## **Board Buys** 22-a. Tract At Eastern **2nd Building Phase** To Be Begun Soon; **Plans Being Rushed**

The Floyd County Board of Education last Saturday voted to add a 22-acre-plus tract of land to the approximately 11 acres breaks and received some of the haul, the originally purchased as the site of the consolidated high school at Eastern.

Shannon, architect, to proceed with preliminary plans immediately on Phase II of the building program at Eastern. Phase I is the school structure now being built; Phase II is a separate building which will contain a gymnasium, auditorium and music room. Three separate buildings were at first planned for these departments, but these are now planned to go under one roof as an economy measure.

The new acreage is being purchased from Earl Webb for \$20,000. Its acquisition will permit construction of the Phase II complex parallel with the school and not in front as hitherto planned. Space will be afforded, beautification.

The gymnasium planned at Eastern will seat at least as many as the Prestonsburg high school fieldhouse, it was said.

Purchase of the added acreage is subject to approval by the Division of Buildings and Grounds and other state agencies.

Advertising of the second Eastern building project is expected soon after preliminary plans are accepted. The board of education expects by that time to be in good bond marketing position, since bonds issued for construction of Prestonsburg high school and the Wheelwright high gym will b amortized by that time.



## **Group Told Of Changes OEO** Wants **Grant Funds Frozen Except on Salaries**, Valid Commitments

The Floyd County Comprehensive Health Services Program was suspended last week after the Office of Health Affairs had held that the Big Sandy Community Action Program and directors of the Health Program had failed at a June 1 meeting in Washington to show cause why the OEO grant financing it should not be at least temporarily withdrawn.


The notice of suspension, contained in a letter written by Dr. Carl A. Smith, acting director of the Office of Health Affairs, was mailed June 4 to County Judge Henry Stumbo, chairman of the board of directors of Big Sandy CAP, and Mrs. Eleanor Robinson, chairman of the health program's board.

All authority to expend or obligate any funds under the OEO grant was revoked except on commitments made in good faith and in accordance with the approved work program prior to notice of suspension. Harry Eastburn, Big Sandy CAP director, was requested to submit to Dr. Leon Cooper, director of the Comprehensive Health Services Division, a list of all health program employees. It was explained that this is asked because Health Affairs intends to authorize the use of grant funds to pay salaries of all bonafide employees of the project through the period ending June 18. Any further OEO assistance on the program, Dr. Smith wrote, must be preceded by a complete reorganization of the program along these general lines: 1. Full operational and fiscal responsibility to be vested in a reorganized board (See Story No. 4, Page 12)

Construction of the 5.9 miles of new US 23 way Commissioner B. E. King said. between Prestonsburg and Allen, including a bridge spanning the Big Sandy at Allen, will cost a total of \$7,975,444, if low bids on the project are accepted by the Department

If the low bids are accepted, as expected, work on this, the last sector of the new fourlane US 23 from Prestonsburg to Pikeville, may be expected to start next month.

Fork of Pound has enraged the environmentalists in Western Virginia. Three years ago they began to notice some acid drainage. By 1970, hardly any fish were left, and manganese, which had been picked up by the acid, had thrown a health scare into the town of Pound (population 1,000).

Pound's new water-treatment plant, built adjacent to the dam, was being stained and corroded. After several months of turmoil, the state health department determined the cause and ordered the plant to add more chemicals to take out the dangerous manganese. Although clothes in washers sometimes came out stained, no one was reported afflicted by the polluted water.

However, the local furor resulted in a public hearing by the Virginia Water Control Board.

The state report pinned the blame on the Flat Gap Mining Co. along with the Ambrose Branch Mining Co. and the Ronell Mining Co., but the order to Flat Gap said, in effect: Study the situation and try to come up with a plan of abatement by July 1. Environmental groups interpreted the

Bolling also said that his company, which has mined about 210,000 tons of coal annually from this site (about \$1.5 million worth at \$7 per ton), will be moving from the North Fork of Pound by July. His next mine site is the South Fork of Pound, which feeds more directly into John Flannagan Reservoir.

The Virginia anti-pollution agency contends that it cannot move strongly against a polluter universe it has fresh evidence of fish kills. This it did not have at the Pound reservoir.

