

Two Groups Oppose Compromise Offer

Letter Protests Move Suggested To End Conflict

Troubles of the embattled Floyd County Comprehensive Health Services Program, which were believed last week to have been settled with the proposal of its board of directors to resign upon appointment of an interim committee to reorganize the program, may still exist, it was indicated this week.

County Judge Henry Stumbo said he has had no word from Health Affairs in Washington about its plans, and two groups have protested the new plan.

Asked about the new developments, Judge Stumbo said all he knew "was what he had read in the papers." And this is a part of what he had read:

Members of the Eastern Kentucky Welfare Rights Organization and of a "blue ribbon board" suggested by EKWRO to manage on an interim basis the program met in Lexington to protest the reorganization plan as suggested to OEO and Health Affairs by resolution adopted by the old board of directors.

After the Lexington meeting Nick Frasure, a member of the welfare group, said it had been agreed to write OEO a letter protesting these points:

1. The reappointment of Floyd County Judge Henry Stumbo as head of an interim board and a promise to reinstate some old employees of the program recommended by Stumbo.

2. Membership on the interim board for the state OEO office, which, the group said, is to monitor the program and would involve itself in a conflict of interest by having a representative on the board.

3. A general county election to choose three of the five "consumer" members of the board. The group will suggest that the local political organization, headed by Stumbo, could easily see that consumers of its choice are elected.

The letter will ask that the "consumer" members be appointed - as will the public and professional representatives on the 10-member board - and that they come, preferably, from among welfare rights organization members.

4. The OEO's failure to include representatives of the Council of the Southern Mountains and other interested, poverty-oriented organizations on the board.

Board members, under current plans, will include - in addition to the consumers, Stumbo and the state OEO representative - the state commissioner of health, the dean of the University of Kentucky College of Medicine and the administrator of Alice Lloyd College.

Frasure said the welfare rights group's board would have included, besides those present at the Lexington meeting, representatives of the Council of Southern Mountains, the Park-DuValle Neighborhood Health Council of Louisville and of two mountain clinics.

Title I Cut To End Clothing Purchases For Needy Students

Title I funds handled by the Floyd county school system will not be available this year, as in the past, for the purchase of clothing for economically disadvantaged children who attend school.

The necessity to eliminate this service to children stems from the 10 per cent budget cut for the Title I program in this county for the coming school year.

Superintendent Charles Clark explained: "A loss of 10 per cent of Title I funds is in the neighborhood of \$88-90,000, and the present budget would not permit clothing purchases without cutting Title I educational services."

2-Day Regatta Set for Dewey This Week-End

The boats will be moving faster than usual Saturday and Sunday at Dewey Lake when the Dewey Lake chapter of the National Outboard Association will stage its first annual regatta.

Barry Storm, recreation director at Jenny Wiley State Park and program director for the regatta, said a total purse of \$2,400 will be offered winners. Fifty boats from a wide area are expected to participate. Prizes have been donated by Prestonsburg, Paintsville and Pikeville business houses.

The 12 classes for Saturday's races will range from the 40-50-cubic-inch group through those of unlimited power. Two Sunday marathons will be staged - one for all stock classes, beginning at 2 p.m., and the second for all unlimited classes, starting at 4 p.m.

An added attraction, both days, will be kite-skier John Frazier, Simpsonville, Ky., who will fly 125 feet above the surface of the water.

The prizes in the various categories will be: first place, \$50; second, \$30; third, \$20.

Last Showings Of 'Jenny Wiley'

The Jenny Wiley Summer Music Theatre will play its final performances of the season Thursday-Sunday, August 19-22 at 8:30 p.m. in the amphitheatre of Jenny Wiley State Park.

The current production, "Jenny Wiley!" a new musical by Mitch Douglas and Benjamin Keaton, has since its opening two weeks ago broken all attendance records for the summer theatre. The musical won a standing ovation from its opening night audience, and three of four critics' reviews were favorable.

The 1971 season has been the most successful in the theatre's history. Attendance increased by 20 percent. Earlier productions of "Oklahoma" and "The Sound of Music" won public and critical acclaim. Jacqueline Pierce, of the Metropolitan Opera, became with her performances here the first "Met" artist to play an extended engagement in Kentucky.

The theatre is now in the process of planning its 1972 season and has announced initial auditions at the amphitheatre for 1:30 p.m. Friday, August 20. Applicants should bring a piece of prepared music and a complete resume. Auditions are open to the public.

Former Wayland Woman Realizes Dream of Becoming An Engineer

A former Floyd county woman, in becoming a professional engineer, has realized a dream of years.

Mrs. Virginia Hatfield Fraley, formerly of Wayland, recently passed the Ohio state board examination for civil engineers after years of unremitting effort and a refusal to give up on an ambition that dates back to girlhood. "I can't remember when I didn't want to be a professional engineer," she says.

The widow of Junior Fraley and mother of three, she has not only achieved the dream of personal achievement but also has realized that of success for her three children. She has been employed by the Ohio Department of Highways at Columbus for 10 years. One of her sons, James Aaron, is an instructor of mathematics at New York State University and is working toward a Ph. D. Another son, Jan Thomas, is a veteran of the Peace Corps and was with the U. Highlands Folk Fest To Add Pennington, Kazee to Its 'Cast'

When the sixth annual Kentucky Highlands Folk Festival opens at the Jenny Wiley State Park amphitheatre here Sept. 3, the wealth of native talent will be joined by two nationally known folk singers, it was announced this week by Mrs. Edith F. James, director of the festival.

To appear at the festival for the first time will be Lee Pennington, poet and folksinger, and Buell Kazee, former Brunswick recording artist, who, a native of Magoffin county, is described as "Kentucky mountain born and banjo-bred."

Mr. Pennington, also a native Kentuckian, is the author of more than 600 published poems and teaches creative

writing at Jefferson Community College, Louisville. Termed "one of the youngest, most creative talents Appalachia has produced in the last decade," Pennington turns his talent to the music of his region in the most effective fashion.

