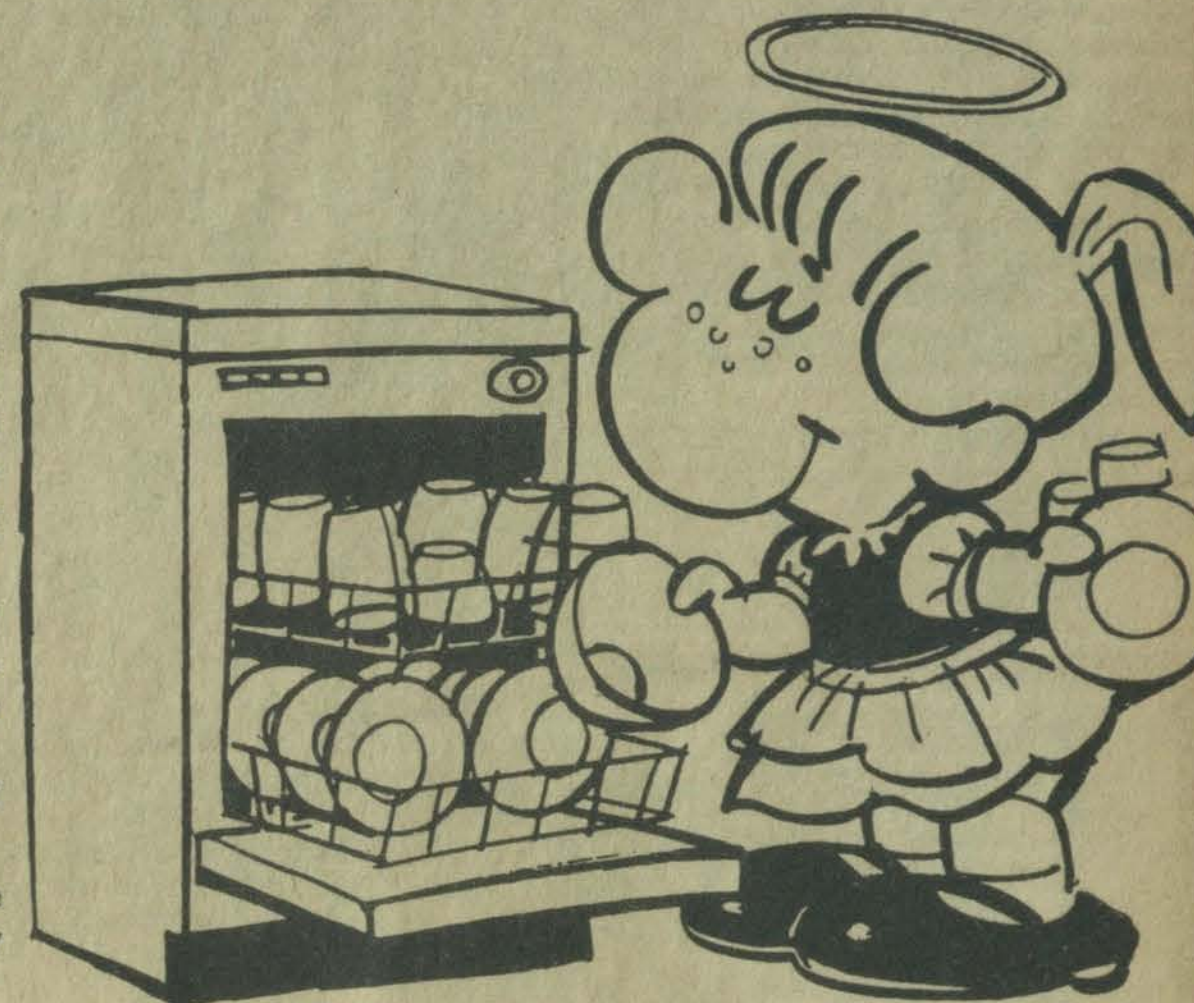

Insurance Firm's License Voided
The license of a Nebraska mail-order insurance company has been revoked by state Insurance Commissioner Robert Preston, after a number of complaints had been received from Kentuckians.
The action means that it is now illegal for Executive Fund Life Insurance Co. of Omaha to do business in Kentucky, with the exception of renewing policies of existing clients.
Preston said he had tried to settle the issue with the company, but the firm's response had been unsatisfactory.
In 1969 the firm received premiums totaling \$161,330 in this state and paid \$41,928, or just 26 cents on every premium dollar earned, the department reported. The policies provided \$100 per week in extra cash benefits for hospital confinement due to sickness or injury.
Preston said the firm waived health questions when accepting new applicants, but relied on one protective device—a provision that a claim for a pre-existing ailment was not covered until the policy was in force at least one year. On this basis the company declined 50 to 55 per cent of claims during the first policy year, he explained.
Preston said the company threw out all renewals, then offered higher-priced coverage to the best of its policyholders.