However, the state did take some bluegill fish from elsewhere and, as an experiment, placed them in water from the reservoir. The resulting report said: The scales loosened, the gills turned red and bled freely. For awhile the fish swam near the surface and gulped air, but eventually they turned a pale white and died of internal symptoms when the red blood cells were destroyed. But this evidence was not considered strong enough to take action.

With the North Fork of Pound dead, and Flannagan Reservoir in a vulnerable position, Col. Maurice Rousch of the Army Corps of Engineers in Huntington, W. Va., indicates it might be time for a federal move.

The Corps, under authority of the Refuse Act of 1899, will issue permits for discharges into the nation's navigable waters and their tributaries, starting July 1. Regulations governing these permits were drawn up by the Corps, the Environmental Protection Agency, the Council on Environmental Quality and the Departments of Interior, Commerce and Justice.

"Basically, our policy is to let the states handle pollution regulation," Col. Rousch said. "But we are also custodians of the reservoirs and if the states don't act, then we will have to."

"Does this mean that the Corps will set precedent by taking legal action against a strip mine?

"If we can trace pollution from navigable waters to a strip mine, we will sue," the colonel said. His district, including part of Kentucky, West Virginia, Virginia and Ohio, already has 36 anti-pollution cases in the hands of the Justice Department.

## **Mobile Homes** In This County **May Be Target**

Dr. Russell L. Hall, head of the Floyd County Health Department, and James B. Goble, health department administrator, indicated Monday that they will soon approach the courts in an effort to establish a means of halting and ultimately ending the flow into Floyd county streams of raw sewage from hundreds of mobile homes.

The health officials admit they have a tough problem of their hands, one which may never be solved unless their hands are strengthened by the courts when they take action against the polluters.

An average of five mobile homes a day come into this county, their sanitarians have been told. But where are they? Up every hollow, along mountainsides, wherever enough space can be levelled to provide a site-and for many of these no provision has been made to handle the sewage. Some have septic tanks and lateral fields. But many have nothing but a sewer line running from the bathroom, straight into the nearby stream.

The department's three sanitrians have been instructed to take time, in the future, to seek out by on-site visits and through inquiry the location of all mobile homes, then to determine those which have not complied with state law in guarding against stream pollution. Presumably, the next step will be to warn these homeowners who are in violation to take immediate steps to correct the situation, give them a stipulated time in which to do the work, then take legal action if no effort is made.

And that, health officials say, is where the courts come into the picture.

They also say it would be helpful if state law would require all mobile home dealers to provide health departments a record of their sales and the sites to which the homes were delivered.

In addition to the anonymity of mobile home purchasers, there is the handicap imposed through the facility with which these portable homes are installed. "A conventional home isn't built quickly, and we can see that the plumbing regulations are followed," it is explained. "But anybody can buy a mobile home today, have a site ready, and be living in it and polluting a stream by nightfall-before anybody but the nearest neighbor knows what is happening." A septic tank and lateral field to control pollution costs the mobile homeowner around \$500. It has been argued that, perhaps, state law might be enacted requiring dealers to include this cost in the price of the home, then have the sewage disposal work done at their expense. However difficult the problem, the health department recognizes the danger to the public health this source of pollution presents. And it proposes to do something about it.

## **Kentucky's Vast Waters Give Finest Year-Round Fishing**

fishes Kentucky's major lakes should demand his fair share of water, he'd have almost four tenths of an acre to call his very own and to fish in as he desired. This earthshattering revelation was brought about by simply dividing Kentucky's 184,126 acres of big lake waters among the 478,921 license buyers in recent years.

The question naturally arises as to the



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FRANKFORT, KY .--- If every person who amount of fishing this .4 acre would afford and it can be stated with certainty that it's more than a little bit. Many farmers have ponds that are no larger than a half acre and they glean many a mess of fish from these waters and they also get many hours of invigorating outdoor exercise from fishing that is offered there.

> The two largest lakes, which combine to make up 93,700 acres, are the twin lakes, Barkley and Kentucky. These two giants combine to form one of the largest manmade bodies of water in the world. (They are separated by the Land Between the Lakes but are connected by a canal across LBL.)