Mr. Kazee was born on the head of the Burton Fork in Magoffin county. He sings tunes dating back to the Elizabethan era, as well as many native to the hills, to his own accompaniment. A Baptist minister for more than 50 years, he has made his folksinging a hobby, but now in semi-retirement he is heard more frequently in concert.

Mall Wins Nod Here But Money Is Problem

Although its actual construction still depends upon several factors - mainly, financial participation by an agency of the federal government - the open-air mall proposed for Prestonsburg's business district edged ahead at last Thursday night's meeting of the City Council with business men and property-owners in the Court street area.

Of the dozen business interests represented, all gave their approval of the project.

The council thereupon voted to employ a planner to complete project plans. After this is done, applications for federal assistance will be filed.

Mayor George P. Archer said it is not certain that such help will be available. Without it, he added, the project would be beyond Prestonsburg's reach. The open-air mall, which would have an overall park

effect, closed to all except pedestrian traffic, would extend in the central business district from the Lake Drive-Court street traffic light the length of Court street to Front street. Plans include a third parking area.

Council approved plans for construction on Lake Drive of a municipal building which would house all departments of city government and also provide second-story offices for lease to private individuals or firms. But this project, too, depends upon financing.

Mayor Archer said a meeting was held Monday evening with the Prestonsburg Water & Gas Commission at which the commission was asked to participate as a lessor of quarters in the new municipal building, its rental payments joining those of other departments of city government in retiring bonds issued by a holding company in the financing arrangement.

"Unless they (the commission) participate, we wouldn't be able to undertake the building," Mayor Archer said.

The water and gas commission asked for a week in which to consider the proposal.

Next Grand Jury Will Investigate Deaths of Four

When the Floyd circuit court begins its criminal session, Sept. 7, the grand jury will have the task of investigating four slayings which have occurred since the last criminal term of court, Commonwealth's Attorney Harold J. Stumbo said this week.

The deaths to be investigated are those of Gurnies Hall, at Estill, Virgil Lee Tackett at Justell, Verline Robinson at Manton and Ernest Hall on Left Beaver Creek.

One murder case, that of Palmer Powers, accused of the slaying of Paul Dean Taylor at Auxier, is already docketed for trial. Some of those indicted in new cases may be given trial during the term, it was said.

Ninety-three names have been drawn from the jury drum to provide the grand and petit juries for the term. Names and addresses of prospective jurors follow:

Vandy Coalition In 'Health Fair' Work in County

The Vanderbilt University Health Coalition, which has conducted "health fairs" for some time in Tennessee, has been for the last five days in Kentucky for the first time with a similar fair being conducted at the John M. Stumbo elementary school, Grethel, for the benefit of the poor on Mud Creek.

Volunteer Vanderbilt students, nurses and doctors, directed by Dr. Ben Roach, physician at a Midway, Ky., clinic, have offered free physical examinations. The team, which included Dr. Joe Moss, chief resident in pediatrics at Vanderbilt, has made blood tests to detect black lung and other diseases, has done X-rays and electro-cardiograms when needed and held dental and nutritional consultations.

Dr. Roach was asked to serve as director of the program because most of those from the Vanderbilt Coalition are not licensed to practice in Kentucky. Members of the team said they came to this county on invitation of the Eastern Kentucky Welfare Rights Organization.

Traffic Safety Group To Conduct Workshop

County and city officials in this county have been invited to attend the first Alcohol Re-Education Workshop, to be held at Jenny Wiley State Park, next Wednesday, it was announced this week.

Mrs. Mary Richmond, a member of the Kentucky Traffic Safety Coordinating Committee's citizens advisory board, said the officials and interested citizens are being invited to the meeting, which will focus on alcohol re-education centers for offenders of Kentucky's drinking and driving laws.

Kentucky's problems with handling drinking drivers will be presented by Arthur E. "Buzz" Beard, executive director for the Kentucky Traffic Safety Coordinating Committee. The alcohol re-education centers will be explained by Dr. Jerry L. Miller, a professor at Eastern Kentucky University and director of the state's first operating alcohol re-education center, and Richmond Police Judge Paul E. Fagan, who refers offenders to Miller's clinic.

Martin's Flood Control Project Beset by Snags

Officials of the town of Martin and Floyd county agreed this week that there is a chance the flood control project which has been already partially funded for Martin could be lost.

Congress has appropriated \$800,000 for the initial phase of the work there. Before it is completed - if the work is undertaken, at all - approximately \$3 million in federal funds will have been spent there.

The U. S. Army Corps of Engineers has planned the work to begin at a point near the junction of Right and Left Beaver Creeks, west of Martin, and to extend downstream through the town to a point near Clark Branch, between Arkansas Creek and the town of Allen.

Beaver Creek, which has repeatedly flooded Martin and farmlands in the area, would, according to the Corps of Engineers' plans, be widened at its bottom to a width of 75 feet, straightened where necessary and its banks rippedraped to prevent their erosion.

The Engineers estimate the work, if completed, would reduce the level of floodwaters in Martin 5.7 feet. This reduced depth of the stream itself and the control of Big Sandy River waters through upstream dams will, it is held, remove entirely the threat of damaging flood. (Without control of the river stage, backwater has in the past caused heavy damage in Martin.)

But the town of Martin and the Floyd fiscal court must procure without cost to the federal government easements from property-owners before any work will be undertaken. And those negotiating for these easements are running into trouble.

Raymond Griffith, who is working with Martin Mayor E. P. Grigsby in an effort to procure property easements within the city limits, said that perhaps as many as 20 property-owners have refused to make easement grants. Milton Stumbo, who is (See Story No. 3, Page 12)

State Moves Toward Mine Water Control

Frankfort, Ky.—The state's first detailed standards for impounding and treating runoff water from surface mines would be set under a proposed regulation now being circulated by the state Reclamation Commission.