Salyersville Mayor Says Well Is Bad
Salyersville, Ky.—Mayor J. W. Carpenter says residents of Magoffin county may one day be without water if the federal government doesn't approve a proposed \$307 million dam and reservoir project on the Licking River, near Royalton.
Carpenter, in comment Tuesday, said residents in the outlying areas of town actually are carrying water from the city.
Local residents, he said, are drawing their water from an obsolete well drilled in 1933 which contains the maximum salt content allowed by federal standards.
He said it is impossible to drill quality wells in the county.
The proposed project, which would also provide a basis for industrial development in Magoffin and surrounding counties, calls for a 2,100-acre, 100-million-gallon lake.

12 Mine Inspectors Are Added by State
FRANKFORT, KY.—The Kentucky Division of Strip Mining and Reclamation, faced with a rapid increase in surface mining and an influx of former deep miners to the more lucrative strip mining field, has added 12 more inspectors to its staff.
The 12 will raise the total number of inspectors to 52, according to division director Elmore Grim. Of the 12 additional inspectors, Grim said, 10 will enter service in Eastern Kentucky, bringing the total there to 42. Two will go to Western Kentucky, boosting the total there to 10.
Grim said surface mining operations have increased dramatically in recent months. He quoted figures showing that 13,000 acres were disturbed by surface mining of coal in 1969, compared with 23,000 acres in 1970.
He also pointed to the sudden appearance of new strip mine operators—some driven out of deep mining by the Coal Mine Health and Safety Act of 1969, some former highway builders driven to expansion of their construction firms by a lag in road construction.
He said the construction firms had vast experience in dirt removal and transfer, and were in many cases better equipped than the strip miners themselves, but the former deep mine firms often were not so well equipped.
Grim noted that applications for permits to strip mine are being turned down recently by the division in numbers larger than ever before.