> If a fisherman is not satisfied with his four-tenths of an acre, he won't have to fret long until he'll have more. Two other lakes, with a combined acreage of 13,870, are now in the ending stage and should be fishable within a couple of years. They are Cave Run, below which is being erected Kentucky's new fish hatchery, and Laurel Lake.

> In addition to the major lake waters, Kentuckians have something over 13,000 miles of running water-a total above that of any other state except Alaska-plus more than 40 state-constructed lakes, and of course the more than 100,000 farm ponds which average in size about one acre each. So, the fisherman does have right now

> considerably more than four-tenths of an acre of water for his very own.

> But water, from the standpoint of the fisherman, is of very little value unless it is generously populated with fishes. This is no problem in Kentucky.

With the exception of a small percentage of streams that are contaminated by pollution, the waters of this state offer good populations of fish, and the various species present year-round fishing. When it's an off season for one species, another in all probability will be on.

The black bass is a year-round fish; whites come in many sizes and offer good fishing by various techniques during many months; the croppie is productive on a good many days; the bluegill is almost always around, even for ice fishing; the catfish will give a good account of himself for many hours of many days; then there are the rough fish that are in demand, especially in ENTERTAINED THE CONAWAYS





**To Conduct Survey Of Employment Here** 

A sample of households in this area will be included in a nationwide survey of employment and unemployment to be conducted the week of June 14 by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, according to Joseph R. Nor-wood, director of the Bureau's regional office in Charlotte, N. C.

The monthly survey is conducted by the Bureau of the Census for the U.S. Department of Labor, and the information is used to calculate the number of persons with jobs, the number looking for jobs, and the monthly percentage of unemployment, which is regarded as one of the most important measures of the Nation's economic health. In April, for example, the survey indicated that 78.2 million persons were employed and 4.7 million unemployed. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 6.1 percent, as compared with 6.0 percent in March.

The June survey will include, also, queries on marital status, the number of children in families and the number families expected to have. Answers to these questions are used to guide demographers in making projections of birth rates and family composition. Individual family information is kept strictly confidential and is used for statistical purposes only.

The Census Bureau interviewer who will visit households in this area is Mrs. Ella R. Daniel, Thelma, Kentucky.

In return for the stipend the student agrees to work for the Department every summer while in college and one year after graduation for each year he was on scholarship. They are paid according to prevailing state wage scales.

The program serves a double purpose. It helps young people interested in pursuing an engineering career to finance their education, and it helps attract qualified engineers into rewarding careers with the Highway Department.

The decision as to who will receive the scholarships is left entirely up to each individual school. The counseling staffs are told how many scholarships will be available to them for the coming year, and they decide which students should get them.

of directors, with the new health board, not Big Sandy CAP, the grantee.

2. The new health board is to have at least 50 per cent of its members persons who are eligible for health care under the program; about 25 per cent designated by a broad range of local professional organizations and institutions that are committed to the goals of the program, and the remaining 25 per cent by other groups such as the State Office of Economic Opportunity, the State Health Department, the UK Medical School, the Council of Southern Mountains, the Alice Lloyd Foundation and the Park-DuValle Neighborhood Health Center.

3. The health program board must indicate its commitment to a program of family-oriented comprehensive health care. "A crucial element in this program," Dr. Smith wrote, "is the direct provision of medical, dental, nursing and pharmaceutical services, properly related to supporting transportation, training, outreach, referral and in-patient services." 4. A committee consisting of representatives of the organizations mentioned-the State OEO, Department of Health and others-must have a significant role in drafting for OEO consideration a new health program for Floyd county.

The suspension period will be for 21 days, unless termination proceedings are instituted during that period or OEO and the grantee agree on an extension of the suspension.

Dr. Smith indicated at the conclusion of last Tuesday's Washington hearing that at least a week would elapse before a decision on suspension could be made. It was made, however, two days later.

"We made a useless trip," County Judge Stumbo said this week. "It was all cut and ried." He added that he does not propose to resign from the board of directors but said, "I am for the program to serve the poor people who need it, regardless of who operates it."

At the Washington hearing Judge Stumbo objected sharply to a document suggesting that a suspension of the program might be useful to straighten out the program's problems.

"Let me have that document!" Stumbo said after an OEO official had questioned the meaning of the suggestion. "I'll erase that part. . . I say, keep the program down there. The poor people need it."