The commission has sent preliminary draft copies to coal-industry officials, other governmental agencies and citizens' groups, with a request that comments and recommendations be submitted by next Monday.

A final draft then will be the subject of a public hearing scheduled at 10 a.m. Sept. 17

in the state Health Department auditorium in Frankfort.

The 1966 strip-mine law contains a general provision that surface-mine operators must "impound, drain or treat all runoff water so as to reduce soil erosion, damage to agricultural lands and pollution of streams and other waters." However, that section of the law never has been implemented with specific standards.

A regulation to set water standards for surface mines has been discussed periodically by Reclamation Director Elmore Grim for several years. However, formal action has been withheld until the adoption of statewide water-quality standards, Grim said. The state Water Pollution Control Commission, after a series of controversies, finally adopted such standards last month.

"We've never had (general) state standards and we didn't want to be in conflict with them," Grim explained.

The regulation would require that water discharged from a surface mine into public streams:

1. Have a "Ph" (acid-alkaline) factor of not less than 6 or more than 9. (Neutral is 7.) In addition, "the discharge must register a positive net alkalinity."
- (As explained by reclamation officials, waters with the same "Ph" factor can have a different "net alkalinity" because of different mineral contents. "Net alkalinity" refers to a water's ability to withstand additional acid.)
2. Contain no settleable solids (such as coal "fines" or sand).
3. Contain no suspended sediment in excess of 1,000 Jackson turbidity units four hours after a "major precipitation event" and not more than 200 such units 24 hours after such precipitation. A "major precipitation event" is not defined.

In addition, surface-mine operators would be required to:

Construct approved treatment facilities, water-retarding structures and silt dams before the start of mining; intercept all surface water uphill from the stripping pit so that it does not enter the pit; keep natural drainways open; make no discharge through existing deep mines; seal any deep-mine opening encountered with "low permeability soil material to a depth of three times the greater dimension of the (mine) opening" and "a masonry-type seal keyed into the sides and floor of the opening"; pump or siphon into a natural drainway any water that collects in a stripping operation; discharge all drainage from a surface mining operation through treatment facilities.

The limits on water acidity would have their biggest impact in the West Kentucky coalfields, Grim said yesterday.

"Every seam out there has potential acid drainage," he said.

While East Kentucky coal only presents acidity problems in scattered instances, the problem of sediment control is greater in the eastern mountains, Grim added.

Grim also said the reclamation division expects to get a grant from the federal Environmental Protection Agency to conduct a test of the new regulation's effectiveness and enforceability in a previously unmined area.

Testing stations would be erected to measure water quality before, during and after mining, Grim said.

The Reclamation Commission, which will decide on adoption of the proposed regulation, is composed of state Natural Resources Commissioner James Shropshire, Mines and Minerals Commissioner Harrel Kirkpatrick and Grim.