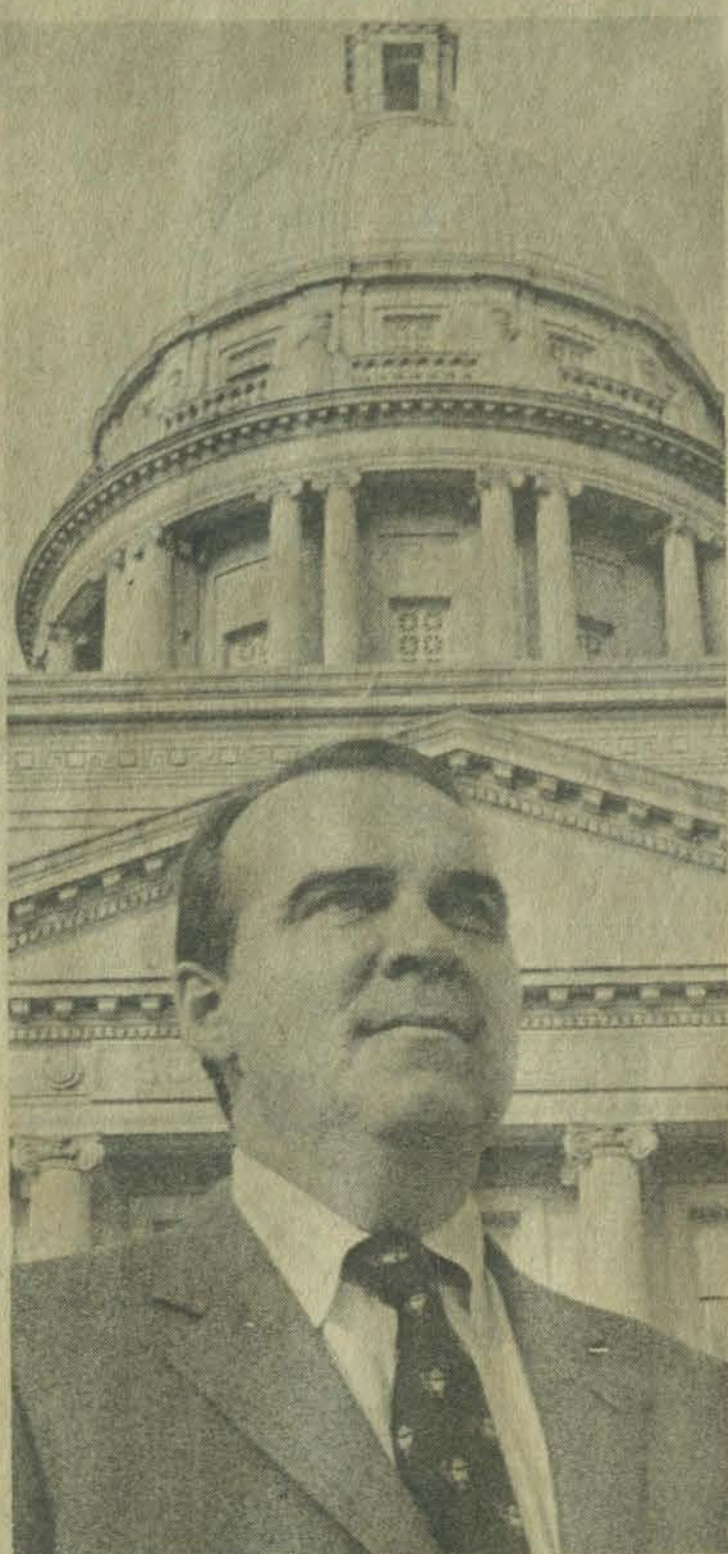

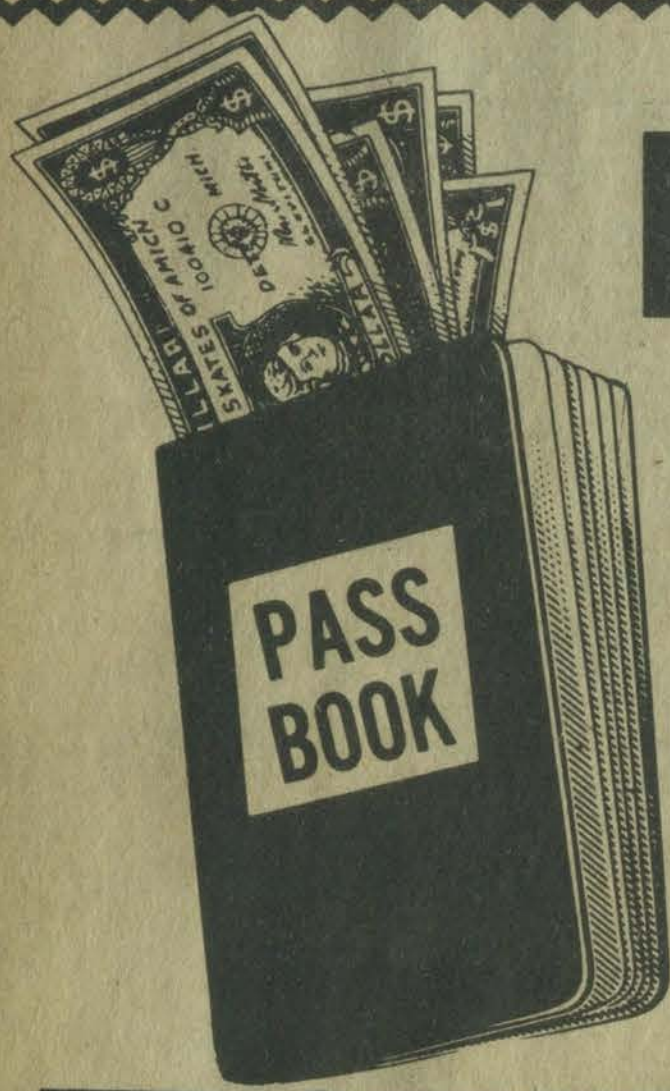