Three directors, representatives of the consumer group, have resigned. They are Frank Daniels, Phyllis Pitts and Charlie Akers. A fourth member of the board, Mrs. Ruth James, also has resigned.

These replies were made to OEO changes:

1. That there was just cause for the disputed employe dismissals, including that early this year of the project's director, Dr. Arnold Schecter.

2. That the poor have been given ample opportunity to participate in policy decisions and that only a small minority of the poor has questioned the program's operation.

3. That if excessive fees were paid to doctors, the fault was the responsibility of Glen Hentschel, an OEO employe who worked temporarily as the Floyd county progam's director during 1970.

4. That the project's uncertain status has hampered efforts to carry out programs fully, including the hiring and training of the poor.

Dr. J. D. Adams, who represents the county's doctors on the health progam board, said that to reduce the program's reliance on referring the poor to private doctors would mean "the poor people don't have the opportunity to go to the physician of their choice."

A representative of the anti-poverty board, Arthur Pope, blamed "continual harassment from these organizations whose professional business is to tear down the establishment" for some of the ills of the progam.

Mrs. Eula Hall, speaking for one of the groups Pope evidently had in mind, the Welfare Rights Organization, was one of the few who questioned the merit of the progam.

"The present board cannot or will not administer the program in a way that is responsibe to the health needs of the poor," she said, but she offered no definition of a program that would meet that standard.

In addition to the mall, plans call for a 250-car parking lot extending along the river bank from the site of the old First National Bank building, upstream past the present Prestonsburg General Hospital. This would be brought to near the level of existing buildings on the west side of First avenue in that area by installation of pilings.

Restricting of traffic in the mall to foot travel will require development of new routings for motor traffic. Mr. Frazier said this phase of the development might include widening of Arnold avenue (Second street) to permit two-way traffic and the extension of Ford Street on past Second to intersect with South Lake Drive (US 23). to offset the trend toward development of



because of the mountains, but mostly because of the water. The Bluegrass State has some 13,000 miles of streams and rivers-more than any state except Alaska, which is 14 times its size. Its lakes (upwards of 10 acres) cover 650 square miles, and there are scores of smaller lakes

scattered throughout the state. There are 78 lakes in Kentucky that measure upwards of 25 acres. Fifty of them 'are 100 acres or larger. Thirteen of them are "major" lakes, real giants. The major lakes range from Dewey Lake's 1,000 acres to Kentucky Lake's 158,000 acres.

Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley (93,000 acres) are joined near their dams by a mile-long canal. Together they comprise the largest man-made body of water in the world. They extend far down into Tennessee and their combined shoreline is around 3,500 miles long. Lake Cumberland is another jumbo. It has a surface area of more than 50,000 acres. It has more than 1,250 miles of shoreline and its average depth is 90 feet. It lies entirely in Kentucky. All these waters are open to the public, free of charge. They teem with some 200 species of fish. In 1970, more than 650,000 sport fishermen took around 30 million pounds from Kentucky waters. That's 15,000 tons of fish. About 1,000 tons were taken from Kentucky Lake alone, and that doesn't include the millions of pounds of socalled "trash fish" harvested by licensed commercial fishermen-mostly carp, buffalo and the like.

The Kentucky Court of Appeals last Friday upheld by a 5-1 decision a restrictive clause in a contract which prevented Dr. Mary A. Hall, of McDowell, from practising her profession within 50 miles of the Daniel Boone Clinic at McDowell after she had quit working for the clinic.

The legal action instituted by Dr. Hall began in the Floyd circuit court, with the firm of Willard and Woolsey, Inc., operators of Daniel Boone clinics, the defendant. The appellate court decision upheld the judgment of the lower court.

While the case has been in the Court of Appeals Dr. Hall has returned to practice at McDowell.

The covenant in question was referred to in a one-year employment contract Dr. Hall signed with the Daniel Boone Clinic on July 1, 1969. Her salary as a newly qualified specialist in internal medicine was \$24,000. Later, she asked the clinic to release her from her contract. That request came after she and four other physicians employed by the clinic served notice they wanted to resign to form their own group to practice medicine in McDowell.

The five physicians expressed disatisfaction with the clinic's administrative policies and with their pay. They also maintained that the growth of the clinic was a result of their efforts and not those of the clinic, which subleased space and equipment from the Appalachian Regional Hospitals.