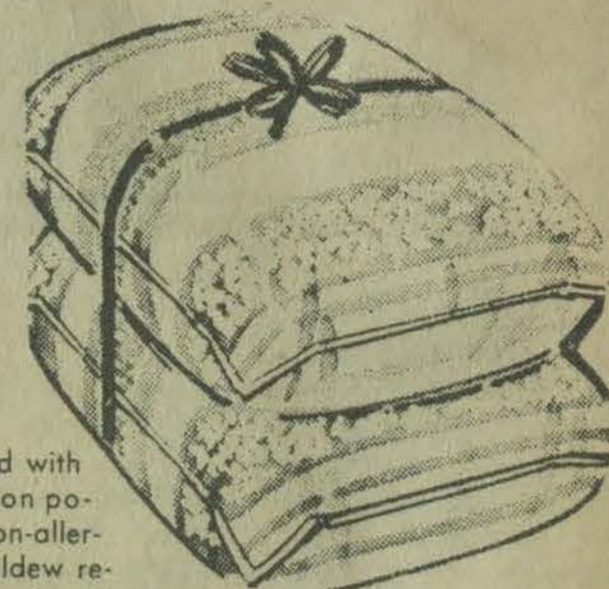

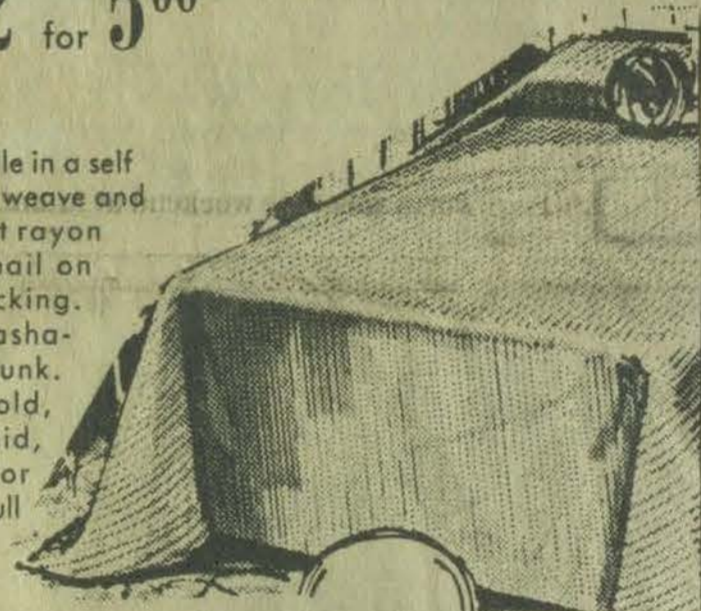

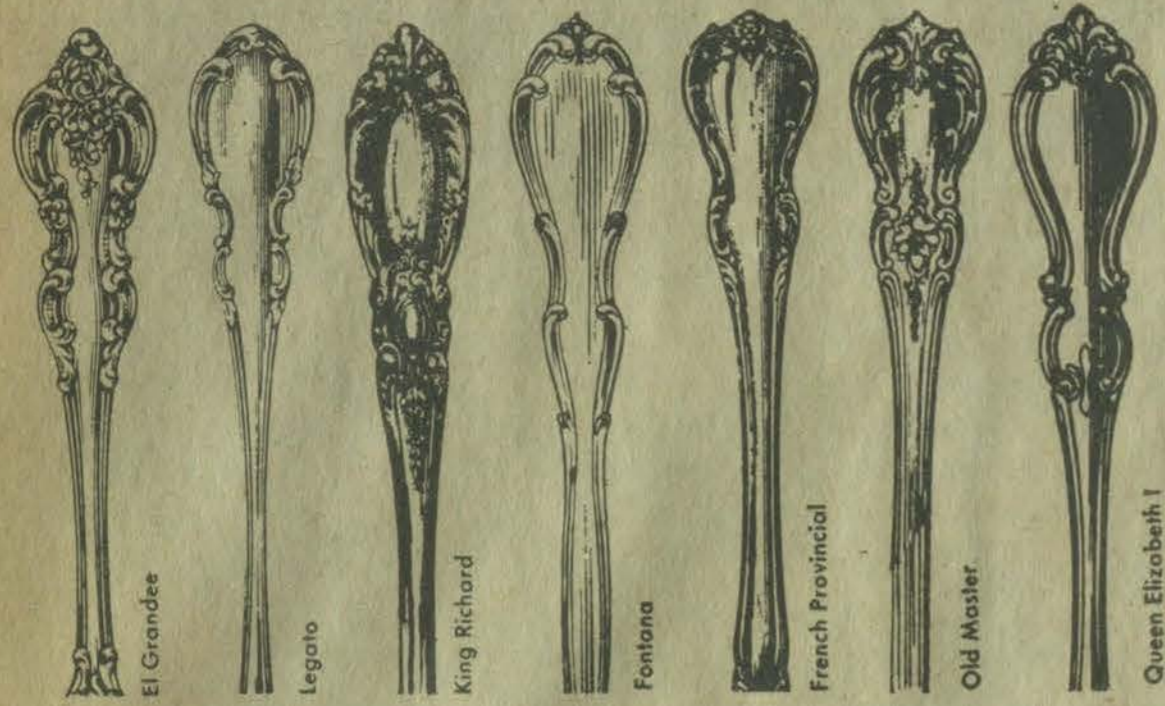

Good Squirrel Season Expected

FRANKFORT, KY.—If the squirrel hunter so desired he could spend almost one-third of a year in Kentucky woods legally hunting the bushytails. Actually, 116 days have been decreed as legal squirrel hunting time, more than for any other species of protected wildlife in the commonwealth.

This year the season opens Aug. 21, continues through the remainder of that month, through all of September and October, after which there is a lull until Nov. 18 when the second phase opens. That last part will continue through the remainder of November and closes Dec. 31.

The long season may be one reason that squirrel hunting is the No. 1 harvester of wildlife, numerically, in Kentucky. And there must be a pretty good supply of squirrels or the 1,389,000 yearly average over a five-year period would not be available.

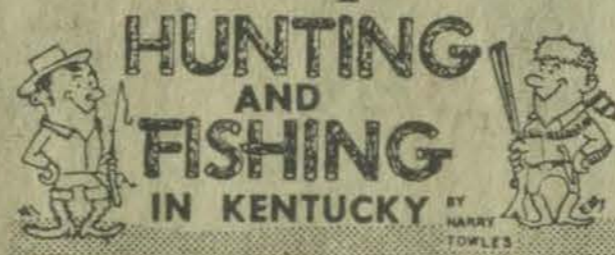
Biologists of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources believe 1971 will produce another moderate crop of both the grey and fox squirrel (sometimes erroneously called the red squirrel). They base their prediction on observations in the woods by field men, and on the fact that last fall a fair supply of mast (squirrel food) was available on trees and bushes. That always reflects on the squirrel crop the following season.

The mast crop is one of the most reliable indices of the upcoming population. If there is a good supply of food produced in a given summer (enough to last through the following winter) then a hearty, robust squirrel breeding stock is available.

If the food is not available, much of the broodstock will not make it through the winter and those that do will not produce the good, strong type of young, and the population will suffer.

But biologists say the mast crop was about average last winter and therefore the papa and mama squirrels made it through the cold months fairly well. This has resulted in an average crop of young, and points to a good shooting year for the Kentucky squirrel hunter.

Squirrel hunting is a statewide endeavor. There's hardly a county that does not offer targets for these hunters. The grey squirrel is universal in scope and from the banks of



the Mississippi to the Big Sandy, Kentucky nimrods will be plinking at this most elusive animal. In the central Bluegrass section, with its stately trees dotting pastureland and wide fields, the fox squirrel will be the target. The latter may be the sharper of the two species, when it comes to outwitting the hunter, probably due to the fact that it has a better view of his adversary as he approaches.

One note to the squirrel hunter: Often the best hunting is later in the season. In the early days a hunter may become discouraged because he does not see the number of squirrels he expects, but this does not mean they're not present. In all probability, they'll show up about that time in the fall when they start storing nuts and other food for winter use.

Squirrels may be hunted with shotguns that hold no more than three shells in the barrel and magazine combined, or with breech-loading rifles less than .240 caliber. Shotguns loaded with slugs or buckshot are prohibited as are all breech-loading rifles of .240 caliber or above.

These restrictions are placed on the weapons, not so much to protect the squirrels as to prevent hunters from illegally cracking down on a deer in the hunting season. Squirrels may, however, be taken with all types of muzzle-loading weapons. The limit is six per day or 12 in possession after two or more days of hunting.

Near Dublin, Ireland, an illiterate young lay preacher started a series of meetings in a barn. Folks who attended said it was a rather discouraging meeting. It didn't last too long. The preacher just simply stopped the series, packed up his bag and moved on to what he considered more fruitful fields.

Only a few folks turned out for those meetings, and they weren't much interested in the series. There was a young boy who had made a decision for the Galleian during the meetings, but no one paid much attention to him. Everybody knew him. It was just Gus. And the crowd hardly got excited when Gus made his decision.

Strange, indeed, are the ways we measure success. Numbers, statistics — that's the only method many of us have to judge the worth of a venture. So we count as failures those ventures where we are not overwhelmed with numerical success. If the leading citizens of the community had come to the meetings, made decisions to become Followers of the Way, why the meetings would have been a success. They would have been continued! But just Gus? Why, it was as if everyone had wasted their time.

Fellow told me recently that hindsight is a whole lot better than foresight. The only problem is that by the time we get to the hindsight place, we have already followed our foresight. And using our foresight we measure the worth by the size.

I remember a story about a Man who made a decision. His townspeople didn't get too excited about it. This Man decided to become a preacher. When He returned to His home church to preach, many of the people wouldn't listen to Him. Do you know why? It wasn't because He didn't have anything to say worth listening to. He did. But it was because of who He was! "Is not this the carpenter's son?" they asked. And because He was the carpenter's son, and not the son of the high priest, those neighbors of His would not listen to what He had to say. Instead, they literally ran Him out of town following His sermon in which He spoke some unpopular truth to them.

Well, little Gus grew up and also turned out to be a preacher. He had a lot of enemies, and was an enemy to some people himself. He wrote several books, despite the fact that he died when he was thirty-eight years of age. Those books are out of print now, long since forgotten. He preached many times. More than a thousand in all. But his sermons aren't remembered now. And Gus also liked to write poems, and songs. He wrote one hundred and thirty-three in all. Most of them have not survived the years since Gus was around.

But one song that Gus wrote has survived the years. And it gives every indication of surviving many, many more centuries. The hymn can be found in nearly every hymnbook you pick up. It is entitled "Rock of Ages." It is one of the favorite hymns of millions, and has been a source of inspiration to countless numbers.

Augustus M. Toplady shot a hole in the popular conception that success in a venture for the Creator can only be measured in numbers.

Mondays and Wednesdays, Safest

Frankfort, Ky.—Mondays and Wednesdays, February and early morning—those are probably not your favorite times to travel. But, according to a yearly report from the Department of Public Safety, they are the safest times to drive on Kentucky highways.

A summary of motor vehicle accidents in 1968-70 compiled by the Kentucky State Police shows deaths recorded on Kentucky roads were at their lowest during these periods. There were 3028 deaths on state roads from 1968-70.

In 1968 and 1969, 87 and 81 motorists were killed on the state's roads on Mondays. The 1970 figures showed Wednesdays with 86 deaths and 89 on Mondays. One-hundred-eighty-one persons were killed on Wednesdays during 1968-69.

Weekends, as expected, are the roughest times on the state death count. There were 185 deaths on Saturdays in both 1968 and 1969 and 217 in 1970. Friday figures, when motorists begin traveling to week-end destinations, showed 469 motorists killed during the three-year period while 435 died from Sunday accidents.

Early mornings, between 4 and 5 a.m., have been the safest hours for traveling. Six fatalities were recorded at 5 a.m. during 1968 while 4 a.m. figures showed 11 in each of the next two years.

The heaviest-traveled periods are 3 p.m. A total of 125 deaths occurred in 1968 and 1969 at 3 p.m. while 63, at 5 p.m. was the highest death rate hour last year.

February figures showed 64 deaths last year with two more cold months, January and March, also in the 60's. July recorded 107 deaths, October 106 and November 104. Out of the 1069 deaths in 1970, 907 occurred in rural areas, 162 in urban communities.

During the 1968-70 period, 2024 fatal accidents were reported to the State Police. Speeding drivers caused 591 fatal accidents and drunk drivers were responsible for another 502.