The clinic refused to release Dr. Hall, saying it would have no internal medicine specialist if she left.

"It is obvious that the clinic was placed at a great disadvantage with inadequate time in which to re-staff its hospital," Chief Justice James Milliken wrote for the majority of the high court.

"Although it may be urged that public policy requires that such restrictive covenants should be frowned upon by the courts when applied to the medical profession because the public is implicitly involved," he continued, "it may also be The Labor Department has classified urged that the health of the public is better served if squabbles among physicians are averted by prior agreements and the public

> "It is our opinion," he said, "that the damages that the clinic might suffer from breach of the covenant, though intangible, are sufficient to justify invoking the injunctive powers of the courts and that, since the damages are not susceptible of monetary valuation, there is no adequate remedy at law."



## **McDowell Star Among Recruits** Signed by M.S.U.



## **Many Fisherman List Bluegill A Favorite Among Game Fish**

FRANKFORT, KY.-There's no telling people who scorn other types of fish. Their choice is bluegill and they don't mind let- never seems to be a lack of bluegill. ting the world know.

of ribbing from the erudite bass caster, who fish than the black bass, or the trout fisherman who thinks that he is the only purist in the business.

This is all well and good. As they say, it takes all kinds to make up the world and the same goes for fishing in Kentucky. So, to go "mod" about it all, each fisherman has his individual "thing" to do.

Now that the bluegill fisherman has been equated with the so-called upper echelon, let's get down to the nitty-gritty of catching this tiny, terrific fighter.

It's about time, right now, for the bluegill to be on the nest. He moves in a bit later than other species of fish and deposits his eggs in a nest fanned out for that purpose by both male and female of the species. Usually the eggs are on a clearing on the bottom of the lake, in water not more than a couple of feet deep.

Many individuals may spawn eggs in this area and, once spawned, the adults stand by the protect the eggs from marauders, and therein lies their downfall. They'll battle anything that comes near the nesteven a lunker bass is put to flight by the sharp pinpointed darts of the bluegill.

They'll attack a turtle or any type fish that veers too near and they'll do the same to a proferred morsel of food neatly fashioned to a tiny hook.

They'll hit with a vengeance that makes the art of "hooking" these fellows little more than a sharp jerk on the line. The fish is then reeled in through the shallow waters as it veers from side to side, violently tugging all the while.


This fishing procedure over a nest may continue for hours, as a seemingly unending supply of bluegill are waiting nearby to take the tempting lure.

The fisherman may use a cane pole, which is ideal for farm ponds; he may use the casting or spinning rod or, if he desires to display untold skill with his flyrod, he may just about wear out his arm while casting a small fly over and across the nest, bringing in a flapping bluegill on almost every cast.



QUESTION: Can the mentally retarded be helped?

ANSWER: Until recent years, it was felt abilities and to contribute to society. that once a person's condition was diagnosed as mental retardation and he was assigned to one of the intelligence or behavorial levels we've discussed the past few weeks-profound, severe, moderate, or mild-he would probably stay at that level the rest of his life. He was trained, treated or educated at that level, if and when a training-treatment program was available to him. Usually, advancement to the next level was not even considered. As a result, the individual did not advance-he either Although his thought processes are limited, stayed at the assigned level or he does think. He thinks, learns, feels, deteriorated.

Fortunately, we have gained new insights retarded-he makes decisions. in the past few years and throughout the country, programs are now under way for the mentally retarded which give them the challenge and opportunity to further their mental and social growth. Many mentally

(The information for this section is retarded persons are no longer considered doomed to stay at the same level where they originally tested. With professional help, they are now encouraged to move upward. In fact, the premise on which most Federal Programs for the mentally retarded are based is the belief and faith in the mentally retarded's potential ability to improve their intellectual and social

There must be a careful assessment of each retarded person's potential before entering a rehabilitation progam if he is to make the most effective use of it. If he is pressured by demands that are too high for him, or, on the other hand, left unchallenged by demands too low, the rehabilitation is more likely to fail.

Even though the mentally retarded person usually lacks the full normal capacity for learning, he does learn. hopes, and except for the most profoundly

But, how much each individual improves depends in large measure on the type of medical, social and educational help he receives and what opportunities the community offers.