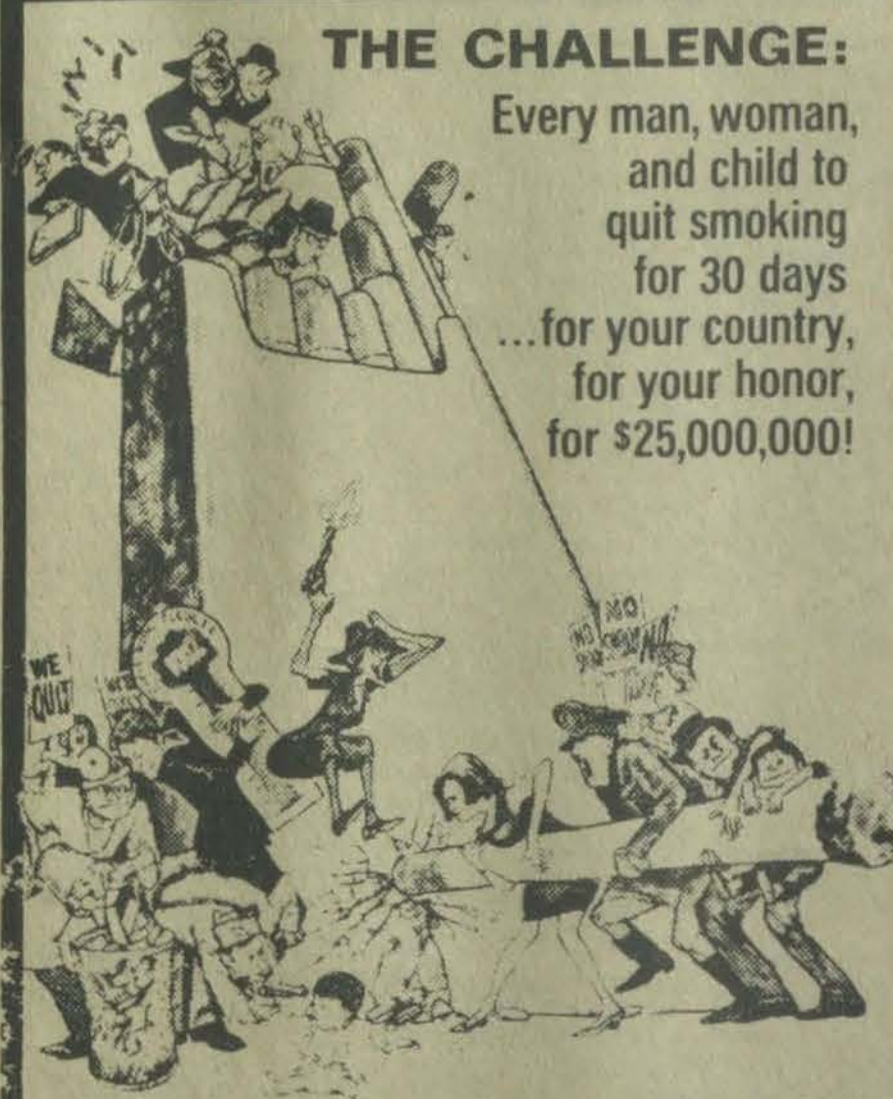

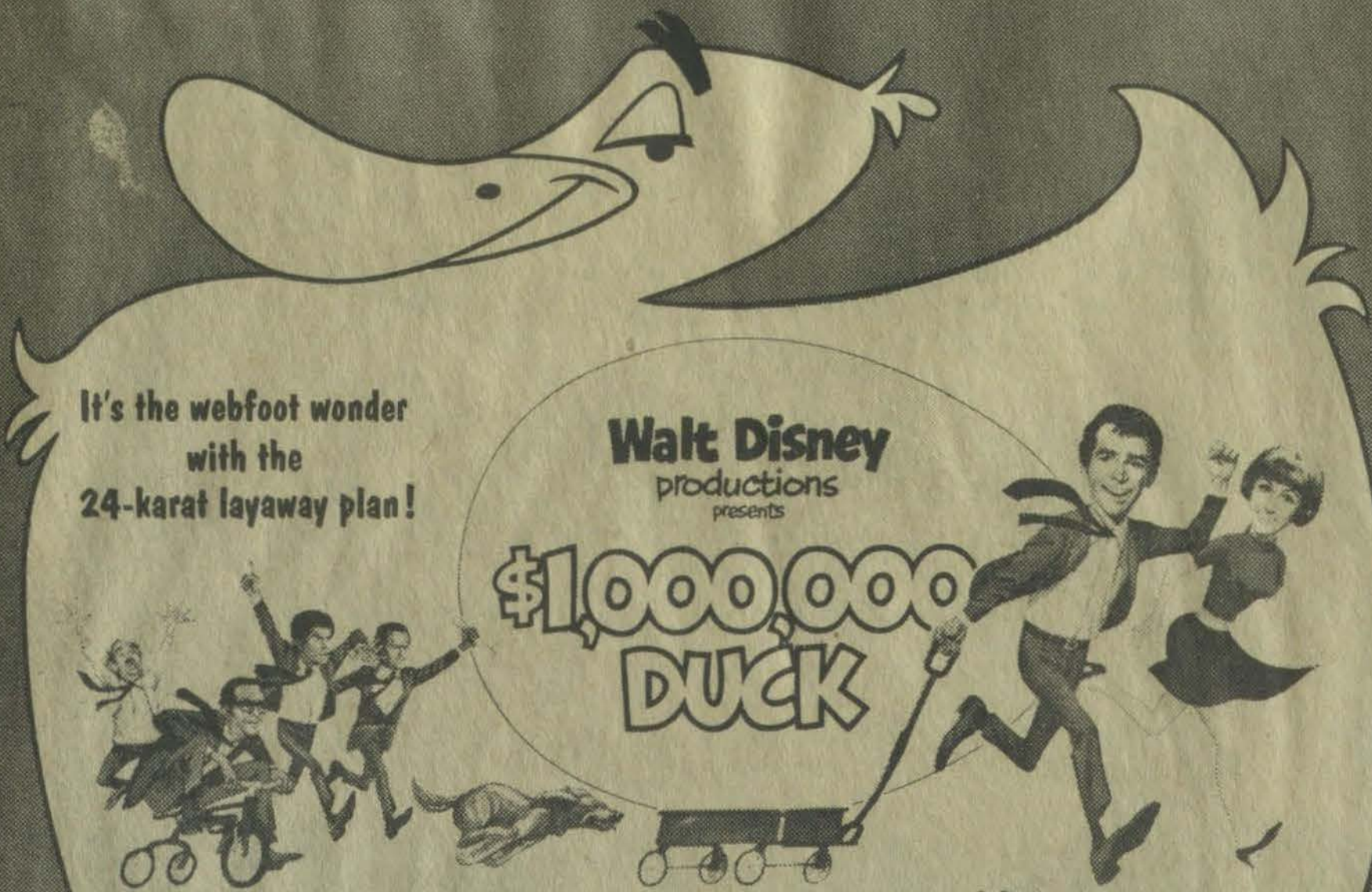

County Judge Henry Stumbo and County Attorney Barkley Sturgill said the fiscal court could institute condemnation proceedings. But neither Martin nor Floyd county has the money to pay for the property, if and when it is acquired by condemnation, and no federal funds can be used for this purpose.

The question which the officials say the town now faces is this:

How long will the federal government wait for these rights of entry to be procured? Congress, they point out, can reallocate the funds already approved to another project which is ready for action.

Health Chief Cites Problems Faced in Providing Medical Care

Kentucky's commissioner of health cites complacency, the population explosion and the matching of medical talent with those people who need it as main problems in providing adequate medical care to citizens of the commonwealth.

In a recent speech before the Frankfort Rotary Club, William P. McElwain said the main problem in providing adequate medical care is getting it from the personnel qualified to administer it to those who need it.

He said any myth about "the good old days" in medicine is ill-founded, and contended that medical care is much better today. As evidence, he cited a big decline in the mortality rate among infants.

He also said Kentuckians are becoming complacent about immunization against diseases and the results are already becoming apparent. McElwain said last year when measles vaccination was heavy there were only 65 reported cases of the disease in the state. This year, 961 cases

have been reported already. The commissioner referred to the environmental problem as a major factor in determining the level of public health. He said there are more people around today than ever before and they like to enjoy a style of living which requires an average of five pounds of garbage, and this must be treated in a sanitary way to prevent disease. He expressed confidence that the army of experts currently working on solutions to environmental and other health problems will be successful.

An increased interest being shown by industrialists in new plant construction in Kentucky is a good sign that the national economy may be on the verge of a significant upswing, Commerce Commissioner Paul W. Grubbs said. In January, his agency had only five active industrial prospects on file, but for the last five months over 35 new prospects have been processed a month.

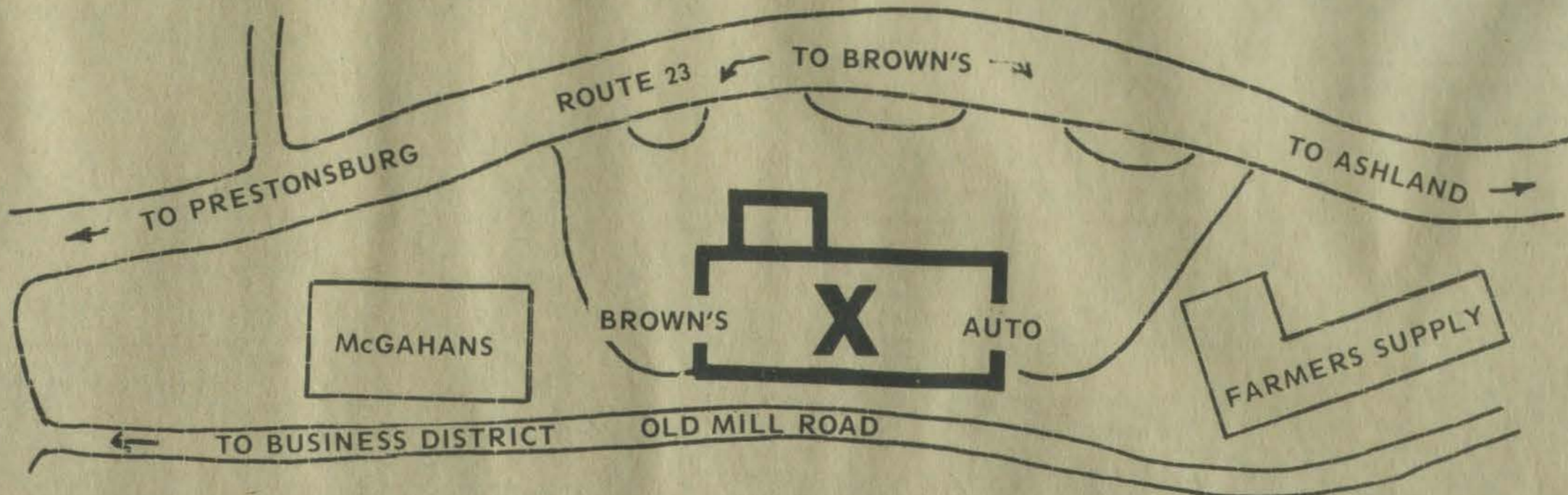

August — Month of Transition

During the dusty days of August become evident the first premonitions and stirrings of fall on the landscape. It is a month of transition when the fresh greens of hastening spring and summer begin to fade into the reds, the browns, and the golds of maturity. With each passing day the green foliage of the fields and woodlands gradually lose succulence, and the colors of age show up in the russets and browns of ripening fruit and in the curling and crisping of leaf and blade.

August is the month when the wildflowers of summer give over to those of autumn, when tall ironweeds in the meadows put forth their madder purple blossoms and the white rosettes of Queen Anne's Lace turn brown and curl up at the edges to form cups wherein spiders lurk to ambush flies.

Then there is the strongly-scented tansy with its golden, bitter button blossoms and fernlike leaves which, in the days of old, were used to keep flies away from fresh killed meat. Also in every fence corner are tall goldenrods struggling for standing room and lifting their yellow plumes to the sun.

There is the cardinal flower with its tall spikes flaming red in the swamps and the purplish-flowered dittany along back country roadsides with which, according to ancient Indian legend, deer and wild goats wounded by arrows healed themselves.

August is the month of jewelweed, the medication of injured serpents; of wild blue ageratum; of purple milkweed, self-heal, and dusky jungles of ragweed; of bursting spikes of broadleaf cattails casting clouds of white-tufted seed into the air and into the pond at their feet.

For many forms of plant life and bird life and animal life, August is the month of waiting. It is the month when all nature seems poised on the crest of the wave of summer and sits waiting until the wave curls and breaks and then, in slow slide, slips downward into the placid seas of autumn.

Rest is the order of the month for most of the things of nature. The time for sprouting and other forms of procreation are over, and now comes the time of feeding and storing away in nut and rind and husk for leaner times to come.

The water level of the pond sinks lower in August. The cool rill in the back pasture which sang so merrily in the months before has silenced its voice to a whisper and, along the still, dark pools of the woodland stream, herons stalk young frogs and minnows which were hatched during the turbulent busy days of spring. Gone are the songs of the tanager, the catbird, and the thrasher, and the sparking tide that was summer ebbs and flows on the currents of time while the patient land waits and reflects upon what is and what has been since the world began.

In August even the fearful ruthless winds of June and July seem to succumb to the lassitudes of the month. From time to time they awaken to strum a few melancholy bars on the power and telephone lines crossing the river or to slightly trouble the glassy surface of the ponds. Then they retire to indulge in fitful slumber in the pine forests beyond the back forty.

August is the month of katydids, mole crickets, and other insects whose incessant voices combine into dreamy nocturnes. It is the month that brings the first uneasy stirrings of the migratory instinct to many birds and the end of life to fireflies that through the long summer lifted their gleams upward in the dusk.

With the poppy as its special flower and the sardonyx as its gem, August is a good month. It is the month when all nature starts reaching fruition.

10,000 STATE DRIVERS MAY GET DRIVERS' LICENSES RESTORED, AS RESULT OF COURT RULING

Frankfort, Ky.—If you're wearing out shoe leather because your driver's license was suspended under Kentucky's financial responsibility law, state driver licensing officials want to hear from you.

According to Roger L. Wilhoite, driver licensing director, you could be eligible to get that license re-instated immediately.

Wilhoite cited a recent Supreme Court ruling, reached in the case of a Georgia motorist who appealed loss of his license under a similar law, as the reason why "as many as 10,000 suspended Kentucky

drivers" may now be able to get their suspensions lifted.

The high court held that an operator's permit could not be revoked solely on the basis of a state law requiring that he show proof of financial responsibility to meet costs of any civil judgment that might later arise out of a court case.

Both Georgia and Kentucky required that a motorist involved in an accident where a death, injury or property damage of \$100 or more occurred must prove financial responsibility, either by posting suitable bond or showing coverage under a valid auto liability insurance policy.

Until the new ruling was handed down, failure to prove financial responsibility was considered sufficient grounds for the suspension of a driver's license.

Wilhoite said that any Kentucky driver suspended under the financial responsibility law should write his office, giving his full name, date of birth and date of the accident which resulted in his suspension. Letters should be addressed to the Driver Licensing Div., Department of Public Safety, State Office Building, Frankfort, Ky. 40601.

"If, since that accident, the driver hasn't been convicted of a traffic offense for which the law prescribes revocation or suspension, we will probably reinstate his license immediately," Wilhoite said.

Drivers who complied with the law by posting bond are also urged to contact Wilhoite. If they execute an affidavit certifying that, as a result of the accident, no civil judgment is now outstanding against them, the bond will be refunded.

Wilhoite said that, as a result of the court ruling, any further suspensions may not be ordered without first giving the driver an opportunity to prove that he was not at fault.

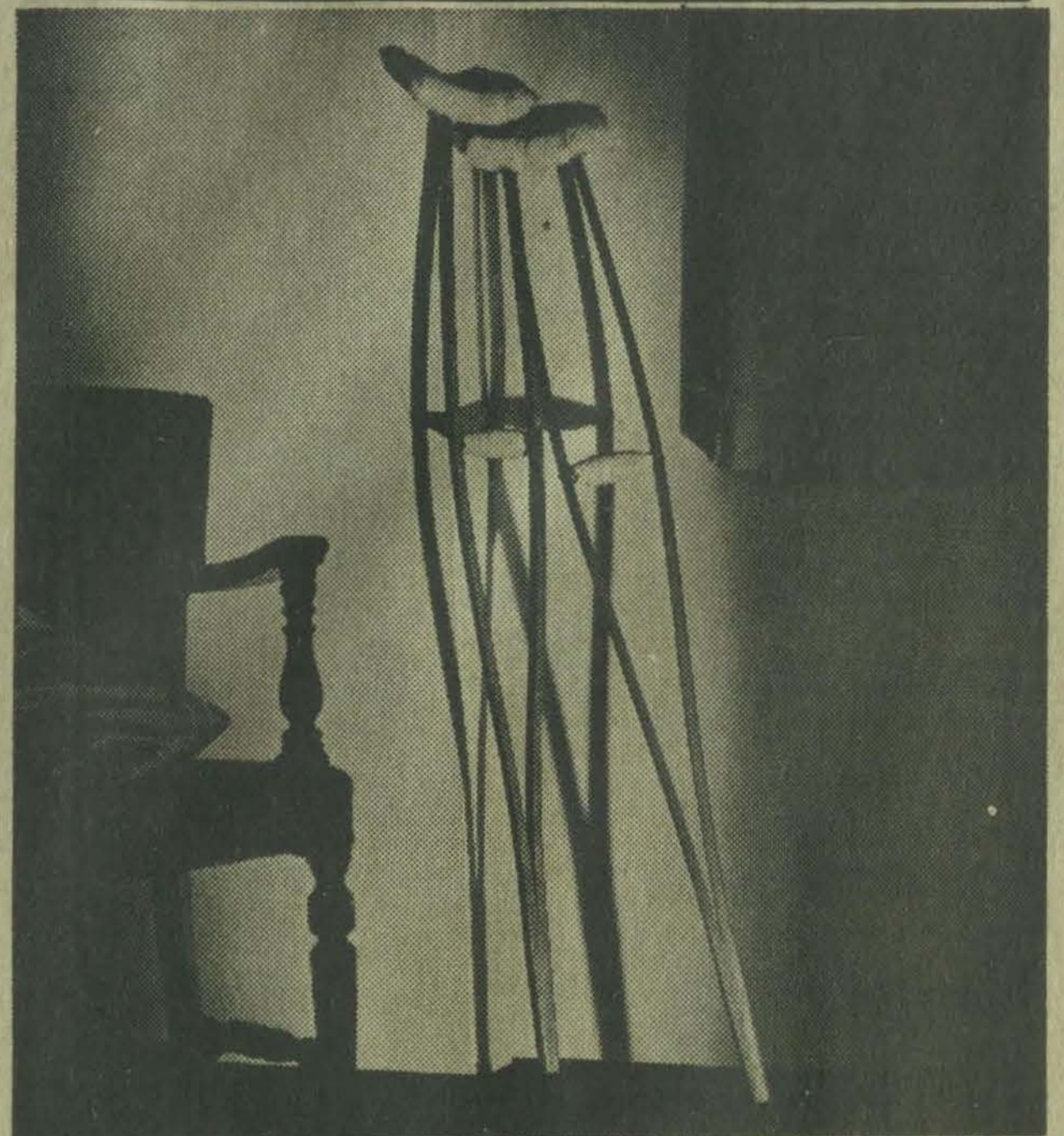
